State Fire Marshall States Most Fires Occur In Homes

Destructive fire killed more than 165 Texans, injured at least 1,540 and damaged well over \$189 million in property last year, according to State Fire Marshall Ernest Emerson.

"Most of the fire-related deaths, injuries and dollar losses occurred in residences," said Emerson. "Negligence was the major contributing factor in the cause of these fires."

There were 17,274 structure fires reported last year. Nearly 75 per cent of those fires occurred in residences. The greatest percentage of residential fires (19 per cent) occurred when cooking was left unattended. Cooking-related fires were also responsible for the greatest number of injuries in residences. More than 74 per cent of all fire-related deaths occurred in residences.

"Most of the residential-fire deaths (23 per cent) occurred in fires where the cause was unknown," said Emerson. "Twenty-one per cent of the fire deaths were in fires caused by heating equipment. An additional twenty per cent of the fire deaths were in fires caused by careless smoking."

The greatest number of heating-related fires resulted when gas-fueled space heaters were placed too close to combustible wall coverings. . .

"But we have also learned that a number of fatal fires were caused

when heating equipment malfunctioned," Emerson said.

"For instance, water heaters were the second leading type of equipment involved in fatal residential fires. Forty-nine per cent of the water heater-related fires occurred when combustible materials were placed too close to the water heater. But 35 per cent of the fires occurred when the water heater malfunctioned, according to fire fighters at the scene of these fires," Emerson said.

Fire statistics are compiled by the State Board of Insurance, State Fire Marshal's Office on the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEX-FIRS). More than 260 fire departments protecting 45 per cent of the state population are currently reporting fires to the TEXFIRS.

"Fire departments are doing a brilliant job of supplying fire data to this system. For the first time in history, we are able to identify and analyse fire problems in Texas. Our understanding of these fire problems improves as more fire departments contribute to the system," Emerson concluded.

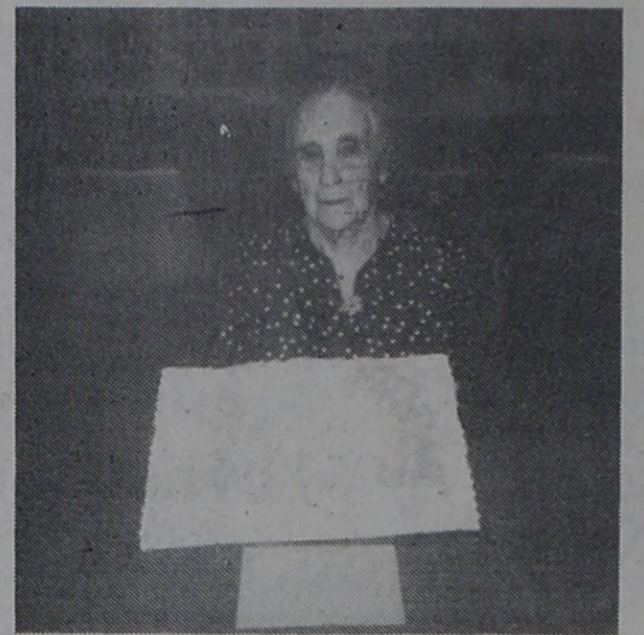

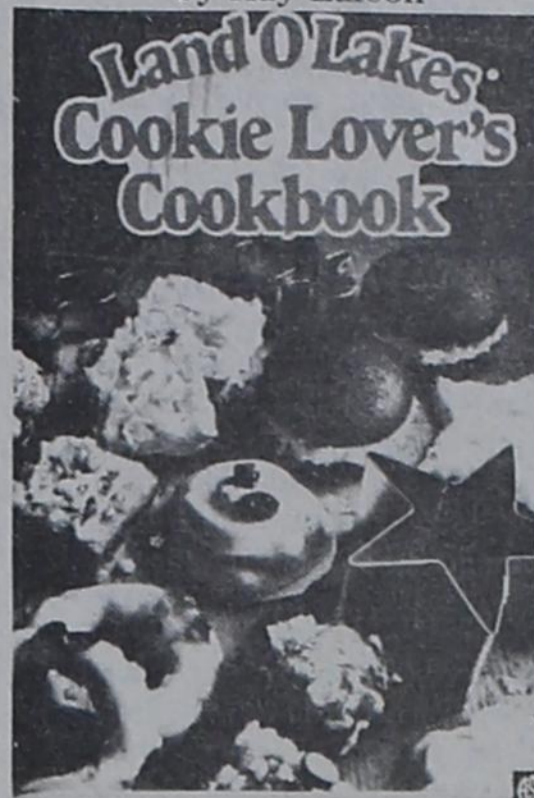
Her husband died May 6, 1960.

