After three years in the air-force, two years teaching and coaching in Denison, Texas, two years in teaching and coaching in Boling, Texas and another year in the Korean conflict, Graydon and Johnnie Baze decided to move home to rear their family -- they have never been sorry. This was 1953.

Graydon came back to become the high school principal. He coached one year, then became superintendent of Gorman Schools for three years.

When Mrs. Donna Moor-

man retired, he took the job as acting Postmaster in 1959. He was appointed Postmaster in 1961 by President John F. Kennedy.

Graydon has been very active in church and civic affairs. He is a deacon in the Baptist Church and has also taught Sunday-school for many years. He has been president of the Chamber of Commerce and a director for several years. He has also served on the school board and the volunteer department. He is presently president of the Industrial Foundation, member of the hospital board and swimming pool committee.

A replacement for Graydon has not been named.

SWPGA ANNUAL MEETING JULY 29

Bill Boswell, De Leon, Texas, President, Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association has reminded all peanut growers to attend the Association Annual Meeting to be held in Stephenville on Friday, July 29. The meeting will begin at 10:00 A.M. and will be held at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center on Highway 281 at the north city limit.

Highlight of the meeting will be the presentation of Dallas Smith, Deputy Director of the Tobacco and Peanuts Division, USDA, Washington, D.C. Smith is widely recognized in the peanut industry as the moldier and coordinator of the many administrative phases of the peanut program. Smith will comment on the peanut price support program and will respond to questions in a discussion period.

A special report on the Washington scene will be made by Sam White consultant representing peanut grower interests in Washington.

SWPGA officials will make brief reports to the members on the 1982-83 operation.

SWPGA officials said peanut grower leaders are expected to be present from most major peanut production areas of Texas and Oklahoma.

The meeting will conclude with a barbecue lunch to be served at the Research and Extension Center and hosted by SWPGA and the Stephenville Production Credit Association.

Phase 1 of Renovation Project Underway At Carbon High School

CARBON — The Carbon Independent School District met in their regular scheduled meeting Monday July 11 and took action on several items.

The board met with and heard an update from Brasher, Goyette and Rapier Architects of Dallas, concerning Phase 1 of the renovation project at the school.

Ken Norris, CISD Superintendent, reported that a contract had been awarded to Ed Chambers Business Development Co. of Plano for the Phase 1 improvements which includes waterproofing the outside of the main building and replacing the doors and windows. The bid for phase 1 of the project was \$113,038.00.

The board also amended the budget in the area of Capital Outlay to include renovation costs and architects fees.

A report was heard on the need for the purchase of new chairs and desks along with the need to go to a seven period day, but no action was taken.

*Heard an update on the Annual Five Year Evaluation Report.

*Approved money for the renovation of the agriculture classroom floor.

*Approved the minutes of the last meeting.

Comptroller's Office Furnishes School Statistics

The State Comptroller's Office has compiled statistics regarding teachers' salaries and attendance figures on schools throughout the state.

The information lists for each district the following: superintendent's salary, elementary teachers salary (average), secondary teachers salary (average), average daily attendance, and ratio of administrators to teachers.

The statewide averages are as follows: superintendent \$41,176, elementary teachers \$19,452, secondary teachers \$20,140, average daily attendance 2,673,746, and ratio of administrators to teachers 1:6.

The highest figures in the state are: superintendent \$96,000 (Houston), elementary teachers \$27,090 (Deer Park), secondary teachers \$28,818 (Deer Park), average daily attendance 175,329

(Houston), and ratio of administrators to teachers 1:17 (City View).

Low figures are: superintendent \$24,416 (Cranfills Gap), elementary teachers \$11,848 (Newcastle), secondary teachers \$10,934 (Sulphur Bluff), average daily attendance 8 (Allamore), and ratio of administrators to teachers 1:1 (Three Way, Walnut Bend).

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on July 21 with the mayor and Commissioner Smith and Commissioner Mears present. Others attending were Mrs. Brinegar, Secretary, Mr. Joe Bennett, Mr. Lonnie Bennett, Mr. Clea Echols and Chief Funderburg.

At this meeting we discussed several items and took action on some of them. I was appointed as a nominee to the WCTCOG on the review board which presented the Third Place trophy for her decorated car.

The annual ice cream supper of the Kokomo Community Club and the Kokomo Extension Homemakers Club will be held following the coronation. Everyone is invited to come and bring a freezer of ice cream or a cake and bowls and spoons for your family and guests.

will be reviewing applications for Grant Money. This committee will be appointed at a later date. We also agreed to pursue the possibility of another request for grant money. I will be meeting with Mr. Carl O'Neal this week to discuss this item.

We listened again to the request to close Scurry street from Lubbock to McCall. After having heard this request and the plans for the use of the street, the Commission voted to close the street. When a street is closed the property reverts back to the property owner on either side of the street. This property reverts back to Sunbelt Savings, Mr. Clea Echols, Mr. Joe Bennett, and Mrs. Linnie Montgomery. The City reserves an easement to all utilities on or under such property.

Another item that has been discussed at various times was again brought before the Commission. This had to do with the dog problem in Gorman as well as the removal of dead animals. We had asked that an ordinance be drawn up covering these items. It was read and debated at this meeting and was approved on first reading. It will be presented for second reading on August 18 at which time we will have a public hearing on the matter. If it is approved on second reading at that time it will become law within the City Limits of Gorman.

The Ordinance in general states that all dogs within the city limits must be kept within a pen or on a secure leash when not penned. They are not to be allowed to run at large at any time. They would also be required to be tagged with a current vacation tag for rabies. Any person violating this law would be subject to a fine and each day would constitute a separate offense. This ordinance may be read in full at the City Office any business day between the hours of 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM.

The part covering dead animals would basically require any person with a dead animal belonging to them or on their property to remove such dead animal at their expense. This part of the Ordinance would also carry a clause that would make the person who refused to remove such animal subject to a fine with each day being a separate offense.

The matter of the dogs has been a problem for years and we have had many requests to do something about dogs running at large. We have studied this matter and in our mind feel that the time has come when something should be done. We are aware of the fact that there are many different ideas on this matter, and that is what we want. We are giving you three weeks to think about this and give us some feedback. We want to know if you feel that we do or do not need such an Ordinance in Gorman. We also invite you and urge you to attend the Public Hearing on August 18. If you are for or against the Ordinance, we want to know for you are the people who have complained and will have to live with whatever we do with this matter. Remember, we want to hear from you.

We should have our certified tax roll within a few days. The County Appraisal Review Committee met on July 27 and should finish up work on tax protests. Soon after we receive this roll we will be setting the tax rate for 1983. We hope that it will not have to be increased very much, if any. There are a number of factors that could affect the total value and cause some increase, we will know about this soon. We hope that tax statements will be mailed out earlier this year than last. You will hear more on this later.

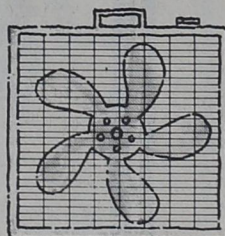
