On Behalf of the Texas Organ Sharing Alliance, I would like to extend my sincere condolences on the death of your son, Anthony. I hope that it is comforting to know that lives have been saved by your generosity. At this time, I would like to share some information about the transplant recipi-

Anthony's heart was successfully transplanted into a 60-year old gentleman from west Texas. He had been hospitalized awaiting a transplant since March of this year. Married and father of 3 boys and 1 girl, he is looking forward to returning to work at this family's hardware store.

You will recall that a young boy had been identified as the primary recipient of Anthony's liver and one of his kidney's. I am very pleased to share with you and your family that though gravely ill, following the transplant operation, the child awoke and is doing extremely well. He is expected to make a full recovery and return home very soon.

Anthony's left kidney was successfully transplanted in to a 61-year old lady from south Texas who's kidneys had ceased to function due to the long-term effects of diabetes. Married and the mother of 4, she is doing very well and is expected to also make a full recovery.

I would again like to express my sympathy, and gratitude on behalf of these recipients and their families. I know that words cannot eliminate the pain that you and your family must feel, but I hope that in the months ahead you will gain some comfort in knowing Continued On Page Two

The Gorman Panthers lost their home opener on Friday night when they were overwhelmed by a very strong Menard team. They trailed 19-0 at the end of the first quarter, then 26-0 at halftime. The Yellowjackets added 14 in the third and 7 in the final period for a 47-0 victory.

The Jackets took the opening kickoff on the Gorman 41 and scored in just three plays. The first play covered 17 yards and the second got 23 before R. J. Ramon got the TD from 1 yard out with 11:13 left in the period. The kick try failed and Menard was up 6-0.

After holding the Panthers on their first possession the Jackets took the ball on their own 27 and went the distance in 7 plays with Matt Williamson getting the final 56 yards on a run with 6:36 left. A pass try for 2 points failed and the score was 12-

On their third possession the Jackets took the ball on their own 41 and scored in one big play following penalties on both teams when Michael Sockwell caught a 59 yard pass from Adam Rieck for the score with 3:30 left in the second. Caleb Slaughter booted the point after and Menard was up 19-

Then just as time was running out in the first half the Jackets got another score when Brady Deaver got the final 1 yard on a keeper play. The Jacks has gotten the ball on the Gorman 37 after an interception. Slaughter added the point after and the half ended of Stage 1 of the Drought Contingency Plan. with Menard up 26-0.

Both bands performed routines at the intermission and received big ovations from the fans.

Following the intermission the Panthers got the ball on their own 32 but fumbled and the Jackets got the ball on the Gorman 25. Just as the third quarter was nearing an end the Jackets scored again with Jermiah Guerero running in for the TD with 1:47 left in the period. Slaughter booted the point after and Menard was up 40-0. The final Jacket score came with 4:59 left in the game when Menard got the ball on the Gorman 49 and scored in 8 plays with Health Cory getting the final 2 yards on a run. Slaughter added the point after and the final score was 47-0.

Jacob McCullough led the Panthers on the ground with 31 yards on 9 tries. Ben Longoria had 29 on 11 carries. Michael Lynch got 21 on 5 tries. Josh Longoria had 11 on 9 tries. David Seaton got 7 on 3 carries and Brian Hunt ran two times for 3 yards. Williamson led Menard with 145 yards on 6 carries.

The Mayor and City Commission would like to inform the Citizens of Gorman that we are initiating Stage 1 of the Drought Contingency Plan. Please read the information provided so that you will understand what Stage 1 refers to. This is somewhat voluntary on behalf of us and our citizens. We will appreciate your cooperation.

Stage 1 Triggers -- MILD Water Shortage Conditions - Requirements for Initiation - Customers shall be requested to voluntarily conserve water and adhere to the prescribed restrictions on certain water uses, defined in Section VII - Definitions, when notification is received from Upper Leon Municipal Water District, requesting initiation

Section VII: Definitions -- For the purposes of this Plan, the following definitions shall apply: Aesthetic water use: water use for ornamental or decorative purposes such as fountains, reflecting pools, and water gardens. Commercial and institutional water use; water use which is integral to the operations of commercial and non-profit establishments and governmental entities such as retail establishments, hotels and motels, restaurants, and office buildings. Conservation: those practices, techniques, and technologies that reduce the consumption of water, reduce the loss or waste of water, improve the efficiency in the Continued on Page Four

