Currently, the Show's total scholarship program represents a commitment of more than \$6 million, through its annual, four-year and endowment awards.

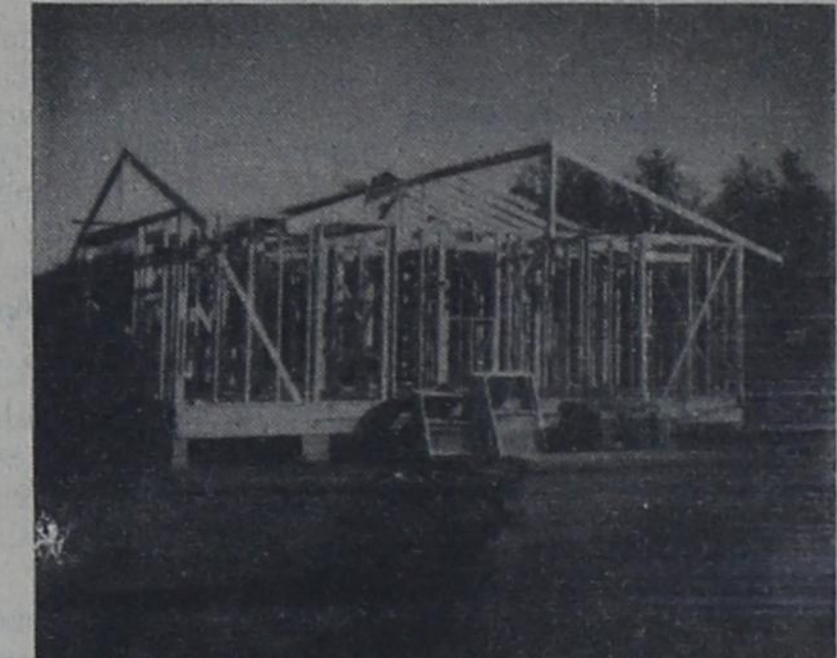

## MEDICARE ENROLLMENT PERIOD BEGINS IN JAN.

People who failed to sign up for the medical insurance part of Medicare or who once had this protection but dropped it will have a chance to get this protection during the 1984 general enrollment period, January through March, Glyn Hammons, Social Security district manager in Abilene, said recently.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills, outpatient hospital services, and many other medical items and services not covered under hospital insurance.

Protection for people who sign up during the general enrollment period will start July 1, 1984.

Medical insurance is financed by premiums paid by those enrolled and the Federal general revenue. Currently the Federal Government pays about three-fourths of the cost.

People who sign up during a general enrollment period may pay a higher premium, Hammons said. This is because the premium is increased by 10 percent for each full year a person could have had this protection but did not.

More information about the medical insurance general enrollment period can be obtained at the Abilene Social Security office, located at 142 S. Pioneer. The telephone number is 698-1360.

## Nugent Calls For Reduction In Home Gas Rates

Railroad Commissioner Jim Nugent said today that he believes it is high time consumers benefited from more abundant natural gas supplies and lower prices.

"Last year, the Commission granted a net of almost \$92 million in lower rates for natural gas transportation," Nugent said. "Based on this and other declines in the price of producing natural gas, I think it's high time we began to see some of these decreases reflected in home heating bills."

"For the past year or so, purchasers and users of natural gas in Texas have seen the halt in the escalation of wellhead prices and in many cases those prices have actually lowered," Nugent noted. "I find this a significant and encouraging trend," he said. "What we must do now is see that the ultimate

consumer also receives the benefit of generally lower rates."

Nugent laid out statistics showing that of the pipeline-to-pipeline rate change cases which came before the Commission in 1983, the net result of Commission actions was a decrease of \$91.9 million in annualized rates.

Nugent also said wellhead prices for natural gas have decreased to a statewide average of about \$2.20 per Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas.

## BAKING TIPS from Betty Crocker



### Frosting Can Make The Difference . . .

"It's the frosting on the cake" is an oft-repeated expression referring to something special — the crowning touch. Actually, real, honest-to-goodness frosting does much more than add a decorative topping or filling for desserts. It provides a protective coating which seals in moisture. It also complements the cake with flavor, color and texture.

Most frostings are variations of four basic types: fondant, seven-minute and boiled, all of which require cooking, and the popular uncooked, buttercream. Add glazes, sauces, whipped- and pudding-type toppings, and you have a smorgasbord selection to enhance favorite desserts.

Homemade frostings, particularly the cooked types, require close attention to measuring, beating instructions and cooking times for smooth, spreadable results with a soft, lustrous appearance. Frostings require just the right consistency to adhere without tearing or causing

crumbling. For foolproof results, consider using a frosting mix or ready-to-spread frosting.



In choosing a frosting, select a flavor and type which will team tastefully with the flavor, consistency and appearance of the dessert. A cake to be frosted should be cooled and brushed free of loose crumbs. If you are frosting it right on the serving plate, protect the plate by placing four strips of waxed paper around the cake base while you do your decorating.

ing. If the frosting seems too thick to spread easily, try thinning with a few drops of water or other liquid.

For the bottom layer of a cake, spread 1/3 to 1/2 cup frosting over an inverted layer to within 1/4 inch of the edge. Cover with second layer, rounded side up, and cover side with a thin layer of frosting to seal in crumbs. Then, add more frosting, building up a 1/4-inch rim around the top edge.

Finally, spread remaining frosting over top to meet raised edge. With spatula, knife or back of spoon, add decorator touches with a light, feathery touch — swirls, spirals, peaks, crisscross or circle patterns.

With Betty Crocker frosting mixes and ready-to-spread frostings, fun need not be limited to cake decorating. safer because of a new project soon to be launched by the Eastland County Extension Homemakers Clubs.  
 Called "Infant Buckle Up," the project is intended to increase the number of area infants who are buckled up in car child restraint device while riding in motor vehicles. The Eastland County Extension Homemakers will be telling parents how important car infant restraints are and will be loaning infant seats to area residents.  
 Car crashes are the leading cause of death to our children. But safely constructed child restraint devices can reduce or prevent most of these tragedies. The problem is to convince parents of the need to use these restraints and then help them get good ones. That's what the Extension Homemakers are going to do.  
 Child restraint devices are very important. A safely constructed restraint device can reduce the probability of death in a car crash by as much as 90%. The probability of serious injury can be reduced by 70%.  
 Once parents decide to get a car restraint device for their child, they may be confused as to which of the many models on the market is best. To help parents make a good selection, the Extension Homemakers will have available a shopping guide which lists all the safe, crash-tested restraint devices for infants and

children up to four or five years of age.  
 Since some people may resist buying a restraint car seat device because of the cost, the Extension Homemakers will be having the infant care seat loaner program available for a small rental fee.  
 When you consider that your child's life could depend on it, car seat restraints are not that expensive.  
 Extension Homemakers serving on the steering committee for this infant car seat loaner project are Gabby Masters, Diane Carlile, Ruthie Keyes, and Dorothy Underwood.  
 This project will be launched during February.


