## First Baptist Church Revival To Feature Dr. A. B. Lightfoot



Dr. A. B. Lightfoot is a man with a mission...to help today's young people find their proper place in God's world. The Carrollton, Texas evangelist will be speaking at the First Baptist Church, October 9 through 13, 7:00 p.m. to 12 noon. Dr. Lightfoot is a native of Santa Anna, Coleman County, Texas. He served as pastor of the First Baptist Church, Big Lake, Texas, the Crescent Park Baptist Church of Odessa, Texas and as Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Snyder, Texas. He served as Assistant to the President of Howard Payne College of Brownwood, Texas for eighteen months. Early in his ministry, Howard Payne bestowed upon him an Honorary Doctor of Divinity Degree.

Through the years he has been busily engaged in evangelism and has committed his life to full time evangelistic work. His campaigns have taken him to Mexico, Guatemala, Europe and Hawaii. Few men have enjoyed such marked success in the winning of souls and the building of the local church as this man of God. We are pleased to present to our city our evangelist known far and wide simply as...A. B. Lightfoot.

Dr. Lightfoot speaks optimistically about today's young people. He believes that many of the problems they face result more from a "communication gap" than from a "generation gap." "Many young people have lost sight of why they are here in the world," Dr. Lightfoot says. "They do not realize that their primary reason for being here on earth is to worship and serve the Lord. Only when they make that great discovery are they able to find rhyme and reason in their existence." Dr. Lightfoot believes young people—and adults too—hide their unhappiness behind "a wall of alcohol,

drugs, illicit sex, and militant demonstrations."

"One of the cliches of our day is that young people have 'turned off' the church," he says. "But let me tell you about the kids I know—church kids who have 'turned on' to God and have done so inside the church."

Dr. Lightfoot says he notes a definite trend in the lives of these young people in the church.

"When they really get serious about their faith it results in increased Bible study, prolonged periods of prayer, staunch commitment to the church, and an electric enthusiasm for telling their friends about their faith," he says.

"I'm excited about the great spiritual victories among our youth," he adds. "It may point to the greatest religious awakening in the history of the church."

Rev. Darrell Dossey and the members of the First Baptist Church have invited the public to hear Dr. Lightfoot and Mr. Daryl Hirst, who will be leading the music, Sunday through Thursday at 7:00 P.M. each evening.

## PANTHERS EDGED BY EAGLES; HOST HORNETS FRIDAY NIGHT

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Goldthwaite on Friday night in a showdown battle with the Eagles and were edged 20 to 14 in a very tough battle as both teams showed much spirit and determination in the game. The Eagles intercepted 2 Panther passes and returned one for a touchdown when the Panthers tried a pass deep in their own territory, which was intercepted and returned for a touchdown that turned out to be the difference in the score.

But don't weep for the Big Red for they played a great game, but just came up short on the breaks, and that was the difference in the game. The Panthers are a great team and will not let this loss effect the rest of the season.

The Panthers took the opening kickoff on their own 23 and started a drive that covered the 77 yards in 13 plays with Jeff Seaton scoring from 4 yards out with 5:09 left in the period. This long drive used up more than half of the first quarter. The pass try for

two points failed and Gorman led 6-0.

The two teams played on even terms until midway through the second period when the Eagles started a drive on their own 10 and went the distance in a long, time consuming drive of their own, going 90 yards in 14 plays with Dale Miles scoring from 14 yards out on a sweep with 7:25 left in the half. The run for two points failed and the score stood at 6-6.

Then with 4:01 left in the half, the Panther aerial throw from Deep in their own end of the field was intercepted by Eric Dennis and returned 15 yards for the score. This turned out to be a costly mistake for the Big Red. Chip Head ran for the two points and the halftime score read 14 to 6 in the Eagles favor.

The Panthers came back in the fourth quarter after the teams had played on even terms for the entire third quarter, and moved for 88 yards in 20 plays with Rhett Harrison running it in from 4 yards out with 9:09 left in the game. The drive featured several good runs by Harrison and Swanner and also a beautiful pass play to Swanner for 22 yards and a first down at the Eagle 25. Swanner added the two pointer to knot the score at 14 all.

The Eagles came back with a long drive after taking the kick at their own 15 and went the distance in

8 plays with Head hitting Eric Dennis with a 15 yard pass for the score with 6:10 left. The run failed and Goldthwaite led 14-14.

