

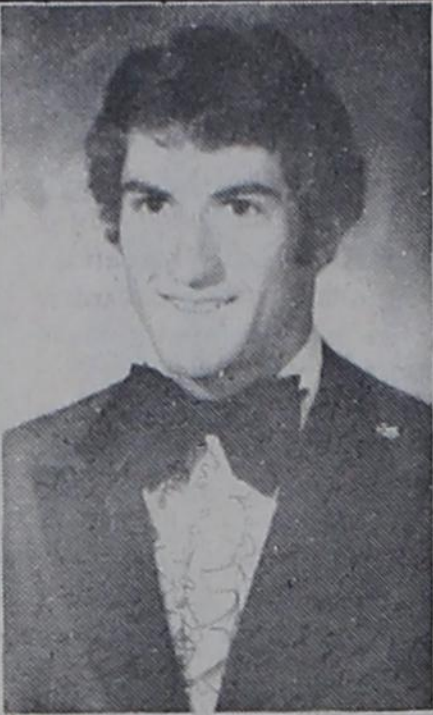
TED UNDERWOOD

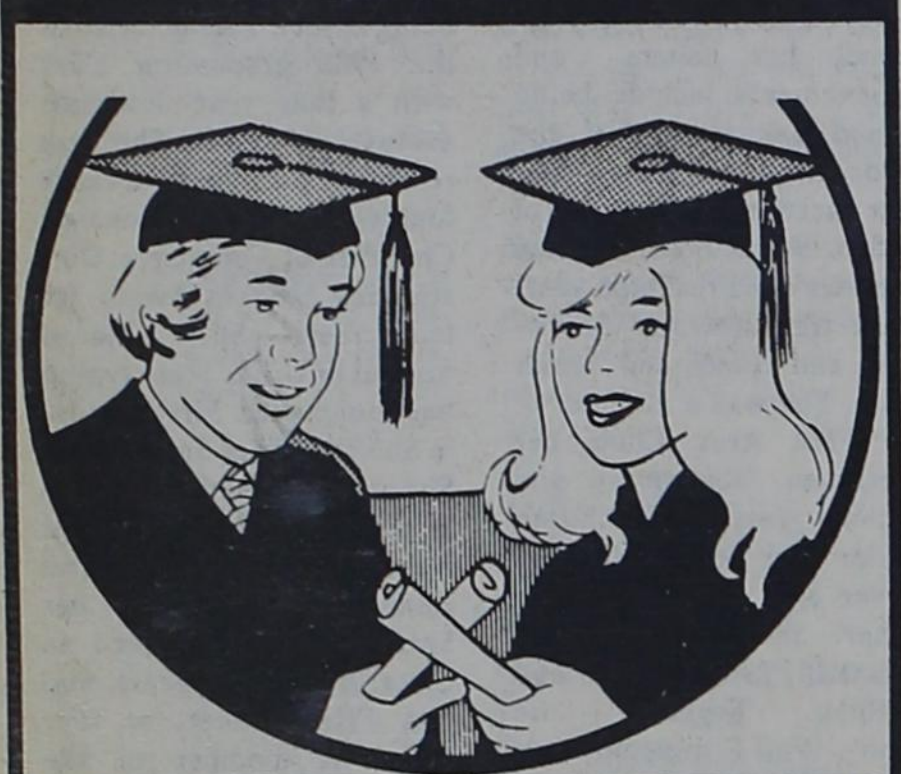


DONNA BETH RODGERS

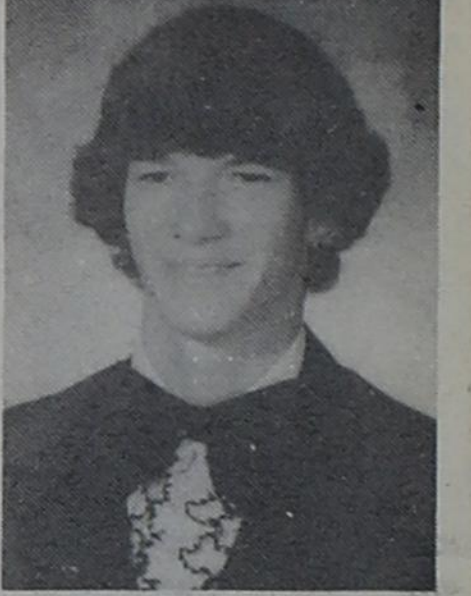

WHAT TO DO WHEN TORNADO IS SIGHTED

We, the residents of Gorman, were extremely fortunate on the evening of Wednesday, May 12, 1982. Comanche, Priddy, Beatty, De Leon and Desdemona suffered damage from tornadoes, and two men in Comanche were injured when a chicken coop blew over on them. A house in the Victor community was flattened by the destructive winds spawned by the storm. A tornado is one of the most awesome destructive forces in nature, being able to pick up a two-ton automobile, carry it a mile away, and send it smashing to the ground apparently with as little effort as we would use in lifting a feather; the violently rotating currents of air can snap a telephone pole as easily as we can break a toothpick; it can totally destroy a house, yet has been known to leave the napkins

and place-settings undisturbed on dining room tables.

The key to survival of such a natural disaster is early warning and taking proper action to protect yourself and family. On the evening of May 12, proper action to May 12, the police department was monitoring reports of funnel-cloud sightings in and around Comanche. Volunteer weather-watchers were called out and they kept a close watch on the sky around Gorman. Two funnels were spotted near Duster, and the alarm was sounded and an attempt made to alert all of our residents so that they might seek shelter. Fifteen minutes later, several funnels were sighted immediately south and east of Gorman. Fortunately, all of them passed over us and to the east of us, causing no damage in our area. We are very thankful to have had sufficient early warning, and owe a debt of gratitude to the civic-minded citizens who came out to help watch the clouds and make the early warning possible.

The second part of the key to survival is to take PRO-

PER action to protect yourself and family. When the alarm was sounded on that Wednesday evening, we saw many, many people leave their homes, get into their cars and drive away, apparently in an attempt to get out of the path of the storm. This action resulted in many deaths during the tornado in Wichita Falls.

