USDA Requests Comments - 2001 National Peanut Poundage Quota

Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Keith Kelly announced today that FSA is seeking comments on the quota determination for peanuts. Comments must be submitted by December 11, 2000, to the Director, Tobacco and Peanuts Division, FSA, United States Department of Agriculture, STOP 0514, 1400 Independence Avenue, S. W., Washington, DC 20250-0514.

The Secretary of Agriculture must announce the 2001 national poundage quota for peanuts by December 15, 2000. USDA expects the 2001 national poundage quota for peanuts to range between 1,180,000 short tons (st) and 1,204,000 st. The 2000 quota was 1,180,000 st.

The quota formula specified in the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938, as amended by the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act (the 1996 Act), requires that the national poundage quota be established at a level that is equal to the quantity of peanuts (in tons) that the Secretary estimates will be devoted to domestic edible and related uses. Also, the 1996 Act removed seed peanuts from the formula calculation of the national poundage quota.

The potential increase in the national poundage quota reflects anticipated increased use of peanuts and peanut products during the August 2001 through July 2002 marketing year.

The 2001 crop national poundage quota will be allocated to each state, based on the state's share of the 2000-crop quota.

Bands presenting the concert are the 5th and 6th grade band, Jr. High band and the High School band.

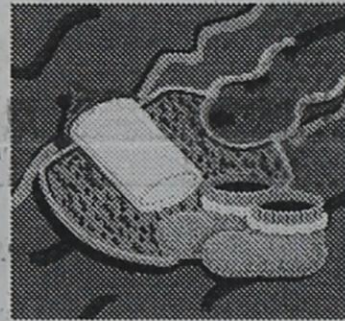
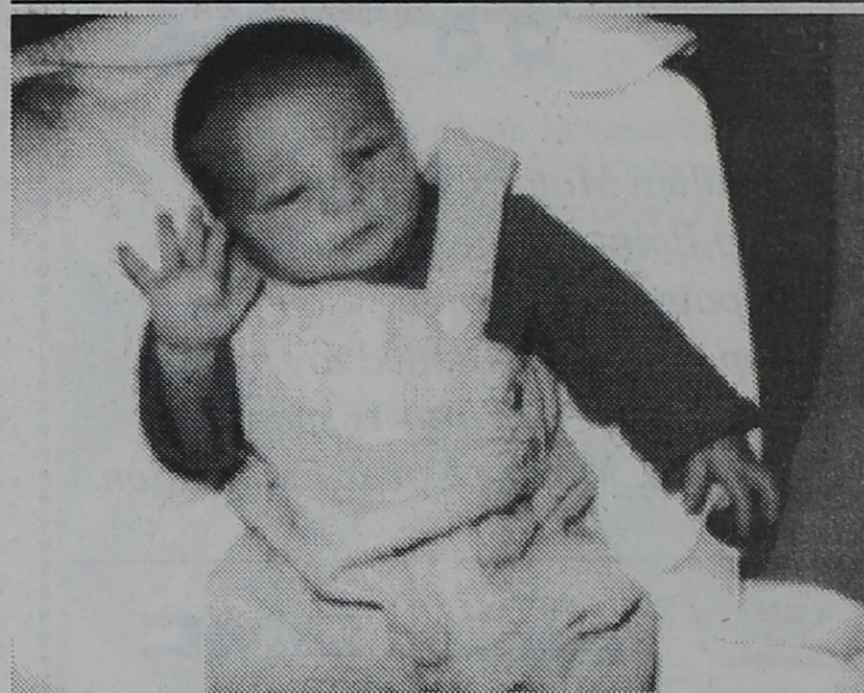

CHIP Representative in Eastland Dec. 14th

A representative of the Children's Helath Insurance Program (CHIP) of Texas will be in Eastland to enroll children in the low cost insurance program on Thursday, December 14th, at the Texas Department of Human Services office.

The representative will be there from 1 to 4 p.m. to assist families in completing the application for insurance.

To enroll for the program, parents should bring with them proof of income. The proof can be at least two paycheck stubs, W2 forms for 1999, or a letter from their employer indicating their monthly pay. Parents with day care expenses should also bring receipts indicating how much and how often they pay for that service.

CHIP is a State of Texas program to provide insurance for children up to their 19th birthday. Income guidelines for the program are very generous. The most the insurance can cost is \$18 per month to cover all the children in the family.

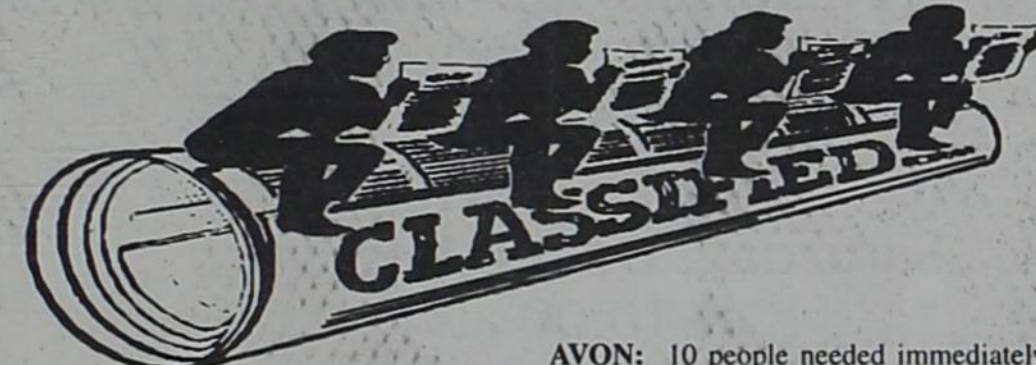



Pause To Think

This week, let us discuss another aspect of the administration of the Holy Ghost in our lives: intercession. The key verses that we will turn to for this discussion is found in Romans 8:26-27. We all know that prayer is the key element that changes things in our lives. In **Romans 8:26-27**, Paul declares that we don't know what we ought to pray. It is important for us to remember that we cannot know our heart. In **Jeremiah 17:9**, Jeremiah declares, "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked: who can know it?" The Preacher wrote in **Proverbs 16:25** and in **Proverbs 14:12**, There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death.

That is why it is so important that we receive the Spirit of Christ into our hearts. Paul went on to say, "And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God." This is the most important part of every prayer time. And it is the most wondrous as well. When one is filled with the Holy Ghost/Holy Spirit and allows the work of intercession prayer to occur, there is no other experience in the entire world like it. Nothing is as rewarding as coming out of a prayer room, prayer closet, or away from an altar knowing that you have touched heaven with your prayer, and knowing that heaven has touched you. It is in this way that the Spirit helps us with our infirmities.

If we allow the Holy Ghost/Holy Spirit of Christ within us to intercede for us, he does so knowing the full intent of our heart, as well as the mind of the Spirit according to the will of God. There is no other way that we could become more perfectly aligned with God's will and purpose for our lives regarding every situation that we face. We will go wrong if we try to understand things in our minds, especially if we are looking to our heart for an answer. Our heart will deceive us every time. If we listen to our heart, we will make the wrong decision every time and/or come to the wrong conclusion about things. The answer to every dilemma can be found if one will allow the Holy Ghost to make intercession for you.
