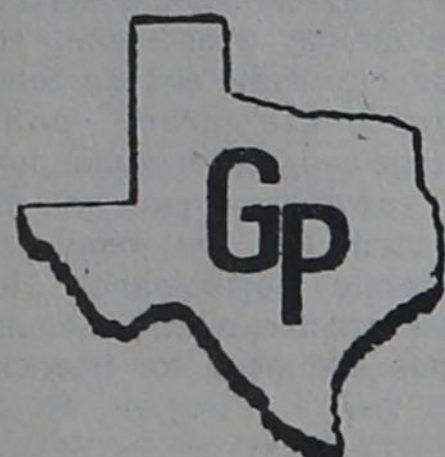

GORMAN PLACES FOURTH IN BEARCAT RELAYS APRIL 3

The Bearcat Relays held in De Leon Thursday came down to the finish of the 1600-meter relay to determine the champion and Bangs finished second in 3:34.74 to surpass both Hamilton and Eastland and take home the first place trophy. Gorman won fourth place.

A victory in the event by either Hamilton or Eastland would have given that team the championship trophy, as Bangs won with 89 points, Hamilton finished with 88 and Eastland took 84.

Coby Frank of Dublin won the poll vault with an effort of 14-6, nine inches off his best set a week ago.

RUN-OFF ELECTION FOR PLACE III

A run off election will be held for Place III on the City Commission on Saturday, April 20th.

The contest will be between L. F. Kellogg, who received 76 votes in the election held Saturday and Mrs. Jo Ann White, who received 59 votes. The third contender for Place Three, Blaine Gibbs, received 49 votes.

Jack Simpson was elected to Place One with 136 votes, Lupe Torres received 50 votes. A total of 197 votes were cast.

In the South Eastland County Hospital Board election, three incumbents retained their positions. Lowell Rawls received 208 votes, James Miears 183, and Hershell Cordell 208. Monty Montgomery won a First terms on the board with 183 votes. Candidate Steve Estes received 77 votes. A total of 226 votes were cast.

Daryl Hirst was re-elected to the Gorman School Board. He received 156 votes and Monty Montgomery was elected as write-in with 104 votes. Windell Treadway also a write-in received 63 votes. 171 votes were cast with many single name write-in votes.

HOSPITAL TO HOLD STROKE PREVENTION CLINIC

Blackwell Hospital, Gorman Lions Club and First National Bank in conjunction with Ultra-Tex, Inc. will sponsor a Free Stroke Prevention Clinic, on Saturday the 13th of April.

The clinic is being held in an attempt to find those people who are unaware of the potential health hazard found in the vessels of the neck that supply the blood to the brain.

With the use of an ultrasound machine there is now the ability to see directly inside the carotid arteries. The ultra-sound image shows any calcium build up and possible blockage of the vessels which is one of the possible causes of strokes.

People who are approximately 50 years of age and older, smoke, or may have high blood pressure are leading candidates for experiencing TIAs or

TIA

Transient ischemic attacks (TIA) are sudden, neurologic deficits (such as loss of vision in one eye, inability to speak, paralysis, or weakness of one side of the body) that last for less than 24 hours. Although they are similar in appearance to minor strokes, they do no discernible lasting damage to the brain's functions.

TIAs are probably due to an interruption in blood flow to an area of the brain. They can be caused by a narrowing in the carotid arteries (the arteries in the neck that supply the brain with oxygenated blood). This narrowing is usually due to the presence of atherosclerosis. Blood vessel spasms and showers of tiny emboli (clots that travel to the brain) are also possible causes of TIAs.