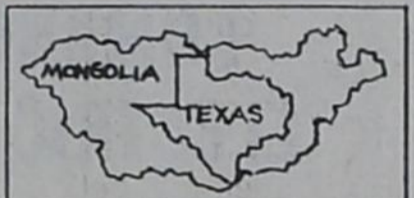

## Homemaking Hints

### County Extension Agent

This week, the Eastland County Program Building Executive Committee met. At this meeting, Bob Ingram, of Cisco; and M.H. Perry, of Eastland; informed the committee on the water supply of Lake Cisco and Lake Leon. As a result of the information heard, we all agreed that conserving water is a must.

Today, I am going to share with you some helpful information on water conservation in the home.

The bathroom is the smallest room in the home, but almost 75 percent of the water is used in a home is used there, mostly for flushing toilets. In fact, about 45 percent of the water used in homes is used to flush toilets.

A leaky toilet can be one of the biggest water wasters in the home. Wasting about 200 gallons of water a day. If you have to jiggle the handle of a toilet to get it to stop making noise, that's one sign of a leaky toilet. Although some leaking toilets may make a hissing sound after the bowl has filled with water, not all leaks give such obvious clues. There are a few simple tests which you can perform, however, which can help

you determine if your toilet is wasting water.

First, make sure there are no wastes in the toilet bowl. Then remove the cover of the toilet tank and put a few drops of food coloring or a dye capsule into the tank to color the water. After waiting 15 minutes, check the water in the toilet bowl. If the color shows up in the bowl and the toilet has not been flushed in that time, you have a leak to repair.

There are several possible causes for the leak. Normally, the water level in a toilet tank should be between 1/2 inch and one inch below the top of the overflow pipe. However, if the water level is at or about the top of the pipe, water will pour into the toilet bowl and go down the drain. Carefully bending the float arm down slightly should correct this problem.

If that doesn't help, the problem may be that the flush ball is not fitting correctly in the valve seat. Lining the guide wires up better may stop the leak. If not, a new flush ball or flapper assembly can be purchased for only a few dollars.

Even if the water in the bowl doesn't change color in the previous

test, you may have a leak.

To find out, flush the toilet and then wait about ten minutes. Then look in the tank to see if water is still flowing from the refill tube into the overflow pipe. This also indicates a leak.

Sometimes it is the flat that is causing the leak. Unscrew the flat and shake it. If you hear water inside, this indicates that the flat needs to be replaced.

You might want to investigate some of the new flushing equipment on the market which eliminates the flat and ball cock assembly. Because it is made of plastic, it is long-lasting. Some models are even useful in detecting leaks because they make a special sound indicating a leak.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

When some cooks shy away from kitchen heat in August, you can cook and stay cool with our microwave Blackberry Jam Bars.

**BLACKBERRY JAM BARS**  
 1/4 cup plus 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, softened  
 1/2 cup firmly packed brown sugar  
 1 cup all-purpose flour  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1/4 teaspoon baking soda  
 1 cup quick-cooking oats, uncooked  
 1/4 cup blackberry jam

Cream butter; gradually add sugar, beating well. Combine flour, salt and soda; add to creamed mixture, mixing well. Stir in oats.

Press half of mixture into a ungreased 8 inch square baking dish. Shield corners of dish with triangles of foil, keeping foil smooth and close to dish. Microwave at Medium (50% power) for 6 to 7 minutes or until firm, rotating the dish one quarter-turn at 2 minute intervals. Top with jam, spreading to within 1/4 inch of edge. Press remaining crumb mixture on top.

Microwave, with edges shielded, at Medium for 11 to 13 minutes or until firm, rotating dish one quarter-turn at 2 minute intervals. (Do not overcook; mixture will firm up as it cools.) Cool and cut into bars. Yield: about 2 dozen.

## CAFFEINE SHOWN TO BOOST ANALGESIC EFFICIACY

Caffeine has been added to aspirin, phenacetin, acetaminophen, and salicylamide in various dosage combinations for years, yet there has been little documented evidence to show that the practice adds to the analgesic efficacy of the combinations. Recently, however, 10 clinical studies involving more than 10,000 patients conducted during the last 20 years were analyzed to assess the efficacy of caffeine as an analgesic adjuvant (JAMA 251:1711, 1984). Although most studies included pa-

tients with postpartum uterine cramping or episiotomy pain, some involved patients with pain from oral surgery or headache.

In 21 of 26 studies, the relative potency estimates of an analgesic with caffeine was greater than an analgesic without caffeine. The pooled relative potency estimates in each of several major categories of combination analgesics were also significantly greater. The data show that to obtain the same amount of response from an analgesic without caffeine requires a dose that is approximately 40% greater than one with caffeine.

The authors suggest that it seems reasonable to conclude that the addition of caffeine, 65 mg, to an analgesic tablet taken in a two-tablet dose results in a more effective analgesic. Mood enhancement may result as well. For many patients, this could be of considerable clinical importance. Therefore, it seems a caffeine-containing analgesic provides an important therapeutic option for treating the patient with pain.