PLEASE DO NOT GET INTO YOUR CAR WHEN A TORNADO IS APPROACHING! If you do not have a storm cellar in your yard or next door to your house, **STAY IN YOUR HOUSE!** Go to the center of your house or to the north wall of your house, near a strong supporting wall, away from windows or other glass, stay down low, and cover yourself with pillows, heavy blankets or quilts to protect yourself from flying debris. Possibly your bathroom is the safest place in your house. Climb into the bathtub and cover yourself with a pillow or quilt, but **PLEASE** do not get into your car. Most of our violent storms occur after sundown, and it is impossible to see exactly where the tornado is, and you may drive right into it. If your loved ones are not with you,

don't try to go to them. They will take action to protect themselves, and you should do the same. If you are caught in your car when a tornado is approaching, get out of the car and seek shelter in a ditch or other depression in the ground, lying flat and covering your head with your arms.

There is one exception to the above advice. If you live in a mobile home, get out of it and go to a sturdier structure. Mobile homes will not withstand the winds that are generated in a tornado.

Remember, a **TORNADO WATCH** means that weather conditions are favorable to the development of tornadoes, but none have been spotted.

A **TORNADO WARNING** means that a tornado or funnel-cloud has been sighted in the area, and you should seek protective shelter immediately.

When bad weather is in the area and you hear a single blast of the fire siren, this means that we are calling the volunteer firemen out to watch the clouds. If you hear a long blast of the siren followed by several shorter blasts, do not take time to go outside and see if you can see the tornado... take cover immediately. This signal, one long blast followed by several short blasts, means that a funnel has been sighted in the immediate Gorman area and we are in danger of being hit by a tornado. **SECONDS SAVE LIVES!**

What wonderful rains we have received, for which we are so thankful to receive. Also give thanks that the tornadoes, high winds and destructive hail passed us by. Tho we sure sympathize with those that were in them. Here in the home we spent one hour in the hall in the evening and 1 1/2 at night in hall when cyclones were too near us for comfort. The nurses were so nice and kind to us. They knew that it was for our safety if a cyclone

should hit. That night when I started to get up and go to my room, I could not stand on left foot. Graydon helped me to my bed. The left knee still has a bone in it due to that fall from a pecan tree, stopped too quick, so Dr. Rodgers claimed.

