WIN A BALE OF COTTON CONTEST
AUSTIN — If you would like to have a bale of cotton all your own (or the possible \$240 it's worth), Agriculture Commissioner Reagan B. Brown will be giving one away March 18 as part of the state's observance of Agriculture Day.

Brown is the state chairman of Agriculture Day, a nationwide recognition of the contribution of agriculture to the U. S. economy. The theme for this state is "Agriculture—It's Your Heartbeat, Texas."

The Lamesa Cotton Growers Association is donating the 480-pound bale. The average price of cotton today, depending on grade, is about 50 cents per pound.

"Persons interested in becoming instant cotton farmers will have to do some work. They are required to write a postcard full of reasons why agriculture is important to Texas," Brown said.

"The Lamesa growers will get the bale to the Capitol, but the winner will be responsible for transporting it from there, storing it and finding a buyer," Brown said.

"The winner will be facing the same challenge that farmers have now in finding the buyer with the best price. We'll give some suggestions, but the owner will handle all of the negotiations for sale."

Entries should be addressed to Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown Texas Department of Agriculture, P. O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711. Entries must be postmarked no later than February 26. The winner will be announced at ceremonies on the Capital steps March 18 at 1 p.m.


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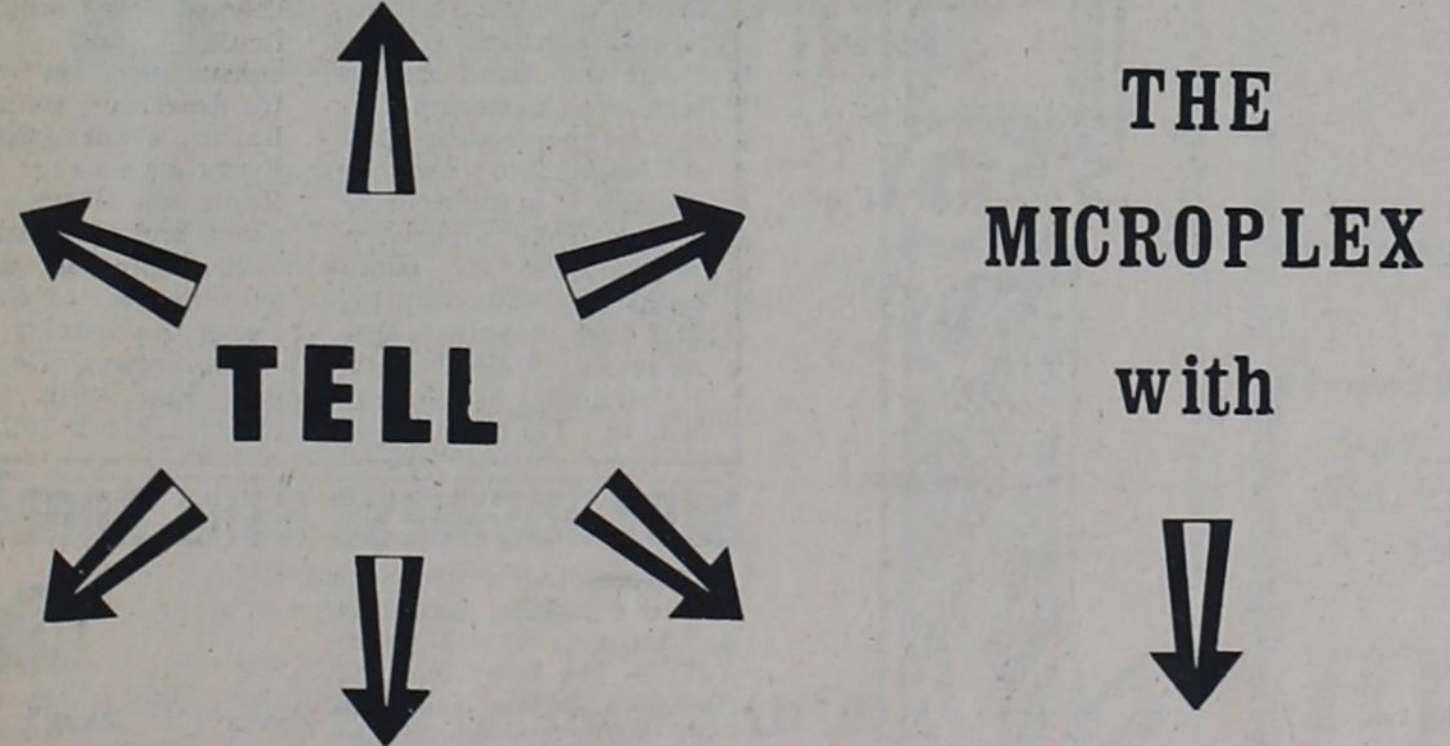
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REAGAN BROWN TO SPEAK AT RC&D BANQUET

The Business Council for International Understanding Institute reports that corporate requests for intensive language training have risen 20 percent in the last two years.