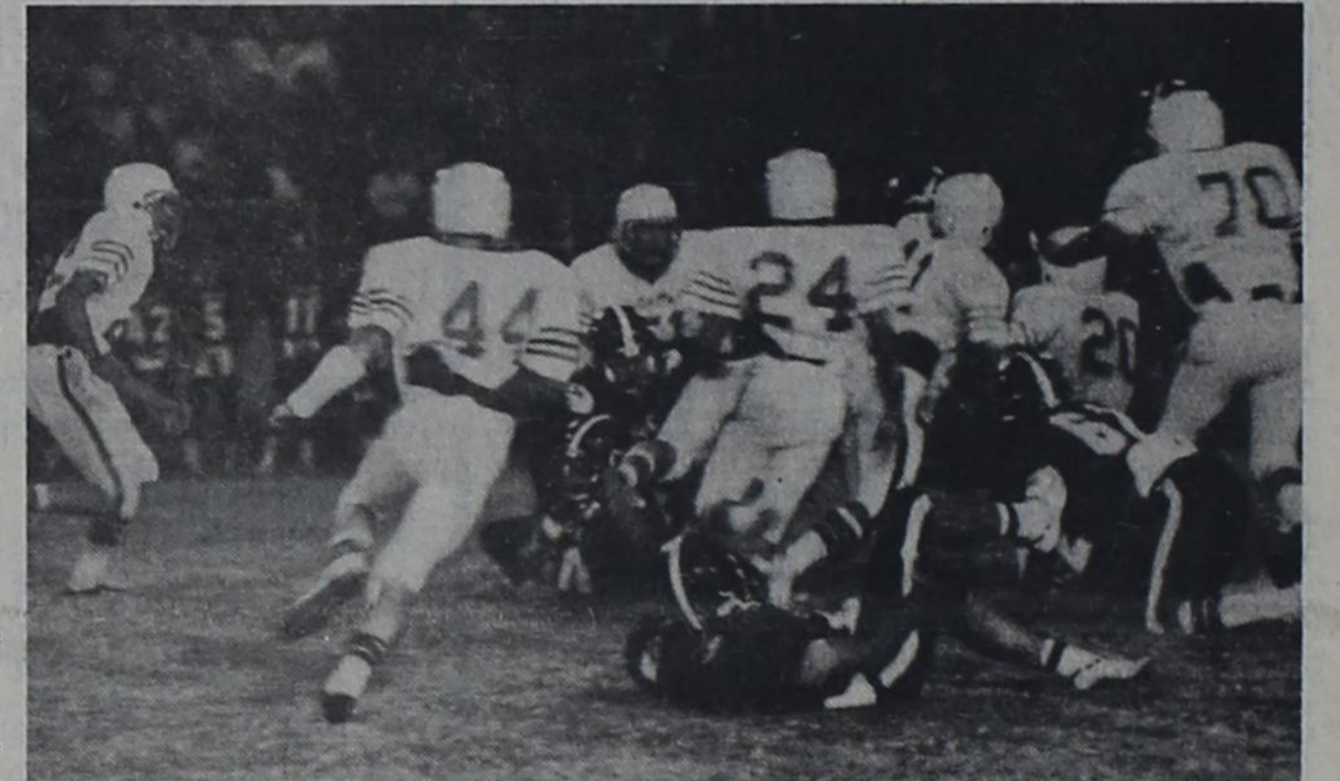
The Big Red tried real hard to get a win but thanks to some lucky breaks by the Eagles that kept their final drive alive to kill the clock, the Panthers didn't have enough time left after taking over on their own 11 with only 20 or so seconds left.

It was a real great game and the Big Red are to be commended for their valiant try to win the battle. Both the defense and the offense played great.

