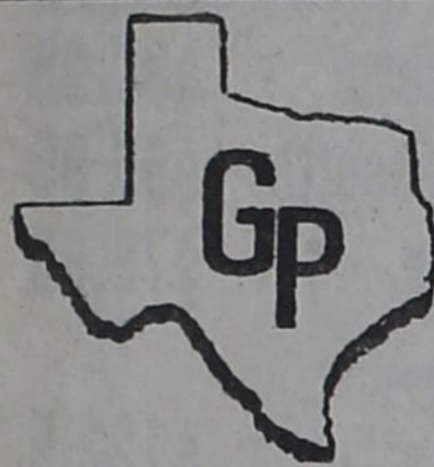

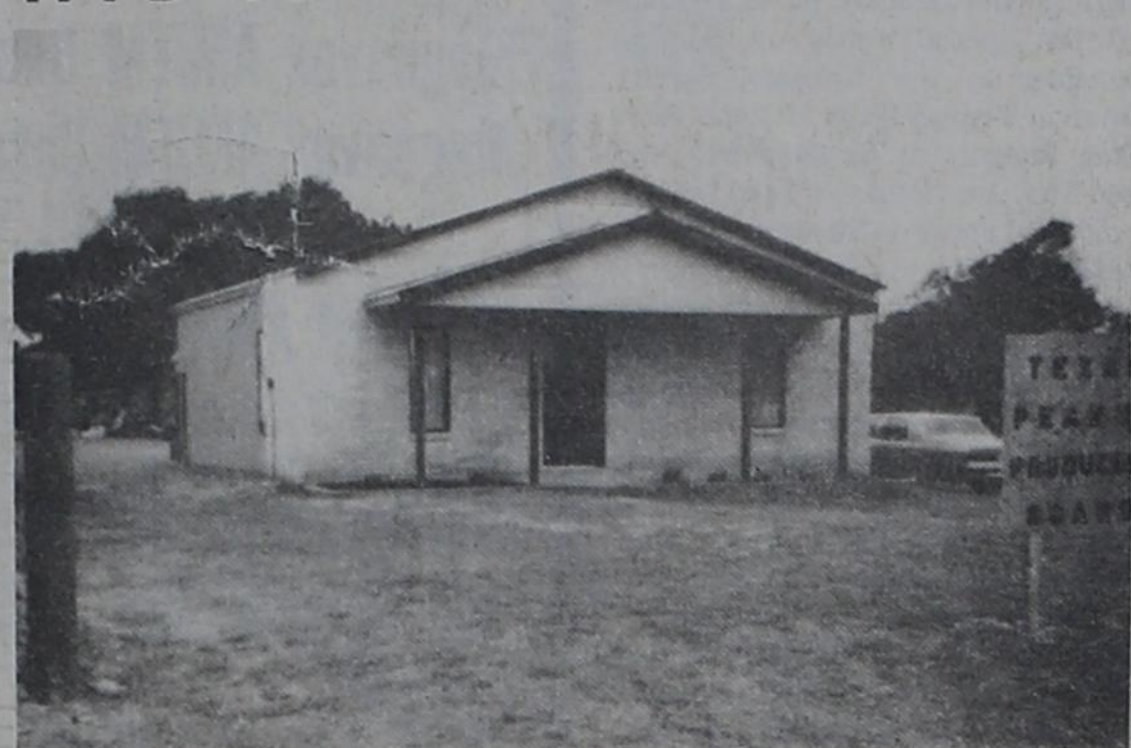

TPPB OPEN HOUSE TODAY — The new building of the Texas Peanut Producers Board will be dedicated today, Thursday at an open house from 2 to 4 p.m. Texas Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower will be the guest of honor at the event. He will be available for questions from 2 to 3 p.m.

A hand-painted plate depicting the history of peanut production will be given away as a door prize. The Board of Directors and Mary Webb, executive secretary invites everyone to attend.

The peanut farmers in this area are beginning to dig their peanuts in preparation of harvesting the crops. Some of the peanuts are dyeing due to disease and some are not turning out as well as first anticipated, due in part, to too much moisture at certain times. However, overall, the peanut crop in this area should be pretty good this season.

