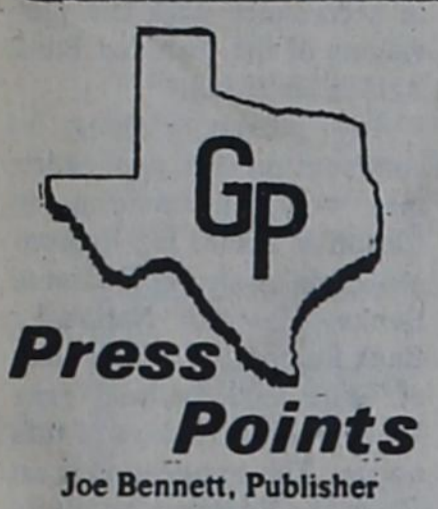

A larger number of voters went to the polls Saturday to elect a mayor and two Commissioners to the City Council.

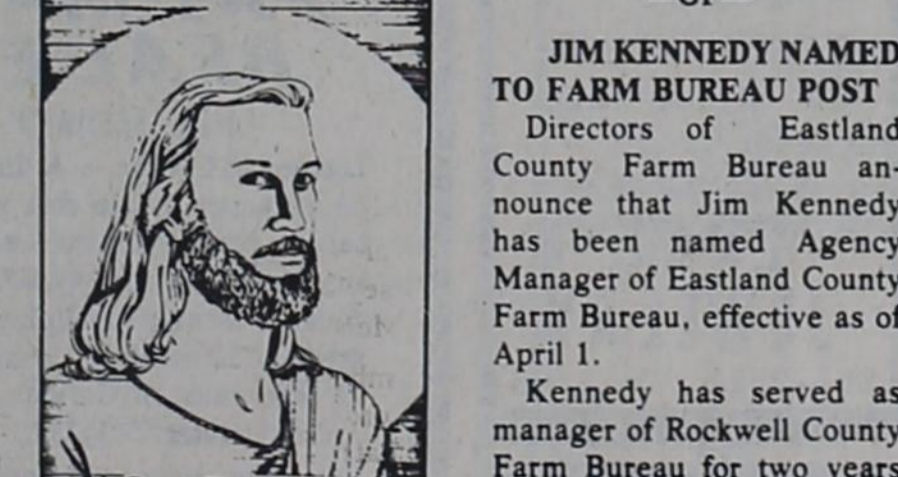
A total of 221 voted in the city election with unopposed Charlie Garrett receiving 191 votes, to be re-elected mayor...

**CONTRACTS NEEDED FOR CRUSHING, EXPORTING ADDITIONAL PEANUTS**

Additional peanuts produced for crushing or exporting must be contracted by APRIL 14, David W. Martin, County Executive Director, Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said.

Additional peanuts are those marketed from a farm for which a poundage quota has been established and which are in excess of the poundage quota, and also those marketed from a farm for which no farm poundage quota has been established. "This production must be either placed under an approved contract with a handler or be placed under price support loan, at the \$200. per ton loan rate. If the additional peanuts are marketed, or considered marketed, in any other way they will be designated as quota marketings and subject to a 38.5 cent per pound penalty", the ASCS official said.

The peanut price support program no longer limits the number of acres of peanuts that can be planted. This means that any person can grow peanuts anywhere in the country and market the peanuts for other than domestic edible use. Under previous programs, production was limited to farms with an allotment.

**EASTLAND COUNTY RECEIVES GRANT FROM STATE**

### SOCIAL SECURITY? ME? I'M STILL WORKING!

It is true that you may apply for and be eligible to receive some social security retirement benefits even though you continue to work. If you are age 72 or older, you may receive full social security benefits even though you continue to work.

In 1982, social security beneficiaries under age 65 will be allowed to earn \$4,440 (\$370 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are over age 65, up to age 72 will be allowed to earn \$6000 (\$500 a month) and still receive full social security benefits. Beneficiaries who are age 72 and older may earn any amount of money and receive full social security benefits.

The 1978 Amendments to the Social Security Act contained a provision whereby, beginning with 1982, beneficiaries age 70 and older would be allowed to earn any amount of money and receive full social security benefits. However, the 1981 Amendments to the Social Security Act have delayed the effective date of this provision for one year. Therefore, for 1982 we will continue, under the old law, to pay full social security benefits to beneficiaries age 72 and older regardless of the amount of their earnings.

