utes instead of millions of years it takes nature to accomplish job.
According to Beef Business Bullell tin, scientists at U. S. Bureau of Mones' Energy Research Center in Pittsburgh believe they've found way — figure they can convert two tons of "pasture patties" into a ton of crude oil and a ton of water. And oil is good — has heat value of 15,000 BTU's per pound compared to 20,000 BTU's in nature's crude oil, only 6,000 in dried cow chips.

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
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