There were 21 combines at the "neighbors and friends threshing day" at the Cecil Self farm just out of Carbon on Friday. It was wet and the combines wouldn't work properly until about 5 p. m. and then the volunteers got to work and got the crop in by 8:10 p. m. This was a marvelous thing to do for Cecil and Christine.

PANTHERS LOSE TO SANTO 33-12; HOST RISING STAR FRIDAY NIGHT

The Gorman Panthers traveled to Santo on Friday night to take on the tough, unbeaten Wildcats, and after the dust had cleared following the game, the Wildcats were still undefeated as the very strong, large team rolled over the Panthers by the score of 33 to 12. The Wildcats had one of the best running attacks that we have seen in a long time. Their heavy front line did some tremendous blocking and the runners had a great night.

The Wildcats got on the board first with 8:20 left in the first period when Kelly Dennis raced 44 yards untouched for the score after the Wildcats had recovered a Panther fumble on the Wildcat 47. The kick failed and the score was 6-0.

The Wildcats came right back on their next possession and scored again with 2:10 left in the period with

Thomas Montelongo going the final yard for the score. Montelongo kicked the PAT and the score was 13-0.

The Cats scored again with 8:04 left in the second period with Montelongo going 3 yards for the score. The drive covered 60 yards in 11 plays. Robert Poe kicked the PAT and the score rose to 20 to 0.

The Panthers managed to score with just 32 seconds left in the half, taking the ball on their own 49 and going the distance in 14 plays with Glen Burgess catching a 5 yard pass for the score. The run for two points failed and Santo held a 20 to 6 lead at halftime.

The second half was played on more even terms as the Panthers held the Wildcats out of the end zone until 2:09 of the third period. The Wildcats took the ball on their own 38 and marched the distance in just 2 plays as the first play netted 54 yards before Montelongo went the final 3 for the score. The run for points failed and the score was 26 to 6.

The Panthers mustered another drive with 3:23 left in the game when Don Rodgers caught a 4 yard pass for the score from Gressett. Again the run for points failed and Santo lead 26 to 12.

The Wildcats hit the scoreboard again with 1:27 left in the game

when Adam Toppowell ran in from 3 yards out for the score. Montelongo kicked the PAT and the final score was 33 to 12.

This was a long night for the outweighed and outmanned Panthers. The heavy line really opened up the holes for the Wildcat runners. The blocking was extra sharp. The outweighed Big Red defense just simply couldn't stay with the stronger Wildcats.

Glen Burgess led the Panthers with 54 yards on 16 carries. He also caught some great passes. Randall Gibbs had 47 yards on 9 tries. David Gibbs got 24 yards on 11 carries, and Scott Gressett had 15 yards on 5 keepers.

The Big Red will play their first home game of the season this Friday night when they host the Rising Star Wildcats in a District 8A contest at Brogdon Field at 7:30. The Wildcats have a much improved team this season and played the Santo Wildcats a closer game than the Panthers on September 19th. The Big Red will really have to work together for a victory in this game and will be trying to rebound after the loss to Santo. The Panthers have been working real hard this week in preparation for the game.

Cross Plains Paint and Palette Club to Host Annual Art Show

The Cross Plains Paint and Palette Club will host its 13th annual art show Friday, October 31, through Sunday, November 2, at the Cross Plains Community Center, Beech Street.

Registration will be from 2-6 p.m. Friday, and the show will be open to the public from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and 1-3:30 p.m. Sunday.

The show will have over \$500 in cash awards for the winning paintings, as well as two door prizes. A drawing will be held at 3:30 p.m. Sunday and cash awards will also be presented at that time.

The registration fee is \$2 per entry for adults (limit of five entries), and a \$2 entry fee for children (limit of three entries). Artist must live within a 75 mile radius of Cross Plains, and any previously-shown paintings are ineligible.

Paintings will be classified into six divisions--professional, advanced amateur, amateur, beginner, intermediate (12-18) and children (1-11).

