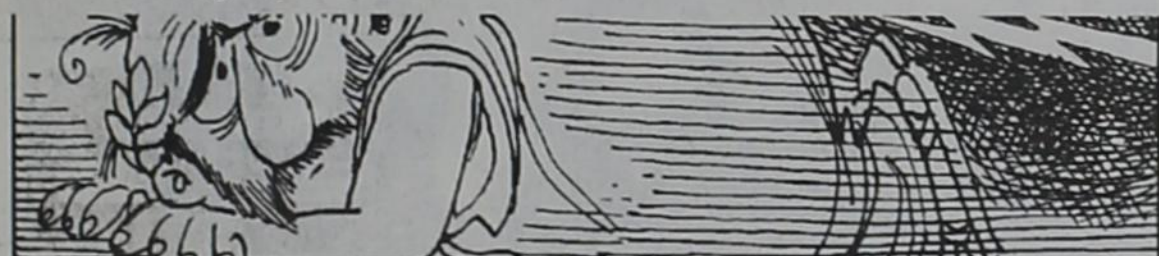

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission ("TNRCC") sets drinking water standards and has determined that the presence of microbiological contaminants are a health concern at certain levels of exposure. If water is inadequately treated, microbiological contaminants in that water may cause disease. Disease symptoms may include diarrhea, cramps, nausea, and possible jaundice, and any associated headaches and fatigue. These symptoms, however, are not just associated with disease-causing organisms in drinking water, but also may be caused by a number of factors other than your drinking water. The TNRCC has set enforceable requirements for treating drinking water to reduce the risk of these adverse health effects. Treatment such as filtering and disinfecting the water removes or destroys microbiological contaminants. Drinking water which is treated to meet the TNRCC requirements is associated with little to none of this risk and should be considered safe.

The Upper Leon River Municipal Water District failed to meet the minimum treatment technique requirements for the month of October, 2000. Specifically, Upper Leon River Municipal Water District allowed the turbidity of the filtered water to exceed .05 NTU in more than 5.0 percent of the measurements made during the month.

This notice is published as a requirement of the TNRCC. Treatment complications experienced at the Upper Leon River MWD Proctor Treatment Plant were determined to be algae related. With technical assistance from several outside sources, those complications that made this notice necessary were limited to parts of seven days between October 10th and 16th. ## Sonny Throckmorton To Sing At Sixth Cisco Writers Club Songwriters Showcase

One of the nation's hottest songwriters, Sonny Throckmorton, is to sing at the Sixth Cisco Writers Club Songwriters' Showcase Saturday, Nov. 18. It begins at 6 p.m. at the Corral Room, 400 Conrad Hilton.

Admission is free. Donations will benefit the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department Building Fund.

Throckmorton, son of a Pentecostal preacher, grew up in the western states. He graduated from school in Wichita Falls and studied engineering at Midwestern State University. He left, stumped by English, astounding his professor with, "I'm gonna be a songwriter."

"I believed I could do it," Sonny says, "but it took a lot longer than I expected." He moved to San Jose, Los Angeles, back to San Jose, then to Nashville, where he worked for several music publishers.

In 1966 his "How Long Has It Been" by Bobby Lewis hit the charts. Other Throckmorton tunes brought some recognition, but in 1975 Sonny became so discouraged he returned to Texas. There, away from country music's epicenter, he found renewal. He rejoined Tree Publishing in Nashville.

Eighteen number one hits followed: "Friday Night Blues," "I Feel Like Loving You Again," "I Had a Lovely Time," "I Wish I Was Eighteen Again," "I Wish You Could Have Turned My Head," "I'm Knee Deep in Loving You," "If We're Not Back in Love by Monday," "It's a Cheatin' Situation," "Last Cheater's Waltz," "Middle Aged Crazy," "She Can't Say That Anymore," "Smooth Sailing," "Thinking of a Rendezvous," "Trying to Love Two Women," "The Way I Am," "Why Not Me," "Stand Up," and "Where the Cowboy Rides Away."

