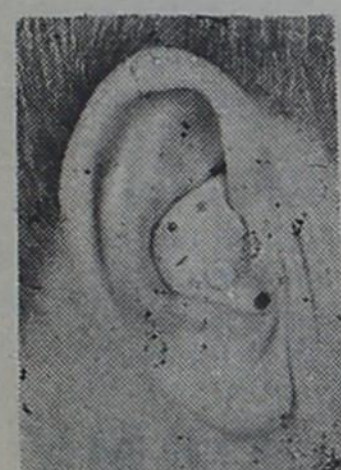

## TSTA SUPPORTS THESE PROVISIONS IN HOUSE BILL 72

1. The bill provides equalization aid for property-poor districts.
2. The bill reduces class size by setting a maximum of 22 students per classroom in kindergarten through second grade beginning in 1985-86 and in kindergarten through fourth grade beginning in 1988-89.
3. Provides pre-school, summer school, and extended days for children with limited English proficiency.

6. The bill recaptures the school day by limiting non-emergency interruptions of instruction.

9. The bill requires passage of an examination in order to receive a high school diploma.
10. Creates scholarship and student loan programs to encourage young people to enter teacher training institutions and assists practicing teachers in obtaining retraining in critical shortage areas.
11. The bill requires regular, formal evaluation of teachers and administrators through a comprehensive appraisal process.
12. Provides protection for school districts against tax rollback elections.
13. Creates a discipline management program that every district must utilize.
14. The bill tightens standards for teacher training institutions.

## Social Security Direct Deposit Is Very Popular

A growing number of Social Security beneficiaries are discovering the advantages of direct deposit.

### SSI Reporting Instructions

This is a special reminder to persons receiving supplemental security income (SSI) checks. A change in your monthly income or your address may affect the amount of your SSI check. These changes must be promptly reported to the Social Security office by telephone (698-1360) or in person at our office located at 142 S. Pioneer in Abilene.

Other events that must be reported include marriage, divorce, death and changes in the number of people who live in your household. If you own checking or savings accounts and the balance added together exceeds \$1,500 (\$2,250 for a couple) on the first day of any month, you should report this immediately.

Prompt reporting of changes will help us pay you the correct amount of SSI and prevent underpayments or overpayments. Failure to promptly report changes may result in a penalty deduction of \$25 from your next SSI check.

Over 38 percent of them were having their checks sent directly to a bank or other financial institution at the start of 1984, compared with 23 percent only 5 years earlier.

Why is direct deposit so popular? Here are some reasons beneficiaries give:

**It's safe** - There's less worry about muggers and mailbox thieves.

**It's convenient** - There's no line to stand in to cash the check. The money is in the bank to draw out when it's most convenient for you.

**It saves money** - You save gas money (and parking fees) by not having to go out to cash the check. And the Government spends less on issuing checks which means more money is available for other benefits and services.

If you're now getting Social Security or supplemental security income (SSI) benefits and want direct deposit, here's what you should do: Ask at your financial institution for form SF-1199 and complete it.

Even though benefits no longer come where you live, you still must notify Social Security promptly if you change your address. This is because important information is mailed directly to you from time to time.

Should you decide to close your account where you have direct deposit, notify Social Security right away where you want your benefits sent. This will reduce the chance of a delay in payment during the change-over.

