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Tornado Warning Signal Test Set



Arlton Smith, Civil Defense Director for Gorman, has scheduled a test of the tornado warning signal at 1:00 P.M. on Saturday, March 13, 1982.

The purpose of this test is to familiarize the citizens of the community with the signal that will indicate the approach of a tornado or other disaster. The warning will be sounded on the siren that is mounted on the water tower, and the signal will consist of one long blast lasting one minute, followed by numerous short blasts.

This test will be conducted only if the weather is fair on the scheduled date. With the approach of the tornado season, it is important that all our citizens know the meaning of the signal so that lives may be saved if and when disaster strikes.

If you hear this signal during inclement weather, take cover immediately near the center of your house or building, covering yourself with blankets or pillows to protect you from flying glass.

If you are caught outside during a tornado, lay in a ditch or other depression in the ground and cover your head with your arms. Do not, under any circumstances, get into your car and try to outrun a tornado.

Countless lives were lost in Wichita Falls because people were unprepared and did not know what to do. Take just a few moments to instruct your children and loved ones. Plan ahead--for an event that we hope never happens.

In case of an actual tornado the television cable system will be interrupted for an announcement, insert siren warning signals cut.

Peanut Markets Dictate Cut In Additional Plantings

After surveying the current export market outlook for U. S. produced peanuts the National Peanut Growers Group Steering Committee has advised growers to make decisions on the planting of additional peanuts in a cautious and deliberate manner.

Ross Wilson, Texas representative on the national organization, said that a delegation of U. S. peanut producers recently visiting European users of U. S. peanut found marketing opportunities to be in a depressed state. Factors contributing to the poor market outlook include inflation, lack of strength in the dollar and a surplus of peanuts world wide.

Wilson said that prices for shelled goods presently being quoted by foreign users of U. S. peanuts convert to prices on farmers stock substantially below the cost of production. He said there-

fore, the National Peanut Growers Group has recommended that growers not plant additional peanuts in 1982 unless a contract has been secured that will assure a satisfactory net return to the producer. Wilson stated that growers should remember that additional peanuts not contracted must be placed in the area association pool and that pool dividends depend on both domestic and export edible demand.

He said that there currently exists a considerable inventory of 1981 crop segregation 1 peanuts held by handlers and by the three area grower associations under the loan program. "We can only conclude at this point, Wilson said, that any production of 1982 crop additional peanuts without contracts will only add to the oversupply situation and further deteriorate markets. Also, such pe-

nuts going into Association loan pools will have even poorer potential of returning to growers anything over the loan rate for additional peanuts."

The grower spokesman said that in spite of the present dim market outlook for the short range in 1982, the grower team studying the export situation believes there remains a bright future for American peanuts in the European market. He cited as partial reason for his long range optimism the 13 percent increase in peanut butter sales in Europe last year, but the broad development of that market is in its infancy, he said.

For now, Wilson said European buyers are enjoying the prospect of acquiring cheap peanuts, a condition that is being nurtured by the current oversupplied world market.

Referendum and Election of T.P.P.B. Approaching

The Texas Peanut Producers Board is required by law to hold biennial elections for the purpose of electing board members. In the 1976 biennial election, three board members were elected for six-year terms. Those whose terms expire April 30, 1982 are: J. O. Jackson, Jr. - District No. 2; Bill Huff - District No. 3; and Billie Wayne Heiser - District No. 4 (B. W. Heiser resigned July, 1980 and J. M. Lindsey, III, was appointed to fill the unexpired term).

DISTRICT NO. 2 - Includes the northwestern counties of the State. The southernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Loving, Wheeler, Ector, Midland, Glasscock, Sterling, Coke, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Parker, Wise, Denton, Grayson, Fannin and Lamar. All peanut producers north of this line are in District No. 2.

DISTRICT NO. 3 - The westernmost boundary of this district includes the following counties: Red River,

Delta, Hunt, Collie, Dallas, Tarrant, Hood, Erath, Bosque, McLennan, Bell, Milam, Lee, Bastrop, Fayette, Colorado, Wharton and Matagorda. Producers east of this line are in District No. 3.

