## Texas Dairy Queens To Sponsor Country Music Festival

DALLAS — The Texas Dairy Queen Operators' Council, as part of International Dairy Queen, will help sponsor the third annual Country Music Festival, a benefit for the National Kidney Foundation. The festival will air the weekend of April 23 and 24 on radio stations across the country.

The programing on Saturday will consist of 12, 40 minute, pre-recorded segments, which will be a countdown of country music's favorite 100 songs, as voted by country music fans at Dairy Queens across the country. From 1:06 to 8:30 p.m. on Sunday, Emmylou Harris and Ronnie Milsap will co-host a live show via satellite from Nashville and Los Angeles. The show will feature many of country music's top entertainers.

"Bullett" Manale, president of the Texas Dairy Queen Operators' Council, said, "Across Texas, more Dairy Queens and more country music stations are participating in this third annual festival. Within a few years, I believe the fundraiser will reach every part of Texas, giving people an

opportunity to help cure and treat kidney diseases, and also providing good, country music to those who tune in."

Dairy Queen kicks off its part of the fundraising with a donation of \$50,000. In addition, every participating Dairy Queen will contribute 25 cents to the foundation for each sundae and Royal Treat sold during the festival week-end. Also, Dairy Queens have displays for the Kidney Foundation that include canisters for additional contributions from patrons.

"During the festival, Dairy Queen customers can treat themselves to our tasty ice cream dishes," said Manale, "and we will, in turn, help to treat kidney disease."

The National Kidney Foundation's Country Music Festival is scheduled to air on more than 300 radio stations across America. Of that number, approximately 50 are part of the Texas State Network, which means the show will reach listeners from Dalhart to Falfurrias and from Sulphur Springs to Fort Stockton.

## Legal Notice

The Eastland County Appraisal District wishes to remind property owners that Monday, May 2, 1983, is the deadline for filing property exemption applications and business personal property renditions.

State law requires that all business personal property be rendered each year. Renditions were sent or delivered to county business earlier this year. If you have not yet returned your business rendition; you should do so before the May 2nd deadline.

If you did not receive a rendition or have lost it; you should check with the appraisal district office.

The deadline for filing open space land exemption applications and residential homestead applications is also May 2nd.

The open space or agricultural use exemptions allows the property owner to pay on an Ag-use value rather than the higher market value. If your land was granted an exemption for 1982 and the use of the land is still the same as previously reported, a new application does not need to

be made. Only those whose land may qualify for the first time need to apply.

The residential homestead application needs to be filed by those homeowners who were not signed up in 1982 or who have since changed their place of residence.

Those homeowners who have recently turned 65 years of age should check to see if they are not eligible for an additional exemption for those over-65 granted by many of the taxing jurisdictions.

If you have changed your residence between January 1, 1982 and January 1, 1983; a new application will have to be filed on the new residence in order for the exemption to be granted.

The exemptions and renditions must be filed with the Eastland County Appraisal District by May 2, 1983 in order to be accepted for the 1983 year.

If you have a question concerning the filing of your applications or renditions, please contact the Eastland County Appraisal District prior to the May 2, 1983 deadline.

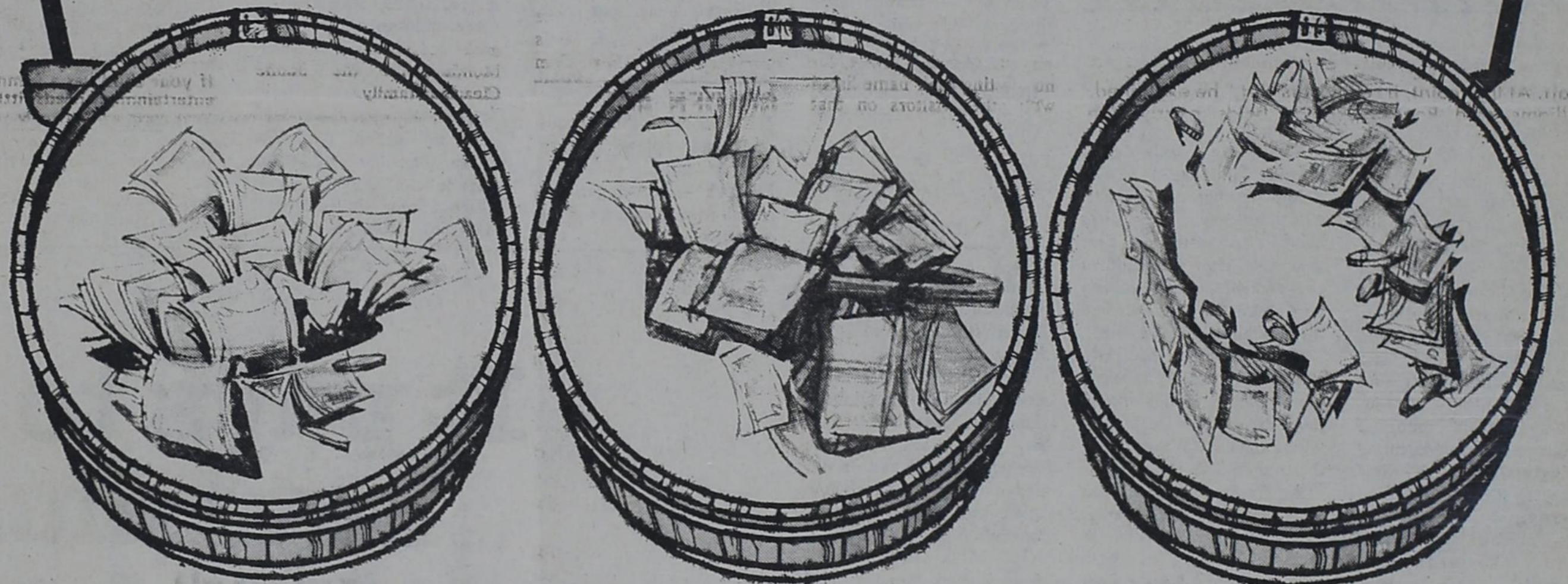

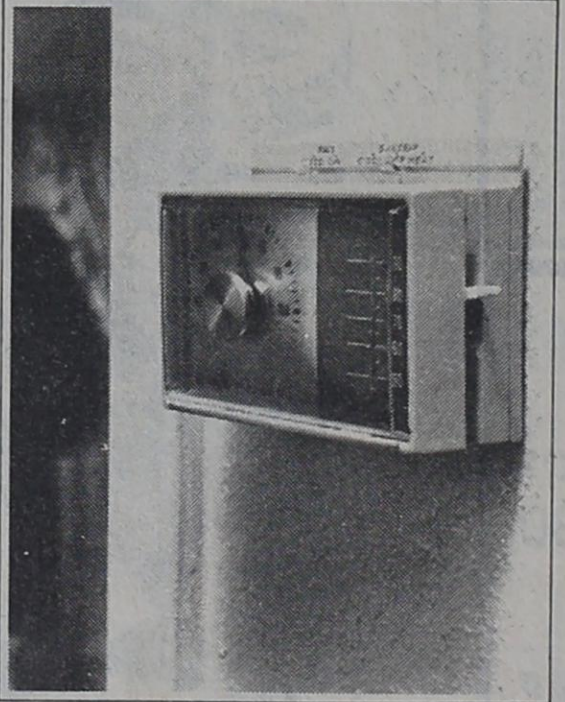