Last week when I was tested, the test showed emphysema and a bad scar on lungs from pneumonia. I do not remember having that unless while in the "Goose Pen." (That was a 100x100 yard pen with 8 ft. high fence

around it.)

It was divided into four parts. (Just by walkway.) One for mumps, whooping cough, measles, and a catch all. I went up to office to see doctor. You see I had mumps in just one jaw. 

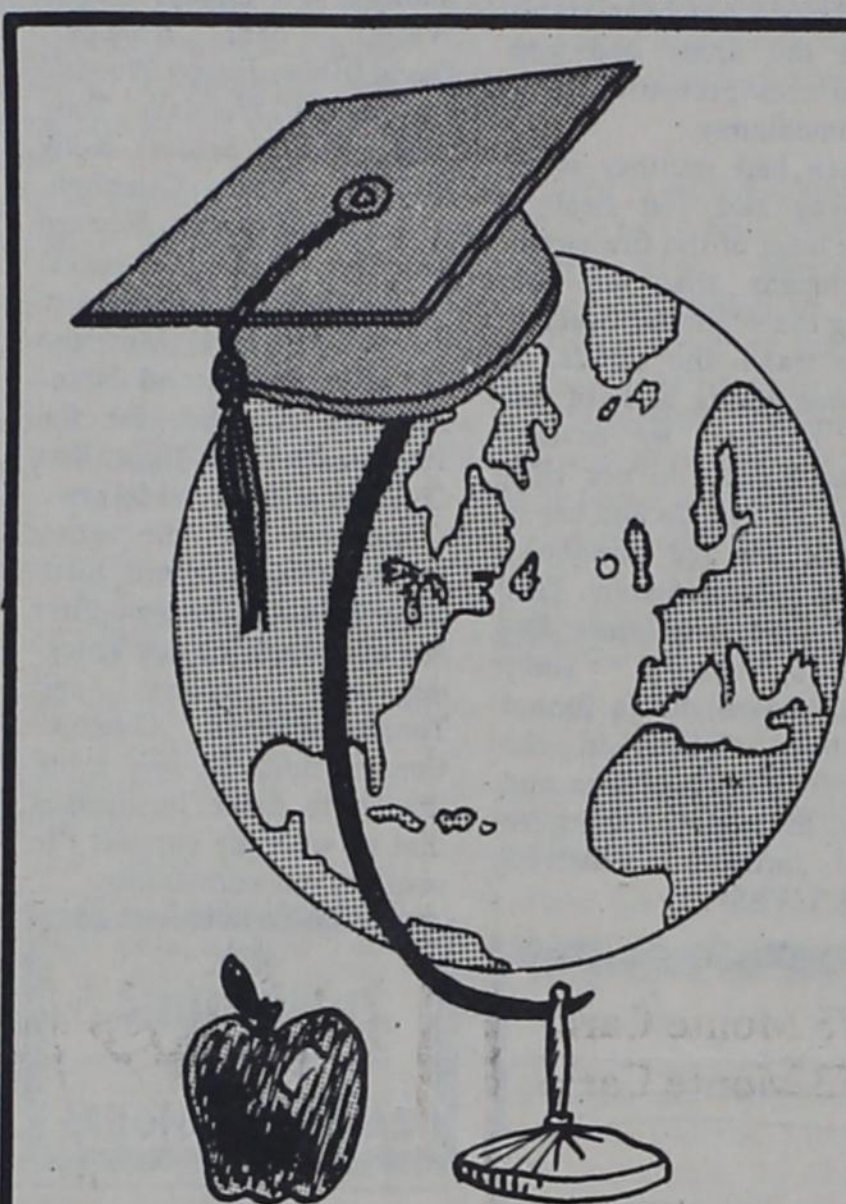

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PEANUT QUOTAS FOR FARMERS

COLLEGE STATION — Texas farmers plan to plant some 265,000 acres of peanuts this year, a 3 percent increase from 1981.