DISTRICT NO. 4 - The northernmost counties of this district includes the following counties: Maverick, Zavalla, Medina, Bexar, Guadalupe, Gonzales, Lavaca, and Jackson. Producers south of this line are in District No. 4.

REFERENDUM STATE AT LARGE - The Texas Peanut Producers Board proposes to increase the current assessment rate from \$1.00 to \$2.00 per ton to be collected at the point of first sale to finance programs of advertising, promotion, market and product development, education and research designed to increase the profitability of peanut production. All peanut producers within the State are included in the referendum.

The referendum and election of board members must be completed and tabulated by May 6, 1982.

All producers of peanuts within the area defined, including owners of farms on which peanuts are produced, are eligible to vote in the election if such producer would be required under H.B. 525 to pay the assessment.

Any producer of peanuts who is qualified to vote in the election and desires to be a candidate for membership on the Texas Peanut Producers Board shall file with the principal office, P. O. Box 398, Gorman, Texas 76454, an application to have his name placed on the ballot. The application must be signed by the candidate and by at least ten producers who are qualified to vote in the election and must be filed at thirty (30) days prior to the election (April 6).

No candidate, unless so nominated, shall have his name placed on the official ballot. However, this does not prevent the writing of the name of any candidate on the ballot by any qualified voter at the election. Spaces shall be provided on the ballot for such write-in candidates.

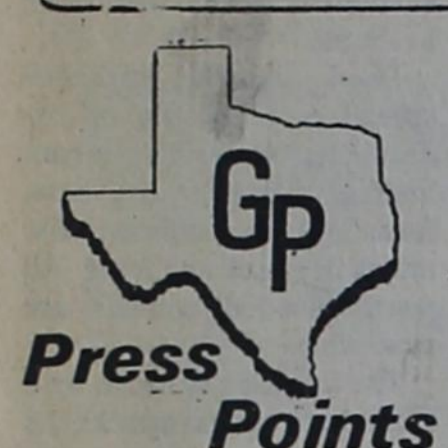

**RABIES VACCINATIONS TO BE GIVEN MARCH 13**

Larry Damron, D.V.M. from Stephenville will be at Gorman Milling Company, Saturday March 13 from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. Rabies vaccinations for small animals (dogs and cats) will be available for \$5.00 per animal. Distemper shots will be available.

Dogs are the principal spreaders of rabies, or by-dropholia. Outbreaks occur among skunks, coyotes, foxes and other animals that attack livestock and fowls. All warm blooded animals are susceptible.

The infection is cause by a filtrable virus that attacks the nervous system. It is transmitted in the saliva of a diseased animal that bites its victims. Upon entering the blood stream, the virus infects the nerves, follows their course to the spinal cord, and finally involves the brain. From 15 to 45 percent of the bites of rabid animals result in death to the victim.

Please have your dogs and cats vaccinated and help prevent this disease in our community.

**HOMESTEAD BENEFITS AVAILABLE TO THOSE OVER 65**

Homeowners who are age 65 or older and failed to receive their School District Homestead Exemption in 1979 have until April 1, 1982 to still sign up. In this way, Over-65 homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000 Homestead exemption given by the School District of the State.

According to House Bill 885 which was passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, Over-65 homeowners who Qualified For the school homestead "Tax Freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the Chief Appraiser of the County Appraisal District in which the home is located.

This application must be made with the Chief Appraiser of the Eastland County Appraisal District before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years of age or older.

- Own his or her home.
- Use that home as his or her Principle Residence.

The Chief Appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the Chief Appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the Over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000 for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

For information and application forms, you may contact the Eastland County Appraisal District office located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse. The mailing address is P. O. Box 914, Eastland, Texas 76448 and the telephone number to call is 629-8597.

from Scott heirs in 1921 two of Dads cousins that worked in steel mills at Birmingham visited us. They wanted to take dog and go hunting. The dog jumped a jack rabbit. One said it was a deer. Dad told him it was a mule eared jack rabbit. They had ears like a mule. They treed a squirrel and one wanted to catch it bare handed. Could not talk him out of it. It was a draw. The thing chew-

ed and bit his hand. Tho he took other hand and choked it Went on and dog treed cotton tail. Dad told him it would not hurt him. He shook his head and said that it was too large, so I pulled it out. We had a good dinner. When the man put iodine on his hand he really waltzed. They said they could tell folks in Alabama about hunting in wild West Texas.

