Support is directed in the four areas of civic and community activities, culture and the arts, education, and health and welfare.

RELEASE OF FARM POUNDAGE QUOTA

All or part of the farm poundage quota may be released temporarily or permanently. Quota may be temporarily released for one year only and will provide considered producer credit for that year for the pounds released provided that quota has not been released from the farm in the prior two years.

The final date to release quota is June 15, 1987.

TRANSFER OF PEANUT QUOTA

The final date for spring transfers is June 15, 1987. Transfers filed after that date will be considered fall transfers and the transferring farm must have planted a sufficient acreage to be expected to produce the full effective quota on the farm or a transfer will not be allowed.

Producers are reminded that there is no planting requirement for a spring transfer. Those with a large amount of undermarketings may want to consider transferring a portion of their basic quota from the farm and retaining their undermarketings to market the crop.

Transfers of quota do not cause bad history nor does it create good history for purposes of protecting the

Of course, sometimes I call my son, Lanny, by my grandson's name and vice versa and call my daughter by my sister's name sometimes. But I don't think there's anything wrong with that, do you?

And now I am anticipating that one fine day I will be blessed with a great grandchild. Oh, to be a G-G. Last September 6, I went by ambulance to the church wedding of my only grandchild, Mark and his and our beloved Stephanie. I also went to the reception. And, oh yes, my dear brother, Lawrence, and Ruth came, and also my brother, Dub.

I will admit that everything may not be coming up roses, so to speak. But one can shut her mind to the bad and keep her eyes on good things. I know this for a fact.

By now, I will say one more time that I enjoyed the time spent with my family these last few days and am waiting for next year.

I have to run now. You see, I didn't intend to write a book, but I will if somebody begs me to. Ha.