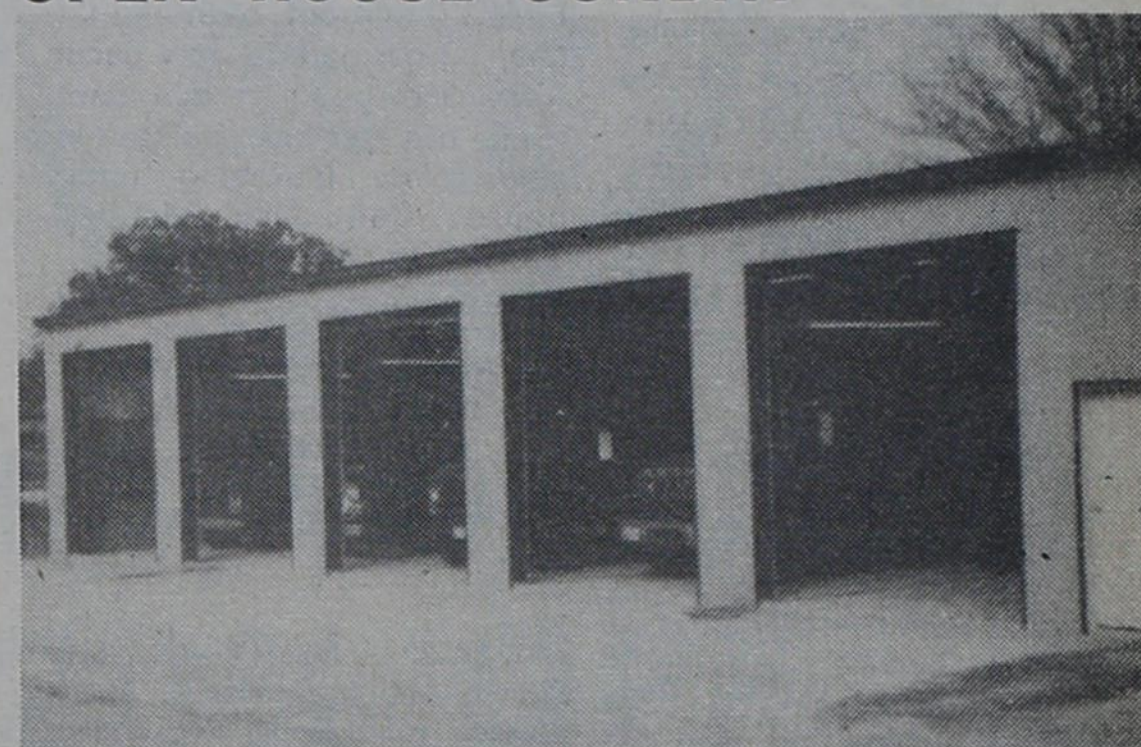
The symptoms of TIAs are both varied and frightening to the victim. They can include weakness of the side of the face; numbness in various parts of the body; blindness in one eye; weakness in the arms or legs on one side; and prickling or "pins and needles" sensation in parts of the body. Vertigo (Sensation of spinning) combined with any of these symptoms and others can also be due to TIAs.

The major importance of TIAs is their use in the diagnosis of stroke. Any such attack may be a predictor of stroke. Often, when a person describes a "light stroke" he or she is really talking about a transient ischemic attack. If left unattended, TIAs can indeed lead to major strokes, with permanent damage to all parts affected, as well as to the possibility of sudden death. The first line of attack in diagnosis is a complete examination including history and physical, neurological, and eye exam. "Buits" noises caused by narrowing in an artery, are heard in the carotid artery. TIAs can be an indication of serious problems and if experienced, must be brought to the attention of a physician immediately.

The Gorman Volunteer Fire Department would like to use this means of letting everyone know we now have our new Fire Station Complete.

We invite everyone to come by Sunday afternoon from 2-5 p.m. April 14th, to see the New Fire Station. Coffee and Donuts will be served.

All our Equipment will be on display for you to see. Firemen will be present to explain the different types of equipment and its useage. As a group of Volunteer Firemen, we have set some goals that we think are very important in protecting you property and protecting us in fighting fires.

1. Proper Equipment - Fire Truck - Pumper and Tankers.
2. Proper Training - Fire Schools - All Types.
3. Proper Personal Equipment - Helmets, Bunker Coats, Rubber Boots.
4. Proper Housing Of Equipment.

In the Last seven years, many of our fireman have taken their own time off to go to Texas A&M Fire School for one week of Extensive Fire Training during the summer. Also we have sent almost every fireman to Abilene every August for 4 nights of Fire School. Also of these men give of their time and efforts, Free, to learn about new equipment and proper methods in fighting L.P.G. fires, Natural Gas fires, Oil Pit fires, Transport Spill Fires, House and Car fires. How to use air packs in fighting structure fires. Learn the dangers and how to handle Hazardous Materials. Fighting fires in Rural Areas in much different than fighting fires in town, because of available water.

We have just received a Van from Dyess AFB, thru the efforts of Texas Forest Service to be used to carry all our air packs, extra air cylinders, extra hose and floatation pump.

We have used all our funds and are trying to acquire a one ton pickup with 4 Wheel Drive with a 240 gallon Slip-on foam Unit thru Texas Forest Service. We are in need of approximately \$8,000.00 to complete this project.

The people of Gorman and the surround area have been very generous with donations to the Fire Department. For this we say "Thank You".

Thru you donations, the help of our City Council and a lot of hard work from your firemen, we feel we have as nice a fire station as any town our size. We are aware that many have made special contributions for special equipment, and for that we are very grateful.

Hope to see everyone other open House, Sunday from 2 to 5 p.m.

