GHS HOMECOMING 2000 Panthers Edged By Hounds; Open Date This Week

In the Homecoming Game on Saturday night before a very large crowd the Panthers lost a heart-breaker to the Throckmorton Greyhounds by a score of 17 to 14 in overtime. The Hounds jumped out to a 14-0 lead on their first two possessions, but the Big Red Defense held them in check the rest of the way. The Panthers scored on their second possession in the second period they tied the score with 1:24 left in the game to send the game into overtime. Then the Hounds got their possession, and we held at the 10 yard line but booted a field goal of 27 yards to win.

The Hounds took the opening kickoff on their own 15 and went the distance in 6 plays with the help of a Gorman 15 yard penalty. They ran for 16 on the first play and the Panthers were called for the penalty. Following runs of 8 - 1 and 4 Brandon Oliver caught a 42 yard pass to set the Hounds up at the Gorman 4. From there Alex Contreras ran in for the score with 9:33 left in the period. The kick try failed and the Hounds were up 6-0.

Then on their next possession on their own 2 the Hounds went the distance in 11 plays with Matt Bellah getting the final 31 yards on a keeper play with 2:11 left in the first period. The drive featured a 31 yard pass play by Oliver. Then Bellah threw a pass to Oliver for the 2 pointer to put the Hounds up 14-0.

Then after exchanging fumbles the Panthers took the ball on the Throckmorton 20 and scored in four plays with Josh Longoria catching a pass from brother Ben for 7 yards with 8:54 left in the second. The drive featured runs of 9 and 4 by Josh before catching the scoring pass. The kick try failed and Gorman trailed 14-6. This score held up till halftime.

Both the Throckmorton and Gorman Bands did great at the intermission entertaining the big homecoming crowd.

The score held up until 1:24 in the final period when the Panthers scored on a beautiful pass and run by Josh Longoria of 30 yards for the score. The drive covered 50 yards in 25 seconds. After an incomplete pass, Ben Longoria hit David Seaton with a 20 pass to set Gorman up at the Hound 30. Then Ben hit Josh with the TD catch. The Big Red went for the two pointer and Steven Patel ran in for the 2 points to tie the score and send the game into overtime.

Following the short break Gorman took the ball on the 25 but failed to score on their possession. Then the Hounds get their chance and tried to score but were held at the Gorman 10 on 3 downs. But from there the Hound kicker Caleb Hodges booted a 27 yard field goal for the win.

It was a heartbreaker for the Panthers who had fought back and behind some fine blocking and tackling tied the score in a gut-wrenching performance to lose in OT.

Patel led the Panthers with 92 yards on 19 tries. Josh Longoria had 36 on 8 carries. Micheal Lynch got 20 on 7 tries. Lynch led the Panthers in the passing game, catching 3 pass for 34 yards and Josh had 31 yards on three catches.

The Panthers found out they could block and tackle and really did a great job after the first period. We think the Panthers really found a new desire and will do better in their remaining games.

The Big Red have an Open Date this week before hosting a very good Baird Bear team on the 13th in the first district game at 7:30

Cubs Win Opener on Sept. 28th

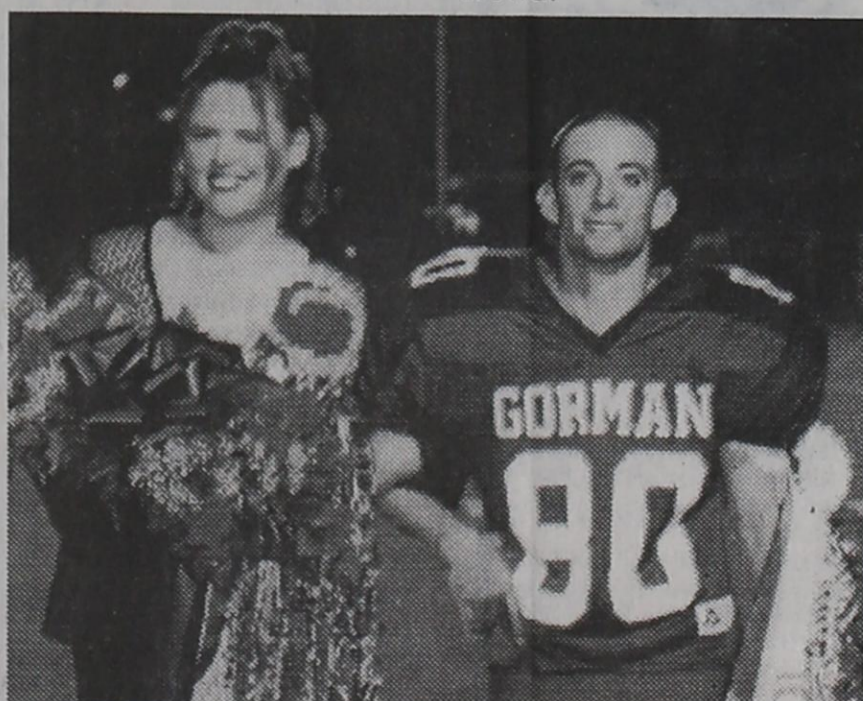
The Cubs won their first victory of 2000 at Throckmorton, 14-0. They are now at 1-1.

