MAY OIL AND GAS DRILLING APPLICATIONS

A total of 4,367 drilling applications were processed by the Railroad Commission in May, according to RRC Chairman Mack Wallace. In April, the Commission processed 3,735 applications, and 3,855 were handled in May 1983.

The May 1984 total included 3,355 applications for permits to drill new oil and gas tests, 102 applications to deepen existing holes, 315 applications to plugback existing holes, and 100 applications for service (non-producing) wells. Operators also field 495 amended drilling applications. Applications for new oil

and gas holes in May included 363 in the San Antonio area (District 1), 121 in the Refugio area (District 2), 300 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 179 in deep South Texas (District 4), 91 in East Central Texas (District 5), 130 in East Texas (District 6), 488 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 243 in the San Angelo area (District 7C),

445 in the Midland area (District 8), 351 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 463 in North Texas (District 9), and 181 in the Panhandle (District 10).

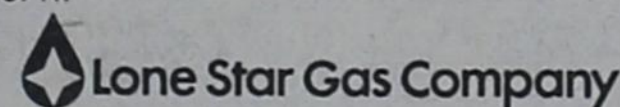

Morris, Young exchange vows

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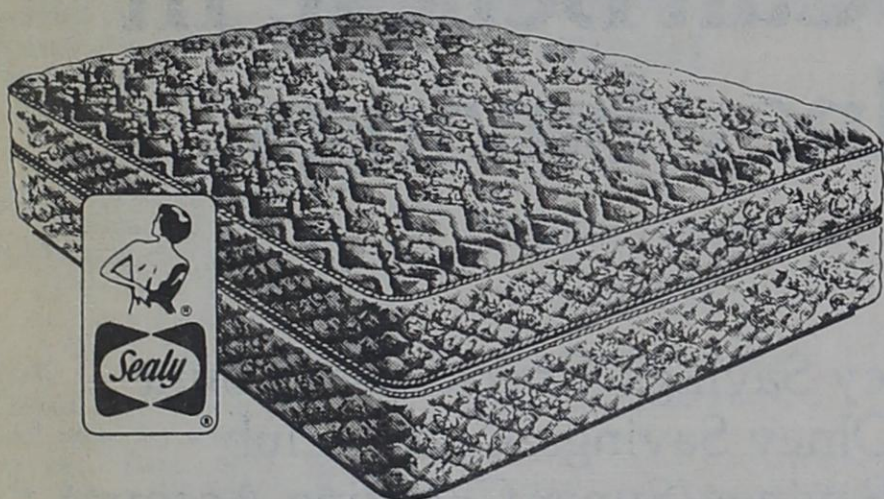
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
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THE GORDON SPOT

The rain we had here in Eastland County June 5 and 6 provided much needed moisture for peanut planting. Peanut planting was delayed because of the dry soil. Since the rain growers have been busy preparing seed beds and planting peanuts. Fortunately, most of the peanut growing areas of the county received from 4 to 6 inches of rain providing good conditions for planting.

High temperatures and high winds have since taken out much of that moisture and the soil surface is very dry again. But, as of last week, there was still adequate moisture in the root zone of the young peanuts. The peanuts are coming up now and the stands look good.

I also saw some hay being baled this week, but this crop is far behind schedule too. After last year's short hay crop and a hard winter, we sure need a good hay crop this year.

Small pecans are now shedding from pecan trees. This drop is traditionally called the "June drop". Fallen nuts should be inspected now for the cause of drop.

Pecans are now falling due basically to 4 reasons. The pecan nut casebearer, phyloxera, pecan scab and physiological causes. Nuts which have fallen from pecan scab will be covered

with olive green to black lesions. Pecan scab has not been severe enough in Eastland County this year to be a significant factor in current nut losses.

Nuts dropping from phyloxera are malformed with open galls on them. Even a few fallen nuts with phyloxera galls will signal the need to spray an insecticide at budbreak next year.

Next to physiological causes, the pecan nut casebearer is the most significant cause of nut failure at the present time. Fallen nuts will have a small hole at the base which is blocked by dark brown frass and webbing. A significant number of these casebearer infested nuts mean that the casebearer spray was not timed properly or the application rate and method was not adequate.

If casebearer damage was successfully prevented, the most significant cause of nut failure will be from physiological causes. Nuts which have fallen from physiological causes have no signs of mechanical injury or damage from in-

sects or diseases.

Although poor pollination is suspected to be a major contributing factor to physiological drop, there is evidence to suggest that the tree itself if helping to make the determination of which nuts will fall independent of the pollination factor. Maintenance of tree health throughout the year with special emphasis on nitrogen fertilization, zinc nutrition and water management will help reduce physiological nut drop.

Pecan aphids are causing more damage in June than normal. Usually the aphids which cause honeydew on the leaves are worse in July and August. Both the yellow aphid and the black aphid can be found on pecan trees now. Recommended insecticides for aphid control include Diazinon, Zolone, and malathion.