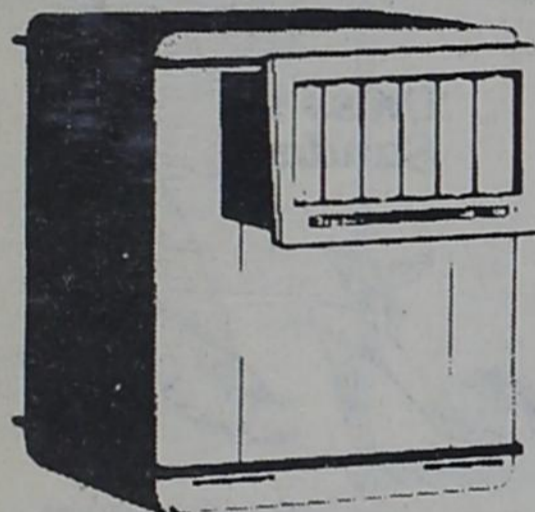

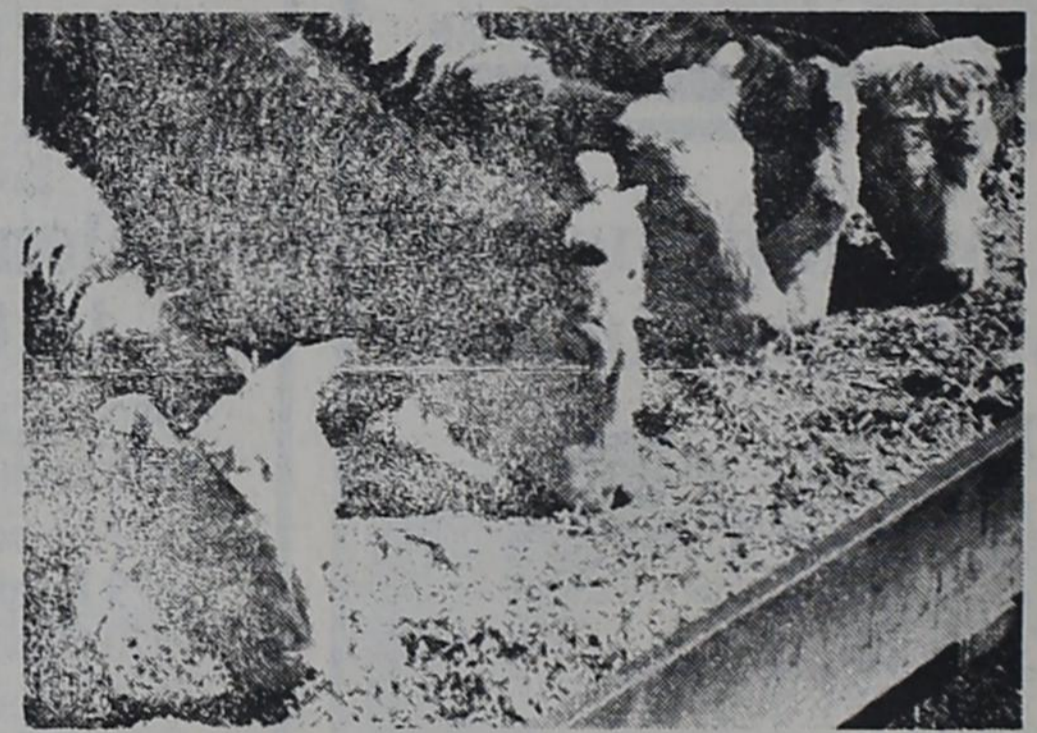

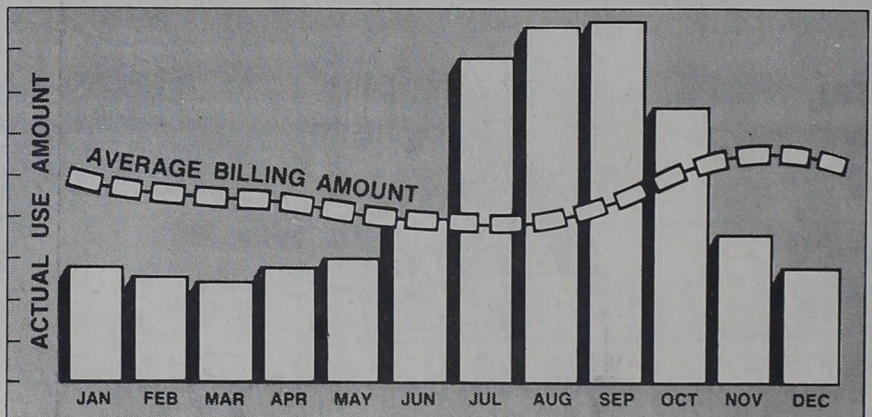
