RAINS MAY BRING MOSQUITOES

Mosquitoes are a problem in all parts of the state. In one way or another they affect everyone. Mosquitoes occuring in the home, about the yard and in public parks can become a nusiance disturbing man in his work and Some species of mosqui-

transmit diseases such as malaria and vellow fever to man, encephalities to man and horses and heartworms to dogs.

In extreme south Texas, mosquitoes may breed throughout the year. Howevewr, in most areas the warmer temperatures of spring, summer and fall are needed for breeding.

All mosquitoes pass through four stages of development - egg, larva (wigler), pupa and adult. The two most encountered are wigglers and adults.

Although the habit and habitats of different kinds of mosquitoes differ greatly, they all require water to produce their young. Female mosquitoes lay their eggs on water or in areas which will later become flooded.

The eggs of most species hatch in 2 or 3 days. The wigglers which hatch from the eggs feed on organic matter. The wigglers usually pupate within a week. Pupae usually become adults within 2 days. In another day or two the female adults are ready esto feed. Male mosquitoes do