In Spring of 1913, I was plowing with those 2 and 3 year old mules with a hammock seat cultivator and a neighbor came there and we were talking. A whirl wind blew his straw hat off and it went sailing by. So did the mules. I stood up in stirrups and the seat came off. I did not yell "Elvira, nor get up", but saved lines and stopped them. Got off and drove them back to seat, put it on and was ready to go.

In those short days in June I was laying by Cotton. Worked all week until Saturday noon. I felt sorry for the mules. I stopped at well and put lines down to get a drink. They were gone to back side of field ¼ mile and back to exact spot I had stopped them. A 1½ mile run, on place where Abie Duncan lives. I had two more runs with them. Tho I came out ok.

Dalton Sellars was about 6 or 7 he saw the boys tail cows. So one day he slipped up behind the big mule and tailed her. Dad saw it just as it happened. Too late. The mules feet went on each side of his head. What a lucky boy that day.

When we lived at Flatwoods in 1912-15, we did not have any pasture. We would cut corn tops and cane for stock. We had two jersey steer yearlings. So Dad made some yokes for them and we broke them to work and pull a cart. We would haul feed and melons with them. They made a good team.

In the Fall of 1913, we were picking cotton on west side of place and a shower came over dumping about ½ inch rain. The Sun did not even stop shining. We went to the house. Dad wanted to know why we quit. So I went back and brought the sacks back and started picking on

east side.

One time Ben Layton, wife and son Marcus visited us there. They were from Cal. He worked for Oil Co. lived in City. Marcus was dressed in fine clothes at all times and one day Gail bet Arthur that he could hide an egg on Mack and it could not be found. Arthur felt in pants, shirt, etc. shook his head and said they were fooling him. Mack was all smiles. He said "Oh yes there is." So Arthur walked up and hit his cap and said "There is that egg". Marcus yelled "Uncle Loss" Dad got the razor strap. They waltzed. I was an innocent by stander.

I will say this, Dad never whipped me in my life. I knew he went meant what he said. I never whipped any of my children except Elbert, one time at school. A boy was sore at me and took it out on Elbert. He fought back. I was out jogging, the other day and Dr. Lonnie Lou and his boss was jogging. Dr. said Bookie went to De Leon to let Windy give him the works, a Hair Cut, Shampoo and all that good smell um on his head. Then Bookie began to complain as the women would come up to him smile and almost swoon over him. They would run their hands over is invisible hair and run their hands their permanents. He has about decided he is getting too old for such foolishness.

Our deepest sympathy goes out to the Joe Barron family. I played with Joe as a child. He lived where Pinky Jobe lives. Grandad Scott lived where Dallas lives.

Also I notice where Mrs. Stokes died. The mother of Mrs. Reddell of School Hill. This is something all must do. May you look to the Keeper of the Books in your time of mourning.

We moved from Flatwoods in December 1915 to place where Bo Caraway lives. Dad lived there while I was in Army. In 21 months I came home twice. The last time

December 1918. I was coming home to Grandmother Scott's funeral. I told them if I could come I would be there at 11 a.m. on day of funeral. Tho heavy snow delayed me 12 hours or more. I was

walking from Eastland and just north of Flatwood, Dr. Johnson stopped and carried me on home about 10 miles out of his way. He told me he admired me serving our country. He said I knew and

