It's said that on St. Pat's Day there are two kinds of people who celebrate, those of Irish descent and those that wish they were. Well, whether you're Irish or just wish you were, celebrate with the traditional Corned Beef & Cabbage dinner fixed a modern way.

**Slow Cooker Corned Beef Dinner**

- 3 1/2-lb. corned beef brisket
- 2 small onions
- 3 medium carrots
- 1 medium head cabbage
- 3 medium potatoes

Peel and quarter carrots, potatoes and onions. Place in the slow cooker. Place corned beef, fat side up, on vegetables. Add 2 cups water. Cover and cook 8-10 hours on low or until meat is fork tender. Wedge and core cabbage. Add to slow cooker, press down into liquid. Cover and cook on high for 45 minutes or until cabbage is crisp tender. Or steam cabbage wedges on top of the stove and serve with beef and vegetables.

Note: A fresh brisket can be substituted for corned beef if desired.

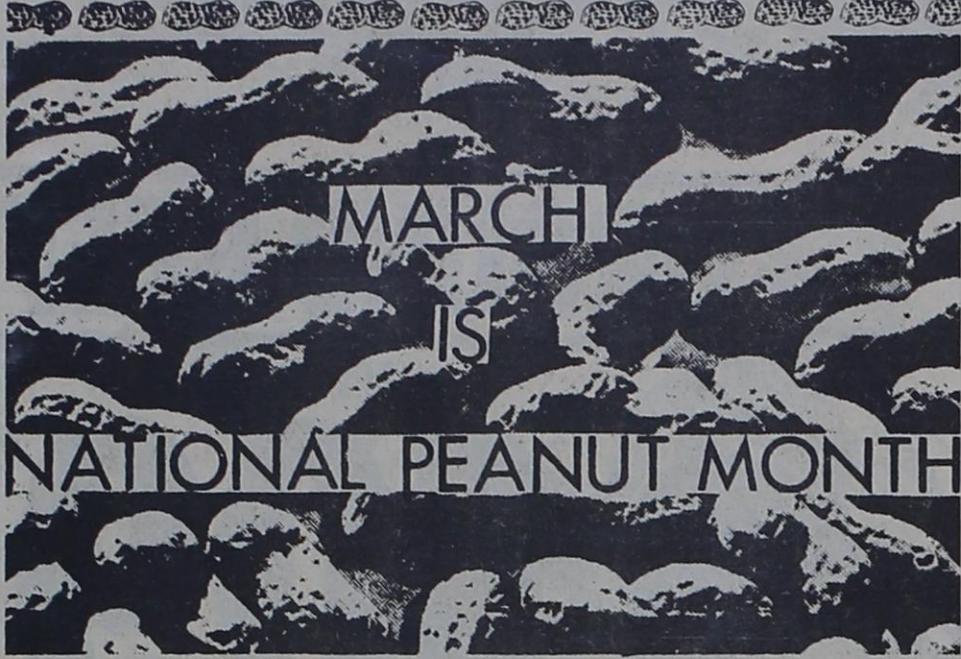



Dear Editor: I feel like it is time the people in this district know some of the facts concerning Blackwell Hospital.

Blackwell Hospital is the second largest employer in Gorman. Over 80% of our employees have lost their jobs. That means a loss of revenue to the economy of Gorman. When people don't have a job they can't spend money.

I believe Blackwell Hospital is worth saving. There is a rumor going around town that Blackwell Hospital will open within 48 hours after it is closed down by HMA. This is not true! The certification from Medicare and the State was issued with exemptions. Once the doors are closed the hospital will have to be recertified. This is unlikely because the building no longer meets the requirements for a hospital, as it was built before present life

safety standards went into effect. Also, everyone must know that recertification in rural areas is almost impossible, because the trend is toward large urban hospitals.

We would not be in this predicament if it weren't for the greed of the doctors. They know that if Blackwell closes no other doctor will move into this community; and therefore, they will have it all to themselves.

Can we honestly say to ourselves that the doctors and the hospital board are serving our best interest. Isn't it time we thought seriously of doing something for our own best interest and the interest of our children and our children's children just as our parents and grandparents have done for us by seeing that we have a hospital in our town?