However, farmers must comply with reduced poundage quotas as required under the 1981 Farm Act to be eligible for support prices and other provisions of the peanut program, points out Johnny Feagan, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The 1982 national poundage quota has been set at 1.2 million tons.

For each farm that had an allotment in 1981, a preliminary poundage quota is established subject to certain categories of reduction based on production characteristics of the farm during the 1979-81 crop base period. These categories are as follows:

-Category 1: Farms which did not actually produce peanuts due to inadequate tillable cropland.

-Category 2: Nonproduction of the quota two out of the three preceding years. Quota to be reduced for the current year to the extent that peanuts were not produced during two out of the three years of the base period except when due to natural disaster or other reasons beyond the control of the producer.

-Category 3: All farms which were not reduced to zero poundage quota under Categories 1 and 2 or were not affected by reductions in these categories. A uniform state factor will be applied against the preliminary farm

poundage quota on all farms not reduced to zero in the first two categories.

-Category 4: Active farms where peanuts are regularly grown on adapted soils.

A state committee can establish a state reserve for the correction of errors, notes Feagan. This reserve would not exceed 2 percent of the state poundage quota and would be allocated to counties upon request.

Under the law, any peanuts produced on a farm without a poundage quota or in excess of the farm poundage quota will be classified as additional peanuts. These peanuts must have been contracted for export or for crushing by April 15, or they could have been placed in the price support loan pool for additional peanuts.

Producers will be permitted to transfer their peanut quota by lease or sale within their county, adds the economist.

All peanut growers are required to certify their planted acres to the county ASCS office. A peanut marketing card must be issued to each producer before he can sell any peanuts. This reflects the poundage that can be marketed for domestic edible uses or marketed as contract additional peanuts for export or crush. Any peanuts marketed in excess of the contracted quantity are considered as quota peanuts.

The loan rate for quota peanuts will be \$550 per ton to the farmer while additional peanuts are being contracted for about \$400 per ton, says Feagan.

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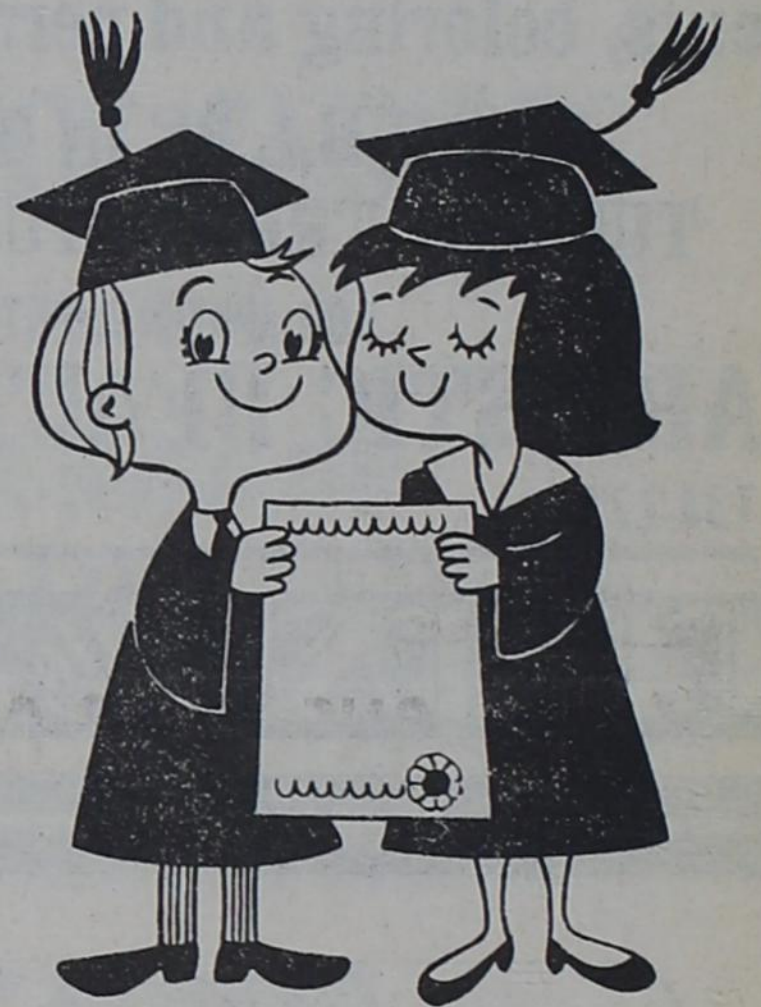