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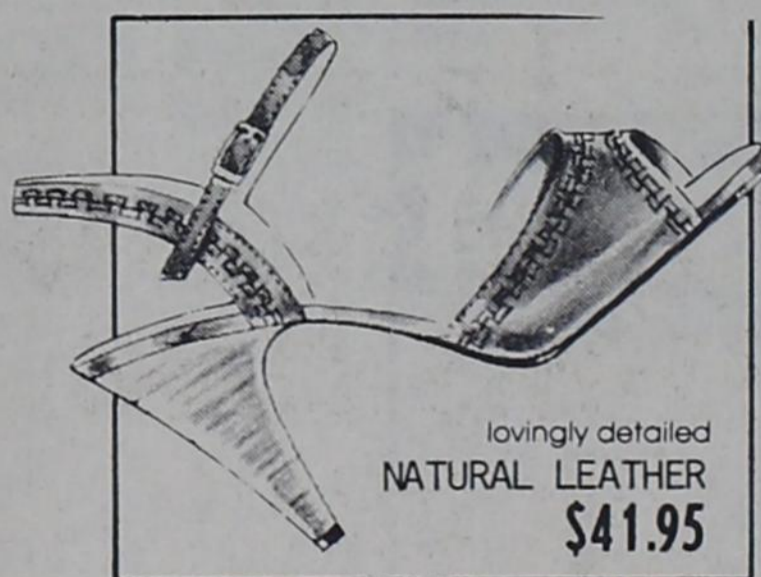
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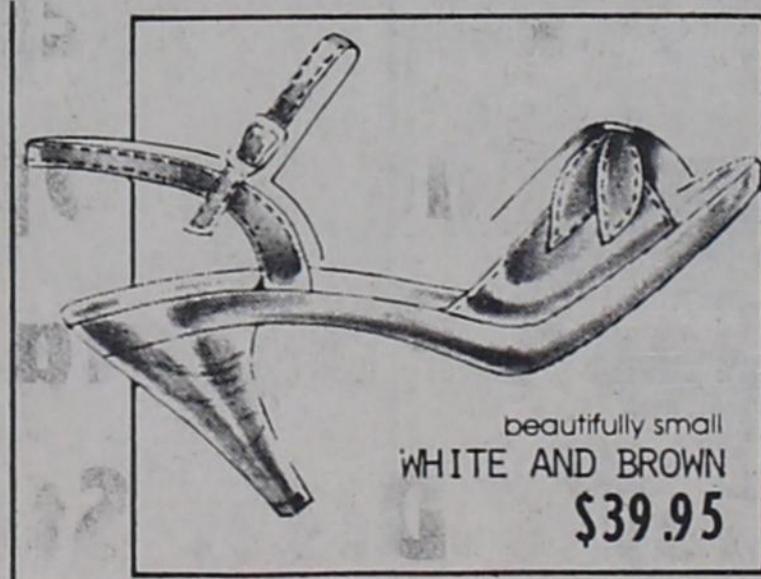

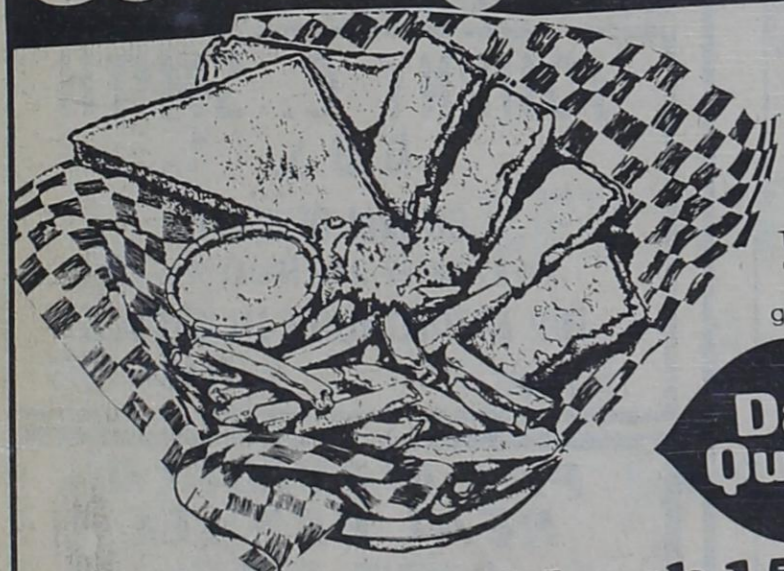