Acreage Conservation Reserve (ACR) is July 16, 1984. Other spring non-conserving crops that should be reported by this date include dry beans, peppers, potatoes, soybeans, sunflowers, tomatoes, melons, apples, peaches and alfalfa. Any other crop for which producers wish to establish a history record for crop insurance purposes should also be certified.

ACCURATE REPORTING - When filing your crop report be sure you file an accurate report. Failure to do so can result in a farm being ineligible for program benefits and the assessment of a penalty.

HAYING AND GRAZING ACR - Eastland County has been approved for emergency haying and grazing of ACR land. Producers can request to graze or harvest hay or other forage from ACR. This applies to all crops except wheat which is already approved for haying and grazing. Only livestock owned by the appli-

cant 30 days prior to May, 1984 are allowed to utilize the hay or grazing.

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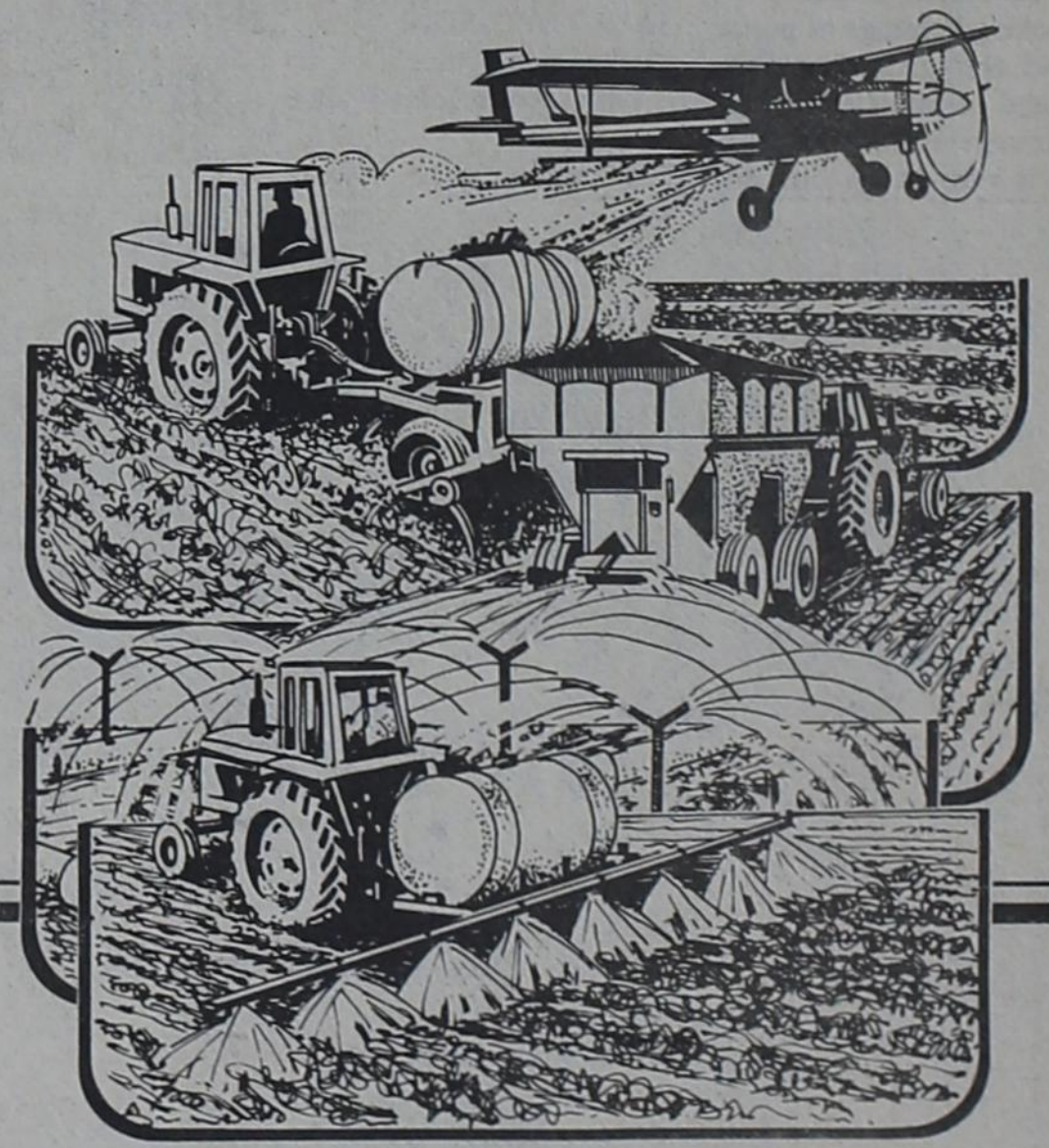
