Water safety officials warn about possible diving hazards

There are lots of good swimming holes in Texas, and many of them offer man-made or natural structures from which the stout-hearted can dive from considerable heights.

Diving from a 50-foot cliff can be a crowd-pleaser, but it also could be an invitation to disaster.

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A factor in some of the diving fatalities was the lack of strong swimmers to pull the stunned or injured diver from the water. Inexperienced divers often hit the water

at an angle or with legs and arms extended out from them, which increases the chances of injury, officials noted.

RAINS MAY BRING MOSQUITOES

Mosquitoes are a problem in all parts of the state. In one way or another they affect everyone. Mosquitoes occurring in the home, about the yard and in public parks can become a nuisance disturbing man in his work and leisure.

Some species of mosquitoes readily transmit diseases such as malaria and yellow fever to man, encephalitis to man and horses and heartworms to dogs.

In extreme south Texas, mosquitoes may breed throughout the year. However, in most areas the warmer temperatures of spring, summer and fall are needed for breeding. All mosquitoes pass through four stages of development - egg, larva (wiggler), pupa and adult. The two most encountered are wigglers and adults.

Although the habit and habitats of different kinds of mosquitoes differ greatly, they all require water to produce their young. Female mosquitoes lay their eggs on water or in areas which will later become flooded.

The eggs of most species hatch in 2 or 3 days. The wigglers which hatch from the eggs feed on organic matter. The wigglers usually pupate within a week. Pupae usually become adults within 2 days. In another day or two the female adults are ready to feed. Male mosquitoes do not bite.

Because of the need for water to breed, the recent rains will play an important role in local mosquito populations. Tin cans, buckets, old tires or other such containers which may collect rain water will become breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

Effective mosquito control requires community cooperation. Homeowners should take every precaution to prevent breeding on their premises by eliminating standing water. In addition to removing water-holding containers, dripping outdoor faucets and leaky pipes should be repaired and puddles resulting from evaporative coolers or air conditioners should be properly drained.

The proper use of insecticides around the home also aids in controlling mos-

TRI-REGION HEALTH SYSTEMS AGENCY TO CEASE JULY 31

On April 29, the Board of Directors of the Tri-Region Health Systems Agency directed the agency to officially cease operations no later than July 31, 1982. Due to drastic budget cuts by the Reagan administration, the agency's minimum funding level would decrease from \$245,000 to approximately \$100,000. The HSA also does not meet the 100% staff-to-population ratio requirement as stipulated by the Bureau of Health Planning.

The tri-Region Health Systems Agency will not accept any Certificate of Need applications after May 1, 1982. Applicants should mail their

applications (original and one copy), along with the required filing fee, to the Texas Health Facilities Commission, P. O. Box 15023, Austin, Texas 78761.

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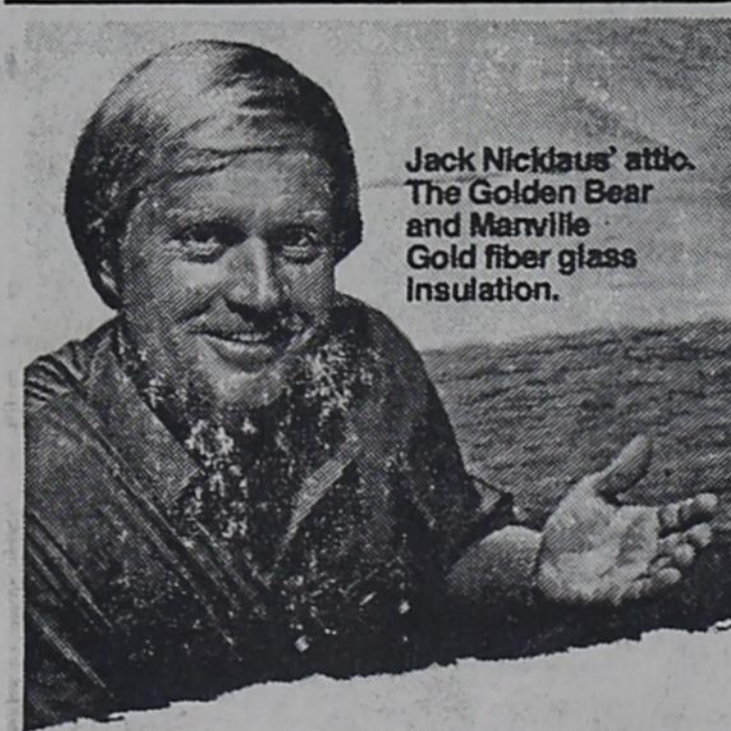

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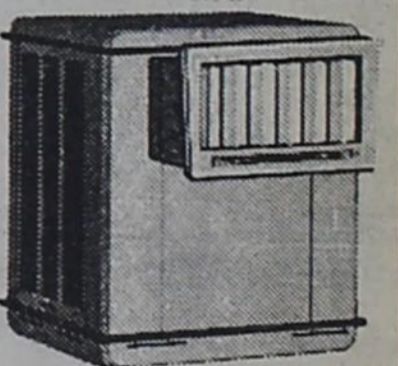