Awards include \$85 (best of show), \$75 (best of professional), \$65 (best of advanced amateur), \$60 (best of amateur), and \$50 (best of beginner). Also included will be a \$50 cash award to the adult peer's choice and \$15 to the children's peer's choice; \$30 and \$20 awards to the adult and children's people's choice; and \$15, \$10, and \$7 to the first three places in intermediate and \$10, \$7, and \$5 to the first three places in children.

Ribbons will be awarded to the first three places and honorable mention in each division at the judges discretion.

Senate Give Green Light To 65 MPH Speed Limit

A bill co-sponsored by U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm to permit an increase in the speed limit to 65 miles per hour has won approval by the U.S. Senate.

Gramm, R-Texas, a longtime opponent of the 55 mph cap, pressed hard to allow state legislatures to increase the limit to 65 mph on interstate highways in rural areas.

"You can drive 55 miles per hour in Texas forever and still not get anywhere," he said. "And if you're driving 55 miles per hour in Texas, the likelihood is you are going to get run over."

The national 55 mph speed limit was imposed on states by the federal government during the energy crisis of the early 1970's.

During the Senate debate, however, Gramm pointed out that the gasoline shortage which prompted the original reduction in the speed limit "no longer exists."

The bill allows states "to look at the circumstances, to gauge the safety factors and to make a decision based on their own individual needs," Gramm said.

"I urge those who live in other parts of the country who want to preserve the 55 mile-an-hour speed limit to do that," he said. "But those of us who live where there are huge driving distances should be allowed to set a limit that makes sense, that we can enforce, that will be respected."

The Senate passed the bill on a vote of 56 to 36. It must now be considered by the U.S. House of Representatives.

Mr. John Kygen, Tex. Div. Special Events Dir. gave a good 5-point plan of cancer prevention. Start with the very young, kindergarten. Teachers do not smoke in their presence and teach the harm of smoking. Warning to expectant parents, their second baby was 3 months premature--his wife smoked. Reach the top teenagers in FHA, Vocational High Schoolers, top athletics, etc. They set an example for others. Encourage doctors and nurses to be tobacco free. Hospitals and doctors are being encouraged to do mammograms for high-risk women for half-price.

Over \$181,000 was raised last year by volunteers in District 16 to support ACS in a three-fold program to attack cancer through research, education and patient services. In Texas alone, more than \$6 million is currently invested by ACS in 12 major hospitals and research institutions.

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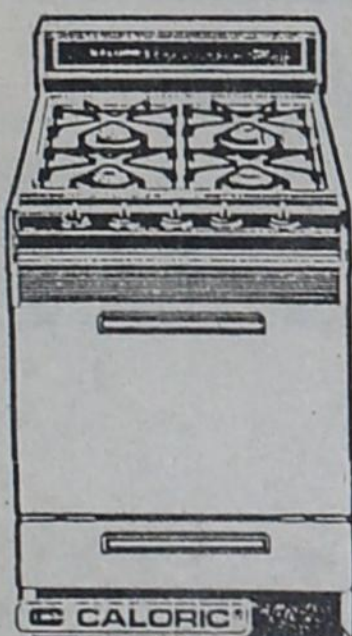
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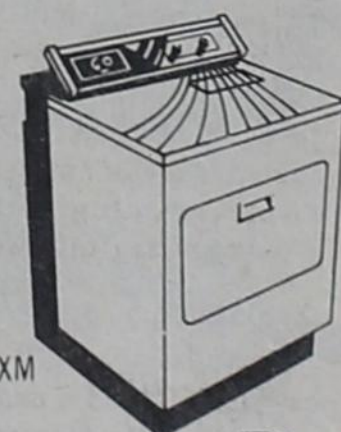
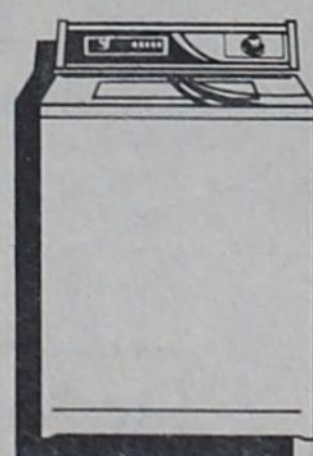
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
