Dear Eugene:  
Most Texas newspapers and an unfortunately large number of our citizens reacted to our position on the wage-price freeze, as it affects State employees and teachers, on the basis of emotion, without realizing that there were very good, logical and legal reasons for our position — reasons which compelled us to take that position.

The issue is not, as has been suggested by many, that we or the State of Texas oppose any reasonable means of curbing inflation. Nor is it that we want special treatment for our State, its employees or teachers.

It is simply a question of whether Texas will be treated in a manner consistent with other States, almost all of which have already had pay raises go into effect for their employees in the past year, whether the Governor is supposed to protect and defend the Constitution and laws of his State, or simply forget his oath of office, and whether the Congress actually could authorize, or did authorize, the President to void State laws.

Indeed, we in Texas have been in the vanguard of the fight against inflation and recession. We operate under a spend-as-you-go budget, unlike the federal government's inflationary policy of deficit spending, which put this nation more than \$20 billion in the red last year.

We have cut spending wherever possible and even vetoed the entire second year of the biennial appropriations bill so that we could reduce spending to more sensible levels. We have prevented the enactment of unnecessary taxes which would have placed an added burden on the already economically strained pocketbooks of our citizens. And, more than a year ago, we called on the Republican Administration in Washington to revise its failing economic policies in favor of well-planned, reasonable wage and price controls.

Obviously, there are many complex legal problems involved which make it difficult for the people to understand the action we took. Hopefully, greater understanding of the necessity for our action will become apparent as more and more people acquaint themselves with the facts.

## Know Your School

The Board of Trustees met on Monday evening and completed the adoption of the budget for 1971-72 school year. The budget calls for an estimated income of \$216,820 from all sources. This money will come from the following sources: local taxes \$72,230; state and federal \$137,680; loans \$5,820; and other \$850. The estimated expenditures are \$216,811 which will be spent as follows: administration \$23,100; instruction, \$151,400; transportation \$10,800; operation and maintenance of plant \$9,700; insurance and interest \$3,300; capital outlay \$1,200; bond and debt service \$13,657; other \$554. Some items of this budget will change during the year due to attendance or other adjustments by the state. These changes will be reflected in amendments during the year.

By closely watching all expenditures during the year we were able to close out the year in the black again. All items of the budget were met and some exceeded. The new bus that was purchased in May, 1970 through a five year loan was completely paid for at the close of 1970-71 year. The balance in the operation fund as of September 1 was \$2,745.

The Board completed a purchase agreement for a new International 48 passenger bus at the Monday meeting. The bus was ordered in June, but due to the demand for new buses because of forced busing, delivery is not assured before January 31, 1972. This bus will be financed for a five year period to be paid for from transportation money from the state level. It is hoped that it can be paid for in less time as we were able to do on the last one. The new bus is costing \$6,161 which is up \$1,000 above the same size bus that was purchased 16 months ago.

I appreciate the good turn out of local fans for the game last week. I feel that you saw a good game and a good performance by the band. I am proud of both groups and their coaches. I think the men working with these groups are doing a fine job. I urge your continued support of these and all other school activities. There seemed to be a little disturbance by some students and outsiders in the band section. I am asking that members of the band not be disturbed during their performance. These students are busy and have no time to visit with or be disturbed by anyone.

I feel that we are off to a good start with all faculty members doing a good job. It is our desire to do the best job possible with your children and we ask for your help and cooperation so that we may do this. We are having too many students absent for reasons other than illness. It is very important that a student be in regular attendance. There are a few students within the compulsory school age who are not in attendance and I would urge parents of these students to see that these children get in school. The law requires attendance for 165 days and we are making an effort to enforce this.

I am inviting all of you to come by and visit with us any time. If you have any questions or problems, please bring them to your child's teacher, the principal or to me and we will all do what we can to help you solve any problem you have. The problem needs to be brought to the people who are working with the students and who are aware of conditions under which the problems arise. We want to help your children, and we will if you will give us a chance.

I would like to express my appreciation to all of the people of the community for their continued support of the school and its program. This is your school, and if it does the job that it should in the community, we must have your support and cooperation. It takes a lot of money to run a school, but it also takes a lot of cooperation from the community. You continue to give us your cooperation and support and we will continue to give you the best educational opportunities possible with the facilities we have.

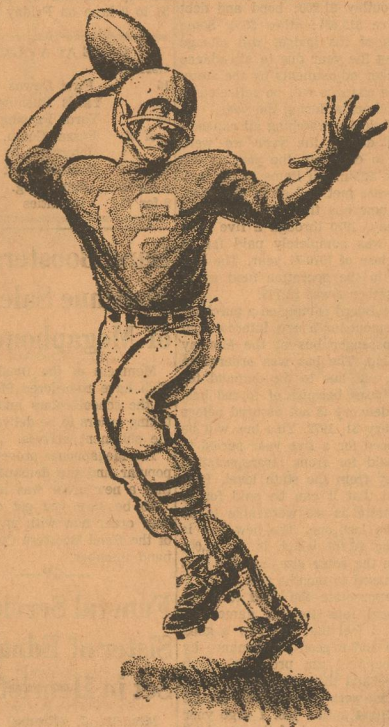

WASHINGTON, D. C. — IF MUCH OF OUR FOREIGN AID is not already wholly ridiculous and asinine, it has been made worse by recent action of the House of Representatives.