The concert will be held at Chesley Field in Cisco and will begin at 7:30 in the evening. There will be no charge for admission however a free will offering will be received.

Vivacious and versatile - talented and terrific - are the adjectives to describe the artistry of Wanda Jackson. Wanda, who became a veteran star of Country Music in a relatively short time, has been singing and entertaining fans of Country Music throughout the United States, Canada -- even around the world -- since her early teens.

A native of Oklahoma, Wanda's talents were discovered by another great entertainer from the Southwest, Hank Thompson. Wanda confesses that much of the stage presence and technique that she possesses was learned from Thompson when she appeared on many shows with him after first entering her career. Wanda has consistently been a best seller for Capitol Records and has thrilled millions of fans throughout the world in her personal appearances.

Aside from being a great favorite at country music shows, fairs, rodeos, and all types of presentations all across the United States and Canada, Wanda is one of the few country music artists who has been so talented as to record her songs in the languages of both Germany and Japan. In 1971 and 1972 she was voted "THE FAVORITE FEMALE COUNTRY MUSIC SINGER" of the Scandinavian countries - Norway, Sweden, Denmark, etc., and just a few years before had received a tremendous reception from country music fans in Japan, Philippines, Korea and the Far East. In 1972 Wanda was chosen as one of the country music stars to make the first U.N./CMA sponsored tour of Australia, New Zealand and Japan, where a triumphant reception was received. Wanda has been nominated for the Grammy Award for BEST FEMALE PERFORMER twice.

In real life, Wanda is a devoted Christian and lives happily with her husband and manager Wendell Goodman and their children in Oklahoma City. ### WTCC OPPOSES RECONTROL EFFORTS

Strong opposition to the proposed "Natural Gas Market Policy Act of 1984" has been voiced by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Also known as the House Energy and Commerce Committee Natural Gas Bill, H.R. 4277 is an attempt to "recontrol" the natural gas industry, according to the WTCC.

"By imposing a two-year price freeze on all price escalator clauses in the gas decontrolled on January 1, 1985 and July 1, 1987, the measure effectively reimposes price controls on categories of gas decontrolled by the Natural Gas Policy Act" said Dan Mendell, III, of Midland. Mendell chairs the chamber's Mineral Resources Committee.

"In addition," continued Mendell, "these provisions overturn clauses in thousands of existing gas sales contracts, resulting in changes to all parties involved and uncertainty as to the price paid for almost 50% of the nation's gas supply."

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce maintained that other provisions in H.R. 4277, such as take or pay and contract carriage, would also cause unnecessary stumbling blocks to energy producers and transporters.

"With a fragile recovery now underway among oil and gas companies, any new taxes or roadblocks would be very detrimental for the industries and extremely bad timing for the West Texas economy," concluded Mendell.

### STENHOLM NAMED SUBCOMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

The House Small Business Committee Chairman announced today that Congressman Charles W. Stenholm has been named chairman of the Subcommittee on Energy, Environment and Safety Issues Affecting Small Business. Chairman Parren J. Mitchell (D-Md) said the vote by the full House committee for Stenholm was unanimous.

Stenholm, a third-term representative, said he believes the chairman's seat will be a boost to all small business people in the 17th District.

"Being named chairman of a House subcommittee will allow me to have a more positive impact on legislative issues of great interest to the small business community, not only in the 17th District and Texas, but in the nation as a whole," the Stamford Democrat said.

"Given the fact that over 13.7 percent of the 17th District is selfemployed, this leadership position will be very valuable," the 45-year-old congressman said. "We have almost twice as many self-employed people in our district as the national average. The input that comes from our business community will be very helpful in all areas of legislation viewed by the subcommittee."

### TIPS GIVEN TO CONSERVE WATER

About 75 percent of the water used in the home is used in the bathroom. The West Texas Chamber of Commerce lists the following ways that water use can be decreased and your water bill reduced without any great sacrifice:

1. Repeating leaky faucets can result in large water savings. A slow drip can waste as much as 170 gallons each day, or 5,000 gallons per month. Repairing a faucet which leaks a small drop can save you \$10.00 or more per month on your water bill.
2. Your toilets may be leaking and need repairs and you may not know it. Add a few drops of food coloring in the storage reservoir. If the colored water moves into the toilet bowl between flushings, you will know you have a leak. Repairing a leaking toilet can result in a decrease in water use and a savings of several dollars a month on your water bill.
3. Using the toilet as a trash disposal for facial tissue and other trash results in many unnecessary flushes. Each time you dispose of trash in a trash basket instead of flushing the commode, you save 5 gallons or more of water. Three or four unnecessary flushes per day would result in a waste of 400 to 500 gallons of water per month.
4. Bathing in the shower instead of the bathtub will reduce water use by 5 to 10 gallons.
5. Shampooing your hair while taking a shower will require only a little more water than a normal shower and save the 10 to 20 gallons of water normally used in a separate shampoo.
6. Ponding water in the basin for handwashing or shaving instead of letting the faucet run will reduce water use for these activities by about half.
7. When brushing your teeth, turn tee," Stenholm said.

