Grand Jury Writes Letter Concerning D.W.I. Law

At the conclusion of the Eastland County Grand Jury session this week, the members thereof discussed the current DWI law and the apparent leniency of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles. The Grand Jurors expressed concern that the DWI law provides a maximum confinement in the penitentiary of only five years regardless of how many times a person is convicted of a DWI offense. They were also concerned about the leniency of the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles, for example, in allowing and authorizing the release of persons from prison after such person have served only 6 to 8 months on a three year sentence.

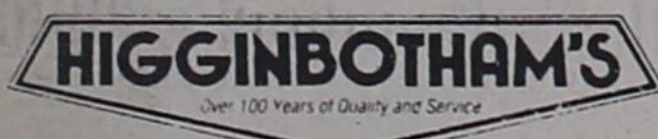


