

RABIES VACCINATIONS AT GORMAN MILLING SET SATURDAY

Larry Damron, D.V.M. from Stephenville will be at Gorman Milling Company, Saturday, March 26 from 1-3 P.M. Rabies vaccinations for small animals (dogs and cats) will be available for \$5.00 per animal. Distemper shots will also be available.

Dogs are the principal spreaders of rabies or hydrophobia. Outbreaks occur among skunks, coyotes, foxes, and other animals that attack livestock and fowls. All warm blooded animals are susceptible.

The infection is caused by a filtrable virus that attacks the nervous system. It is transmitted in the saliva of a diseased animal that bites its victims. Upon entering the bloodstream, the virus infects, the nerves, the bloodfects, the nerves, follows their course to the spinal cord, and finally involves the brain. From 15 to 45 percent of the bites of rabid animals result in death to the victim.

Please have your dogs and cats vaccinated and help prevent this desease in our community.

In continuation of last week's article, I would point out that a mandatory jail sentence for DWI would, without a doubt, have serious impact on our crowded county jail problems. The only question unanswered, is to what extent. Estimates from those who supposedly know, both on the prosecutor and defense sides of the docket, range to a low of 40% to a high of 150% increase in the average daily jail population. The calculation to be derived, most meaningful to the taxpayer, is the vastly increased cost of incarceration; the fact many jails, even new jails, could not meet the requirements of the Jail Standards Commission; and,

the fact that the increased jail inmate population would necessarily have a further impact on the Texas prison system, addressed in earlier

It is extremely easy to say to me as your State representative, "Jim, let's get drunks off highways and into jail." However, in telling me this, you must also tell me whether you are willing to shoulder increased expenditures and resulting tax increases necessitated by more stringent enforcement procedures.

In a recent survey done by the Criminal Justice Center at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas, 45% of the people surveyed admitted that they, them-








GLASGOW FILES BILL OUTLAWING PRESCRIBING OF **QUAALUDES**

Senator Bob Glasgow has filed Senate Bill 715 which would prohibit the prescribing of methaqualone, more popularly known as "quaa-

'This is one of the most abused drugs in Texas, and our young people are endan-gering both their own lives and the lives of others when they use it," stated the Senator in a prepared state-

The statement continued by noting that there are several other therapeutic products available for the same medical purposes which have substantially less potential for abuse. The Senator stated that these can easily be substituted to patients needing such medica-

Three states, Georgia, Florida and New Jersey have already banned the prescription of methaqualone.

One of the largest drug store chains in this State, Eckerds, has already discontinued carrying methaqualone. Reasons given were its potential for abuse while substitute drugs were readily available and the hope that such discontinuance would discourage robberies and burglaries of their stores.







There's nothing quite so attractive as a well-laid brick walkway. Building it yourself is not as complicated as it may seem. A few simple tips can help assure a goodlooking job with relative

The "dry-mortar" method described by Mechanix Illustrated magazine is the best way to proceed. Here's what to do.

First determine the width and length of the walkway.

Divide these dimensions by the dimensions of the bricks you plan to use to determine how many bricks to buy. Making a sketch of the project is helpful.

Next, using a mason's line and stakes, lay out the walkway. Check width measurements as you go to make sure the lines don't wander. Then dig out all sod to a depth a few inches below the brick depth both within the lines and a few

inches beyond either side to allow for framing. Lay down the framing, again checking dimensions. Pressure-treated 2x6's should be used with one side set 1/8 inch higher per foot of width than the other to allow for drainage.


Fill the framed walkway form with quarry dust or crushed stone to the depth of the brick to provide good drainage. Level this base with a 1x6 notched to equal the thickness of the brick. Sprinkle the base with water to firm it up; re-level, if necessary. Now you're ready to lay the bricks.

The final step is to sweep fine sand into the joints. (This is where the term "dry mortar" comes from.) The



Start now rounding up your trash and as soon as we set the date, the City will furnish a way to haul your brush and large items to the landfill. More information will be given on this

The next item is about the landfill. As you know, we do not keep the landfill locked and you may haul trash there anytime. We are having a few problems out there. Many times you are just pouring your trash out anywhere you wish rather than putting it in the pit.

When this happens, the trash blows all over the landfill and makes it look terrible. In addition to this,


