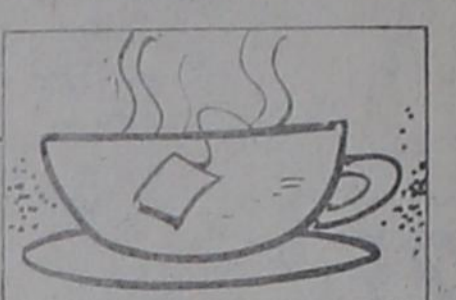

Chester was born April 27, 1921 in Gorman, and graduated from Gorman High School in 1939 where he excelled in athletics.

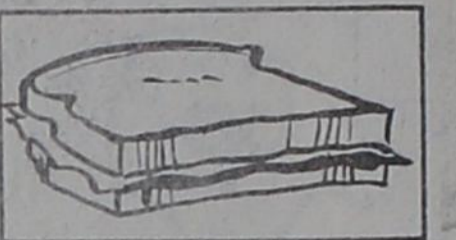

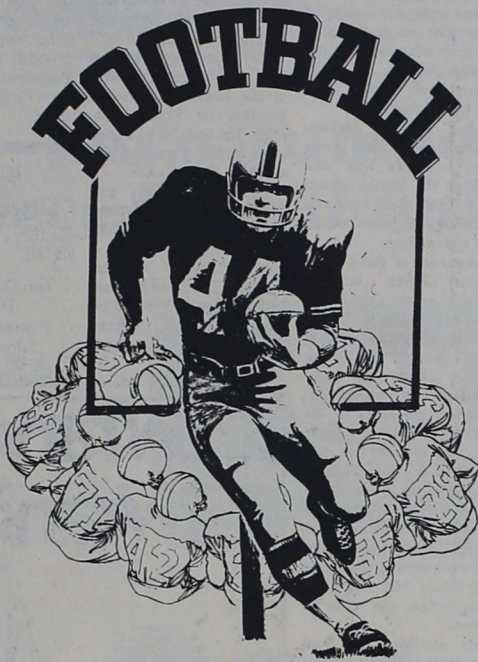

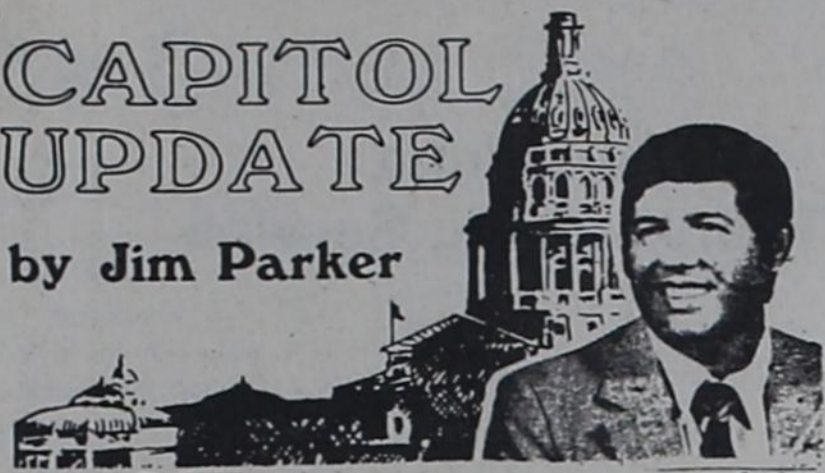

# CAPITOL UPDATE

by Jim Parker



As I am sure all of you know by now, ten of the

eleven propositions passed in the November 8th election. The only proposal that failed was proposition #8 which would have allowed political subdivisions to exempt veteran and fraternal organizations from ad valorem taxes.

While we will all be affected eventually, either directly or indirectly, by these Constitutional a-

amendments, probably the one which will have the most immediate, positive effect on some in our district is proposition #7 which makes veterans eligible for a \$20,000 loan from the Veterans' Land Board to assist them in buying a home. For this reason, I thought I would take this opportunity to explain the process and the steps which

veterans will need to take to put the program into action.

The Veteran's Land Board of the General Land Office may use \$500M in the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund for the purpose of making a loan of \$20,000 to qualified veterans in order to assist them in purchasing a home. The remainder of the mortgage

would be financed through one of the participating financial institutions. Both the Land Office and the lending institution would share first lien on the house. By December 15th a list of participating financial institutions in the state will be published so interested veterans may be aware of the ones closest to them.