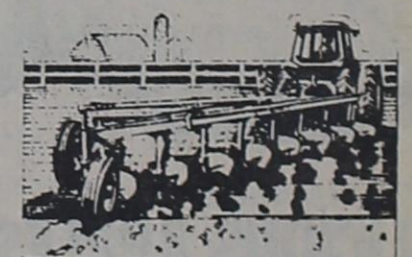

**Helping Lawns Recover-** Lawns will be slow to recover this spring due to the severe cold weather in December and January, says a turfgrass specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. But homeowners can help the recovery process with several practices, including scalping the lawn and recovering clippings, applying a complete fertilizer at the rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet, and applying a pre-emergence herbicide to control weeds.

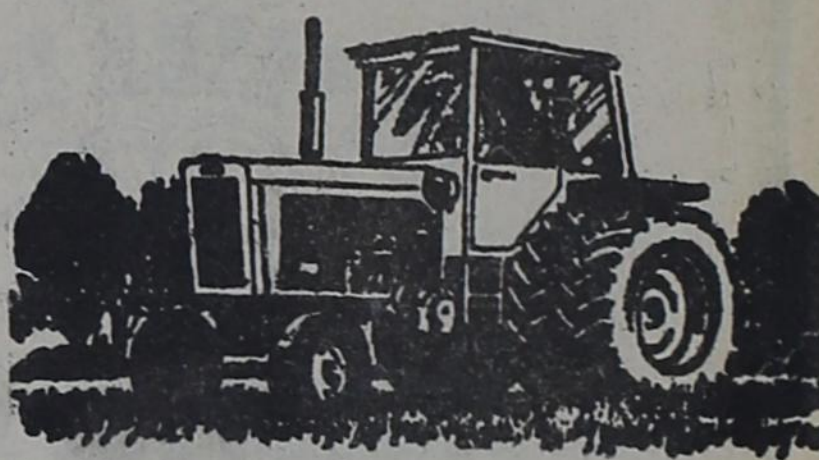

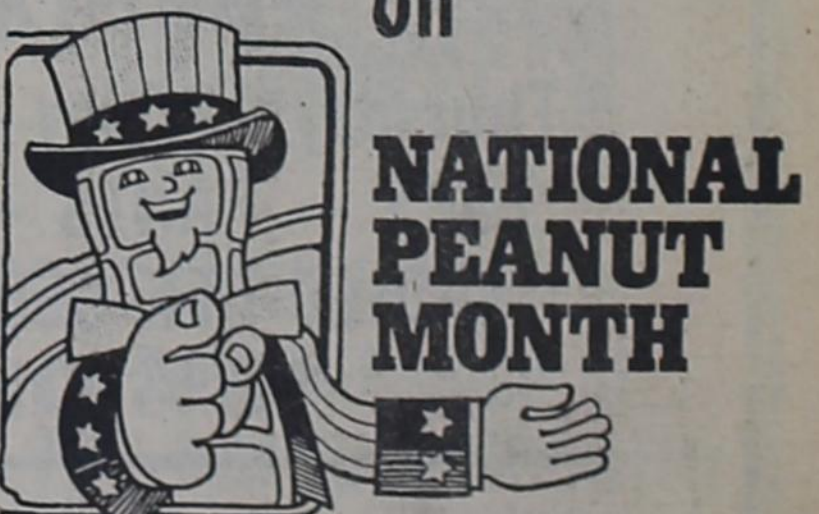

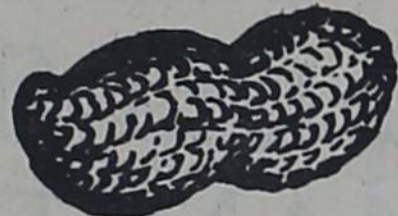

## LAWNS TO RECOVER SLOWLY FROM WINTER

Most lawns will recover slowly this spring due to the unusually harsh winter, says a turfgrass specialist at Texas A&M University.

