CRIME STOPPERS PAYS OFF AGAIN

Gorman Crime Stoppers has paid another reward for information concerning illegal drug activity in the Gorman area. The cash reward of \$150.00 was paid to a person whose identity will remain confidential. All persons who are concerned about the drug problem, and have knowledge of illegal activity are encouraged to call Gorman Crime Stoppers at 734-2730 with the information. You can be assured that your identity will not be revealed under any circumstances, unless you so desire.

When information is received from a confidential source, it is given to the proper authorities and action is taken immediately if the information is of a nature that allows legal action. The source of the information is not disclosed to the District Attorney, the Sheriff, the Judge, or any other person unless the source states that he or she is willing to testify in court, if necessary. It is not even necessary for you to disclose your identity to Crime Stoppers if you do not wish to do so. The important thing is that your information can be verified. In most cases, verification is not necessary when your identity is known to Crime Stoppers.

The Gorman Crime Stoppers program has been responsible for the arrest of eighteen persons since its inception on September 23, 1982, and has resulted in a large amount of controlled substances being seized. With the continued support of the citizens of Gorman and the surrounding area, the program can help remove the drug culture from our community, and protect our children from this poison.

A NEED FOR CAUTION IN HOLIDAY DRIVING

The Gorman Police Department would like to remind the Citizens of Gorman and the surrounding area that extra caution should be exercised while on the streets and highways during the holiday season. There will be more drivers on the roads during this time due to Christmas shopping and visits to relatives and friends.

The number of persons injured in automobile accidents inside the Gorman city limits through November has already exceeded the number injured during all of 1981, although the number of accidents has decreased. Through November of 1981, there were twenty-eight accidents in Gorman, with four injuries and one fatality. During the same period in 1982, there were twenty-four accidents with six injuries. This matches the total of injuries in all of 1981. Friday has proven to be the most dangerous day of the week to be driving, with seven of the accidents and four of the injuries occurring on Fridays. Sunday is second with five accidents and one injury, followed by Monday, with four accidents. Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday each had two accidents. These statistics are for accidents that have happened inside the City Limits. The police department has assisted the Texas Department of Public Safety on several accidents that have happened just outside the City Limits, in which there were many injuries and one fatality.

We have also had two accidents in which pedestrians were hit by automobiles. The need for caution cannot be stressed too strongly, especially during the holiday season, when many drivers (and some pedestrians) have been drinking alcoholic beverages to celebrate the holidays. If you MUST drink, please let a friend drive you home from the party!

Most of the accidents in Gorman are caused by failure to stop and to remain stopped at stop signs until it is safe to proceed. In an effort to prevent accidents, the police department will be issuing citations to stop-sign violators. Remember, those signs do not say "Slow down to see if another car is coming"...they say "STOP"!

Have a happy and SAFE holiday season, and help make it a safe and happy one for all others.

NOVEMBER 25, 1982 MEMORIES

Happy Thanksgiving to one and all. My Thanksgiving of 1917. The Doctor told me to come to the Base Hospital at Ft. Sell Okla. when my tonsils were not sore and they would remove them and take a growth out of my throat. Soon Sunday before Thanksgiving I went to hospital. I told them I was a free bleeder. So they assigned a Sgt. to stay with me after operation. He kidded me about my girl and said he would learn her name and address before I came to after operation. He tried and failed on that part. The Doctor was a major. He gave ether, operation and all. I was strapped down and one eye became uncovered. I told him it was being burned. He said "Who is doing this me or you." I said "well I thought you were at least a man." He shook me and put the ether to me. Then I was in "Dreamland." I came to on my bed, blood dripping out of my mouth, I propped up in bed lying on my side. I had chewed one of the lead handle knife handle nearly off. I had swallowed my tongue. The Sgt. was playing Sol on a paste board in his lap. I asked him to let me hit him. He stuck out his chest and said "You cannot knock a fly down." I drew back as he was sitting on the side of my bed and knocked him backwards to the floor. He sure looked funny and said to me you must have gone to sleep mad?"

There were 32 beds in the ward and people going there to see their kindred. I would speak to all. After awhile a Shave Tail came thru I spoke and he just looked at me and kept going. I got off the bed and started after him. I said, you will speak to me or I will whip you. He looked at my bloody gown and face and spoke. I do not know but you will do such things and that stuff gives you more power. When that big dinner came, I could not eat. All I could do was drink liquids. I must have drank a half gallon pineapple juice. It was liquids for a week.

My belly button was rubbing my backbone. This lasted two weeks. That growth kept me out of the navy as I was turned down after passing at Ft. Worth. You know one thing we did not have to worry about. S.S. Income Tax or the Mafia Gang.

I remember when we worked 26 hours without stopping. We were Baking What was called "War Punk." We would let dough rise one time. Put them in 10 pound rounds, just like a bun, mash them down grease them and put them in 800

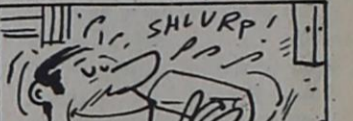

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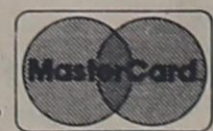

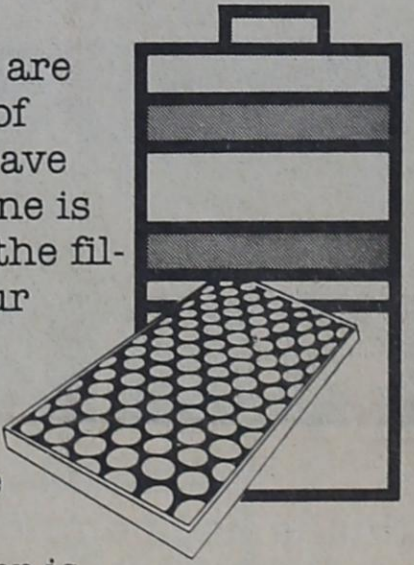
