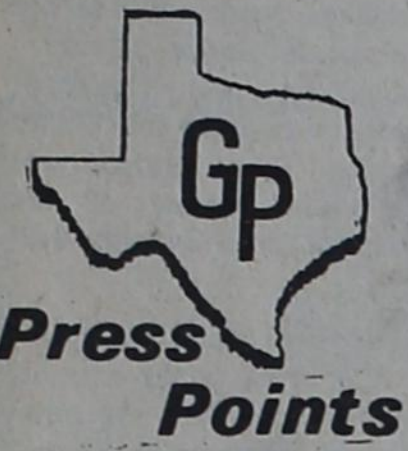

Final Rules Issued On Peanut Quotas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department issued final regulations Friday on the 1982 peanut poundage quotas.

Everett Rank, administrator of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said the final rules are basically the same as those proposed in early March.

The 1982 marketing quota for peanuts is set by law at 1.2 million tons and will be reduced each year through 1985. Under the rules, each state will receive the same share of the 1982 poundage quota as it had in 1981. A poundage quota then will be established for each farm which had an allotment last year.

Although the law permits anyone to grow peanuts, only farmers with poundage quotas can qualify for the highest federal price support rates. Peanuts grown outside the quota system or in excess of a farm's quota are supported at a lesser rate.

Rank said state and county ASCS offices have further details of the program.

Hornet). He was 6 and Roy was 8. They were in the bath tub together, rather skinny and noticed their shoulder blades and decided they were sprouting wings. They called their mother and said they were going to be angels. They would fly instead of

slow walking. She laughed and told them they were everything but angels and showed them it was just shoulder blades. A terrible loss for them.

We were visiting them one Christmas and went to an orchard and picked a bushel of oranges, a few lemons for \$1.00. They had two lemon trees that had lemons the size of a quart can and they had about as much juice as a dozen lemons. While we

were in the orchard John Thurman, our neighbor, came in to get oranges. They had been deer hunting below Dilley.

I wrote a few weeks ago about cowboying after those Mexican steers. It was with Lesters dad and grandad.

The Marines went in with awful casualties. Capt. Bob Green was in charge of tanks. After the marines cleared a beach head when Capt. Green (he was from Albany) went ashore and wrote in the Albany paper that it beat shooting ducks on a pond. He put guns about breast high and mowed Japs down. Drove Japs to north end of island where hundreds jumped to their death rather than surrender.

My son, Vernon, with the B29's, landed there. The U. S. controlled the air and sea. The marines next went to Iowa Jima where "the Flag was raised." L. A. Bennett, with B29 was closer to Japan.

In 1961 Elbert, Cora Lee, Onie and I went to Lamar, Colo. to see Elbert's granddaughter, Kathy Jones. Cora Lee said they stopped at some motel last year that we did 20 years earlier. The only thing that was changed was

the price (was above the ceiling).

Before we left Gorman, Henry Collins wanted 600 silver dollars. He was going to give Elbert a cashiers check for it and asked Elbert if he wanted any. He said he would take 200 and would pay him when he came home. So we drove to bank in Denver and gave banker the check for \$800. He said must have a hot game. Elbert told him he needed small change for oil money. Got two 25 pound bags silver dollars and put them in turtle back.

They were digging spuds. Sacks nearly covered ground. They carried them to place where they were run thru machine, washed, dried and run thru a chute where they were sacked according to size. The large ones were sent to end and we got us one apiece. When we arrived home just weighed 4 pounds each. We picked up about 60 pounds apiece. Just right to eat. They would chop the worst ones up to put in feeder for cattle feed.

They had corn planted by drills in 16 inch rows, very thick. They would contract that corn to feeders as green silage. At least half of corn in roasting ear stage. The cutter would cut four rows. Behind the cutter was a wagon and hands cutting two rows of roasting ears from stalks to go to cannery. Just like clock work. If they made more silage than contract, they would just stack it on ground. It would not spoil in dry, cool weather.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District will be accepting orders for stocker channel catfish and stocker minnows through

May 14, 1982. The fish will be delivered in Comanche, Dublin, Eastland, and De Leon providing enough orders are received in those locations. The channel catfish will be \$30.00 per hundred and the min-

nows are \$7.50 per pound. A tentative delivery date has been set for the last week in May. The only container needed at the time of delivery is a large cardboard box to place the oxygenated bags of fish into for transportation to the pond. The box will prevent the bags from rolling

and possible punctures and also protect the fish from the sun.

The Upper Leon SWCD has sponsored the fish stocking program on three previous occasions. Through this method more than 44,076 catfish and 454 lbs. of stocker minnows have been sold. An estimated 304 pounds have been stocked throughout the District.

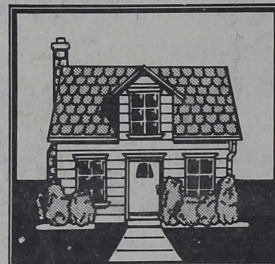
