The Wildcats got the insurance touchdown with 11:25 left in the game when David White got free on an option, faked the pitch and kept the ball an raced into the corner of the end zone for the score. Stacy Green kicked the PAT and the score was 14-0.

The Panthers finally got on the board by going 75 yards in 18 plays

with Glen Burgess catching a 35 yard pass for the score with 3:38 left in the game. Tom Campbell ran for the two points and Gorman trailed 14 to 8

However, the Big Red defense simply could not hold the heavier Wildcats and the Wildcats ran out


So really, the fumbles were the big factor in the game.

Hightower addressed area peanut producers, other farmers and public officials, calling for "a problem-solving partnership that links an active state government with enterprising Texans to build new, homegrown industries in such fields as food processing, electric energy generation, aquaculture, movie-making, and tourism. With a targeted, coordinated, crash program including market development, applied research, capital formation, entrepreneurial training, and natural resource conservation, the state can be a catalyst to generate hundreds of small and medium-sized enterprises that will bring new wealth, good jobs and a positive balance to our state's economy," Hightower said. "Added up, these growth industries have a multibillion-dollar potential, representing an economic gusher greater than Spindletop offered 85 years

Hightower observed that declining oil prices, a deepening agriculture depression, a slump in the high-tech industry and other disquieting trends have dimmed the economic luster of the Lone Star recently.

"But our Star will be ascendant again if we make a concerted effort and vest our economic future in the hands of our own enterprising people," Hightower said. In fact, a recent Texas poll revealed that the public is more than ready for such a push, with 65 percent of those polled saying that they would be willing to pay more taxes to the state to encourage economic development.






