Its new formula will help prevent the corrosion that can lead to scaling of heat transfer surfaces. It's important to use a coolant/antifreeze that will protect aluminum. Tests have shown that a radiator filled with the wrong coolant may lose thirty percent of its cooling capacity in a few thousand miles. This could lead to your radiator boiling over.

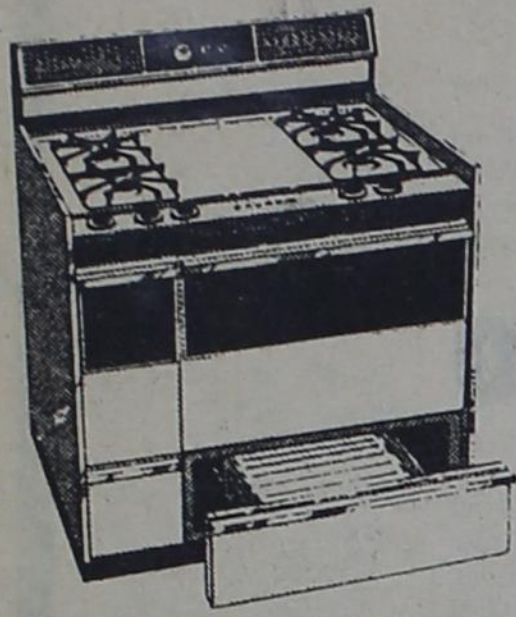

GAS GATHERING SYSTEM PLACED IN SERVICE

A low pressure natural gas gathering system in north central Texas has been placed in service by Northern Gas Products Company.

The gathering system and 50 mile pipeline will transport gas from wells in Eastland and Comanche counties to the company's Lipan processing plant in Hood County, southwest of Fort Worth.

"Eight wells in Eastland County are tied to the system," says John Hon, the company's regional manager in Houston. Hon expects another 60 wells in Eastland and Comanche counties to be connected by the end of March.

Called the Punkin Center Pipeline, the new system has the capacity to move up to 10 million cubic feet of natural gas per day. The gas is expected to yield 50,000 gallons of mixed hydrocarbons, including ethane, propane, iso-butane, normal butane, and natural gasoline.

The line originates in southern Eastland County and passes through portions of Comanche and Erath

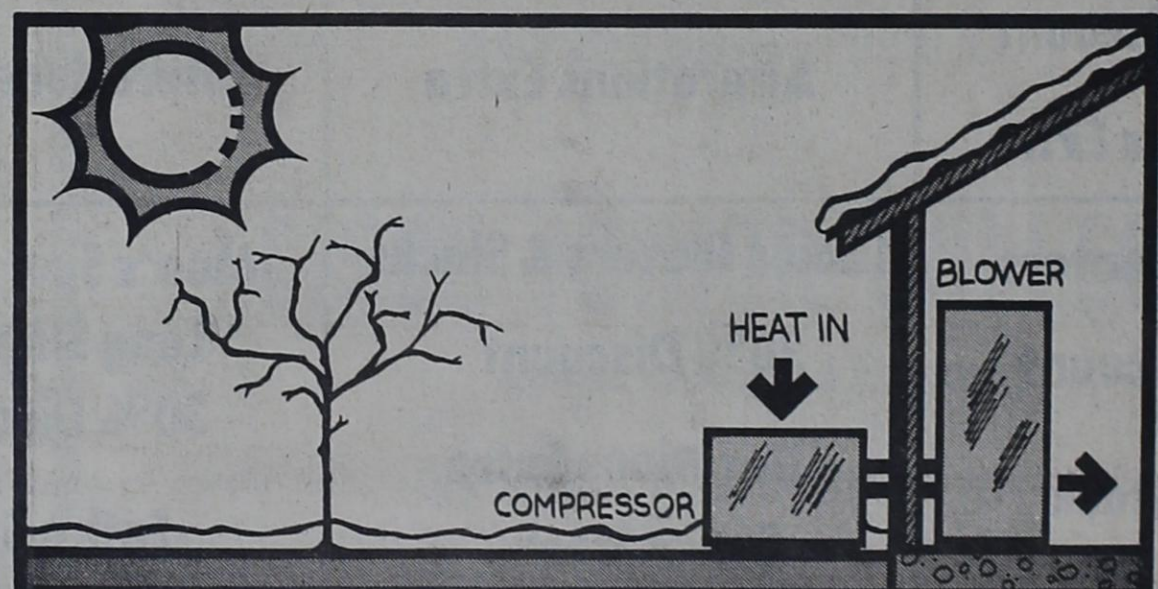
