Gorman runningback Jimmy Johnson was named to the Texas Sportswriters Association All-State Class A team for the second consecutive year, and four other area players made the Class A or AA squads, including two from Aspermont.

Pat Boyd and Marvin Louis, both of whom played for Aspermont, were named to the Class A team at lineman and linebacker, respectively. Jay Hess of Eastland was named to quarterback the AA team, and Hamlin noseguard Ken Johnson was placed among

the linemen. Johnson, a 5-8, 180-pound senior, led his team to the semifinals with his 2,200 yards rushing, averaging slightly more than 10 yards per carry. He scored approximately 200

points this season. Boyd played linebacker for six games before moving to noseguard where he had 15 quarterback sacks and 13 fumble recoveries. The 5-10, 180-pound senior batted down four passes and averaged 10 tackles per game. Boyd also doubled as a runningback, rushing for 1,345 yards in the regular season and 409 more in playoff games.

Louis, a 5-10, 175-pound senior, averaged 17 tackles per game, two interceptions and three fumble recoveries. He, like Boyd, doubled as a runningback for the Hornets, rushing for 1,206 yards and 16

touchdowns. Hess quarterbacked Eastland to the quarterfinals before losing to eventual state champion Pilot Point. The 6-0, 180-pound junior hit 86 of 144 passes for 1,402 yards and 11 touchdown's. He rushed for 321 yards on 65 carries for 12

touchdowns. Hamlin's Ken Johnson, 6-0, 245 pounds, anchored the Pied

Rabies remain a constant threat in Eastland County. Dr. Kevan Blasor, Ranger Veterinarian, reports three confirmed rabies cases during the last month. Pet owners should make sure their animals get yearly vaccinations. It is easy to forget how much time has passed since the last vaccination.

We recommend annual rabies vaccinations for all dogs and cats three months of age and older. Vaccination is the number one weapon in the battle against the dreaded disease. While little can be done about rabies in wild animals, pet owners can take a positive step in protecting their animals with annual vaccinations.