THE FOREIGN AID AUTHORIZATION BILL, passed by the House and now before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, contains a section which prohibits military assistance to Greece because the Country is run by a military junta considered to be a repressive dictatorship by the "liberals."

AT THE END OF WORLD WAR II and for several years thereafter, Greece was in a civil war. At least it was called that but it was obvious that it was not all Greek fighting Greek. The 300-mile northern border of Greece joins communist Albania, Yugoslavia and Bulgaria. Elements of these countries joined the Greek communists to bring that nation behind the Iron Curtain with them.

WITH MILITARY AID FROM THE U. S., the non-communists of Greece were able to stand and today it is the only Balkan Nation outside the Iron Curtain.

years ago, from a front line vantage point, I saw Greeks loyal to their Country defending it. Finally a stable Government was established and they have been our friends through turbulent times since.  
GREECE IS A STRATEGIC IMPERATIVE in the Mediterranean. She is the anchor of NATO. While flanked by two other NATO Nations, Turkey and Italy, these lat-

ter show an instability which, to say the least, is not encouraging. The ports of Greece are really the only places in the Eastern Mediterranean where our 6th Fleet can go without resentment. Recent entry by our ships into the ports of Turkey set off riots, protest bombings and crippling strikes.

LOOK AT A MAP OF THE SOUTHERN rim of the Mediterranean and our relations with those countries it touches. Except for Turkey, once a bastion on NATO's South Flank, Israel, Tunisia and Morocco, there is hostility towards the United States. Even the Island of Malta, only about 60 miles below Sicily, athwart the narrow channel along the North coast of Africa, is now taking anti-NATO actions and showing strong sentiment for Soviet Russia. For 150 years Malta was a key power point for the British but like England's other diminished positions, it slipped away. A Malta oriented to the U. S. S. R. would result in the ability of the Soviets to control the crossroads of the Mediterranean as the British had historically done.

THE LIBERAL NEW YORK TIMES and the liberals in Congress turn the heat on Greece because they say it is a military, dictatorial Government. Greece took this course in April 1967, at a time when again a communist takeover was considered imminent. No one has to approve of this type of government but the fact remains Greece is our friend and vital to the defense of that strategic area.

THE SAME VOICES OF CONDEMNATION of Greece are not directed against the dictatorships of Yugoslavia, the Red juntas in Algeria, Syria, Libya and others — not Red China or the Soviet Union. Strange.

YET THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES says that no military aid should go to Greece unless the President finds it is required for America's national security. To place this onus on the President or to extend this authority, is yielding to political escape.

## Disabled Veterans Qualify For Free License Plates

Certification of Texas veterans disabled 70 percent or more for qualification to receive free license plate for one auto will be done by the Veterans Administration, according to Jack Coker, VA Regional Director at Waco.

VA records show 14, 150 Texas veterans are 70 percent or more disabled.

Eligible veterans should act now to establish their claim for this state benefit approved by the last Texas legislature, Coker emphasized. Texas motor vehicle authorities must have the request by October 1, 1971, in order for the veteran to qualify to receive his free 1972 license plate.

Forms for application have been distributed by Texas officials to VA offices, Texas Veterans Affairs Commission county service offices, Tax Assessor Collector offices and Texas Motor Vehicle District offices.

Since this is a new state benefit Texas officials do not know which Texas residents qualify, so it is the responsibility of each veteran who has a 70 percent service-connected disability to make application.

Coker expressed concern that so far the Waco Regional Office has received only 1,700 applications for VA verification.

Coker noted that eligible veterans should obtain their form, complete the veteran status part, and send it to 1400 North Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76710. The VA will certify the degree of disability and return the form to the veteran applicant. The veteran then tenders this certified form to the Texas Motor Vehicle Division with one-dollar for handling and mailing. The dollar should not be sent with the form to the VA.

Since several days of mail transmission to and from the VA and records checking by the VA will be necessary, veterans are cautioned not to wait until the last few days in September before acting.

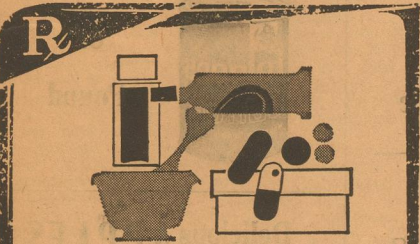
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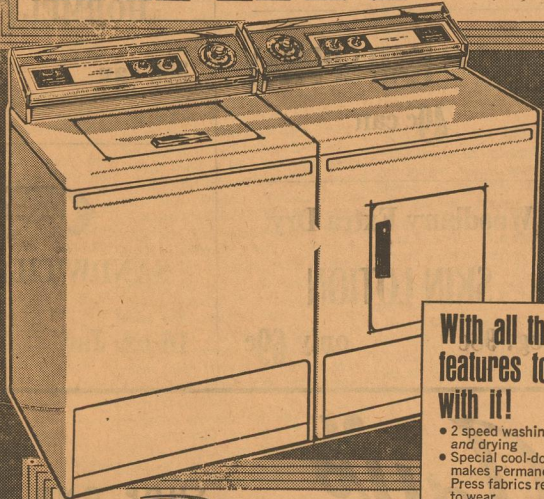
