

FORMER BHS COACH GETS SPC JOB

James G. Morris, former Borwnfield High School track coach and Texas Tech assistant track coach this past year, has been named head track and field coach at South Plains College, Levelland.

Morris was appointed to the position by SPC President Dr. Marvin Baker upon the unanimous recommendation of a special selection committee composed of SPC administrators and faculty members.

Morris, 45 years old and a native ov Brownfield, succeeds Clint Ramsey, who resigned his position June 1 to assume duties as head men's track and field coach at Angelo State University in San Angelo. Morris appointment becomes effective with beginning of the 1982-83 school year.

In addition to his coaching duties, Morris will join the South Plains College Lavelland faculty as an instructor of physical education.

Morris received his B.S. degree in physical education from Texas Tech in 1960. He has completed graduate work at Texas Tech and Azuza Pacific University.

After graduating from
Tech, Morris joined the
Brownfield Independent
School District as a coach for
the junior high football, basketball and track and field
programs. In 1968, he
became head coach for boy's
track and field and boy's and
girl's cross country at Brownfield High School, a position
he held until 1980.

The past year, Morris was head men's cross country coach and assistant track coach at Texas Tech Univer-

While at Brownfield High athletic program of South

Morris coached high school athletes to the State Track and Field Meet for eight consecutive years He has coached two state champions and his boy's cross country team finished State UIL runners-up in 1975.

At Tech, Morris coached two finalists in the 1982 Southwest Conference Meet where one of his athletes placed fifth.

He has been a guest lecturer and instructor at various coaching clinics, including the Texas Tech Track and Field Camp. Morris has also organized and directed more than 150 track and field meets and cross country meets since 1960. He was the meet director of the Region I, 5-A and 3-A high school track and field meets hosted by Tech this past spring.

In addition to his involvement in track and field, Morris is owner and manager of the Athletic Attic, a sporting apparel store in Lubbock. He is a member and past president of the Brownfield Noon Lions Club and a Charter member of the Board of Directors of the District 2-T2 Lions Eye Bank in Lubbock.

Morris and his wife, Beverly, have a son, Mark, who is third-year medical student at Texas Tech, and a daughter, Mitzi, a senior at Tech.

Morris commented during the press conference, "I feel very fortunate and proud to have the opportunity for this advancement in my professional career. It's seldom that a coach or teacher has the opportunity to take over a successful program such as the one that Clint Ramsey has established at South Plains College. It is a program that is second to none in the Junior College ranks."

Although Morris' immediate problem in recruiting is in the sprint department as the entire sprint relay from last year will not be returning he mentioned his main concern in recruiting, "My immediate goal is to recruit the student/athlete that will help continue the winning tradition of the academic and