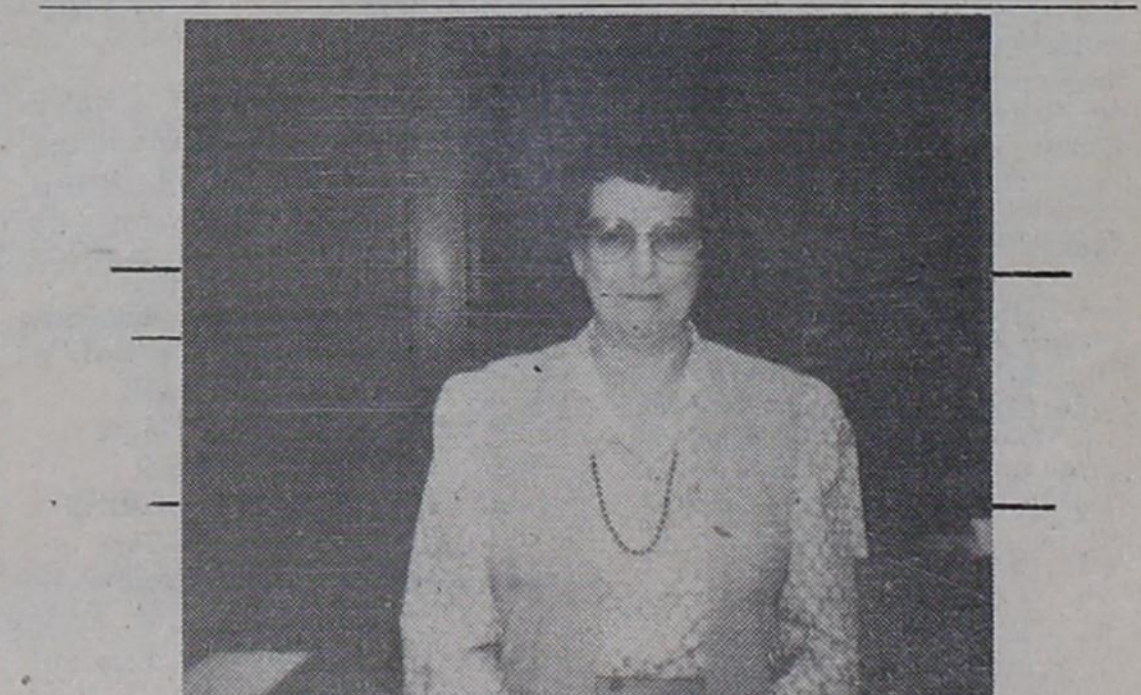

TIME TO SPRAY FRUIT TREES

It's time to spray fruit trees if you want fruit free of worms this year says County Extension Agent De Marquis Gordon. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed for the first time when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases such as Brown Rot and Scab. The suggested insecticides are Methoxychlor, Diazinon, and Thiodan. The recommended fungicides include Captan, Benomyl, Thiophanate-methyl, and wettable sulphur. Follow the directions on the amount of chemicals to add per gallon of water. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray at 10 to 14 days after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to apply as many as five applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties says Gordon. Do not apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches.

Gordon says Homeowners Fruit and Nut spray schedules are available at the County Extension office to give you more information on fruit tree spraying.

Hummingbirds See Red

Hummingbirds in your garden create a breathless sort of beauty. In the blur of their humming, fast-beating wings, the small (smallest in the world) birds hover, almost motionless, over flowers, lapping up nectar with their brush-coated tongues. These aerial acrobats dart from flower to flower, sometimes even flying backward. They shimmer with iridescent colors that come, not from the pigments of the birds' feathers, but from light striking the feathers' prism-like surfaces.



Want "hummers" in your backyard? Let your garden break out in a riot of color. Hummingbirds are suckers (so to speak) for tubular red, orange and pink flowers. Therefore, any yard flaunting a perpetual gaudy bloom will probably collect hummingbirds on their migrations in both spring (late March to mid-May depending on your distance from their wintering habitats in Mexico and the Caribbean) and fall. And if you have the right habitat for nesting, you may have hummingbirds with you the whole season.

While North American hummingbirds feed on quantities of small insects (ants, thrips, and insect larvae) found on, or near flowers, their main diet consists of flower nectar. And while you can coax hummingbirds to your yard with sugarwater feeders and/or dense foliage for nesting, the flowers are probably your best lures.

Many kinds of hummingbird-attract-

ing annual and perennial flowers, available as seeds and young plants, can be purchased at garden centers and through mailorder nurseries. Some suggestions: scarlet salvia (perhaps overall the most available, effective, cultivated hummingbird plant); scarlet or pink petunia; scarlet nicotiana — or flowering tobacco (which has the added attraction of drawing night-and-day flying hummingbird moths as well as hummingbirds); and scarlet morning-glory.

Hummingbirds especially like wildflowers. Buy them only from reputable nurseries or from your local or state plant societies—places that are careful to make native perennial wildflowers available without depleting natural wildflower supplies. In the East, look for: cardinal flower *Lobelia cardinalis* and trumpet creeper *Campsis radicans* or its hybrids. In the western U.S., red flowering currant, Pacific-Northwest columbine *Aquilegia formosa*, scarlet paintbrushes *Castilleja* or scarlet penstemons are highly attractive.

In the eastern U.S., look for the ruby-throated hummingbird, the only hummer commonly found east of the Mississippi. In the Rockies, look for black-chinned, calliope and broad-tailed hummingbirds. The rufous, Allen's and Anna's hummers are predominantly Pacific slope breeders. The hummingbird capital of the U.S. is southeastern Arizona, where 13 kinds of hummingbirds might be seen beating their way from flower to bright flower, all day.