"St. Augustine lawns appear thin and slow to recover all over the state," points out Dr. Richard L. Doble with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "Floritam St. Augustine, which is more sensitive to low temperature injury, was particularly hard hit."

Lawns that were in poor condition last fall were severely damaged by low temperatures in December and January, notes the specialist.

"Lawns affected by brownpatch, St. Augustine Decline, chinch bugs and white grubs last year were in a weakened condition before low temperatures produced further injury. Heavily thatched lawns also suffered extensive winter injury since the turf was more exposed to temperature extremes," explains Doble.

What can homeowners do to promote lawn recovery and prevent similar problems next year?

Doble suggests "scalping" the lawn in early spring with a mower to remove debris, applying a complete fertilizer to promote recovery, and controlling broadleaved weeds to reduce competition. "If these tasks are followed

with regular maintenance, lawns should green-up rapidly," he says. Scalping involves mowing the lawn with the lawnmower blade set 1/2 to 1-inch lower than normal and then removing the clippings.

Next, apply a complete fertilizer such as 8-8-8 or 12-12-12 at the rate of 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This means 12 pounds of a fertilizer such as 8-8-8, which has 8 percent nitrogen (the first figure in the formula).

The specialist cautions against early application of preemergence herbicides for weed control on lawns since they may further slow grass recovery. "Weeds will be a problem this spring, but regular mowing and fertilization will keep weeds under control and give the grass a better chance to recover," says Doble.

## TEXAS FARM BUREAU NEWS

The president of the 300,000-member Texas Farm Bureau charged Friday, March 9, that a judge's order extending workers' compensation benefits to farm and ranch hands "stretched the court's authority to the breaking point."

"Courts are to interpret laws, not to create them," said S.M. True Jr. of Plainview.

State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin Wednesday ruled that the exemption of farm and ranch laborers from workers' compensation is unconstitutional. The order takes effect March 17.

Judge Clark's ruling giving farmers and ranchers

Range Workshop to be held June 17-22 at the Texas Tech University Center near Junction.

Applications are now being accepted for the 32 openings for youth interested in practical range and ranch management, says Dr. Bob J. Ragsdale, range specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

The week-long workshop, sponsored by the Texas Section of the Society for Range Management, is designed to recognize outstanding youth, develop leadership skills and provide advanced training in range management, Ragsdale says.

It will include plant, wildlife and livestock studies; field trips to ranches and experimental areas; plant collecting and range judging; and leadership training. Recreation and sports are also planned for the delegates.

However, Ragsdale says, this is not a recreational experience. "The workshop had been called a camp prior to 1982, but the name was changed because it did not truly indicate the work and study character of the week."

Ragsdale also emphasizes that the workshop is coeducational, and he encourages girls who are interested to apply.

Only one 4-H and one FFA delegate per county is eligible to attend, and the applications are considered on a first-come basis. Enrollment will close April 30 or when the quotas fill. Ragsdale adds that the 4-H quota usually fills quite early.

only ten days to obtain workers' compensation insurance is "unreasonable," True said.

"Working with out county organizations, we are doing everything we can reasonably do to inform farmers and ranchers with one or more employees that they have until midnight, March 16, to purchase workers' comp insurance or face very serious liability without common law defenses in the event of a suit by an injured employee," the TFB president said.

"This certainly is not a case of ethnic or racial discrimination," True said. "Government surveys show that only about one-fourth of farmworkers are of Hispanic origin. The argument used by the plaintiffs that the law is racially biased is absurd."

True said the Texas attorney general's office has

indicated it will appeal the judge's ruling.

"We do not believe the ruling will stand up under the scrutiny of higher courts," the farm leader said.

The TFB president further questioned Judge Clark's ruling that he will retain jurisdiction over all similar cases in the future.

"Such is not the role of a state district court," farm leader said.

True said information being sent by TFB to county Farm Bureaus warns that any farm or ranch employee injured after the March 17 effective date of the ruling could claim his right to sue his employer if the employer does not carry workers' compensation insurance.