The easiest for Americans are usually Italian, French, Spanish, Portuguese, and Romanian. German, Afrikaans and the Scandinavian languages are all close cousins to English. BABY BUSINESS STILL BOOMING

Despite the lack of jobs and the sagging economy, one business is still booming... the baby business. Having children is coming back into style—population researchers say that more than 3.6 million babies will be born in the United States this year.

However, nutrition experts are concerned about what we will feed these babies. Not because of food shortages, or unemployment, or even inflation—but simply because parents don't know enough about infant nutrition.

"Standards for infant nutrition have changed in the past 20 years," according to Dr. Sarah Short, nutrition professor at Syracuse University.

Dr. Short cites the American Academy of Pediatrics' recommendation that infants be breast-fed—or when that's not possible, not chosen by the mother, or stopped early—fed iron fortified infant formula for the entire first year of life. "Cow's milk, once thought to be the perfect food for babies, does not fulfill the nutritional needs of an infant during the first 12 months. And it's hard to digest," Dr. Short says.

Dr. Short also cautions about starting solid foods too early. "Babies don't need the extra calories in solid foods until they reach four to six months. Then introduce foods one at a time following the advice of your pediatrician or health care adviser."

There was a main there about as high as Jack Mauney. 8 feet and over. I could stand under his arm. I stepped on his toe and he yelled. I thought he might be on stilts.

We went to see Baby Ruth, she was 16 about as fat as Clyde Pulley. 530 pounds. You could not see her feet. I noticed in paper where she lived to near 70 years. She weighed 780 then. Still with the show. The show was nearly over and they were having lions acting when the wind struck. The tent was rocking. They said they would close. So Ed and I just dropped down and went under side of tent. Ran and caught the first trolley home. Enjoyed it all.

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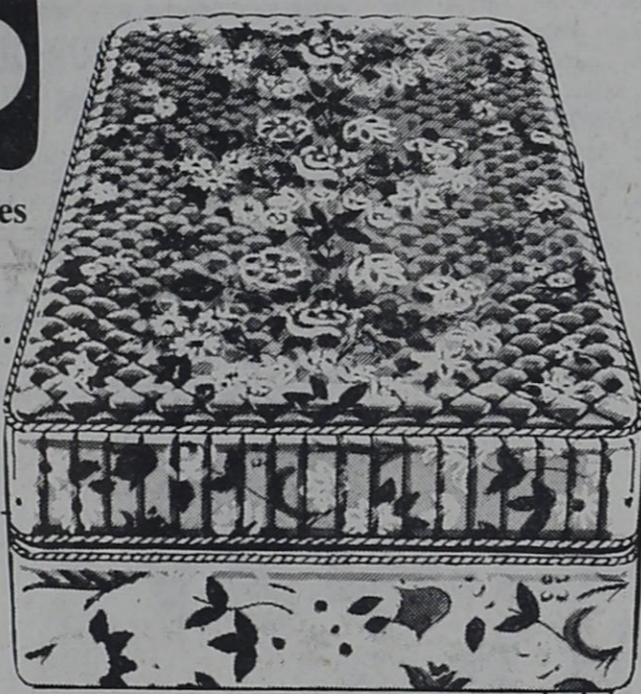

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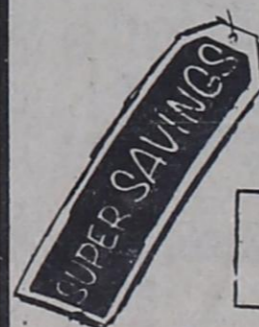

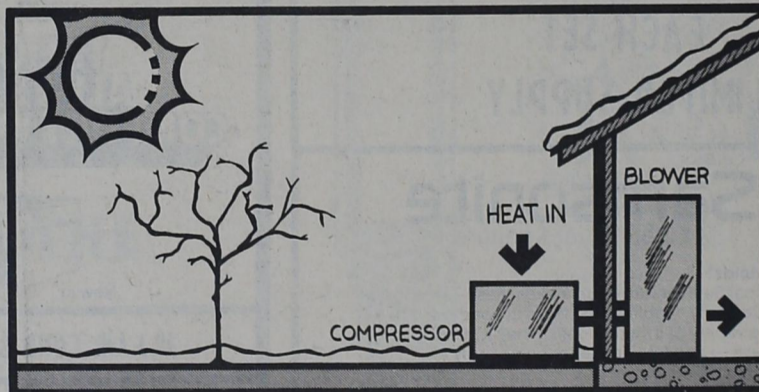