Except for three weeks, Throckmorton had hits on the charts continuously from 1976 to 1980. For several weeks he had up to seven songs on the charts at once.

"I Wish I Was Eighteen Again" and "Middle Aged Crazy" became major motion pictures. Throckmorton has appeared on "20/20," "Austin City Limits," "Nashville Now," "The Mike Douglas Show," and road appearance with his band, the Pikeville Raiders.

Honors include Songwriter of the Year by the Nashville Songwriters Assn. Int'l in 1979 and 1980, 1977 Cashbox Songwriter of the Year, and 1980 D J's Songwriter of the Year. "It's a Cheatin' Situation," which Throckmorton co-wrote with Curly Putnam, won Song of the Year from the Academy of Country Music. "Why Not Me," by the Judds, did the same in 1985. In 1987 Sonny was inducted into the Nashville Songwriter Assn. Int'l Hall of Fame.

Sonny can again be found in Texas on his ranch near Brownwood. He performs at the Cisco Showcase with three longtime friends, songwriter/singer Rock Killough of Bangs, fiddler-to-the-stars Billy Graham, and guitarist Jimmy Boggs of Wichita Falls.

A songwriters' showcase offers a venue for songwriters to perform their original material. It creates networking opportunities for songwriters, singers and musicians. It is dynamic, refreshing entertainment, perhaps by emerging stars, that achieves a new level of energy with the presence of veterans like Throckmorton and Killough.

As we continue with, "What One Must Do To Have The Hope Of Eternal Life," we will continue with our study of repentance. What is repentance exactly? The Bible shows us that there are 6 aspects of Repentance. (1) **First**, there is a **RECOGNITION** of the fact that we have offended God. (2) **Secondly**, there is a **REMORSE / REGRET** because we have offended God and we are not right with Him. (3) **Thirdly**, there must be a **RESOLVE** (a change of mind). No longer will I allow sin to be my master, though from time to time I know that I will sin through ignorance and weakness. (4) **Fourthly**, there must be a **RETURN**. We must go back to the point where we got off track with God. In this fourth step of repentance we reestablish our relationship with God. Look at the lost son in Luke Chapter 15:11ff. He recognized his sin against his father, he regretted it, he decided to change his mind (stop sinning willfully) and in verse 20 it says, ".....he arose, and came [back] to his father." You see his father never left him - his father never went anywhere. It was the son who left the father. The same is true with us when we at one point in our lives "leave" our Heavenly Father through the age of accountability or the willful practice of sin. The point of step four in repentance is we must "come back" to God. Next week we will continue with our examination of Biblical repentance. But what about you, the reader? Are you a Christian? Are you a child of God? Have you repented? Have you obeyed God's Plan of Salvation? Have you obeyed the pure Gospel of Christ (2 Thess. 1:7-9)? Jesus said one must **HEAR** the word of God (John 5:24) and **BELIEVE** that Jesus is the Son of God (John 8:24). One must **REPENT** (Luke 13:3) and **CONFESS** that Jesus is the Son of God (Matt. 10:32-33). One must then submit to New Testament **WATER BAPTISM (IMMERSION)** for the washing of one's past sins by the blood of Christ (Mark 16:16; Acts 22:16; Rev. 1:5). One must then continue to **LIVE FAITHFULLY** and **IN OBEDIENCE** to God all of their life (Matt. 7:21-23; 10:22; Luke 6:46). If you haven't done these things you cannot go to Heaven according to Jesus. Have you obeyed the words of Jesus? Call or write us if we can help you in any way. Forming alliances, finding new markets and approaching new ideas with bravery and vigor is how we're working to make Texas a virtual brand name known across the globe.