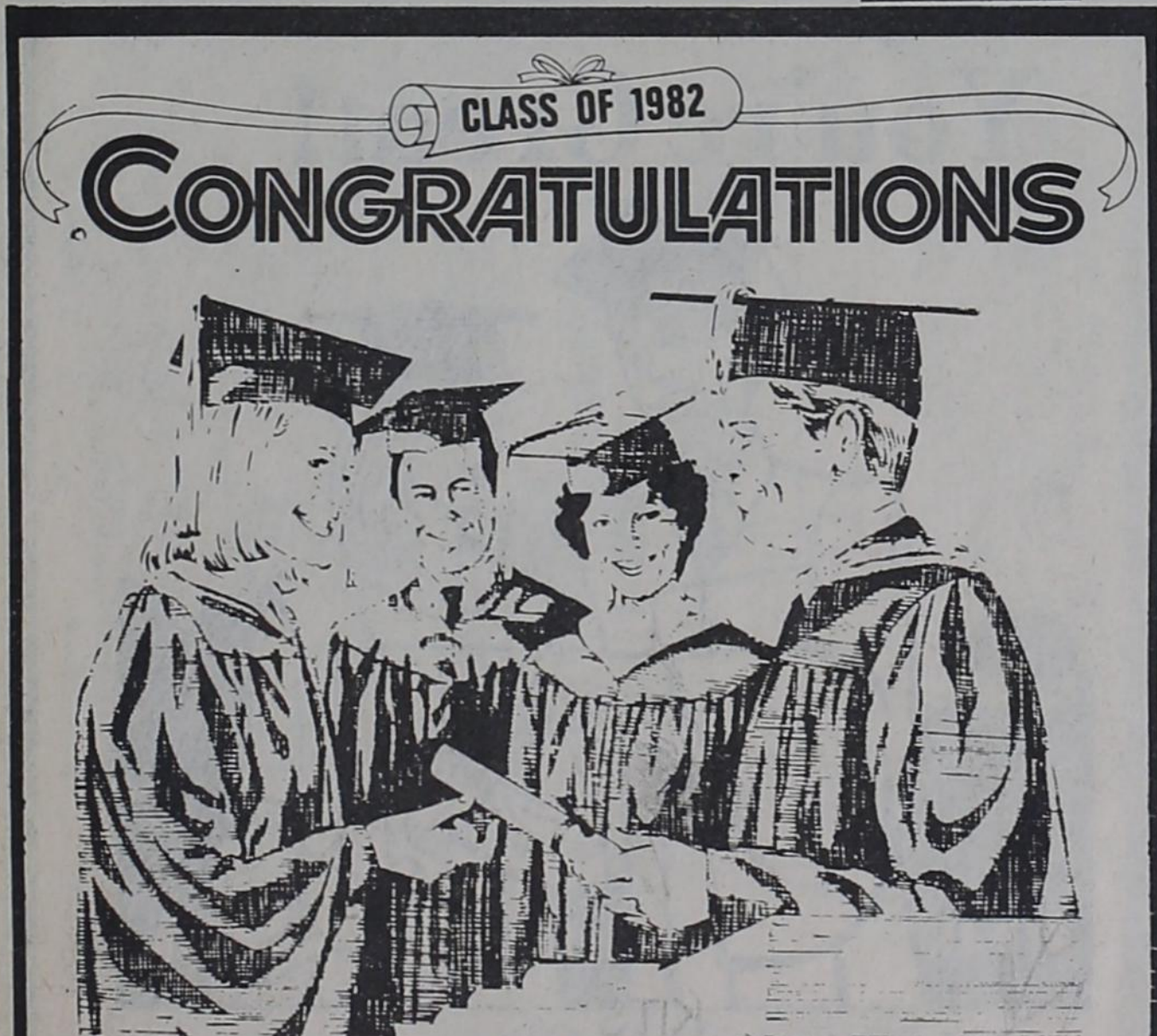

BUYING OR LEASING PEANUT POUNDAGE QUOTAS

Peanut growers have a four-year program to operate under, but there are still a lot of questions about buying or leasing peanut poundage quotas.

Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System, provides this information regarding poundage quotas:

Current law requires that individual farm quotas be reduced based on the farm's production characteristics during the 1979-81 crop base period.

1982 USDA regulations divide peanut farms into three priority categories to reduce the national poundage quota from 1.44 million tons in 1981 to 1.2 million in 1982: category 1 -- farms with inadequate tillable cropland to produce poundage quotas; category 2 -- farms on which quotas were not fully produc-

ed in at least two of the last three years; and category 3 -- quotas on all other farms.

To comply with final regulations, category 3 farms in Texas must factor their 1981 poundage quotas by 0.882621, which less than the 16.7 percent reduction in the national poundage quota. The balance of the poundage quota reduction in Texas resulted from eliminating quotas held by category 1 and 2 farms, notes Lovell.

The national poundage quota in 1983, '84, and '85 will be reduced 2.7 percent, 2.8 percent, and 3.1 percent, respectively.

Regarding the impact of the poundage quota reduction and its effect on buying or leasing quotas, Lovell offers these comments.

From 1978 through 1981, peanut producers have experienced annual reductions in peanut acreage allotments. From 1982 through 1985, the national poundage quota is to decrease by 8.33 percent. Due to the relatively small size of the typical peanut enterprise and other considerations, the impact is negative for the individual producer's vantage point, says the economist.