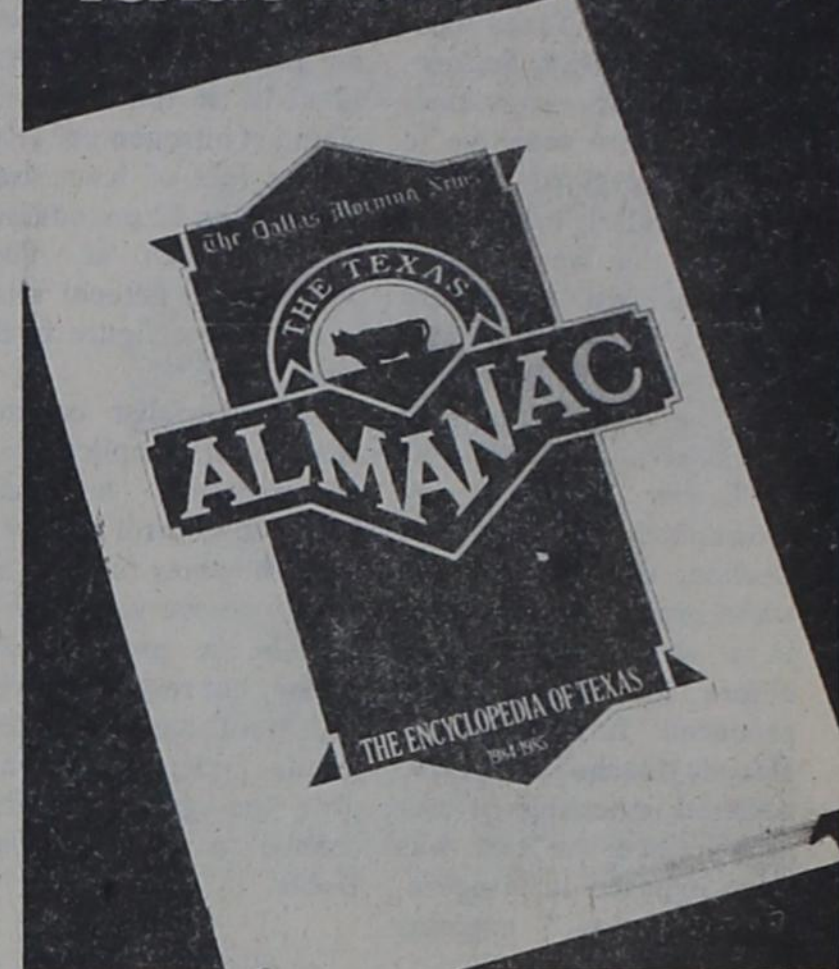
Also being pointed out, he said, is that any state-approved employer liability policy covering farm work-

ers states that it will not pay claims of injured farm workers if they come under the workers' compensation law.

True said that attorneys reviewing the ruling have

suggested that, pending the final determination of this case, "it is felt that the only safe course of action is for employers to buy workers' compensation coverage immediately."

