

We also want to thank our advertisers for their continuous support of your newspaper and the Christmas edition this year. We enjoy real great support from our advertisers and sincerely appreciate their support for your paper, because without it publishing the Progress and mailing it would be an impossibility.

And now for the bad news. As you probably noticed in last weeks column, I had stated that the subscription rates on the Progress would likely be raised. Well, we have looked at this thing from all angles, and without the raise in subscription rates it would be almost impossible for us to continue to mail the Progress each week. The cost of mailing the paper is the sole reason for the increase in your subscription rate. It is getting progressively more expensive as time goes on to mail the paper. The rates have increased many times this year, and we have no other alternative but to go up on the rate to keep being able to mail the paper to you. The postal service seems to be on rampaige of increasing the mailing rates of second class mail, while third class mail (the larger portion of which folks would as soon not receive) seems to be getting the best of possible rates. Oh I know that newspapers have received a lower rate over the years, but the simple reason for this is that your newspapers have always printed public information, announcements, news of all kinds, and have not charged for it. Now that the postal service is hitting the second class mailing rates so hard that some of the papers have begun charging for a lot of the articles folks wish printed in the paper. Most of the papers our size have already raised their rates several times and are higher than our rates. But we have finally come to the point where we are forced to raise the rates. The subs coming due in January will be raised to \$8.00 per year. With the tax it will be \$8.50. This rate includes those subscribers in Eastland and Comanche counties. Other subs in Texas will be raised to \$11 with a tax of 69 cents. Out of state rates will go up to \$12 and they are not taxable. The new rate will be effective with the subs for January. We know it is getting harder and harder for folks to get by, but we have no other choice but to raise the rates if we keep publishing the paper. We hope everyone under-

Comanche County Telephone Co., Inc. in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas hereby gives notice that it is filing with the Commission the necessary revisions of its tariffs to detariff the installation of simple premise wiring and the maintenance of both simple and complex premise wiring provided to its customers.

Detariffing means that these services are no longer regulated by the Federal Communications Commission or the Public Utility Commission of Texas in compliance with an order adopted by the Federal Communications Commission under Docket No. 79-105 ordering the detariffing of the Installation and Maintenace of Premise Wiring on January 1, 1987.

Customers may secure the services of outside parties to install and maintain premise wiring after January 1, 1987. Such installations must be in accordance with Part 68 of the Federal Communications Commissions Rules and Regulations.

The proposed tariff changes will cause insignificant changes in revenues. 
USDA ANNOUNCES POUNDAGE

As required by the Food Security Act of 1985, the national poundage quota for the 1987 crop of peanuts is equal to the estimated quantity of peanuts devoted to domestic edible, seed and related uses in the 1987 marketing year, beginning Aug. 1,

quotas for the 1986-1990 crops.







USDA ADVANCES COMMODITY COMPUTER MARKETING WITH PEANUT "SMART CARD"

What do you call a plastic card with a computer memory chip on it which will be used to buy and sell peanuts?

The U.S. Department of Agriculture calls it a "smart card" and it will help USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service keep pace by getting into the computer marketing of peanuts.

In 1987 the new peanut marketing smart card, which is the size of a credit card, will be used by more than 50,000 peanut producers at approximately 560 peanut buying points, said Milton Hertz, ASCS administrator.

Under the new system, the paper marketing card now in use at the buying points will be replaced by the plastic smart card containing data entries indicating the farm operator's name and address, state and county code and the farm serial number for the peanut program.

"The automation of peanut buying points is in keeping eith the ASCS county office automation project now underway," said Hertz.

A pilot study in 1986 at forty-six buying points in 6 peanut states found that automation using microcomputers was beneficial in reducing paperwork and delays in data entry at the county offices and peanut associations.

ASCS county office personnel will enter pertinent data on the smart card, including eligibility for buyback, producer shares, peanuts retained, farm quota, contract additional pounds, and government debts. The card is then issued to farmers who present it with each load of peanuts offered for sale.

HOMEMAKING HINTS

Family finances is directly related to one of the 12 statewide issues identified for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service programming into the 1990's.

For most of us "the state of the economy" begins at home. To meet this critical need, I will be offering a number of opportunities for you to update your financial knowledge and skills. I invite you to read this column for ideas on being a better family financial manager.

As every parent knows, children become consumers the minute they're old enough to point at something in a store and shriek "me want!" Yet we don't think much about it until children turn into teenagers who "don't know the value of a dollar."