Since category 1 and 2 poundage quotas were eliminated this year and in view of the new farm bill, farms that previously leased out poundage quotas produced off the farms are likely to take the first reduction of quotas in 1983. Assuming a 10 to 12 percent reduction per year through 1985, these quota holders would incur a poundage quota reduction totaling 29 to 32 percent or more through 1985. If poundage reduction is achieved in this manner, operators producing their own poundage quota may expect only a slight or no cut in their quotas, Lovell says.

Another alternative for 1983 being followed this year is an across-the-board cut for category 3 and category 4, where category 4 includes operators producing their own poundage quotas. As should be apparent, it is a guess at this point as to who will take quota reductions in 1983 and the magnitude of these cuts.

peanut enterprise, then buying quotas in 1982 appears to present the safer alternative for achieving this objective, notes Lovell.

The tough question is "How much can one afford to pay for buying peanut poundage quotas?"

Estimating a quota buying price is subject to error due to the lack of knowledge about most factors involved, including the final ASCS regulations for implementing the peanut section of the farm bill. The key toward understanding this uncertainty is realizing that poundage quotas purchased in 1982 do not take on the same ASCS characteristics as quota one already possesses, explains Lovell.

Instead, quotas bought this year carry with them history for the base period 1979-81. Quotas with "good history" should be more valuable than quotas with "bad history." Good history might mean that the poundage quota was "fully produced" in 1979-81 or 1980-81 while bad history could be quota which was not "fully produced" in 1980 or 1979-80. In this example, poundage quota with bad history would have to be fully produced on the farm in 1982 or the operator could face a significant reduction in the 1983 poundage quota, notes the economist.

He advises parties considering the lease or sale of poundage quotas to carefully check out the situation through the ASCS office in the county where the peanuts are located.
