Slides were shown of Comanche's new disposal area. Trenches have been dug and as waste is dumped into the ditches it is covered with several inches of dirt. Other places using this method have converted their dump grounds into very attractive looking areas.

Subject: Solid Waste - Eastland County - City of Gorman - Municipal Disposal Site

Dear Mayor Baker:
Recently our representative, Mr. Ronald Freeman, P. E., in company with Mr. Jimmy L. Turner, Water Superintendent, made an inspection of the City of Gorman's solid waste disposal site.

Based on this Department's recently adopted "Municipal Solid Waste Rules, Standards, and Regulations" and Mr. Freeman's report, this area has been classified as a "Category I Area". The minimum standard for this classification specifies a "Type I" sanitary landfill solid waste disposal operation. The reason for this classification is due to the dumping of refuse within 300 yards of a public road. If the dumping of refuse at the site were located more than 300 yards from a public road, the site could be classified as a "Category IV Area" and could meet our minimum standards with a "Type IV" controlled landfill operation. Classifications of service areas and types of operations are defined in Section B-1 and operational standards for the various disposal methods are described in Section E-3 of our rules, standards, and regulations. A copy was sent to your city in April, 1971.

Your city can meet the Health Department's required minimum solid waste disposal standards by carrying out one of the above methods of operation and by also following the recommendations listed below:

1. Appropriate signs should be posted at the entrance of the site stating the rules and regulations which govern the site.
2. Dikes or berms should be constructed to keep surface water from entering the site.
3. Provision should be made for all-weather access from the entrance of the site to the unloading area or a wet weather access should be provided to an alternate treatment area.
4. An alternate site or a separate unloading area on the processing and treatment site should be provided for large, heavy, or bulky items that cannot be incorporated in the regular treatment process. Such items should be covered periodically with two feet of compacted earth.
5. A vector control program should be initiated to reduce the fly and other insect population at the site.

The City of Gorman should adopt a mandatory refuse storage and collection ordinance. These provisions improve basic sanitation in the city and should also provide funds for the solid waste program. Collection rates should be based on the cost of operating both the collection and disposal phases of the program.

We wish to express our appreciation for the cooperation extended to Mr. Freeman during his visit to your city. Should any clarification of the above information be desired or if we can assist you in any phase of the solid waste program, please let us know.

Peanut Field Day TSC Station Oct. 14

STEPHENVILLE (Sp1) — A day-long program here October 14 will give area peanut producers a look at results in current research and demonstrations. The program will be in two parts:

1. Inspection of results at the Jimmy Grissom Farm, where 23 chemicals have been used (in three different amounts per acre) to demonstrate the control of peanut diseases.
2. Annual field day at the Texas A&M University-Tarleton Experiment Station.

Guests will leave the Station at 10 a. m. for the Grissom farm, where the work has been conducted by Erath County Agricultural Agent Richard Gary and Dr. C. Wendell Horne, plant pathologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University.

The group will return at noon to the Station for a lunch-treat lunch, after which they will inspect the results of research in peanut diseases, irrigation, breeding, herbicides, insect control, harvesting and drying.

The Station program will end about 5 p. m.

Dear Mayor Baker:
We have reviewed a report from Jimmie D. Dickens, R. S., of our staff, concerning his recent inspection of your solid waste disposal site. Mr. Dickens was accompanied during this inspection by Mr. Tommy Davis, Director of Public Works. Mr. Dickens reports that during this inspection on August 27, 1971, solid waste was being dumped without provisions for proper earth covering. The adult fly population was considered very heavy, fly larvae were observed, and dumping was not being confined to the excavation. Photographs were taken of the existing conditions. This information indicates that your site continues to be in apparent violation of the Health Department's Municipal Solid Waste Rules, Standards, and Regulations.

We wish to invite your attention to our letter to you dated July 9, 1971. This letter outlined recommendations for your site to meet the state's minimum solid waste disposal standards. The August 27, inspection indicates that conditions at the site have not improved, although improvement are being planned. It is again recommended that the current open dumping practices be discontinued and that the recommendations in our previous correspondence be implemented right away. We will appreciate hearing from you concerning your plans to comply with our minimum standards.

We are enclosing a copy of the publication "Refuse Handling Ordinances" for your information. This publication should be helpful in updating local ordinance provisions for refuse storage and collection. The use of fifty gallon barrels and the burning of refuse on individual premises in the City of Gorman should be discontinued. All premises should be required to use approved refuse containers.

We will continue to make follow-up inspections to determine what action is being taken to correct the deficiencies in your solid waste program.

CJC Band And Belles To Appear In Macy's Parade

The Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles Drill Team have received an invitation to perform in the nation's most prestigious annual parade, the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade in New York City, according to an announcement made at CJC recently by Eris Ritchie, Public Relations Director and Band Director for the Cisco College. The invitation was acknowledged and accepted by Dr. Leland Willis, president of the college, and at the same time Dr. Willis announced the launching of a massive fund-raising campaign to help finance the trip for the two groups.

The Cisco band and drill team will join a very elite group of only approximately fifteen bands from the entire nation in the parade. Ritchie said that the CJC group would probably be the only organization featuring a girls' dance and drill team and that the Belles will do a featured performance at Herald Square adjacent to Macy's that will be seen by millions on national television.