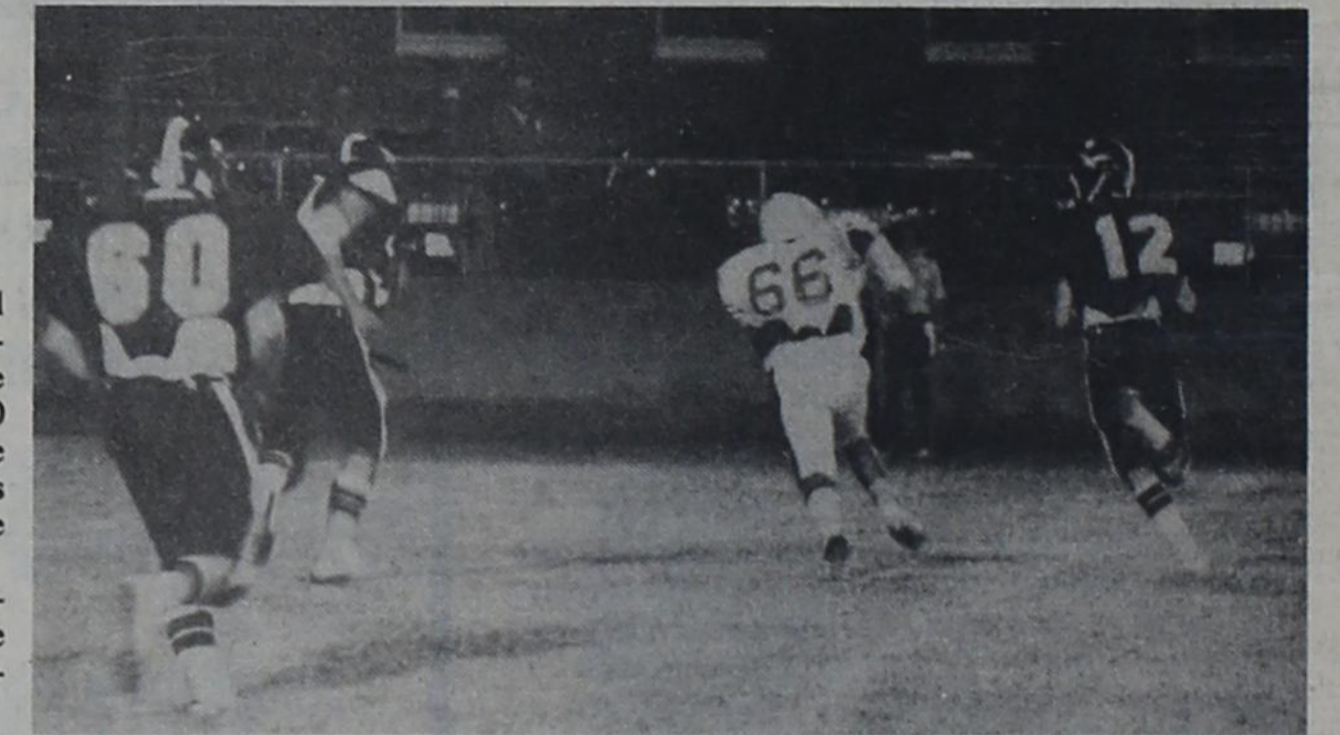
Swanner again led the Panthers on the ground with 87 yards on 24 carries. Harrison had 45 on 13 totes. Ricky Hunter got 18 on 6 and Jeff Seaton wound up with 5 on 7 keepers, losing yardage twice on pass tries.

The Panthers will host the Rochelle Hornets here this Friday night in another crucial District 8-A game. The Big Red in district play if they are to get in the playoffs and will be trying extra hard to defeat the Hornets in this one. And with the improvement in the Big Red defense, we think they will be able to handle the Hornets if they really hustle.

