Hershell Cordell, chairman of the South Eastland County Hospita District, said the hospital is s750,00 in debt and the district has no mones to hire doctors. The hospital lost money because o new Medicare regulations, he said. II a 1938 bill amending the Socia Security Act, Congress changed the way the federal government reim burses hospitals for medical bill: people can not pay on their own.