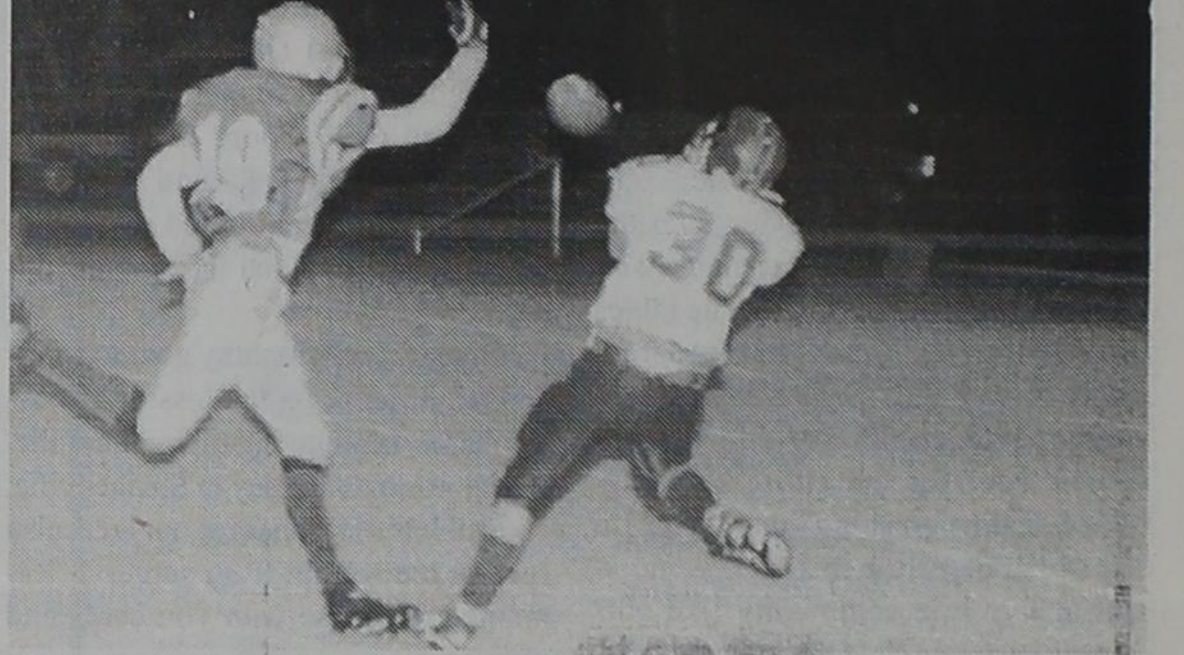
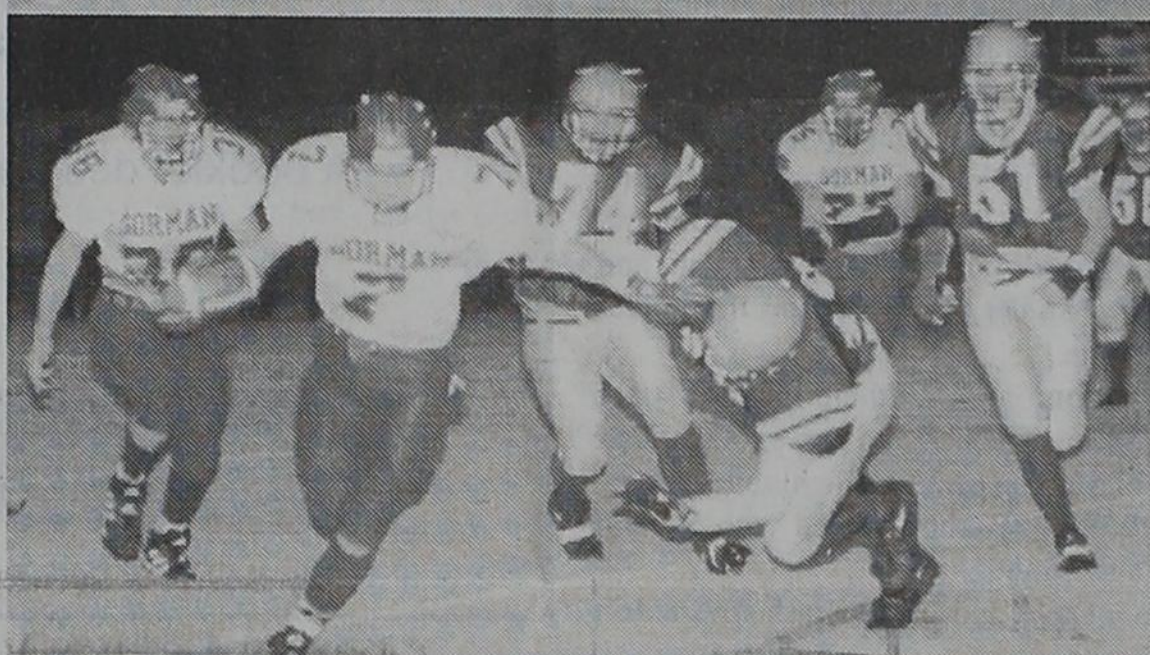