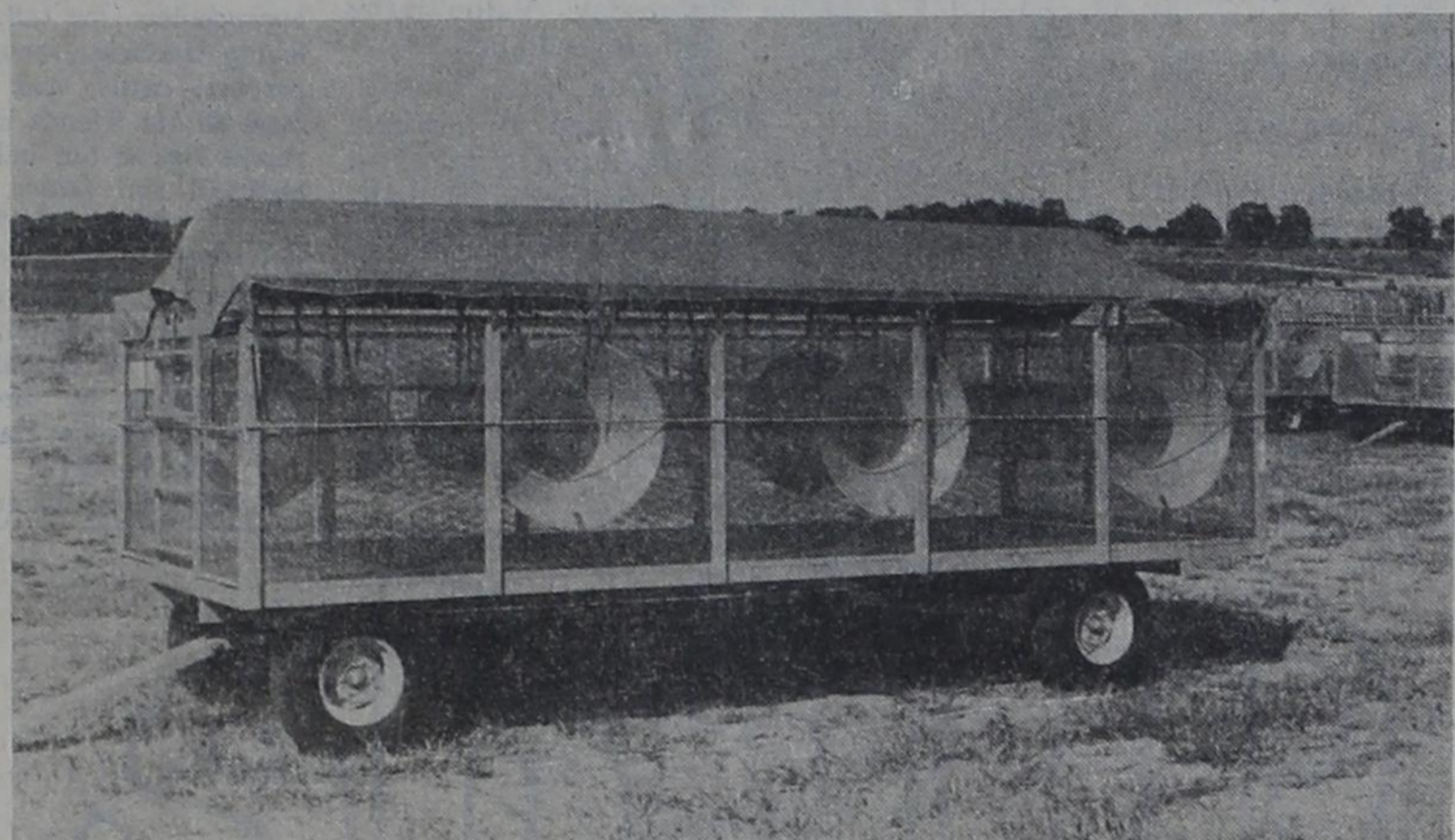

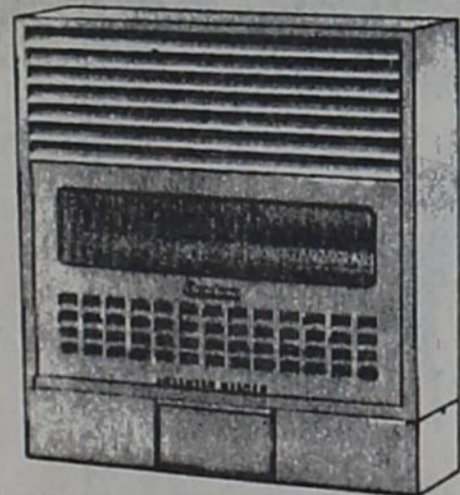

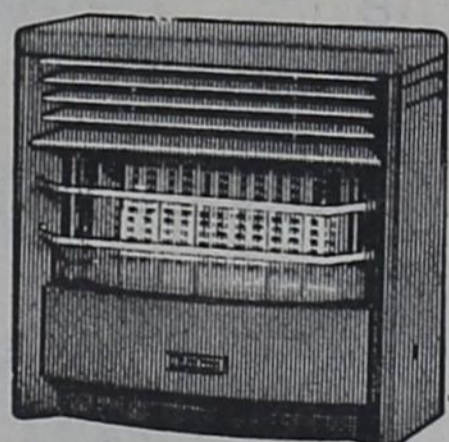

We must still remember that next month we will have many, many of our local goblins trick-or-teating on Halloween night, and they have a tendency to depend on adults to be on the look-out for them.

**CITY CHIT CHAT**

At the last Commission meeting on September 15 the Commission voted to open Winkler Street at this time as far as Bernice Street. This will be done in the near future. Boundary lines must be established and right-of-way determined before the opening.

Present street repairs were discussed and additional streets were included in the current paving projects. The work in nearing completion. It should be finished this week. I wish it were possible that we could have done more, but our budget for repair has been used for the time being. There has been some comments about some of the streets that we topped being rough. It is impossible to redo a street and make it like a new street unless the entire pavement is torn up and start from scratch. What we tried to do was to

fill in low places and holes with hot mix and then seal coat the street. By doing this, we are able to save the street and make it fairly smooth. It would be impossible to tear up these streets and rebuild completely. We do hope that they will serve the purpose. I think that if you will visit some of our near by towns, you will find that we have a pretty good street system.

