

New Program Aimed At Strengthening **Land Values**

A new long-term loan program offered by the Federal Land Bank of Texas should encourage new purchases of agricultural real estate and help strengthen declining land values in the state, says Dr. Danny Klinefelter, economist-management, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

On May 1, the Land Bank began offering 10-year fixed interest rate real estate loans. These loans are match-funded by 10-year securities purchased by the Land Bank at the time the loans are made, Klinefelter explains.

The loans will convert to the bank's variable rate at the end of the 10 years. The current interest rates on these loans are 8 7/8 percent for farm loans and 9 1/8 percent for farm related businesses and rural home loans, he adds.

Borrowers must qualify under the Land Bank's usual credit standards and use the money only for new land purchases, Klinefelter says.
