

Four persons were injured in one mishap, but luckily, all persons who have been injured this year have been treated and released...no

serious injuries. The number one cause of accidents continues to be failure to remain stopped at intersections until it is safe to proceed. The second main cause is failure to yield right of way to oncoming vehicles while turning

In 1981, we had 31 accidents with one fatality and six injuries. In 1982, the number of accidents decreased to 26, but the number of injuries remained the same at six. With only three months remaining, in the year, we have a good chance of keeping the number of accidents below the 1982 level, but only if we are very careful.

The Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays still lie ahead, and they usually account for a year-end increase. We must still remember that next month we will have many, many of our local goblins trick-orteating on Halloween night, and they have a tendency to depend on adults to be on the look-out for them.

And please remember that the speed limit signs and the stop signs are not designed to inconvenience you, but to protect you.

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