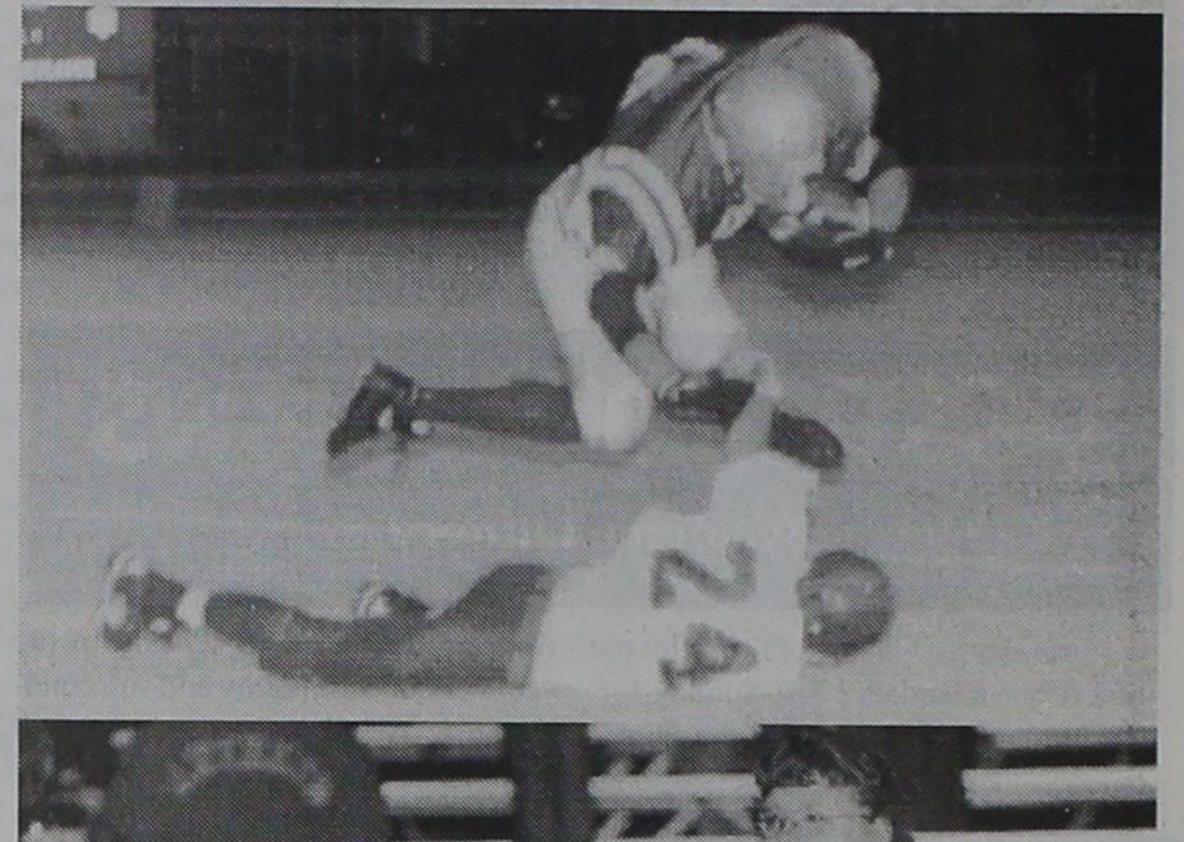
