I will attend the many lectures of the Medical Staff, the Board of Directors, various committees and working organizations within my being and their never ending attempt in providing the most modern and most effective service possible.

by x-rays, wherein
a search for disease
and disorders are

I will feel the pulsation of modern equipment rendering efforts to the in-

I will smell the odors of chemical reactions as the Medical Technicians seek and explore th values of products being subjected to their testing efforts.

I will hold in quiet storage vast amounts of drugs, supplies and equipment that may be required at a moments notice to save life or limb.

I will be aware of the silent flicker of the Cardiac Moniter as the tracings of the heart carefully being monitored steal across the illuminated face of a modern visual tube.

Like any child, as I reach toward adulthood, I must have the items of equipment and supplies that sustain me. My friends and managers and other acquaintences are contributto my well being. Many times during during the past few weeks it has been asked of my management what specific needs are in order at this time.

One of my friends, the Methodist Church here in Gorman, has pledged themselves to come to my assistance by purchasing furniture in conjunction with their God's Acre Program.

Another of my friends has advised my management that he and his family will provide furnishings for one room.

Specifically at this time and in order that I will be complete upon reaching my adulthood furnishings and equipment is the order of the day.