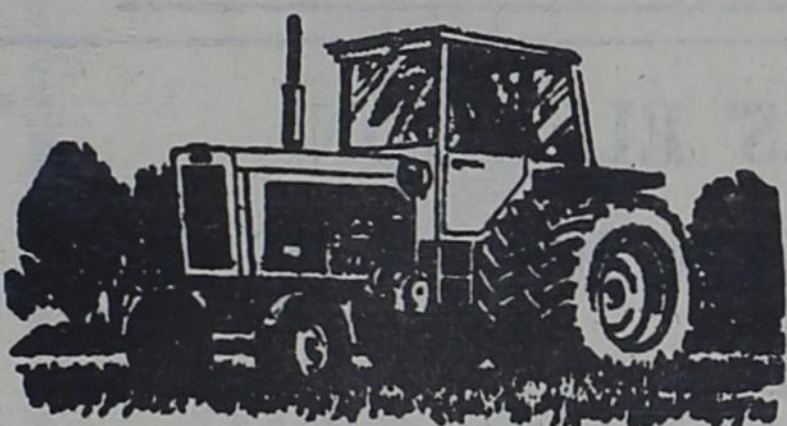

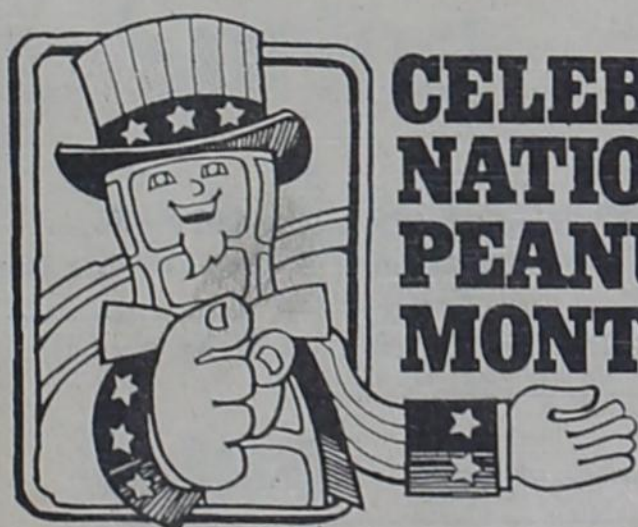

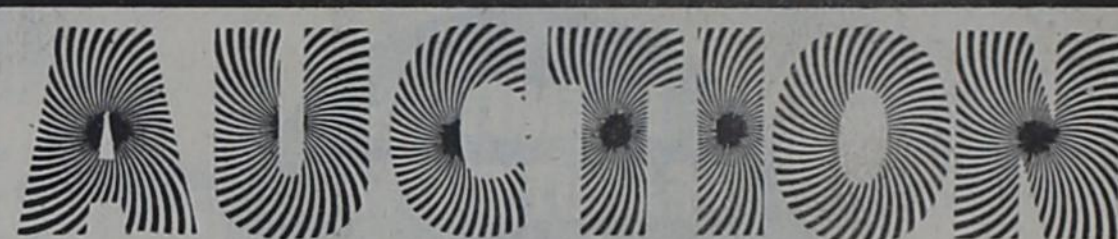

Computer  
Workshop Set**

A workshop dealing with

the use of microcomputers in the home and on the farm and ranch will be held April 3-4 at the Texas 4-H Center at Brownwood.

Conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of the Texas A&M

University System, the workshop will focus on the basics of computer terminology and computer selection. In addition, an advanced session will be conducted to give those with some prior computer experience an insight into operating systems and basic programming procedures, announces Dr. Ashley Lovell of Stephenville, Extension Service economist.

"The program is designed to help participants identify personal needs for computers, to learn basic microcomputer terminology, and to develop a set of criteria for selecting a computer," says Lovell.

Open discussions will focus on family resource management and farm and ranch management and will set the stage for subsequent talks on computer hardware and software.

Special workshops will deal with preparations for computerized accounting systems, crop decision aids, electronic spreadsheets, marketing decision aids, data base management systems, livestock and dairying decision aids, and selection of a farm or ranch accounting system.

**House Passes Bill To  
Strengthen Rural Electric Co-op**

The House of Representatives has passed a bill to make the nation's rural electrification program financially secure into the next century.

The bill strengthens the Rural Electrification Administration's Revolving Fund, which lends money to electric and telephone cooperatives. Without this legislation, the Fund would eventually have run out of money.

"The House has put the REA on a sound footing for the future," said Congressman Charles W. Stenholm (D-Stamford), one of the bill's primary sponsors. "It was a reasonable and responsible way to deal with a growing problem."

The REA has been lending money to cooperatives at 5 percent since 1973 because of a Congressionally-imposed interest rate ceiling. But REA has had to raise that money in capital markets where it sometimes had to pay 14 or 15 percent.

"The sky-high interest rates of the 1970s just weren't foreseen when the 5 percent cap was put into law," Stenholm said. "But they happened, and that meant the Revolving Fund was in trouble."

The bill passed by the

House sets up a new interest rate formula for REA loans. Stenholm amended the formula in the Agriculture Committee to make sure that the Revolving Fund's income would balance its expenses.

The National Rural Electric Cooperative Association strongly supported both Stenholm's amendment and the bill itself.

