need a cure. All of this, obviously with hundreds of volunteers across Texas and the nation, we can make a strong impact on the struggle to control cystic fibrosis."

The North-East Texas Chapter is one of 72 Cystic Fibrosis Foundation Chapters in the U.S. The Foundation supports a nationwide network of 127 Treatment Centers, with 4 of these centers located in Dallas, Fort Worth, San Antonio and Houston. The Centers specialize in diagnosis and medical care for patients as well

as services for CF families. When the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was established in 1955, few CF victims lived long enough to enter elementary school. Because of sophisticated treatment developed through research, nearly helf of the CF patients born today will live past the age of 21.

BLOOD DRIVE NEEDED IN GORMAN AREA

In 1980 United Blood Services of San Angelo began "servicing" Blackwell Memorial Hospital. In essence this means maintaining an adequate supply of blood and blood components for the routine and emergency use of patients in Blackwell Memorial.

It is typical in the other 34

communities that support hospitals serviced by United Blood Services for the citizens to sponsor annual, biannual, or quarterly blood drives to help supply their own blood needs. Up to the present time Gorman has never had a blood drive. The number of pints kept on consigment at Blackwell and exchanged every 10 to 14 days combined with the number of pints actually used brings Gormans blood usage to 222 pints in 1981 and 243 pints in 1982.

This blood is being furnished by your neighboring communities and San Angelo. Gorman is the only community in United Blood Services of San Angelo 27,000 square mile service arca that does not support a Volunteer Blood Donor Program.

Blackwell Memorial Hospital wants to help remedy this situation and has taken a giant step in that direction by sponsoring a Blood Drive in the Hospital March 15th, from 1:00 pm until 6:00 pm. They need your support!

If you are 17 to 70 years old and in good health please get the Volunteer Blood Porgram in Gorman on its feet by donating a pint of your blood March 15th. Any questions may be answered by contacting The Blackwell Memorial Lab or United Blood Services of San Angelo at 915-653-1307.



CROP INSURANCE **DEADLINE APRIL 15**

Apirl 15th is the last day to apply for insurance coverage for grain sorghum, corn, peanuts, and cotton grown in Eastland County, Texas, according to Ardell M. Kalmbach, District Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

"Several new features for 1983 ar eavailable to producers who insure with Federal Crop Insurance," Kalmbach says.

A new Individual Yield Coverage (IYC) plan is available for producers of corn, cotton, dry beans, flax, grain sorghum, rice, sunflowers, and soybeans. This plan allows porducers to establish a production guarantee based on their individual farm yield data.

Producers who feed a portion of their individual farm yield data.

Producers who feed a portion of their crops to livestock and poultry may be eligible for an individual Certified Yield (ICY) plan offered on corn, barley, grain sorghum, and oats. "Having last year's production records qualifies producers for this plan," Kalmbach says.

Farmers participating in the Payment-in-Kind (PIK) program should consider the FCIC increased insurance guarantees of up to 10 percent which are available to them for their 1983 springplanted corn, grain sorghum, rice, and cotton. "Percent increases in the FCIC guarantee are based on the amount of acreage reductions above the regular farm program set aside," Kalmbach states. To obtain full details, producers are encouraged to contact an agent aughorized to sell and service FCIC crop insurance



I wish I could ignore the problem and it would go away but it won't. So this week I will attempt to address the D.W.I. issue.

The pieces of legislation with D.W.I. almost outnumber the sum total of legislators, but can be grouped, generally, under one major heading, that being more stringent application of punitive measures taken against persons convicted under the Act. Perhaps it would be helpful to commence with a little legislative history of the

The 1979 Session passed legislation whereby a person first convicted of drunk driving would mandatorially, forfeit his driver's license and be subjected, additionally, to fines, probation, etc. The effect of the legislation was apparently perceived by the judges across our state as being too harsh, in as much as it inordinately deprived the family breadwinner of means of transportation to and from work. The judges were, of course, not blameless but one can understand how it would be much easier in theory to do serious economic damage to a statistic than to an individual from the judge's community and with Mr. and Mrs. George Hollifield.

The second problem occurs when we find it is not at all unusual to have a defendent on deferred adjudication in two, three or more counties at the same time, since county probation departments quite often have little or no communication with other probation depart-

If history is, in fact, out best teacher, then we should probably, before hasty action, inquire as to the possibility and effect of a backlash to the porposed legislation, like we saw to the 1979 legislation. Almost all of the legislation proposed would mandate a jail term for

conviction of the offense of D.W.I. I worry whether or not the authoirties would, to avoid sending a "good ole boy with a little drinkin' problem" to jail, simply reduce the charge to public intoxication or some such, and further aggravate the problem. It simply has not been historically shown that more stringent legislation, over the long term, leads to lessening of the problem, in fact, quite the contrary has often proven true. Those are facts, like them or not.


At issue is another consideration near and dear to the social conscience of those often labeled "liberal", that being that alcoholism is now, even in rural Texas, pretty

well recognized as a medical problem rather than one of morality. The argument most often advanced by this faction is that society would be appalled at the incarceration of an epileptic, and is there any real difference? Supposedly, both problems are beyond the sufferer's control.

The very nature of this subject precludes my being able to use any more space in the publication to address the D.W.I. issue this week. With your endurance, I will continue my comments on D.W.I., the "open container" legislation and raising the minimum drinking age in following weeks.

