#### **Preventive Medicine Is Money In Your Pocket**

Frankly, there are few advantages to be gained from a routine health or medical checkup. Aside from the fact that a complete annual physical exam can cost as much as \$300 per person, many of the procedures and tests done during routine examinations are not necessary, routine-

For all intents and purposes, there are only a specific number of tests or medical precautions that you would need to protect yourself against a very expensive stay at the local hospital. We like to refer to these precautions as basic "preventive medicine." Understand that the best medicine is prevention: indeed, "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," to quote an ancient cliche.

So, what are these precautions. One, of course, is a skin test or tuberculosis (PPD or Tine Test). This is an inexpensive and effective means of detecting exposure to a disease that could keep you in the hospital for a long time. Chest x-rays may be more expensive, cumbersome and involve exposure to radiation. While it is customary to recommend a skin test annually, a less frequent schedule (every 3-5 years) is probably adequate unless you have definately been exposed to tuberculosis, live, or work in an area in which such a disese is common.

If you are a woman over 25, an important precaution is the "pap smear." This should be taken, at least, once a year, if not every six months to detect possible cancer of the womb (cervix or birth canal). In its early stages, this slow growing cancer is completely curable. Women over 25 should also assume the practice of breast self-examination every month, and should check out any suspicious lumps with their physician. Mammography (a special breast x-ray) is expensive and unnecessary, unless a woman already has a breast tumor.

A test for glaucoma should be done after age forty if there is a family history of glaucoma. Glaucoma is a treatable disease which can cause blindness. See your local eye doctor (opthalmologist) as a precaution so that this disease can be detected early.

After age thirty, it is a wise precaution to have a urinalysis and a test for blood in the stool done at least once every two years, if not sooner. A urinalysis can detect the early onset of diabetes especially in persons who are overweight. Blood in the stool can be a sign of many serious ailments. Just from a visual examination that you can do at home, a dark, tarry stool can be a warning of stomach, esophagus (food pipe) disease or diseases of the upper gastrointestinal track (GI track). Bright red blood in the stool is a clear sign of problems in the lower GI track such as colitis, colon cancer, or irritable bowel. If you see these signs, please see a physician immediately.

Finally, a very important precaution is a check for blood pressure. This should be done every year or so. In fact, if you're overweight, you should have your blood pressure checked every six months.