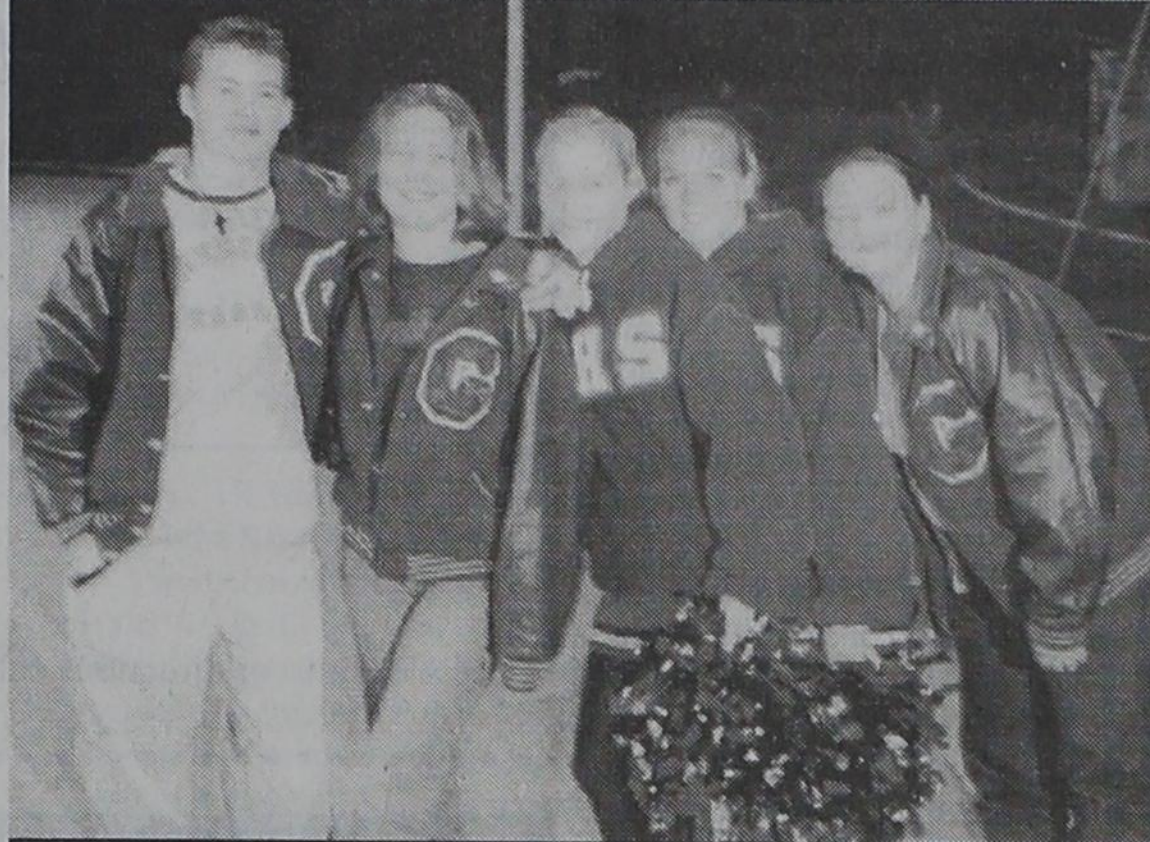
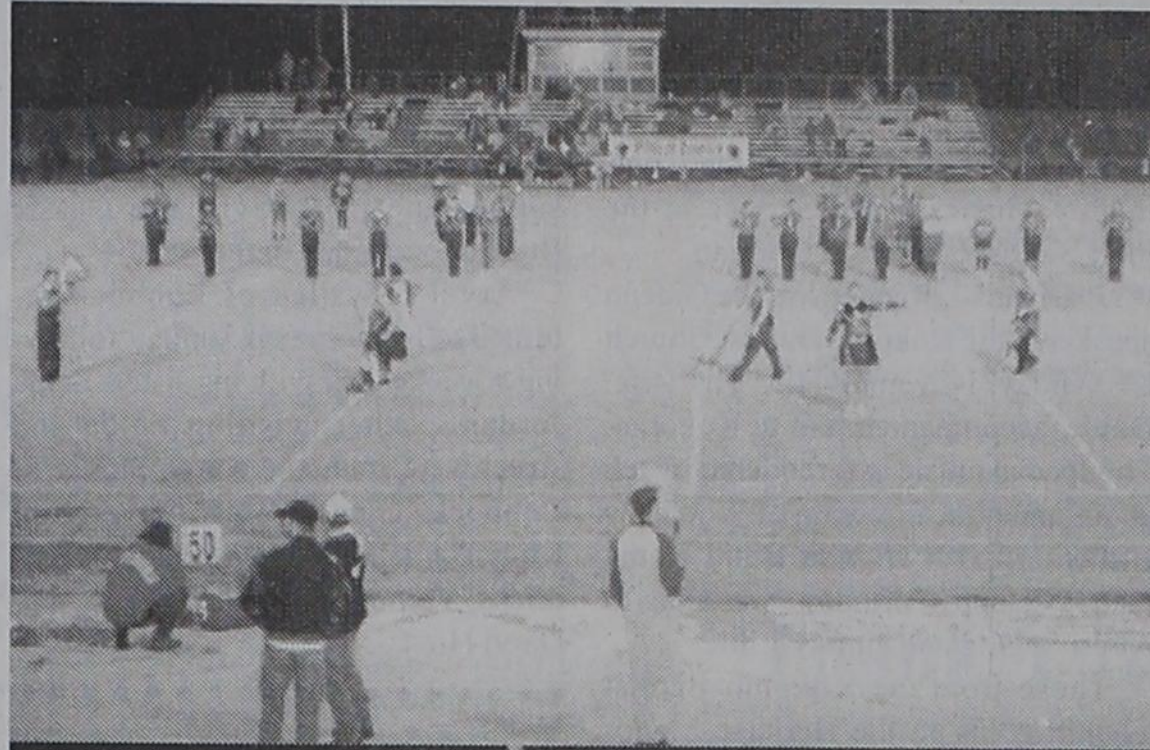

