Gorman Police, assisted by Eastland County Sheriff's Department, arrested two persons early Sunday morning, and charged them with possession of marijuana. The arrests were the result of a search warrant that netted a small amount of marijuana and some paraphernalia in a residence in Gorman. The search warrant was issued by Justice of the Peace Patsy J. Ingram, based on information received by the Gorman Police Department. The arrests in Gorman occurred shortly after the arrest of two other Gorman residents by Comanche County authorities for possession of marijuana. This is the third consecutive week-end that arrests have been made in the Gorman area for drug-related activity.

Panthers To Meet Roscoe In Bi-District At Clyde

The Gorman Panthers put the sign out very quickly on Friday night that they were going to make sure they won a spot in the playoff games if Santa Anna defeated Blanket in the final regular season game. And That's exactly what happened as the Mountaineers edged Blanket 10-6. The Panthers determination to win came on the opening kickoff as Jacky Johnson took the kick about his own 30 and behind some very outstanding blocks on his left side, he raced to distance to bring the Panther fans to their feet and to give them a sample of things to come as the Panthers went on to win 44 to 0 and insure themselves a berth in the playoffs if Santa Anna won.

The Panthers now advance to Bi-District play this Friday against a very outstanding Roscoe team. The Plowboys were beaten last year by Aspermont in the district-deciding game. This season the Plowboys were not to be denied and went through the district contests undefeated. They sport an 8-2 record, losing only to two Class 2-A teams. They have some fine running backs and a front line that averages about 200 pounds. The Plowboys defeated Sterling City last week in the zone playoffs.

The Bi-District game will be played in Clyde at Bulldog Stadium at 7:30 p. m. Friday night. The stadium is located just off Old Highway 80 in Clyde. Gorman fans can take Cherry Lane exit, proceed over the railroad tracks, turn right on Old 80 and the field will be on the left down the highway. The Panthers will advance as the runner-up in District 8-A and Roscoe as the winner in 7-A.

Following the 70 yard kickoff return by Johnson with 11:46 left, Mark Swanner ran for the two pointer to put Gorman in front 8-0. The Panthers held the Wildcats on their first possession and took over at their own 41. Rhett Harrison, who was the leading rusher for Gorman in the game, ran for 10 yards. Johnson added 8 more. Harrison then ran for 7. Swanner got 6. Johnson then made 3 before Harrison added another 5. Then after an incomplete pass, and no gain on a running try, Dane Gressett tossed an 18 yard pass to brother Russ Gressett for the TD with 10:37 left in the second period. The run for points failed and Gorman led 14-0.

The teams then played on even terms until just prior to the halftime intermission. Gorman took the ball on their own 32 and moved the distance in 9 plays with Ricky Hunter scoring on a 5 yard pass from Gressett with just 6 seconds left in the half. The drive featured an 8 yard run by Harrison, a 21 yard run by Swanner, then another 21 yard run by Swanner, and a 5 yard pass to Hunter. Harrison added the two pointer on a run and Gorman was out in front 22-0 at halftime.

After holding the Wildcats on their first possession following intermission, the Panthers took the ball on their own 27 and moved the distance in just 9 plays with Hunter getting the final 10 yards on a beautiful run with 6:57 left in the period. The drive featured a 37 yard scamper by Harrison, a 14 yard jaunt by Swanner, and a 6 yard pass to Johnson. The run for two failed and Gorman led 28-0.

The Panther defense then held the Wildcats on the Gorman 23 and proceeded to score again as they moved 77 yards in 7 plays. The drive was kept alive by a run of 25 yards on a fourth down and 8 when Rodney Reese, the punter, juggled the snap from center, then ran to his right side and raced down

the sidelines for a first down. The following a 5 yard run and an incomplete pass, Harrison hit the middle, broke into the open and outraced the secondary defenders and raced 45 yards for the score with 10:18 left in the game. Swanner added the two pointer on a run and Gorman had a comfortable 36-0 lead.

We congratulate the Panthers and their coaching staff for making the playoffs again this season. They have done a great job, posting a 7-3 record with a small, young team.

