This installation was considered most critical as the air being piped into the lake will provide oxygen needed to eliminate manganese build up which is the main cause of bad taste and odor previously experienced in hot-dry weather. Air also helps to bring top and bottom water temperatures closer together to de-stratify or break up layers of water to produce more treatable quality of water when it is necessary to pump from lower lake levels.

This compressor will be operating 24 hours a day for at least 30 days and will be run on a schedule basis thereafter, depending on the need. Noticeable difference has already been seen at both point of origin and plant site. This is the third system of this type in the State of Texas and is both recommended and approved by State Health Department.

Balance of improvements including chemical feeders and equipment needed to obtain water from higher lake levels have been given final approval, are on order and will be installed as soon as they arrive from various manufacturers.

**Know Your School**

The response to the school improvement survey sheets that were sent out has been good, but I feel that many have failed to respond. It is my desire and that of the Board that every parent and patron of the Gorman Independent School District express their views on this matter. The responses have been very favorable with 75 percent of the sixty-seven replies indicating that they favor a reasonable tax increase in order to enrich the educational program. This, I feel, is very good. This response shows that the people of the district have a desire to help provide the best education possible for their children. If you have not replied, I urge you to do so within the near future, since the board will be making a decision on this matter in the near future.

The Equalization Board has finished working the entire tax roll and have made a number of adjustments. There have been some increases and some decreases. Notices have been sent to any taxpayer where an adjustment was made giving these people a chance to meet with the Equalization Board on Saturday, May 22 between the hours of two and five p. m. The Board will meet in the tax office. Adjustments that are being made by the Equalization Board will not be a part of the general tax increase, if one is made. If an increase is made, market values will remain the same with the percent of assessed valuation being increased. This will work by taking your current assessed value, multiplying it by four, and then multiplying by the increased percentage, which possibly will be 30 percent.

**BOARD SETS OPENING DAY FOR 1971-72 TERM**  
in the board meeting on Monday evening, May 10, the board set August 26th as the opening day of school for the 1971-72 school year. The closing date will be May 26, 1972. A complete calendar will be published during the summer. This schedule allows for 180 days of instruction, which is required by the Texas Education Agency. Workshop for teachers will begin during the week of August 16th.

The board reviewed the damage to the building that was caused by the hail storm that struck here on April 28. All roofs were damaged severely and will have to be replaced. Damage to roofs and windows amounts to about \$7,800.00. Insurance will cover the major part of this damage.

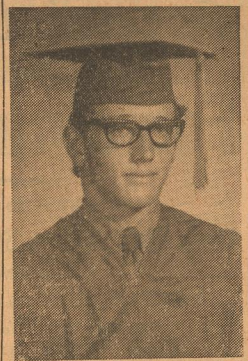
The board is interested in hiring a lady for the lunchroom. If you are interested, or know of anyone that is interested, please contact Mr. Garrett at 734-5614.

**Letter To The Editor**

Dear Editor:

As concerned parents and citizens we'd like to ask you to help send a warning to the motorists and truck drivers on our highways as well as in the cities. We wonder if some people are aware that it is a State law that all vehicles are to come to a complete stop upon overtaking or meeting a stopped school bus and then proceed with caution at 10 m.p.h.

We were suddenly made aware of the danger of disobeying this law one day last week. It is necessary for our children to cross Hwy. 6 west of De Leon in the mornings to board the bus. They noticed two trucks approaching from the opposite direction on this particular morning. One driver stopped and pulled partially over to the shoulder. The other, a large semi, apparently never checked his speed and squeezed through the space between the other truck and our bus. Fortunately, the children boarded moments before he brushed by them, clearing the bus by inches. Our driver feels that the mirrors on the two vehicles struck each other as he later found the bus mirror out of proper position and paint chipped from it. No number was obtained due to the license plate being bent.

As death's icy fingers clutched for them, God's hand intervened and they were spared.

This was a week of school picnics and many end-of-school plans are being made, such as graduation. Had an accident occurred, many parents would have forgotten these joyful occasions and gone to the funeral homes to identify the crushed and mangled bodies of their children. In our case, that bus held all the children in our family. Of the thirty-one students who ride, some are away from home their first year, some are just completing high school and looking to their futures. Those futures could have been blasted away in one split second.

We need to be mindful also of the children in town and watch as they ride bicycles or walk to and from school. In our busy, busy world we seem always rushing somewhere. This rushing will stop the moment a child is hit and everything then seems unimportant.

Some accidents are unavoidable we know, but to be needlessly careless and negligent is something else. We are sending this appeal hoping it might help save some child's life. Please accept our thanks for the time and space necessary to put this in print.

