GORDON SPOT

The good rains we had in May helped crops, pastures, gardens and lawns grow at maximum rates, but the warm, humid weather also is the cause of some problems.

We are seeing some leaf spot on bermudagrass lawns known as Helminthosporium leaf spot. Symptoms of this fungal disease appear as irregular patches ranging in size from two the several feet in diameter. Infections on leaves appear as a small olive green spot which enlarges to form dark blotches. Infected leaves die and fade to a light tan color. The entire plant is killed when the

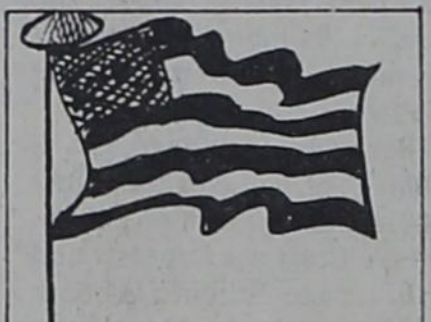
root rot phase of this disease develops.

The disease causing fungus over winters in thatch at the base of the plant and develops when the weather is warm and humid.

A chemical control is recommended where this disease is a problem. Any one of the following fungicides will control the spread of this disease: Captan, Daconil 2787, Actidione, Tore or Tepsan LSR.

Grey Leaf Spot is another we have seen in lawns. The chemical fungicides listed above will also control this disease.

Do you have problems trying to keep home grown potatoes? Fresh potatoes can be harvested any time for immediate consumption, but quality is lowered by harvesting all your potatoes before tops begin to dry down. Potatoes harvested early have thin skins which allow fairly rapid water loss, causing them to shrivel and become soft shortly after storage.

Mosquito Facts & Fancies

Get Ready For (Another) Mosquito Season

Scientists tell us that the pesky mosquito has been with us (and AT us) since the Ice Age. Attempts to divert its annoying attacks on mankind were recorded at least 3,000 years ago with Egyptian use of smudgepots and mosquito netting.

Even today, outdoor enthusiasts are still battling the mosquito. That's not surprising when you consider scientists have identified more than 3,000 species and sub-species of mosquitos. That fact alone is enough to make one start scratching.

While most of us view the mosquito as a nuisance whose bites cause severe itching and irritation while ruining outdoor activities, researchers at Cutter Laboratories point out that you should also be aware that some mosquito species also continue to be a health problem by spreading encephalitis, a serious disease. Some areas of the U.S. even issue "mosquito alerts" to the public when mos-

quito infestation intensifies. Although most of us aren't particularly discriminating about the sex of the mosquito that lands on an arm or leg, you might be surprised to know that it's only the female who's responsible for biting and the resulting itch.

The male is strictly vegetarian, living on plant nectar. Although the female savors the same diet, human or animal blood is a vital part of her egg producing cycle.

Mosquitos lay their eggs on dry ground any time from April through October.



All they need to hatch weeks later is for the rains to come and for a little standing water to be left behind. It takes only two days for the eggs to hatch into larvae.

Our warm, moist skin, the lactic acid in human perspiration, and the carbon dioxide in our exhaled breath are all known to attract the female mosquito. However, when you want to enjoy the great outdoors, there are a few common sense measures you can take to reduce the chances of insect bite. Stay away from stagnant water and be sure to wear long sleeves and pants in the evening and early morning.

Any outdoorsman will tell you that the female mosquito will bite even through fabric. One effective way to discourage her blood-sucking attempts is with Cutter Evergreen, a fresh-scented insect repellent spray from Cutter Laboratories. Its aroma is attractive to humans, but at the same time, it jams the mosquito's sensors, leaving it unable to follow the tantalizing warm, moist air currents from humans, and allowing you to enjoy the great outdoors without itching, scratching and discomfort from mosquito bites.

disease losses will be greater due to the lenticels acting as infection sites.

Never store potatoes that are diseased. These will only continue to decay, causing additional losses. Potatoes which were bruised in harvesting should be consumed first. It is best to dig potatoes and store them in a warm area (55 to 60 degrees) for 15 days and then reduce to temperature of 40 degrees. Prior to using, the potatoes should be warmed to improve quality.

Always keep potatoes in complete darkness. Exposure to light causes freshly dug potatoes to turn green and develop an undesirable bitter flavor. Potatoes can be stored for 5 to 6 months if handled properly.

The Olympic Dream—Coming True For Many

The Olympic dream will continue to come true for as many young athletes as possible thanks to some major funding received by the Olympic Training Center in Colorado.

William Simon, president, United States Olympic Committee, announced that "Miller High Life and the Miller Brewing Company have guaranteed a minimum of \$3 million to assure that the Center has operating support through the 1984 Olympics."

According to Simon, "The Training Center concept is a bold approach to provide increased competition opportunities for athletes without regard to age or ability, including all athletes from novice to elite.

"Our goal is to expose as many of the youth of our country as possible to significant concepts in athletic training and development that the USOC is capable of providing," he added.

The USOC's 34-acre site provides an excellent location for amateur sports operations and the training of the nation's Olympic hopefuls. Since the Center opened in 1977, more than 40,000 athletes in some 30 different sports have utilized the training center to perfect their skills.

The Center features a 400-meter track with electronic timing and timing devices; the Sports Medicine Building for development of special health care programs; biomechanics laboratory for human movements studies; Jerry May and Family of Coleman on Sunday.

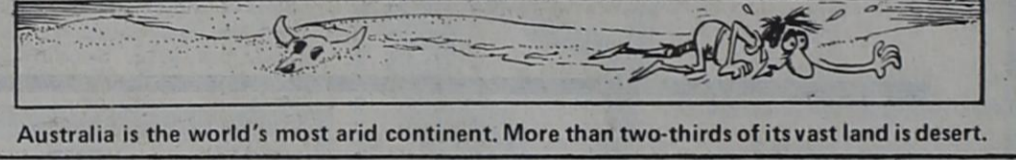
Aggie inventor inducted into Hall of Fame

COLLEGE STATION — The inventor of the integrated circuit and the hand-held calculator—a Texas A&M University electrical engineer — has been chosen for induction into the National Inventors Hall of Fame.
Jack S. Kilby of Dallas will join Thomas Edison, Alexander Graham Bell, the Wright Brothers and other legendary inventors already named to the distinguished group. Kilby is one of five inventors named this

year to the honor coordinated by the U.S. Patent and Trademark office.
Kilby was elected for his invention of the integrated circuit which he created in 1958 when an engineer at Texas Instruments Inc. The integrated circuit was a revolutionary advance in solid-state electronics and led to new products such as the pocket calculator. He has been on leave of absence from TI since 1970.
The inventor joined the Texas A&M faculty in 1978 as a Distinguished Professor of Electrical Engineering. He divides his time between Texas A&M programs and his other research activities.

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NEWS OF SAFETY

RIDER EDUCATION. WHO NEEDS IT?

By Charles H. Hartman President, Motorcycle Safety Foundation
Many riders agree that some form of training program should be available for motorcyclists, but when it comes to their own training they're not so sure. In a survey of nearly 5,000 motorcyclists, Wisconsin Department of Transportation officials found that over 75 percent believed rider education should be available. But when the respondents were asked if they would take such a course, only 44 percent said they would attend.



Evidence from another study, of 900 motorcycle accidents in Southern California, showed that although the motorcyclists had been riding an average of three years, when faced with an accident situation they didn't know what to do. They either took no evasive action or carried out the maneuver incorrectly.
Rider education programs—for new and experienced riders—emphasize handling emergency situations. Perhaps if more of these riders had taken a training program they would have been better able to handle an emergency when it cropped up.
