While awaiting a flight from Miami to Costa Rica, he stumbled across Cooper's first book Aerobics at the airport lobby. He was then a 185 -pound,
pipe chain-smoker just
worried about his health.
Cooper's book changed all Stanfield put down his pipe and picked up a pair of running shoes, gradually working his way up to three to five miles per along the way.
One of his funniest running experiences occurred while he was stationed in Monterrey. run by police wouldn't let me run by myself because the consulate before me had been kidnapped," recalls Stanfield. "So I had to have a police escort whenever I ran. The policemen
