## PANTHERS LOSE TO WILDCATS 12-6; HOST SANTA ANNA MOUNTAINEERS

The Panthers dropped a very hard fought District 8A game to a very good, large Rising Star Wildcat team on Friday night at Rising Star by the score of 12-6. The Wildcats had a much heavier team and the size sure did make the difference late in the game.

The Panthers jumped out to a lead in the second quarter with 7:49 left on the clock after grabbing a Wildcat fumble on the Rising Star 15 yard line. Following a 1 yard run and a 5 yard penalty on the Panthers, Scott Gressett hit Robby Hand with an 18 yard pass for the touchdown. The run for two points failed and the Big Red lead 6-0.

The Wildcats came back in the second period with just 51 seconds left with David White getting the final yard on a run. The score was set up by a Panther fumble (?) called on a hand off on a punt return play by the Panthers. The kick failed and the score was knotted at 6-6. The Panthers came right back with a long drive in the final 51 seconds but ran out of time in the first half.

In teh second half the teams played on even terms until the later part of the third period when the Wildcats started a drive after holding the Panthers on downs at the Wildcat 41. From there the Cats scored in 14 plays that ate up a lot of clock with Derrick White getting the TD on a 6 yard run with 11:55 left in the game. The run for two points failed and the Wildcats were up 12-6.

The Panthers then took the kickoff on their own 27 and moved to the Rising Star 2 yard line on a good drive. With third down and 2 from

the 2 the Big Red called two wide plays and lost yardage on both and wound up out on the Wildcat 20 yard line. With the long drive the Panther fans thought the Big Red would muster enough strength to score again and then add the two pointer to put them out in front. But the outweighed Panthers just couldn't get it across and the Cats took over at their own 20 and ran out the clock for the important District 8A game.

The Panthers only managed 105 yards rushing due to losing yardage on several occasions. Scott Gressett and Don Rodgers each had 45 yards to lead the Big Red. Scott had 13 keepers and Don carried 10 times. Brandon Gilmore was held to only 6 yards on 10 tries, being thrown for losses on several wide plays. Jay McCormick also had just 6 yards on 4 trips, and Joe Rodgers had 3 yards on 4 carries.

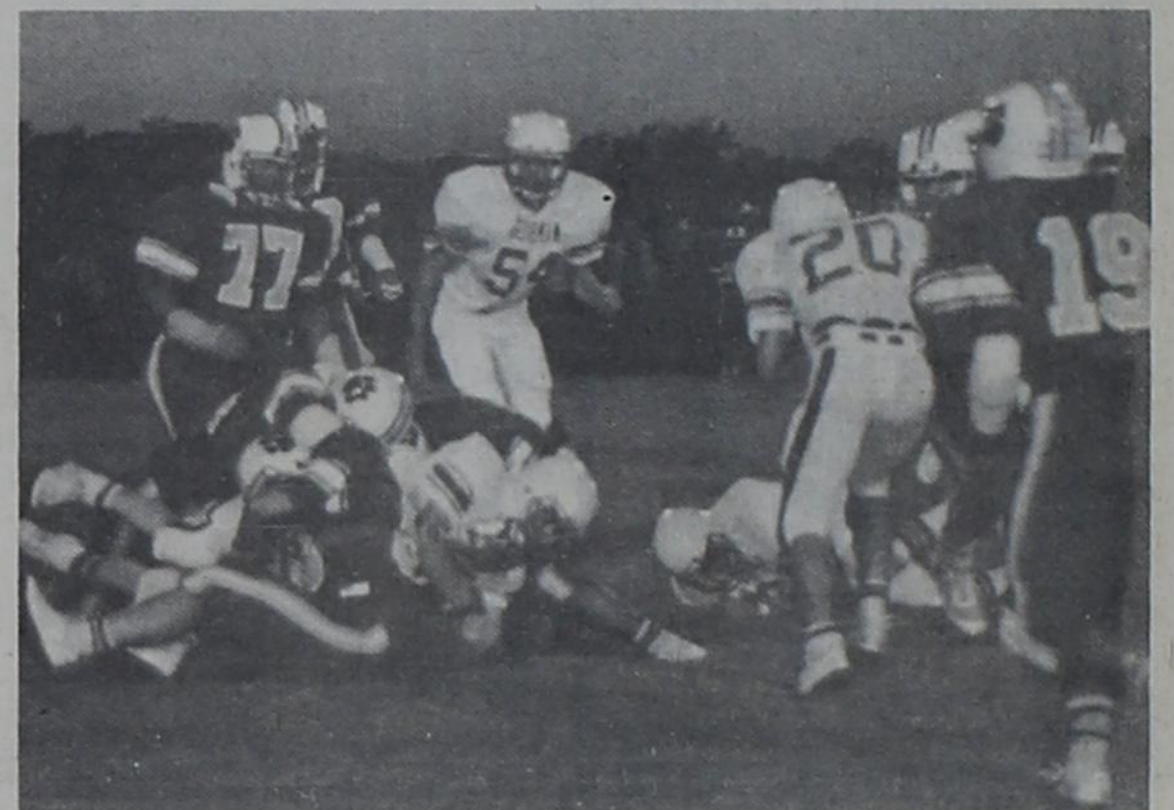
The Panthers will play host to the Santa Anna Mountaineers this Friday night at Brogdon Field in