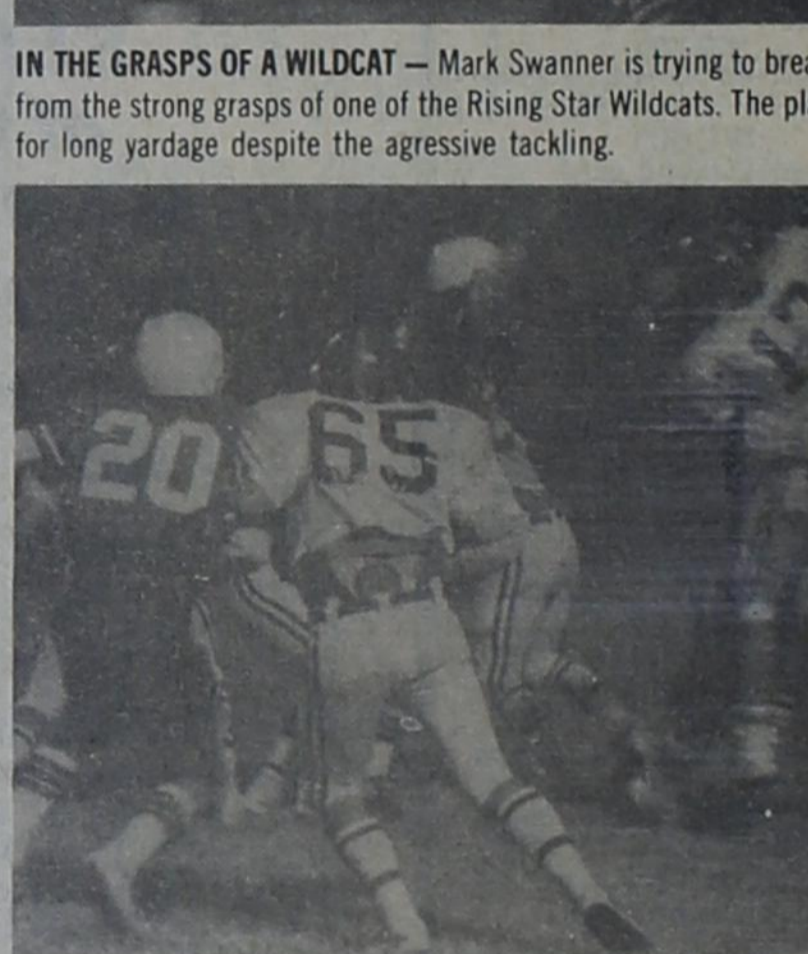
So let's all follow the Panthers to Clyde on Friday night and back them all the way against Roscoe. Get 'Em Big Red.

It's a good day when an idea whose time has come gets up and goes and no one notices.

Gasoline distributors tried. But by the time they changed gallons of liters, the price of gasoline became so high they cut it in half to make the price seem better and besides you couldn't get it anyway on Sundays and long holidays.

Joggers were probably the most successful in the use of the metrics. They had everyone talking about running 10 K's instead of 6.2 miles, but if you believe people who elevate sweat to a sacrament, then you'll believe anything.

The real resistance came from Women who keep house. A kitchen harbors enough strange animals without having milligrams and centimeters running around under the sink. And you try telling a woman who measures a yard from the tip of her nose to her fingers that it'll take 12 meters to cover the kitchen windows with curtain!

As for young people catching on to metric, forget it. Anything that doesn't light up with the answer when you push a button is beyond them.

I understood the logic behind having a universal system of measuring throughout the world. It's just that other things seem to take priority. I'll take European metric seriously when James Bond drives on the right side of the road, when all the bathrooms in Europe have the same flush mechanism, when other nations stop crossing their sevens in the middle, and when Italian lira come out with a few big bills.

In a few years, I suspect all that will be left of the metric invasion in this country is a few cans of whole onions on the shelf that read "1.34 kg" and a road sign that reads, "Willardsville, 40 kilometers."

They will be reminders that you can spoon-feed Americans a diet of decimals, but they don't have to swallow 'em.