### PUC Tips

## Take steps to cut down on telemarketing calls

Tired of annoying telemarketing calls that interrupt you at home?

There are some things you should know that might help cut down on the number of telephone solicitations you receive.

There is certain information telemarketers must provide you - their name, the purpose of the call, the identity of the business on whose behalf they are calling and the telephone number at which the caller or the business can be reached.

You should obtain the name of the solicitor and the purpose of the call before providing any information to the caller. Most legitimate telemarketers will provide you with an address and phone number to contact them if you have questions.

Some telemarketing is done with an automatic dialing/announcing device (ADAD), which provides a recorded message. The machine must disconnect from your line within five seconds after termination of the call. If the device cannot disconnect within five seconds, a live operator must introduce the call and receive the consent of the customer before beginning the message.

Any recorded ADAD solicitation message must be shorter than 30 seconds or be able to recognize a customer's answering machine and terminate the call within 30 seconds.

Be very cautious about leaving your name and telephone number on the message portion of an automated solicitation call. It could lead to "cramming," having unauthorized services billed to your phone.

If you have Caller ID, you may be able to identify telemarketing calls and avoid answering. Telemarketers are prohibited from blocking their names and phone numbers from Caller ID devices.

Remember, telephone solicitors cannot call a residence before 9 a.m. or after 9 p.m. on weekdays and Saturdays, and before noon or after 9 p.m. on Sundays.

- Obtain the name of the solicitor and if possible, the phone number.
- Ask the solicitor to place you on the company's do not call list.
- If calls persist contact the PUC.

To file a telephone solicitation complaint or if you have other questions relating to your telephone or electric service, call the PUC toll free at 1-888-PUC-TIPS (1-888-782-8477).