another crucial District 8A tilt. This game will be a must win for the Panthers if they have any chance of staying in the District race. The remaining 6 games will all be district contests.

The Panther defense did a good job most of the night until the Wildcats got the momentum going when the Wildcats were given the ball on a Panther fumble late in the third. From there the Wildcats seemed to muster strength and then take command of the line of scrimmage the rest of the way. But the Big Red did a good job to be outweighed so heavily.

This contest with Santa Anna will also be a tough battle as Santa Anna was picked near the top in 8A. The Mountaineers have a very good team and the Panthers will really have to have a great effort to win this one.

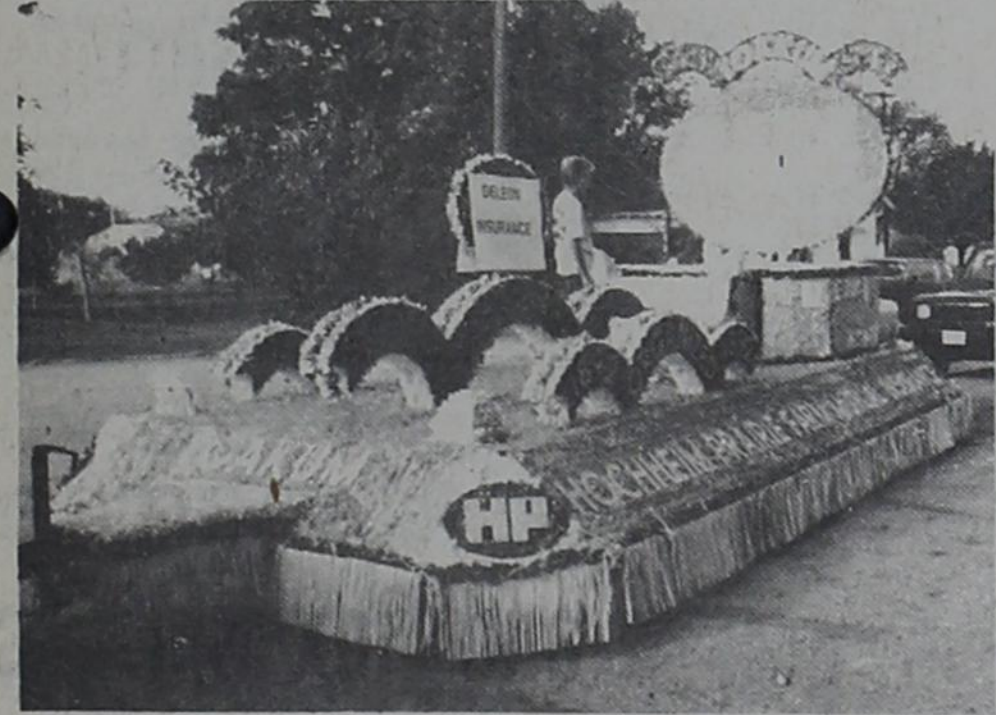

The County 4-H Food Show will be on Saturday morning, October 10th, at the Conrad Hilton, Cisco Community Center in Cisco.