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## Public Meeting Held on Sabanna Watershed Project

Fifty-two interested landowners of the Sabanna Watershed attended a public meeting in the Gorman High School Auditorium on May 14, 1971.

Ross Wilson, Chairman of the Sabanna Watershed Assn., gave the history of accomplishments in the watershed. In September, 1966, approximately 600 questionnaires were mailed to landowners to determine their interest in a watershed program of improvement. Over 60 percent of these questionnaires were returned representing a very high interest in the program. On September 26, 1966, a meeting of the various leaders and land owners was held and plans made to proceed with the project. An application for project approval was filed on Feb. 17, 1967. A preliminary field examination was held in late October, 1967, by Soil Conservation Service personnel and representatives from the State Soil and Water Conservation Board. This proved to be a very favorable hearing. On November 16, 1967, the State Soil and Water Conservation Board approved the Association's application. On May 2, 1968, a public hearing was held to establish a project planning priority. Due to lack of sufficient land treatment on home farms and ranches a planning priority was not granted at this time. High interest was shown on the tour and some 600 people attended the barbecue and public hearing held in Gorman. On May 3, 1969, after many land owners developed conservation plans with the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District and applied these plans, a planning priority was granted. In January of this year a planning party was assigned to gather basic information along the Sabanna River. In late March, 1971, due to shortage of funds, this planning party was moved out but based on current information will be back in the watershed about June 14, 1971. It is hoped they will remain here until the surveying is completed.

Irwin R. Poff, Area Conservationist, SCS, Stephenville, discussed and stressed the importance of land treatment above structures. The life of a structure is similar to that of a farm pond - its useful life depends on the life treatment on the draining area. A round conservation program on a farm or ranch not only conserves maximum soil and water but insures the highest safe

return to the landowner and in turn community benefits. For example a good ground cover on soil in good condition will hold approximately 80-90 percent of the average rainfall; whereby near bare soil in poor condition will lose 80-90 percent of rainfall from run-off. Rainfall stored in the soil not only lessens run-off but greatly reduces flood damages on watersheds such as the Sabanna.

Poff presented a slide program on watersheds which showed each progressive step in the construction of flood prevention structures. Sites are located in best possible areas to give maximum protection at a reasonable cost. SCS personnel give full time to supervision during construction to insure that all specifications are met in order to reduce maintenance to the minimum; dams and spillways are established to vegetation soon after completion. Joe B. Camp, Planning Party Leader, SCS, San Marcos, discussed the present planning steps on the Sabanna and reviewed the next steps of operations. Camp, stated that likely the San Marcos planning party would be back in the watershed by mid June, 1971. High priority potential sites will be surveyed until the estimated 20-25 needed sites have been completed. Steering Committee members will need to work with landowners in order to secure permission for the surveying party to do necessary site work. Camp discussed multi-purpose structures such as water for municipal use, recreation and irrigation. It was suggested that any group having a sincere desire to use water for any of the above purposes advise their steering committee member. This information will enable the survey party to gather all needed information at the time initial survey is made on the site.

SCS personnel furnished the City Council of Rising Star information in regard to the use of municipal water from a proposed structure on the Sabanna. This meeting was held at Rising Star on May 13, 1971. It is likely additional informational meetings will be necessary to render assistance to the Council on this matter. SCS personnel will assist other groups in a similar manner where multi-purpose structures are being considered.



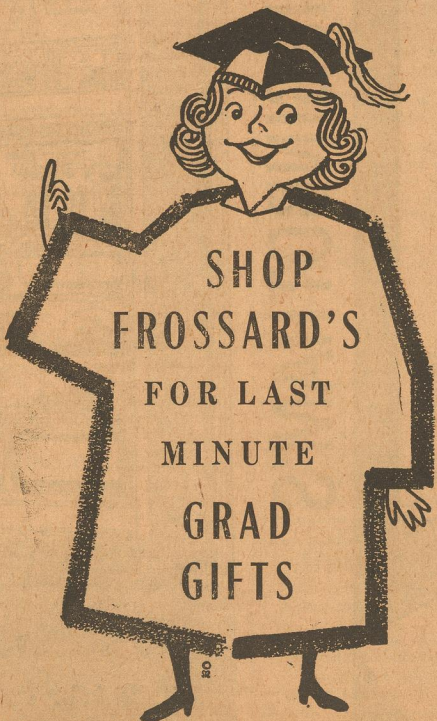

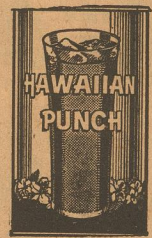