"The major areas of concern are, of course, energy issues, environmental issues and concerns for the safety of small business people and their employees," he said. "Since Texas is at once both an energy and environmental state, any legislation in these areas will have a vital impact on our district and the state."

Stenholm said, "This chairmanship will give me a clear position to use my knowledge from Texas business people and positively affect the small business concerns of the nation as well."

the water faucet on only when you need to rinse your toothbrush, rinse your mouth or clean the sink rather than letting the water run continuously. This will decrease water use during this activity by almost two-thirds for most folks.

Ten to twelve percent of in-home water use takes place in the kitchen.

8. Running water from the tap until it is cook enough to drink is probably the easiest waste habit to break. This can be done by storing water for drinking in the refrigerator. If you have problems remembering, tie a colored ribbon on the faucet to remind you of the nice cool water in the refrigerator.

dishes before using your automatic dishwasher. Not only will you save water, but you will save expensive detergent and energy.

10. The washing machine constitutes from 12 to 14 percent of in-home water use. Automatic washing machines use 30 to 60 gallons per load, so it is important to wash full loads to obtain maximum benefits from your water, energy and detergent.

If you implement a good water conservation program in your home but still find your water consumption is high, you might have a water leak between your meter and the house. It is easy to check. Turn off all faucets, indoors and out, and then check your water meter. If it continues to run, you have a leak and need to have it repaired.

"My staff will be there mostly to listen," Stenholm said. "They'll try to give producers some insight into what's going on in Washington, but the main purpose of the workshop is to get people's ideas on what should be in the new farm legislation congress will write next year."

Every four years, Congress reauthorizes and revises the nation's farm programs. The last overall farm bill was written in 1981, and it is widely believed to be a failure.

"We've got to do a better job this time," Stenholm said. "What's needed is an environment in which profits can return to agriculture."

Stenholm, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, has taken a strong interest in the upcoming farm bill. In addition to his regular trips to his home district to discuss agriculture, the Stamford Democrat has participated in Congressional farm policy hearings in California and North Carolina during the past month. He was a featured speaker on farm policy at the National Conference of State Legislatures in Boston July 23.

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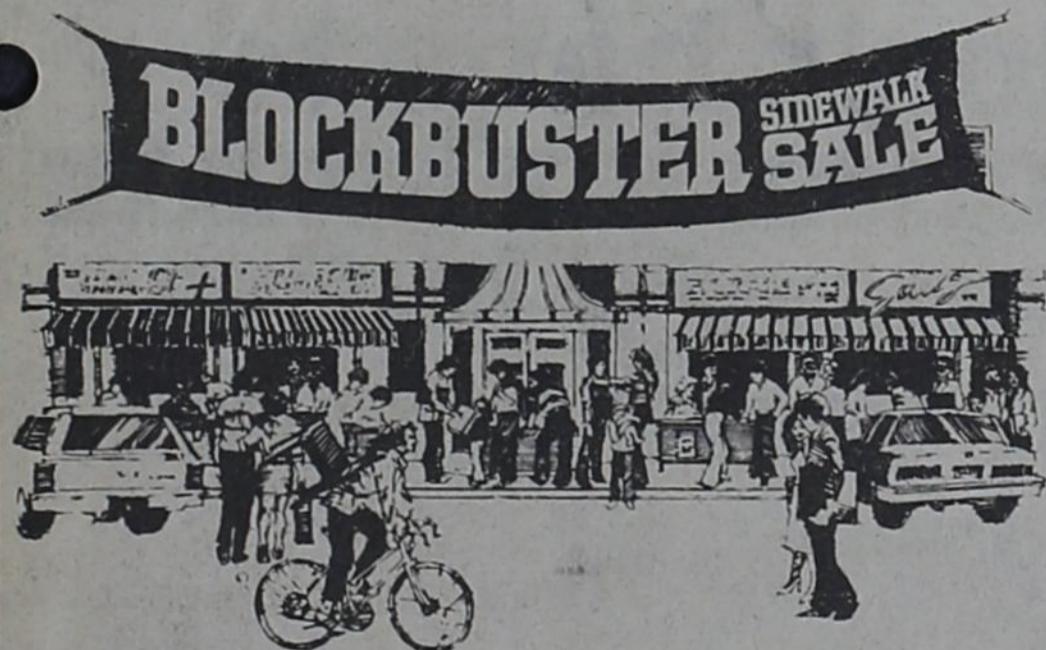
