Volunteer Fireman Attend School

Abraham Torres, volunteer fireman on the Gorman Volunteer Fire Department of Gorman, Texas attended the 55th Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, July 22-27. The school, attended by nearly 2,000 students representing about 750 cities from more than 25 states, is being held on the Texas A&M University campus this week.

Firemen can choose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Training, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection, and Disaster Rescue Training.

Fireman Torres is being sponsored by Eastland County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. BENCH MARKS FOR 1984-1985 SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGETS IN TEXAS

Texas increased spending on local public schools by \$552 million last year, as trustees in 1,069 school districts adopted school budgets totaling \$9.0 billion. That provided more than \$200 in additional funds for each of the 2,727,512 students in the state, according to the Texas Research League.

Local property taxpayers were tagged for an additional \$327 million to pay for the increase. The remainder was funded by increases in state and federal aid programs and by higher local fees.

The figures come from the latest issue of *Bench Marks for 1984-1985 School District Budgets in Texas*, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

School budgets adopted for 1983-84 called for spending \$2,713 per student for current operations. Gorman ISD's budget provided for \$1,882 per student based on the 316 students in average daily attendance in 1982-83.

Four of five of these dollars were spent for salaries. Statewide, payroll expense averaged \$2,153 per student, as compared to \$1,506 in Gorman ISD. Payroll expense is a combination of salary levels and staffing patterns.

The average salary for classroom teachers paid by Gorman ISD in 1982-83 was \$16,749 which was 6.9% above the minimum salary prescribed by the state. The average among all school districts in Texas was \$19,501 per classroom teacher, or 21.8 percent over the minimum.

There was an average of one teacher for 18.6 students in Gorman ISD compared to a statewide pupil-teacher ratio of 1 to 16.4. The pupil-teacher ratio is not the same thing as the average class size because teachers and students are not necessarily in class the same

number of hours each day.

Statewide, the ratio of teachers to students has remained the same the past three years. The report notes that during the 1980s school officials have used additional payroll dollars to increase salaries beyond the rate of inflation, whereas during the previous decade more dollars were spent to hire additional teachers while average salaries grew less than the rate of inflation.

Local property taxes were increased by \$327 million for a total of \$3.6 billion last year. Locally, the Gorman ISD's tax levy was increased by 4.3% for 1983-84, as compared to a 10.0 percent increase for the average school district in Texas.

School property tax rates in 1982-83 averaged \$0.613 per \$100 of market value (selling price). The school tax on a property selling for \$100,000 was \$613 in the average school district. Locally, the rate on market value in Gorman ISD was \$0.413, or \$413.00 on a property selling for \$100,000.

If the property were a homestead or owned by a senior citizen, the school tax would be less because of various exemptions. Open-space land that qualified would be valued on its productivity value rather than market value.

Revenue lost from exemptions totaled \$679 million, which was \$125 million more than that exempted the previous year. To balance school budgets, the revenue loss from exemptions was imposed upon other taxpayers in the school district.

Preparing school budgets for next year, the report noted, will be difficult. Not only did the Special Session of the Legislature provide substantial additional funds, but also changed the method for allocating aid to different districts. School officials also must begin implementing a variety of new educational programs including new curriculum standards.

Opening Doors

Child abusers may be just as ashamed of their behavior as are the children whom they abuse. Child-abusers do not talk to other people about what they do (Actually they know its wrong), but they do not know how to change their habit, control their temper or know any other way to parent the child.

Research indicates that abusive parents were abused as children and these same abusive parents stand a good chance of being abused as elderly people by the very children they are abusing now. Violence and abuse becomes a cycle that is learned, practiced and carried through generations.

A great deal of legal effort, media effort and volunteer effort is going into discussing, defining and identifying child abuse. It is needed!

Child abuse is a shocking behavior. It is difficult to talk about without producing feelings of repulsion, horror, anger, shame and disgrace for the abused, the family and for the abuser.

It is well known there is a hot-line

to Austin 1-800-252-5400 for reporting child-abuse or neglect. The Family Code of Texas makes all of us legally responsible to report suspected cases.

But how or where does the abuser get help in stopping that cycle of violence and abuse before it produces a bigger tragedy? There is help! There are resources. There are agencies that can help an abusing parent. The parent or parents can be helped to understand where the pattern of violence and abuse came from. They can be helped to accept responsibility for their actions. They can be helped to learn effective, gentler ways of rearing children. They can be helped to see the rewards of parenting are better with non-violent, non-abusive methods.

If you are an adult who is abusing another person and want to STOP IT, call any of the numbers below. These agencies in the Ft. Worth area will start you on the road to better self-control and you do not have to give your name.