The bill also allows the Revolving Fund to convert to equity capital certain assets which represent loans made before 1973. Now that the House has passed the legislation, Senate action is expected soon. "Our best judgment is that this bill will work," Stenholm said. "If it doesn't, then Congress will have to look at other ways of strengthening REA without expensive government appropriations."

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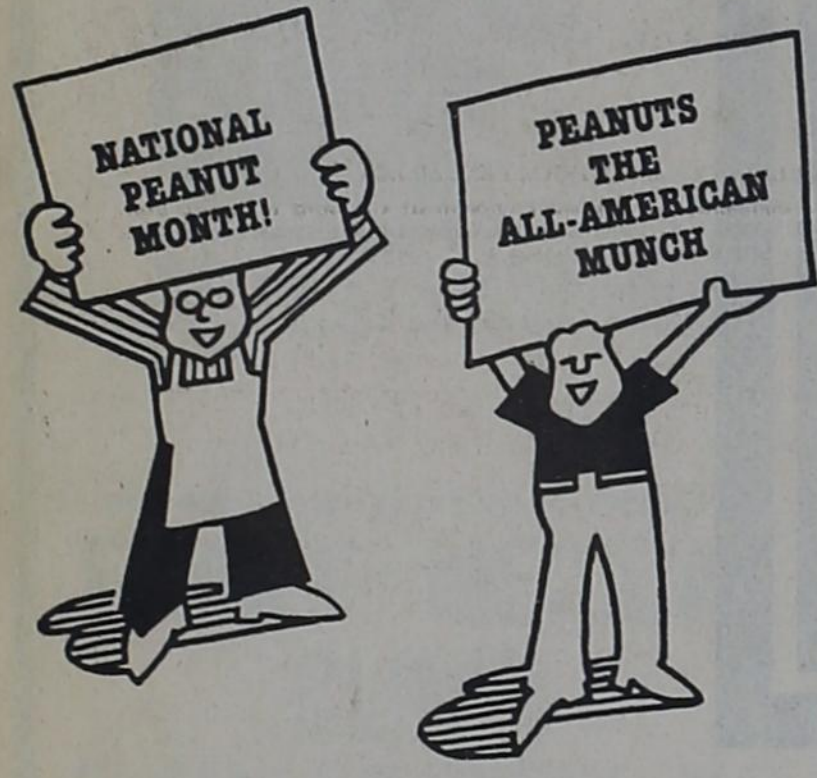

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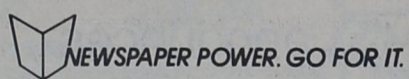