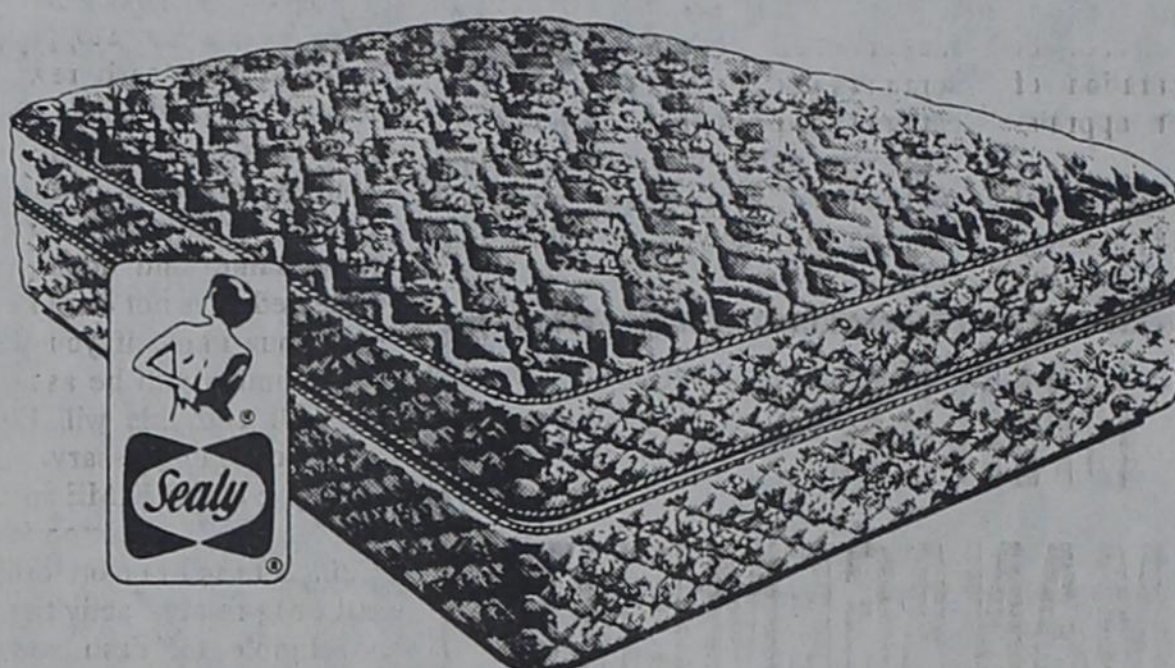

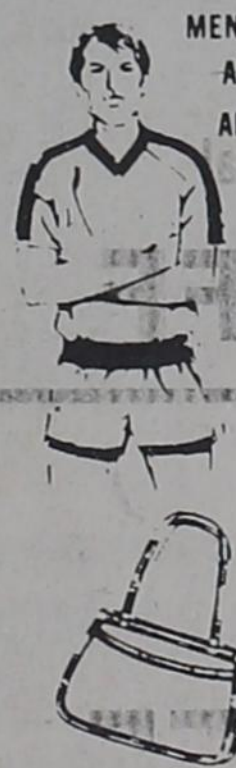
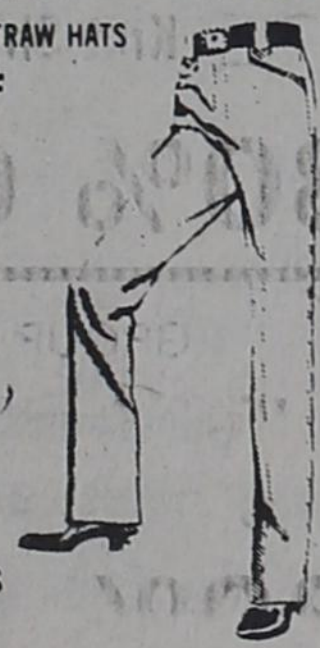

**GRASS POISONING**  
 Cattleman should be alert to the danger of prussic acid poison in Johnson grass, sudan grass, and hybrid sorghum grasses warns Extension Agent DeMarquis Gordon.  
 Several cases of poisoning and some deaths have been reported in Eastland County in recent days. These have been caused by prussic acid in grasses.  
 Care should be taken when grazing livestock on these type of grasses. The agent says the poisonous material is increased following a time of wilting caused by a drought. The most dangerous time is when new sprouts begin to form on a stressed plant following a rainy period. This dangerous period usually last for about 10 days following a rain. If prussic acid is present in the forage when hay is cut and baled, it will remain in the hay for up to two months.  
 Gordon says a veterinarian should be called as early as possible and told what to expect so he can bring an antidote for the poison. Cattleman can also prepare for an emergency by having several bottles of antidote on hand. The veterinarian can provide cattleman with the proper antidote and instructions in its use.

 1. Don't turn cattle into new pastures that might contain even a little Johnson grass or sorghum for the next week.  
 2. Don't pull cattle off pastures they are now grazing, even overnight unless you have lost some cattle in that pasture.  
 3. Don't graze new second-growth that springs up after cutting for hay until plants are 18 inches tall.  
 4. Cattle are less likely to be poisoned by prussic acid if they are filled with hay before being turned into potentially dangerous fields or pastures.  
 5. Don't feed new cut hay until it is well cured. Wait three days after cutting before baling and don't feed hay for one month after baling.  
 6. When you do turn cattle into new pastures first turn in one or two less valuable animals and observe for 24 hours before turning rest of herd into pasture.