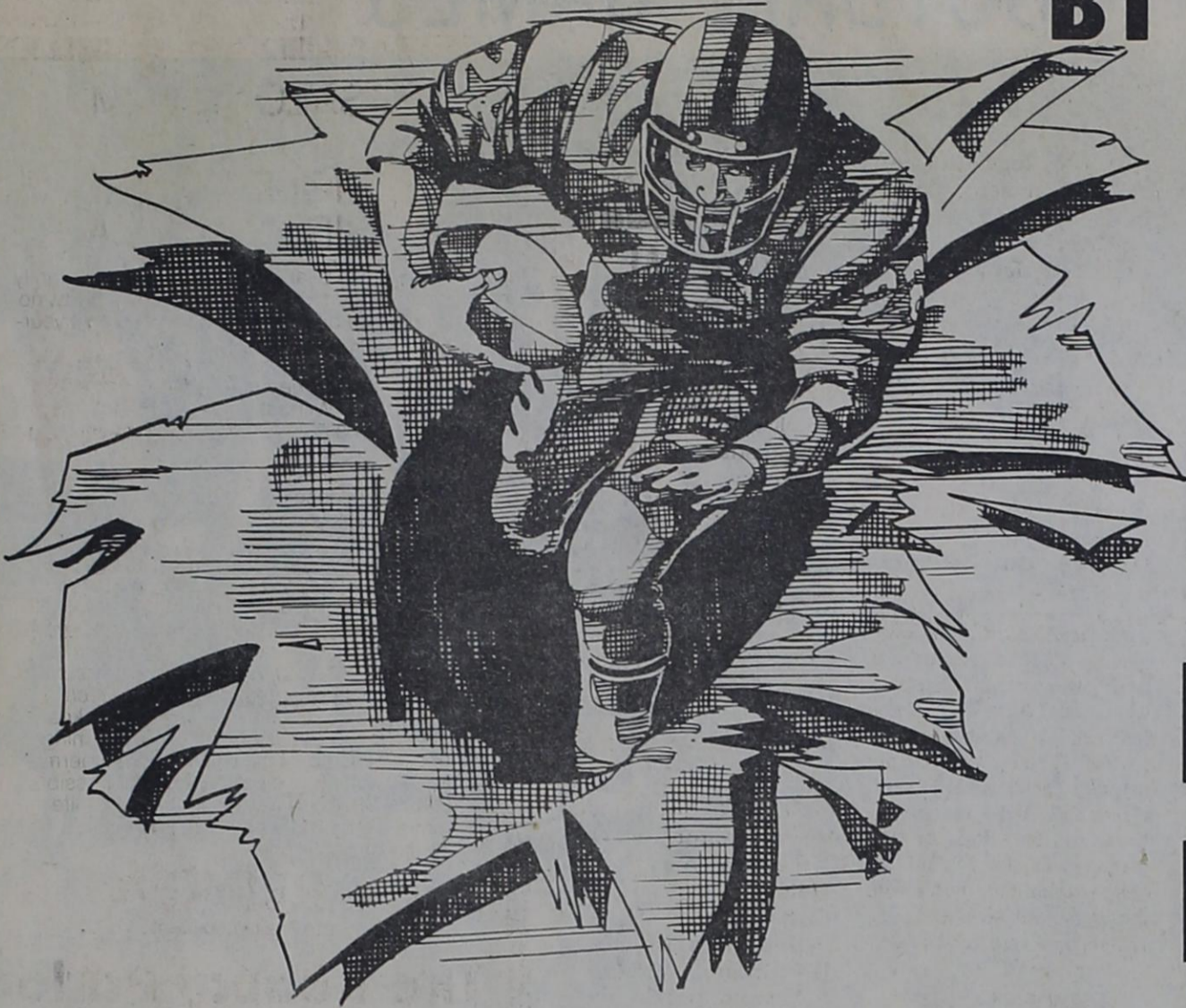

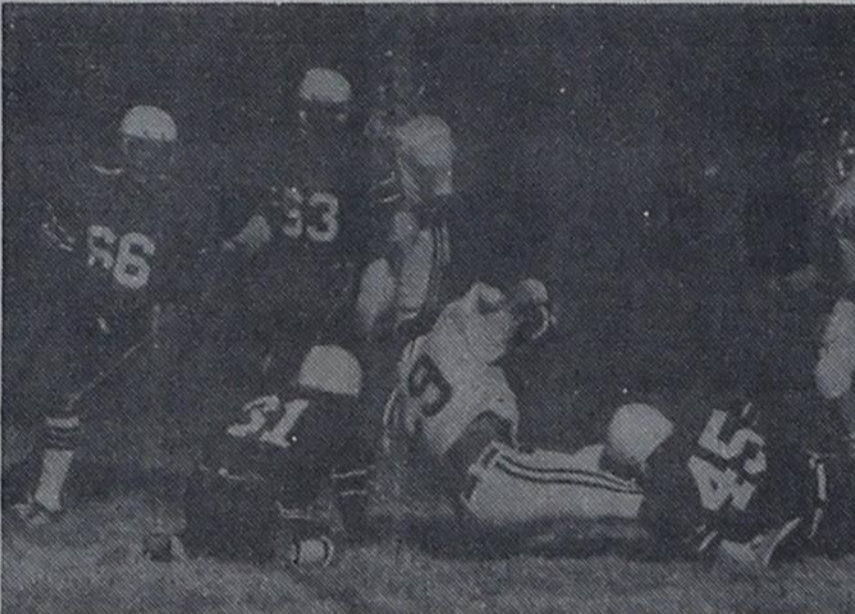

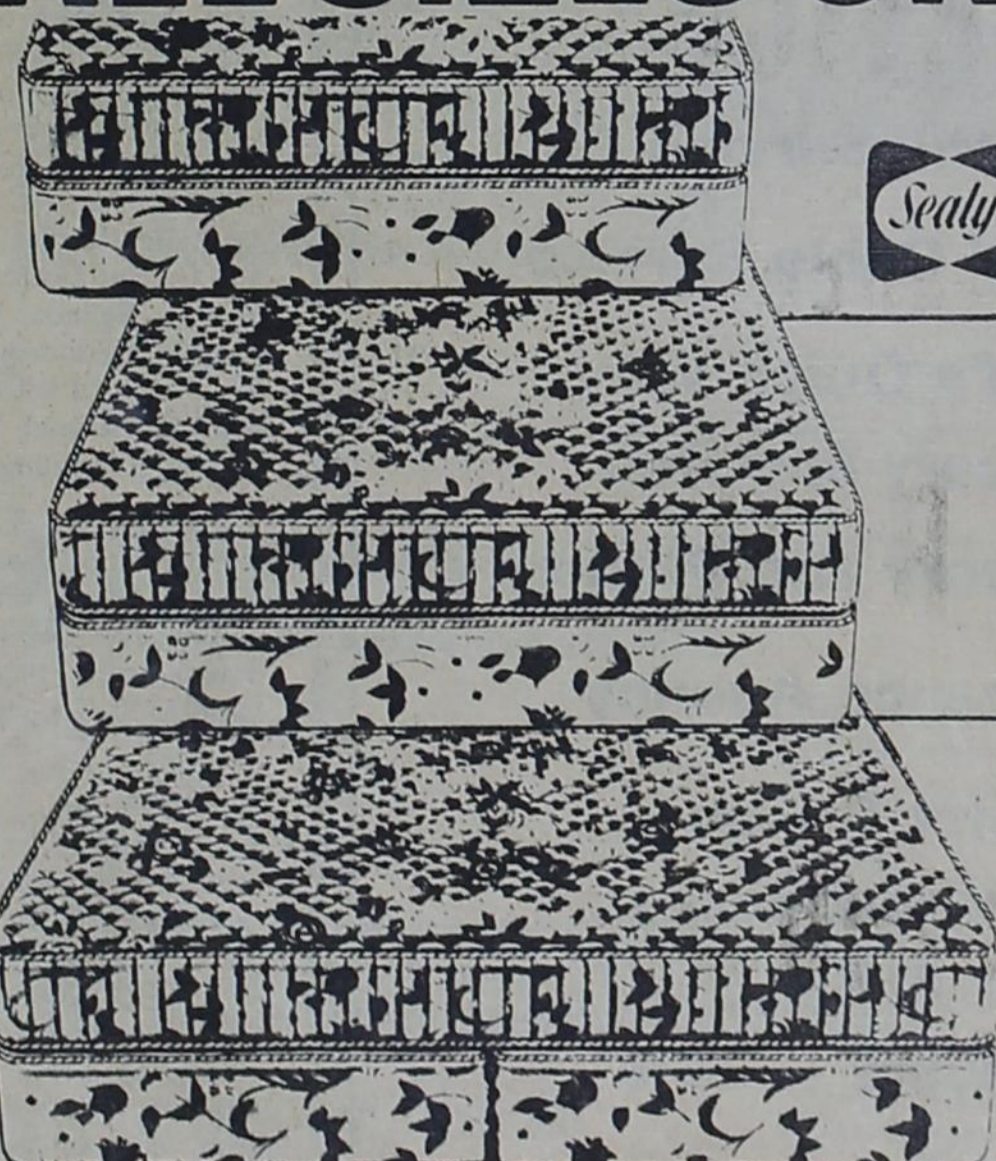

TESCO Meeting Honors 25-Year Employees

Texas Electric President Bill Marquardt said he feels "real good" about the way things are going on the Comanche Peak nuclear plant. During a recent series of licensing hearings the company did "a fine job of stating our case that we're building a safe plant." Marquardt's comments were to a group of active and retired employees last night at the annual Quarter Century Club dinner held at Eastland Elementary School Cafeteria in Eastland. Three hundred years of service was recognized at the event.

Comanche Peak "will be good for our customers because it will help provide a reliable source of needed electricity at a reasonable price." Unit 1 is scheduled to be ready for fuel loading in 1983 and in operating in 1984, with