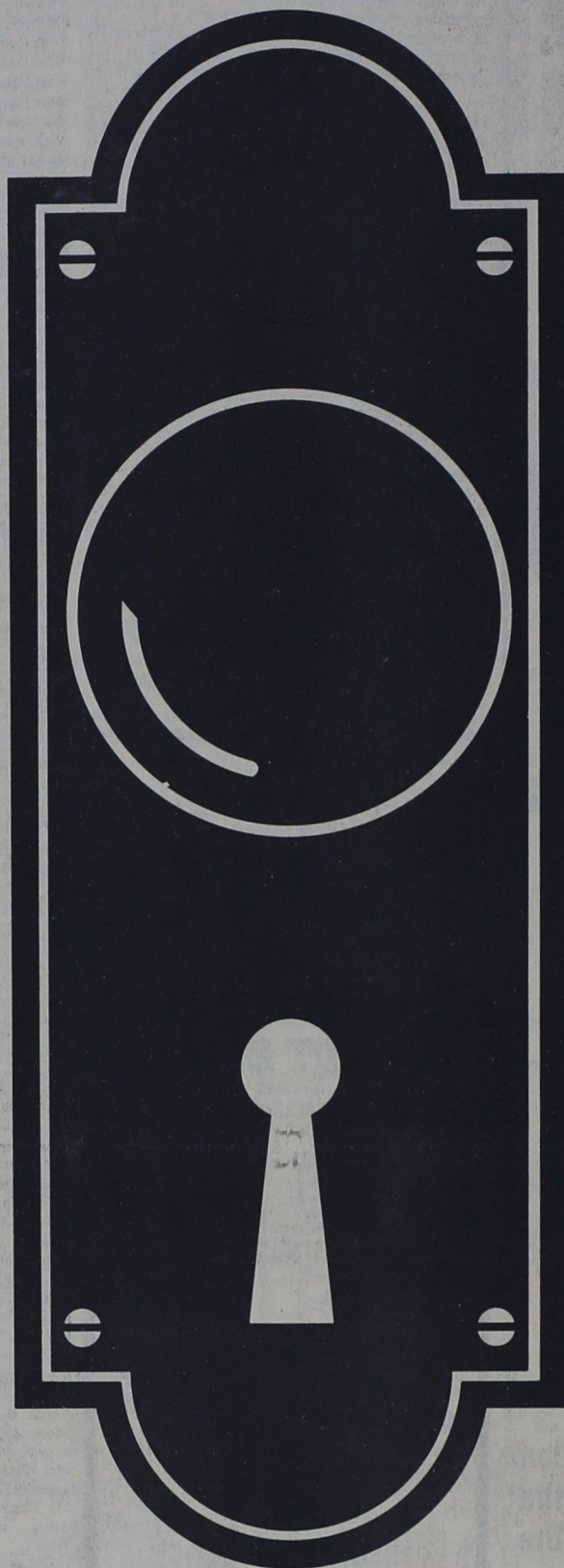

**HOMEMAKING HINTS**

When we think of grief, we often think only of death, but other losses bring on almost identical reactions. People going through a divorce experience grief; so do people who have lost their health. Grief is also common to the aging person. A man in his middle 60s facing mandatory retirement may show grief reactions. Parents may experience grief as their children grow up and leave home.

Ten stages of grief are commonly seen by doctors.

ministers, and others who deal with the problem. Everyone goes through some or all of these stages whenever he loses something or someone very important. In other words, what we are really talking about is "good" grief, a normal process of grieving--not abnormal grief. This healthy kind of grief can help a person move through an important loss with minimum harm to self, either physical or mental.

1. **The first stage of grief is shock.** We become temporarily anesthetized against the reality of the event. This state of shock can be helpful because the reason does not have to comprehend the magnitude of the loss all at once.

2. **The second stage of grief is emotional release.** This occurs when the dreadful loss is realized. People sometimes need to be encouraged to give vent to their feelings and to recognize the emotional release is normal and appropriate. We have been taught to admire people who "cope, are brave, get back to normal."

3. **The third stage is one of utter depression, loneliness, and a sense of isolation.** We experience the depths of despair, believe there is no hope for the future. AS helpers, we should show our concern and intervene, and not wait to be asked.

4. **The fourth stage of grief brings physical symptoms of distress.** One study shows that 80 percent of people seeking medical treatment have suffered a loss during the preceding six months. Most people have problems sleeping and are unable to eat. It is not unusual for survivors to experience symptoms similar to the symptoms suffered by their dead loved one. Seeking out competent and compassionate medical help and gaining an understanding of the grieving process are often both necessary and helpful.

5. **The fifth stage of grief begins when people become panicky.** Panic sets in when we are unable to concentrate on anything except our loss. Distressing dreams and hallucinations cause us to fear that we may be losing our minds. It is helpful to know that these responses are normal, natural, to be expected, and are actually anticipated in other cultures.

6. **At the sixth stage the person begins to feel guilty about everything related to the loss.** Guilt and regrets are normal responses and need to be expressed and worked through. We have found it helpful to draw up balance sheet where an expressed regret must be balanced by an acknowledgement of something that was done that pleases or relieves the grieving individual.

7. **Grief's seventh stage is one of hostility.** This is a sign that the depression is lifting. Anger is a powerful emotion and, if expressed, it can be energizing. Helpers need to have this awareness, so they do not take it personally.

8. **At stage eight the person seems unable to return to usual activities.** Although grieving is painful, at this time it feels more familiar and comfortable to the individual who has to contemplate facing the world again, alone. We need to be encouraging and help people chart their progress.

9. **In stage nine, we gradually begin to gain a glimpse of hope.** Little by Little, emotional balance returns with proper support and encouragement. It is impossible to predict when this will occur because there are so many individual differences.