Eligible veterans will go to a lending institution approved by the Veterans' Land Board and qualify for a housing loan in the same way all other borrowers would. The institution takes into consideration that the applicant would have an additional loan from the Veterans' Land Board. If the veteran qualifies for a loan from the lending institution and is certified as eligible for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Program by the Veterans' Land Board, the Board will send the lending institution up to \$20,000 toward the money loaned for the home purchase. The borrower will make only one mortgage payment per month to the lending institution, which will in turn, send partial payment to the Veterans' Land Board for repayment into the Housing Assistance Fund.

This program should enable many veterans to purchase a home and I hope any in my district who are interested will take part in it. Remember to watch for a list of the participating lending institutions on December 15th. Should you have any questions, Commissioner Garry Mauro of the Land Office has set up a toll-free telephone line which you may call for

## HAY AMMONIATION

Hay ammoniation will be demonstrated and discussed by County Extension Agent De Gordon Tuesday night, November 15, at Cisco Junior College agriculture building.

Herman Glueck, instructor of agriculture, says the department is sponsoring the program to show livestock producers how to ammoniate hay. The program begins at 7:00 p.m.

There is currently a lot of interest in hay ammoniation, a process of treating hay with anhydrous ammonia. Research studies have shown that the treatment will increase hay protein level, digestibility and intake and thereby boost animal performance.

The agent will demonstrate the process using hay owned by a local producer and will discuss the precautions to take while applying the anhydrous ammonia.

Treating hay with ammonia at the rate of 3 percent of the weight of the hay has increased crude protein values from 4 to 14 percent, improved digestibility by 10 to 15 percent, and increased forage intake 15 to 20 percent. All this has boosted livestock performance at a cost of about \$6.50 to \$7 per ton of hay.

Everyone interested in learning more about hay ammoniation is invited to the program.

"In general, we are looking at acquisitions in the \$100-\$300 million range," Huddleston said, "but we are open to any deals that benefit both PPI and the sellers."

Huddleston said that the anticipates Proven Properties Inc. will have a small headquarters staff during the company's early growth.

# The Gordon Spot

The cold front that swept into Eastland County last week reminded us that winter is not far away. It's time when fruit tree care is forgotten or neglected, but it's a critical time for controlling many peach and plum tree diseases to insure a good crop next year.

With the arrival of fall and winter, there's often a tendency to forget our peach and plum trees that served us so well last summer.

Applying a copper fungicide now can stop or reduce three of the six diseases that attack peach and plum trees in Texas. These are peach leaf curl, bacterial

leaf spot and bacterial canker.

Puckered and distorted peach tree leaves that were either bright red or light green in diseased areas last spring were due to peach leaf curl fungus. The only time to effectively control this disease is now with a copper containing fungicide such as Kocide 101.

Timing of the fall spray is critical for effective control and for avoiding tree damage. Copper is a metal and may cause defoliation, but leaves are falling anyway at this time.

Spray when about 70 percent of the leaves have fallen from the tree. Spraying too early will cause leaf

shed or cause the spray to be ineffective later.

Bacterial leaf spot and bacterial canker can be partially controlled by fall spraying with a copper fungicide. But again it's important to spray at the right time to prevent foliage burn.

Bacterial leaf spot affects both fruit and foliage. The infection causes fruit to crack and leaves develop angular spots which drop out. Bacterial canker will kill trees slowly. Infected trees will have gum or wax forming on the trunk and main limbs.

The fall spray in Eastland County is most often applied from November 12 to December 1. Application time will vary with the season so you should check your fruit trees closely. Fall

## Veterans Housing Assistance Program Approved

Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro proclaimed the approval of Proposition 7 in the constitutional amendment election Tuesday as a "great victory for the veterans and the people of Texas." With over 70 percent of the voters approving the proposal, eligible Texas veterans will be able to borrow up to \$20,000 to purchase a home under the Veterans Housing Assistance Program.

The amendment authorized the Veterans Land Board to issue \$500 million in bonds for the Veterans Housing Assistance Program and an additional \$300 million for the contin-

uation of the Veterans Land Program.

"Thanks to the support of the veterans organizations, lending institutions, real estate professionals, homebuilders and thousands of individual Texans, we will be able to launch this program which will be beneficial not just for veterans, but for the entire state economy," Mauro stated.

Homeowners need to be cautious as to where they get their firewood for the coming winter season.

Firewood infected with oak wilt can spread the disease to oak trees in your yard.

Oak wilt disease is common in many areas of Texas, and the fungus which causes it can be transported in firewood. Wood-boring insects may also be present that later emerge and carry disease-causing spores to nearby trees.