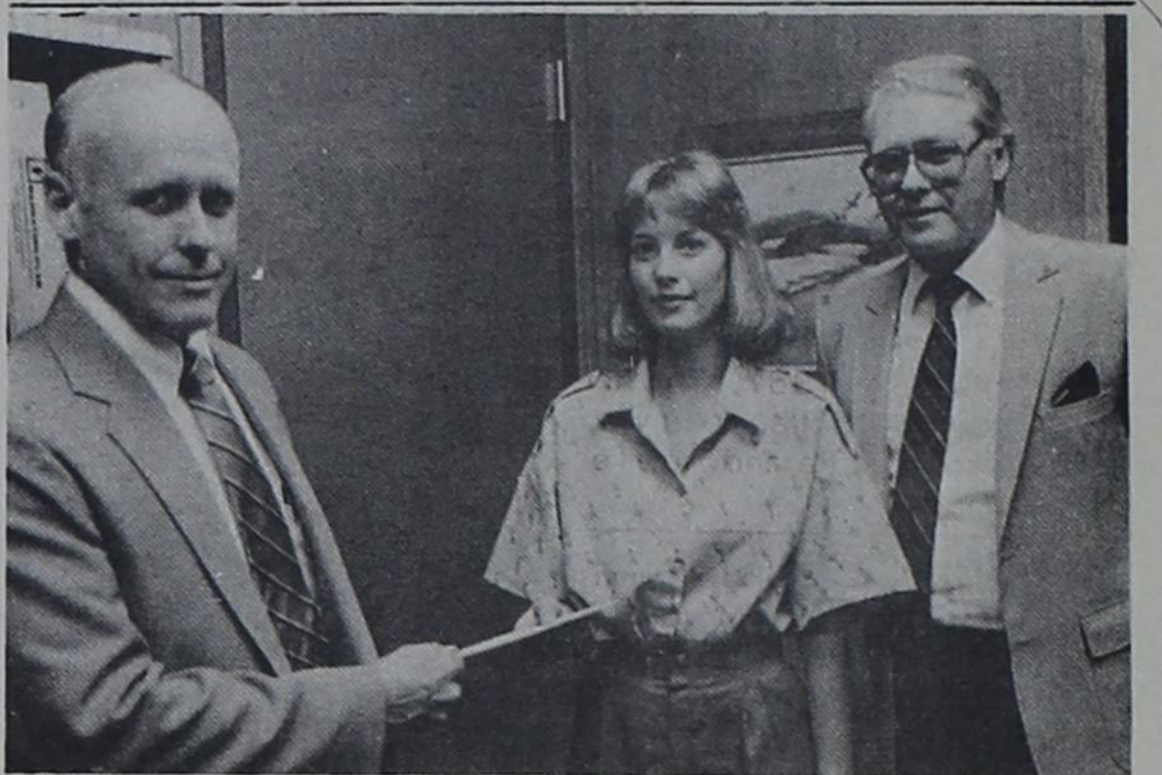
The registration will be from 9 to 9:30 a.m. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. The public viewing and awards program will be at 11 a.m.

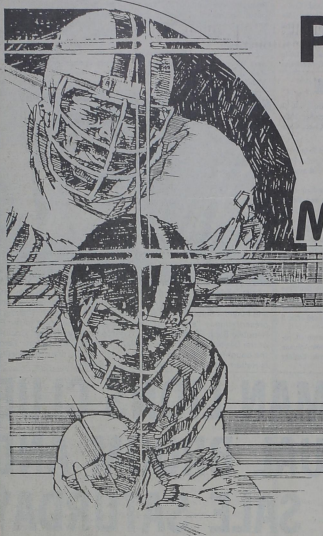