Migrant Education Programs Honored

Gorman, TX—Maxfield Elementary, Gorman Middle School and Gorman I.S.D. have been recognized by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for successfully educating its migrant students.

TEA's Division of Migrant Education has selected Maxfield Elementary a winner of the 2000-2001 Exceptional Award and Gorman Middle School is an Acknowledged Campus. Award given to school campuses and school districts that achieved academic success with their migrant students. Statewide, 100 school districts and 395 campuses are receiving this recognition.

The purpose of the award is to recognize school districts and campuses that strive to meet the unique needs of migrant children and their families and that help migrant students to meet high academic standards. There are approximately 122,000 migrant children in Texas.

Recipients of the Exceptional Campus Award will be presented with a plaque at the 2000 Texas Migrant Education Conference during a special luncheon in their honor. Recipients in all other categories will be recognized in the awards luncheon program. The 2000 Texas Migrant Education Conference will take place at the South Padre Island Convention Centre in South Padre Island, Texas, on November 15-17, 2000.

In order to receive the district award, school districts have to have at least 80 percent of their migrant student population passing all tests taken of the Texas Assessment Academic Skills (TAAS) test, have at least 94% migrant student attendance rate, and have a migrant student dropout rate of 6% or less. The 100 district winners were divided into four categories based on number of migrant students enrolled.

Campus winners were ranked within the four categories of Exceptional, Excelling, Promising and Acknowledged based upon migrant student performance on the TAAS, migrant student attendance, and migrant student dropout rate. Statewide, 48 campuses were distinguished as Exceptional, 97 campuses as Excelling, 137 campuses as Promising and 113 campuses as Acknowledged.

(Ephesians 4:15)

.....Biblical truths brought to you by the church of Christ in Gorman

The following passage in Romans 8, verses 6-14, lists 6 reasons why we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts. Let's discuss them one at a time.

This week, we are discussing the second reason that we must have the Spirit of Christ residing in our hearts, according to the writing of Paul to the Church at Rome.

Romans 8:6-14

For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace. Because the carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can be.

1. So then they that are in the flesh cannot please God. But ye are not in the flesh, but in the Spirit, if so be that the Spirit of God dwell in you.

2. Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his.

3. And if Christ be in you, the body is dead because of sin; but the Spirit is life because of righteousness.

4. But if the Spirit of him that raised up Jesus from the dead dwell in you, he that raised up Christ from the dead shall also quicken your mortal bodies by his Spirit that dwelleth in you.

Therefore, brethren, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live after the flesh. For if ye live after the flesh, ye shall die;

5. But if ye through the Spirit do mortify the deeds of the body, ye shall live.

6. For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God.

In the last sentence of verse nine, Paul makes a statement that is quite sobering. He declares that without the Spirit of Christ we are none of his. In the Greek he is actually saying, "You are not his unless you have the Spirit of Christ."

This declaration should motivate us to diligence in our search for God. We should leave nothing to chance, and refuse to be satisfied, until we are certain that God's spirit dwells within us just like we see it manifested in the scripture.

According to scripture, there were definite signs that occurred whenever someone was filled the Holy Ghost/Holy Spirit of God. Please look closely at the following scriptures; Acts 2:4, *Acts 8:14-19, Acts 10:44-47, Acts 19:1-6

*Please note, that although Acts 8:14-19 does not specifically say that the Samaritans spake with tongues, it does say that the people had received the Word of God and had been baptized. The passage then clearly states that the Holy Ghost had not yet fallen on any of them. How did they know this if they were not looking for a definite sign signifying the infilling of the Spirit? After Peter and John laid hands on them, praying that they might receive the Holy Ghost, they received. And, it was so apparent that they had received that Simon the sorcerer offered money to have the power to give such a phenomenal gift.

I declare that people still speak in other tongues when they truly receive the Holy Ghost/Holy Spirit. I've seen it year after year, service after service. I encourage you to not miss this important step in Christianity, especially since the Scriptures declare, "Now if any man have not the Spirit of Christ, he is none of his."