While it's best to get firewood from areas not having oak wilt, it's not always possible to know the source. So we recommend stacking firewood away from oak trees and covering the stack with clear plastic, sealed around the edges. This will prevent the emergence of wood-boring insects which can spread the disease.

It is also best to use firewood during the current winter season. Holding the firewood over through a warm season allows the emergence of insects that carry disease-causing spores.

Remember, the lower you set your thermostat during the winter, the lower your electric bill will be. At night and when you're going to be away, set it at 55° or lower. Open drapes during the day to let sunlight in, and close them at night to help hold in warm air.



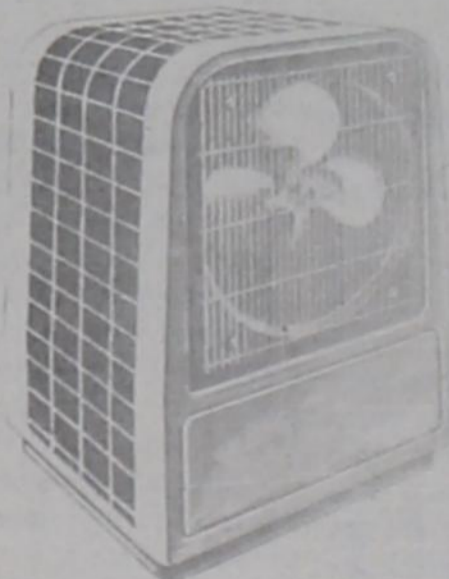

**CAPITOL UPDATE**

A great deal of attention has been given to the problem of overpriced spare parts sold to the military. This is indeed a serious problem. We have seen \$435 claw hammers, \$35 turbine blades costing the government \$390 plastic stool caps with a price tag of \$900 and other overcharges which I consider inexcusable.

Even though only a tiny percentage of the thousands of items purchased each year fall into this category, this problem is nevertheless quite serious. During the past four years, we have spent a great deal of money on spare parts to restock supplies which had dropped so low that military readiness was affected. As a steward of the taxpayers' dollars, I am appalled to discover that even a small portion of this money has been spent on grossly overpriced materials. We can not and will not tolerate these abuses.

The Armed Services Committee has held hearings on this problem. We heard from representative of the Defense Department,

example, has been frequent small-quantity purchases. Each time an order is placed, the supplier has to retool and start a production line, making each individual item much more expensive than it would be if orders were consolidated.

Other times, the military has placed excessive emphasis on speed and not enough on economy. Competition often has been insufficient, and too much ordering has been done routinely by computer and product number, without anyone properly evaluating the value received for the price paid.

I am pleased to report that the Defense Department has instituted a 10-point plan to correct these problems. For example, steps have been taken to encourage competitive bidding and reward employees who find cost savings, at the same time other steps have been taken to discipline employees who are derelict in their duty. These initiatives are most promising. I am convinced that the Defense Department is going to continue to work diligently to end overpricing in spare parts purchasing.

It is vitally important that we provide sufficient quantities of spare parts to keep our military equipment operating efficiently. We will continue our efforts in this direction, while we monitor the Defense Department's progress in

Christmas is right around the corner which means many individuals will be seeking employment for extra money. Preparing oneself for a job interview is the first consideration to be made before getting the job.

Hard work, effort and ability are critical factors in success, but a person has to get the job first before he can become successful. Success, then starts when a person applies for a job.

The interview game consists of two major rules: how well you cope with the verbal techniques, and how well you maneuver the non-verbal plays.

STEP 1. Grooming, poise, promptness and a resume (neat and correctly filled out) are all door openers to second interviews.

STEP 2. The day before an interview call and confirm the time, place, and the name of the person conducting the interview.

STEP 3. Some knowledge about the company, the product or services provided by the organization you are interviewing with sells you. You're letting it be known making their purchasing procedures more efficient and less susceptible to abuse.

If you're nervous about going to interview, accept the fact that (STEP 4.) you're perfectly normal. Remember, though, your task is still to sell yourself and land the job. Some simple pointers are:

- Dry your sweaty palms before you enter and have to shake hands.
- Don't sit down before you're invited to do so - let the interviewer stay in charge.
- When asked about hobbies or leisure activities mention the active ones first - to show you're a doer.
- For extra plusses don't smoke or chew gum even if you're asked.
- Praise your former co-workers and employer - don't criticize.
- Make your resume fit the job.

It's a nutritious low-cost, and don't forget, quick dinner.