All Farm Bureau members are invited to attend this meeting, but only agricultural producers may vote or be elected to an office, according to our county by-laws.

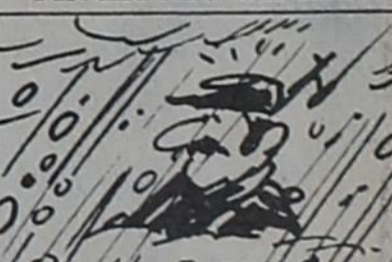
Major issues expected to be considered include new farm programs, energy, taxation, labor, government regulations, transportation and education.

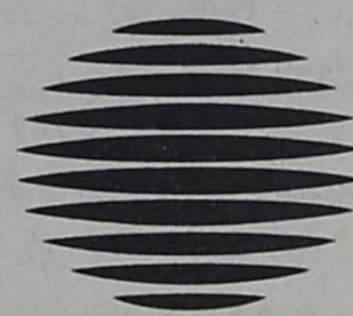

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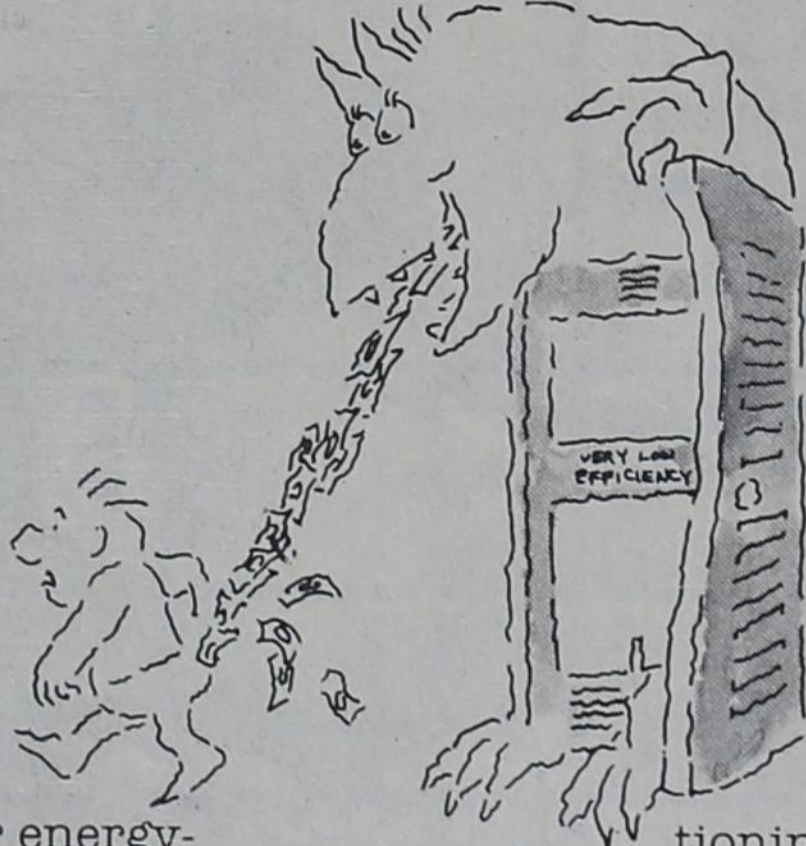

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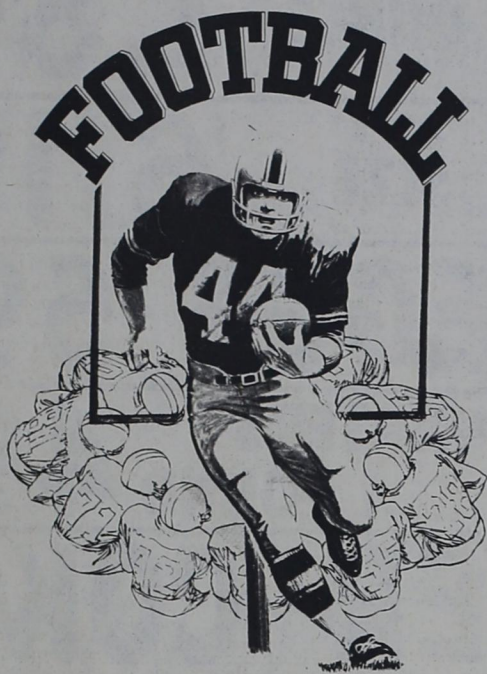