Bill Mears, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Mears of Gorman will be among the CJC students to appear in the parade.

Ritchie, who is also currently serving as Cisco Chamber of Commerce president, said "We doubt that Cisco and Cisco Junior College have ever had or ever will have a more exciting opportunity for national attention and television exposure to millions than the band and belles' appearing in this parade will afford."

The whole nation will be looking in on the parade on Thanksgiving Day, and one of the featured things everyone will see will be the Cisco Junior College Band and Wrangler Belles. This, of course, also represents a true opportunity of a lifetime for the boys and girls in our organizations, and it will be an experience of which they will be telling their children and grandchildren through the years as they view the parade on successive Thanksgivings. To say we're proud and happy would be a gross understatement."

Simultaneous to the announcement concerning the parade invitation, Dr. Willis announced the launching of a large-scale fund-raising campaign to help the college defray the cost of sending the groups to New York. The school plans to charter a 707 jetliner to transport the group and their sponsors from Dallas to New York, and to house the students in the McAlpin Hotel, across the street from Macy's. They will be in New York City two nights and parts of three days. Willis stated that the college seldom conducts fund-raising campaigns for anything, but that this would be a notable exception. He said, "We do not sell advertising in our school newspaper or yearbook. We have no kind of annual fund-raising campaign whatsoever for any purpose, and we have not asked for donations of any type since the time we sent our football team and performing groups to the Wool Bowl in New Mexico some five years ago. We do now sincerely hope that everyone in Cisco, all of the business and manufacturing concerns here, and all of the companies and individuals with whom our school does business, will respond to our call with substantial donations."

The Distinguished Student List consists of those students who carry at least 12 semester hours and have a 3.25 grade average out of a possible 4.0 with no grade less than "C."

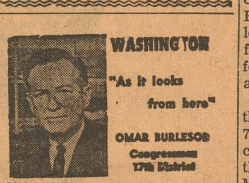
Snider is a senior math major.

WASHINGTON, D. C. — TO ADMIT RED CHINA into the United Nations is about like accepting an unconfessed and unrepentant bank robber into full and participating membership in a church.

ARTICLE 4 OF THE U. N. CHARTER, conceived in San Francisco in 1945, reads: "Membership in the United Nations is open to all other peace-loving States which accept the obligations contained in the present Charter and, in the judgment of the organization, are able and willing to carry out these obligations."

COMMUNIST CHINA HAS NEVER, nor does it now, indicate acceptance of the principles and obligations required by the U. N. Charter.

CHAPTER 1, ARTICLE 2, SECTION 4, of the Charter provides: "All members shall refrain in their international relations from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of any state, or in any manner inconsistent with the purposes of the United Nations."

THE QUESTION IS BEING ASKED our policy makers in the State Department: Does the sending of troops into Korea in support of naked aggression, invasion of India, exporting "revolution" thru-out the world, constitute "peace loving" or the restraint of force against others? If further proof was needed we only have to remember the murderous assault against a defenseless Tibet.

THE UNITED NATIONS WAS FORMED at a time when hopes were high for a peaceful world. Its aims were laudable - its intents the best. Russia joined as an ally of World War II and at the time appeared cooperative in establishing world order. Since that time in 1945 she has violated her commitment by invasion of other nations, by subversion and export of militant communism. Yet, by reason of her membership as a permanent member of the Security Council, censure or expulsion has not been possible.

THE ORGANIC LAW OF THE U. N. contained in Article 6 states that a nation can be expelled only by a two-thirds vote of the members of the General Assembly upon the recommendation of the Security Council. One member of the Council can block such a recommendation.

LIKEWISE, NATIONALIST CHINA, on the Island of Taiwan, was made a permanent member of the Security Council when the organization was formed. No one has ever accused the Chinese Nationalists of violating their obligations under the U. N. Charter. It logically follows that only by amending the Charter could she be expelled.

IT IS BAD ENOUGH THAT OUR GOVERNMENT is not only prepared to admit Red China to the U. N. but to support a resolution to oust the Nationalists from the Security Council and give the seat to Peking, veto and all.

EVEN THIS MAY NOT BE ENOUGH for the Communist Chinese. The yhave said all along that their joining the U. N. is conditioned on Taiwan being completely expelled.

Burleson Wins Comm. Approval on Pickup Excise Tax

WASHINGTON, D. C. — In a closed meeting of the Ways and Means Committee, currently deliberating the President's economic tax package, Congressman Omar Burleson has been successful in gaining approval of his proposal to remove the 10 percent excise tax on pickup trucks of 7500 pounds gross weight or less. The Committee vote was 20 to 4 in favor of Burleson's proposal, with one member not voting.

Burleson commented that the President's proposal recommended removal of the excise tax on automobiles only. Because of the wide use of pickup trucks for personal transportation, and particularly in areas such as the 17th Congressional District of Texas which he represents in the Congress, the Congressman had indicated to the Committee that it would be discriminatory not to include pickup trucks along with automobiles in the tax removal.

As a part of the over-all tax bill, scheduled to be formally reported out of the Committee on Tuesday, September 28, action will be required by the House of Representatives and the Senate before final approval, as well as a Conference Committee to work out differences. Congressman Burleson indicated his strong hope that this provision will be retained as future action is completed. The effective date would be September 23, 1971.