REPORT FROM THE HOUSE

By Jim Parker

In what may or may not be a departure from an issue presentation, this week I would like to discuss a proposed tax reform. Representative Bob Barton is preparing for filing a most interesting item of legislation that would effectively eliminate residential property, both rural and urban, from ad valorem tax consequence, in so far as such taxes have and are being used to support the public schools. The proposed legislation would exempt any property used as principle residence from school ad valorem taxation and, to make lost revenue, would substitute an additional statewide one-cent (1c) sales

Since, with the ever-narrowing tax base, more and more of the burden of supporting public schools has fallen to the home-owner, the proposal has some very attractive aspects.

Proponents say a one-cent (1c) additional tax would generate approximately one billion dollars which would more than compensate for lost ad valorem revenue; that the State of Texas could more equitably distribute the funds, eliminating some of the disparities between "rich" and "poor" school districts; that a sales tax, exempting food and necessities, is not regressive, as is commonly thought, but is on the other hand, progressive; that the sales tax method of financing would more equitably spread the burden of supporting the schools to all citizens of the state of Texas: and that the average Texas taxpayer's property tax would be cut in half.

Opponents feel that the ad valorem tax base tends to keep school control on the local level: that the sales tax is a regressive tax penalizing those most who are least financially able; that people in 42 states pay more sales tax than in Texas and, perhaps most important, that we should not preempt this statewide tax avenue, for what many perceive to be a localized problem, at a time when the state of Texas may, because of budget necessity, desperately need statewide tax generating possibilities for general state revenue.

I can readily agree, and do see, that the homeowner is one of an increasingly smaller group of people who must bear the ad valorem burden. With over 65 exemptions, open space exemptions, various agricultural exemptions and other statutory ad valorem tax exemptions, the entire ad valorem tax system may be headed down a "self-destruct" path. My greatest concern and most serious question is, assuming we all recognize that the ad valorem tax system is basically an inequitable system that must eventually go the way of the dinosaur, do we eliminate it, eventually, in one swell swoop, or do we eliminate it a piece at a time as past legislatures have

LIGHTNING SAFETY RULES

The Governor of Texas has

tentatively designated the week of March 6-12, 1983 as Texas Severe Weather

Awareness Week, and the Gorman Police Dept., in cooperation with the National Weather Service, will be presenting tips on weather safety. The first tip deals with actions to be taken or avoided during a thunderstorm in order to avoid injury from lightning. When a thunderstorm threatens get inside a home or large building, or inside an all-metal vehicle (not a convertible). Inside a home, avoid using the telephone except for emergen-

> reach a safe building or automobile, follow these rules: 1) Do not stand underneath a

If outside, with no time to

natural lightning rod such as a tall isolated tree in an open area. 2) Avoid projecting above the surrounding landscape, as you would do if you were standing on a hilltop, in an open field, on the beach, or fishing from a small boat. 3) Get out of and away from open water. 4) Get away from tractors and other metal farm equipment. 5) Get off of and away from motorcycles, scooters, golf carts, and bicycles. 6) Put down golf clubs, rakes, hoes, or other metal objects. 7) Stay away from wire fences, clotheslines, metal poles, rails and other metallic paths which could carry lightning to you from some distance away. 8) Avoid standing in small isolated sheds or other small structures in open areas. 9) In a wooden area, seek shelter in a low area under a thick growth of small trees. In open areas, go to a low place such as a ravine or valley. Be alert for flash floods. 10) If you are hopelessly isolated in a level field or pasture and you feel your hair stand on end---indicating lightning is about to strike...drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

It's time to spray fruit trees if you want fruit free of worms this year. Peach, plum and apricot trees should be sprayed at pink bud stage and again when 75% of the petals have fallen.

The spray should contain an insecticide to control insects and a fungicide to control diseases. The suggested insecticides are Topsin M, Malathion, Sevin, & Zolone. The recommended fungicides include Captan, wettable sulfur and Benomyl. Follow the directions on the amount of chemicals to add per gallon of water. Some fruit tree sprays have a mixture of insecticide and fungicide.

Repeat this spray 10 to 14 ays after petal fall and again 10 to 14 days after the second spray. It may be necessary to apply as many as 5 applications at 10 to 14 day intervals except on early maturing varieties. Do no apply insecticides within three days of harvesting plums or within seven days of harvesting peaches.

We have Home-owners fruit and nut spray schedules in the Extension office to give you more information on fruit tree spraying.

. At this time of the year, lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the growing season, which is just around the corner.

Scalping a lawn in late winter serves to revitalize it

summer plant growth. Begin this operation by lowing the blade of your lawnmower one-half inch below the normal setting. Then, mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other and remove the clippings after each mowing.

To keep crabgrass, grassburs and other unsightly weeds from appearing, apply a pre-emergence herbicide (weed killer) in early part of March. The preemergence herbicides will only control annual grass and weeds - those that come up from seeds each year. Dacthal (DCPA) and Balan (Benefin) are examples of commonly used preemergence herbicides. When applied properly, these chemicals form a barrier in the soil that will prevent the germination of any seed. This barreir must be in place before the weed seed begins to germinate in order to get

The chemical barrier formed by the herbicide usually lasts from 60 to 120 days, depending on the soil and environmental conditions. Since some weeds may continue to germinate through spring and early summer, it may be necessary to make a second application in early summer to get season-long control.