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

use of water or increase the recycling and reuse of water so that a supply in conserved and made available for future or alternative uses. <u>Customer:</u> any person, wholesale water customer, company, or organization using water supplied by the City of Gorman. Domestic water use: water use for personal needs or for household or sanitary purposes such as drinking, bathing, heating, cooking, sanitation, or for cleaning a residence, business, industry or institution. Drip Irrigation: soaker hoses. Even number addresses: street addresses, box numbers, or rural postal route numbers ending in 0, 2, 4, 6, 8 and locations without addresses. Industrial water use: the use of water in processes designed to convert materials of lower value. Landscape irrigation use: water used for the irrigation and maintenance of landscaped areas, whether publicly or privately owned, including residential and commercial lawns, gardens, golf courses, parks, and rights-of-way and medians. Non-essential water use: water uses that are not essential nor required for the protection of public, health, safety, and welfare, including:

(a) irrigation of landscape areas, including parks, athletic fields, and golf courses, except otherwise provided under this Plan;

(b) use of water to wash any motor vehicle, motorbike, boat, trailer, airplane or other vehicle;

(c) use of water to wash down any sidewalks, walkways. driveways, parking lots, tennis courts, or other hard-surfaced areas;

(d) use of water to wash down buildings or structures

for purposes other than immediate fire protection; (e) flushing gutters or permitting water to run or accu-

mulate in any gutter or street;

(f) use of water to fill, refill, or add to any indoor or outdoor swimming pools or jacuzzi-type pools;

(g) use of water in a fountain or pond for aesthetic or scenic purposes except where necessary to support aquatic life;

(h) failure to repair a controllable leak(s) within a reasonable period after having been given notice directing the repair of such leak(s); and

(i) use of water from hydrants for construction purposes or any other purposes other than fire fighting. Odd numbered addresses: street addresses, box numbers, or rural postal route numbers ending in 1, 3, 5, 7, or 9.

Funds Awarded to School Library

Austin-A school library is typically a place where students can find vast amounts of information through various resources. Individual schools obviously have different books, periodicals, and ways to find additional information, but now public school libraries are receiving the opportunity to get connected. The Gorman I.S.D. school libraries are enhancing the way information can be gathered thanks to the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund (TIF) Board, a state agency in Austin. Maxfield Elementary campus library will receive \$35,000 in order to increase the technology infrastructure to support the Texas Library Connection (TLC). The High School will also receive \$35,000.

What is the TLC? It is an on-line resource that promotes the sharing of current, relevant information. The TLC provides an integrated, statewide resource sharing system through which information resources are identified, accessed, and retrieved. The TLC contains merged records of more than 44 million items from approximately 4200 campus libraries that are already online and subscribing. It also provides these school libraries with on-line resources such as Britannica Online, ProQuest Direct, and governmental documents.

The Non-Competitive Public School Library Grant (LBS) reaches out to more than 200 public school campus libraries throughout the state of Texas. Some of these school libraries die not have Internet connectivity in the library, some did not have an adequate Internet connection or very few student workstations, and some did not have a library automation system, but regardless of the reason, these school libraries did not and could not have access to the TLC without the proper technology. TIF grant funds will help these public school libraries achieve the standard for high-speed connectivity and purchase the equipment necessary in order for the students and faculty to be able to take advantage of the available TLC resources These grant projects officially begin October 2, 2000.

"The grant funds will help immensely," said Gene Shackelford. "The school library should be able to accommodate a valuable resource such as the Texas Library Connection so that our students have access to the most information possible. This grant will allow us to purchase the equipment necessary to get connected and allow our students that very opportunity."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, TIF has awarded approximately \$487 million in telecommunications infrastructure grants to its four constituents--public schools, libraries, institutions of higher education, and public, not-for-profit healthcare facilities. The agency receives approximately \$150 million per year in revenues from telecommunications assessments to disburse over a ten-year period.

3/4 tsp. salt

1/4 C. oil

Dissolve yeast in warm water, add warm milk, salt and oil. Pour yeast mixture into 2 1/2 C. flour, mix 3-5 minutes. Knead on floured board. Place dough in greased bowl, let rise to double in size. Knead on floured board again. roll out thin. Cover thin dough with thin layer of butter. Sprinkle with 1/4 C. sugar and 3/4 tsp. cinnamon. Drop small spoonfuls of crunchy peanut butter on top of cinnamon. Roll into log, seal top and ends. Use waxed dental floss to cut into 1/2 in. slices. Place in greased pan. Let rise 1 hr. and 15 min. Bake at 375 degrees for 15 minutes.