10. **Acceptance: the last stage; we adjust our lives to reality.** We do not become our "old selves" again. We are never our old selves after we have had a great grief experience. We are different from what we were before. It is possible to live, laugh, and love again.

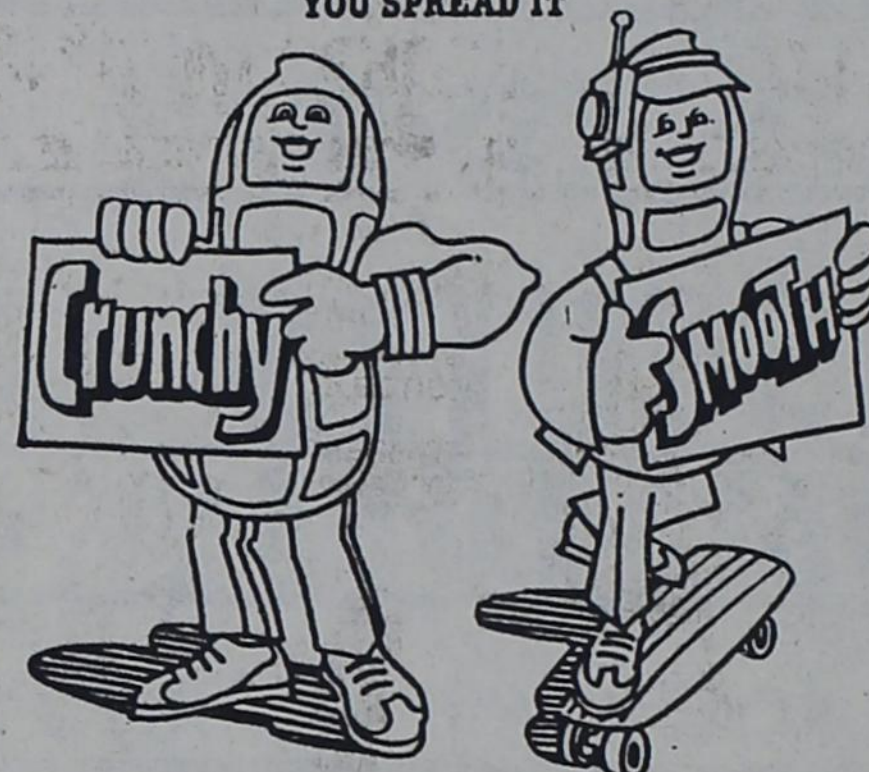

The grades are Anatomy Physics B; Rhetoric and Compositions B, Racquetball (Gym) A; General Physiology B; Introduction to

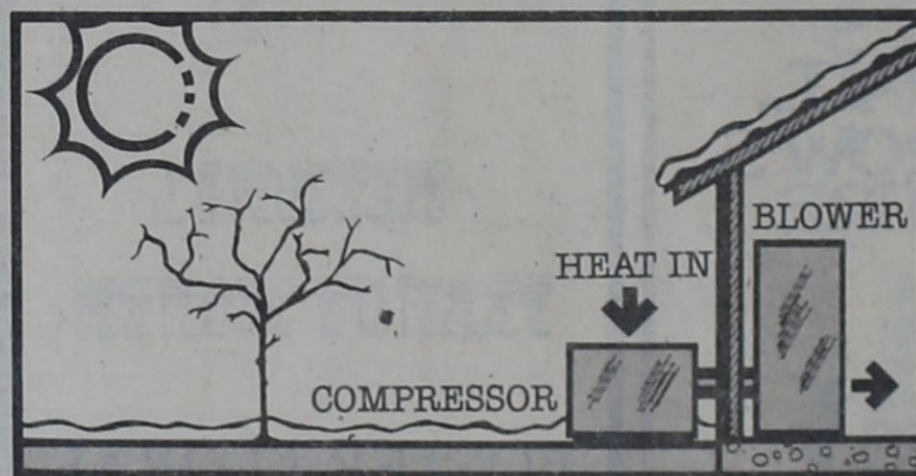