Unit 2 following in 1985. Noting the availability and stability of nuclear fuel, he said that Comanche Peak "will produce electricity cheaper than our natural gas plants can." And that electricity will certainly be in demand, Marquardt said, because the current slow economy has

not stopped the growth in the Texas Electric service area. In fact, since that time last year TESCO has gained over 27,000 new customers and kilowatt hour sales have increased more than four percent. He told the group gathered to honor TESCO 25-year employees that an upswing in the economy could produce an even faster growth rate. Eastland Division Manager Ron Keeney served as master of ceremonies and James Smith was coordinator for the event. He praised TESCO customers for "following the conservation programs we've been telling them about" to hold down growth in the maximum demand for electricity. Marquardt noted that customers remain complimentary of their electric service despite higher energy bills. "Our customers have confidence in us." That confidence is a result

of the "good job all of you have done this year," he said. He quoted a customer who had written praising a TESCO employee as "courteous and professional. A job well done." Marquardt said the proposed consolidation of Texas Electric with Texas Power and Light, Dallas Power and Light and Texas Utilities Generation will allow

TESCO and the other divisions to "operate even more economically and efficiently." "You know, we've never been afraid to make changes we thought were in the best interest of our customers." It will take at least a year before all the changes take place, and even then our local customers won't notice any difference, he said. In closing his remarks

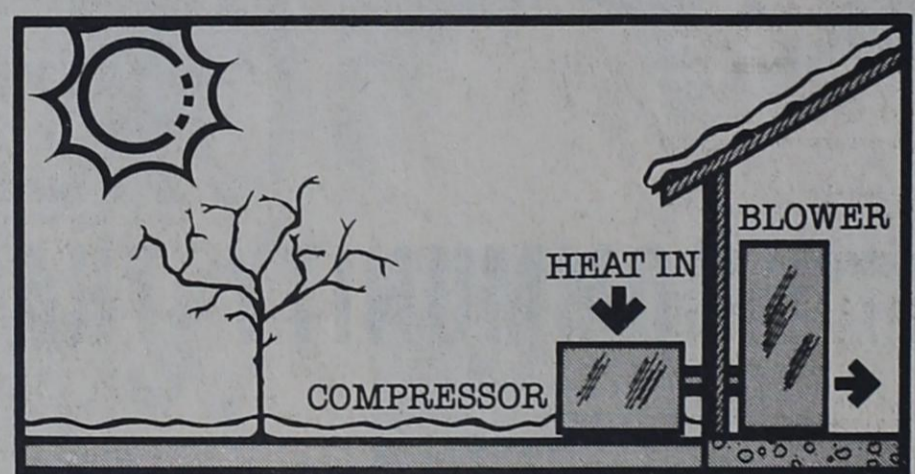