Children can learn how to be good consumers, beginning at an early age, if parents are willing to teach them through experience, example and guidance.

Children need the experience of going on shopping trips. Letting them buy things provides opportunities to talk about products and the reasons for buying.

Experiencing failure, as well as success is also important. For example, if the child buys a toy that breaks right away, it's a chance to learn about poorly made products or how a customer can get a store

Parents provide a powerful example for children in all aspects of their lives--including consumer behavior. When children see their parents taking time to discuss finances and plan the use of their income, they are more likely to do the same with their allowances or money they

Some families hold regular meetings to discuss the family's financial situation. While children don't have to know all the details, communication about family finances can help teach the difference between needs and wants and the idea of saving for financial goals.

Guiding a child's development may be the most difficult part of teaching consumer skills. It requires that parents supervise children's spending rather than direct and dictate their purchases.

Parents need to show consistency, too, by not refusing requests one time only to "give in" to another. It means that parents can't use money as a reward, or withold it for punishment. And that parents must be patient, since money management skills are not learned overnight.

And who knows, in the process of trying to teach our children consumer skills, we may learn a few things

entered into a computer. Next the value of the lot is calculated and an Inspection Certificate and Sales Memorandum is printed out. Each transaction is recorded on the card and the quota is electronically

adjusted. Each transaction is exectronically transmitted over telephone lines to the ASCS state offices for transfer to the Kansas City Management Office. From the Kansas City Management Office, loan accounting data are transmitted to the peanut associations and poundage data are transmitted to the county ASCS office.

At the end of the marketing season, the smart card is returned to the county office where the farmer's marketings are reconciled.

Peanut associations will receive data from buying points overnight rather than the several days it now takes by mail. The new system will also provide rapit transmission of loan information. Verification checks built into the system at the buying point, makes it possible to determine the accuracy of the association's inventory.

Other significant improvements

-- Errors in marketing by growers are detected quickly, enabling the county office to notify the producers in advance when they will complete their marketing or exceed their quota for the far.

-- The county offices can readily reconcile producer marketings against the quota and contract additional pounds without having to sort thousands of sales transaction documents and marketing cards.

It is estimated that about 100,000 peanut smart cards will be used by the peanut growers in the ASCS program next year.

AFTER THE HOLIDAY FAMILY REUNION

"Even a long-awaited holiday

family reunion can leave you feeling down," says Dorthy Taylor, a family life specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program. She points out that family gatherings mah require travel which leaves some family members tired and irritable. Even the most wonderful family reunion disrupts mealtime and bedtime routines and can overwhelm us with more people than we're used to being with at the same time. "Sometimes unresolved emotions among family members surface under the pressures of holiday tension, and lead to depression for those involved," explains the specialist. She advises trying to settle back into your usual routine as soon as possible. "Practice tolerance and forgiveness," she says, "since people say and do things under pressure that are not typical." Remembering the good things that happened over the holiday will also help cure the January blues, Taylor remarks.

University System. Dr. Wayne Hayenga and Dr. Danny Klinefelter, economists-management, say that other producers also may be approaching the same situation without realizing it.

They note that farm operations fitting these descriptions may be candidates for failure:

1. You lender owns more than half of your business.

2. Your short-term loans and accounts payable have increased each year for the past three years.

3. Your interest bill is more than 20 percent of your sales.

"You can easily determine if your lender owns more than half of your business by looking at the net worth statement entries of total assets and liabilities. This factor is critical because of earnings of the assets used in the business," they say.

Traditionally, the economists note, earning rates on agricultural assets are 4 to 6 percent. "A farmer earning the high rate of 6 percent on all assets, but paying 12 percent interest on half of his assets, has nothing left. If earnings fall below 6 percent or asset values decline, but interest rates stay at 12 percent, the owner's equity declines to the point he is unable to finance the business," they warn.

Hayenga and Klinefelter suggest that producers look at their last three years' net worth statements. Without a major increase in business size, if short-term loans and accounts payable consistently increase, sooner or later farmers will not be able to keep the loans and accounts current without increasing income, or refinancing land or long-term assets. When this happens, short-term debt will not be renewed and suppliers will demand cash before delivery, the economists caution.

Research indicates that when interest charges are more than 20 percent of sales, there is less than 20 percent chance the business will survive more than five years. "When interest charges are that high, there is not enough income from the business to pay off expenses, so losses occur. To continue in business, the farmer must finance the previous year's loss and loses even more in the second year. This cycle is repeated until the business is




