



#### Senate Committee Ok's Gramm-Backed Big Bend Park Bill

WASHINGTON — A key Senate committee has resoundingly approved legislation supported by U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm to add 67,000 arces to Big Bend National Park.

The proposal, which authorizes the U. S. Park Service to accept the Harte Ranch property on the edge of the park, was introduced in the House by U. S. Rep. Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio, and in the Senate by Gramm.

It was overwhelmingly approved by the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

"The land which will be added to the park offers variety and beauty with its desert, mountains and prairies," Gramm said.

The land donated is adjacent to the current park boundaries and is commonly known as the Harte Ranch or the North Rosillas Mountains Preserve. In 1985, the original owners gave the property to the Texas Nature Conservancy with the stipulation that it be donated to the Big Bend National Park in its natural state.

The Gramm-Smith legislation provides the U. S. Park Service with the formal authority it needs to accept the property. There will be no purchase costs or other charges to the Federal Government involved in the transaction.

"This is a great deal for the taxpayer, a great deal for Texas and a great deal for us and our children," Gramm said. "All that remains is for the full Senate to approve this legislation and send it to the President for his signature."

Crunchy peanuts have long been a favorite nibble associated with ballgames and other sporting events. Now, many local stores carry raw peanuts, so you can cook them up at home the way you like them and incorporate them into your ritual of TV sports watching.

Roasting, in a conventional oven or microwave, and french frying are the basic home preparation methods. Capitalize on the energy of a conventional oven already in use by cooking a pan of peanuts one layer deep. They can cook along with your main dinner dish.

However you prepare them, you may enjoy the peanuts salt free or sprinkled with one of your favorite seasonings. Since peanuts are good sources of protein and B vitamins, they make a healthy taste treat.

#### PEANUT ROASTING METHODS

#### Conventional Oven Roasting ("Parching")

Place raw peanuts, in-shell or shelled, one layer deep in a shallow baking pan. Roast in a 350°F. oven-15 to 20 minutes for shelled and 20 to 25 minutes for in-shell peanuts. (Peanuts must be removed from oven just short of doneness desired as they continue to cook as they cool.)

#### Microwave Oven Roasting

2 cups raw shelled peanuts

Place peanuts in a 10 x 6 inch glass or other microwave-safe container. Dot with butter or margarine. Microwave on high for two minutes. Stop. Stir peanuts. Continue to microwave paprika, chili powder, curry two minutes at a time followed by powder, red pepper, Parmesan stirring until peanuts have been cheese, etc.

microwaved 10 minutes for light roast; 12 minutes for medium roast. Remove from microwave. \*Season to taste. (Caution: peanuts continue to cook as they cool. Cooking time may vary with ovens.)

#### Oil Roasting (French Frying)

2 cups raw shelled red skin or blanched peanuts

1-1/2 cups peanut oil or enough to cover peanuts

In an electric skillet, deep fryer or heavy saucepan heat oil to 350°F. Add peanuts and cook, stirring frequently, for about 5 minutes or until just under doneness desired (they continue to cook as they cool). Drain on paper. \*Season to taste.

\*Seasonings to complement freshly roasted shelled peanuts include salt, seasoned salt, popcorn salt, onion salt or powder, garlic salt or powder,

#### Gramm Lashes Japan Plan To Keep Barriers Against U.S. Beef

WASHINGTON — U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas, emerging from a meeting with Japanese Ambassador Nobuo Matsunaga, demanded an end to Japenese trade barriers against the import of American beef.

"It is time for Japan to start acting like a great trading nation and to stop cheating its workers through protectionism," the senator said.

Gramm said that "while Japan is a major importer of U. S. beef, the potential foe additional sales is enormous if the Japanese government will finally do away with the trade restrictions that it has already promised to eliminate."

He noted that the present quota agreement on American beef is set to expire on March 31, 1988.

"I have emphasized to the Japanese ambassador that this is an opportunity to create freer trade in a product that will benefit both American cattlemen and Japanese workers," Gramm said.

"The final elimination of import quotas on American beef will increase the incomes of cattlemen here and will improve the living standards of workers there," he said.

"I will strenuously oppose any new proposal to expand the trade barriers on American beef," Gramm said.

#### Senate Sends Big Bend Park Expansion Bill To President

WASHINGTON — The Senate has passed and sent to the president legislation supported by U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm to add 67,000 acres to Big Bend National Park.

The proposal authorizes the U. S. Park Service to accept the donation of the Harte Ranch.

Senate approval of the proposal, which was introduced originally in the Senate by Gramm, followed a formal okay by the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resourc-

The land is adjacent to the current park boubdaries. In 1985, the original owners gave the property to the Texas Nature Conservancy with the stipulation that it be donated to the Big Bend National Park in its natural

"This bill provides the U. S. Park Service with the formal authority it needs to accept the property," Gramm said, noting that the transaction includes no charges to the federal government.

"This is a great deal for the taxpayer, a great deal for Texas, and a great deal for us and our children," Gramm said.

Warns Citizens Of

**Get Rich Scheme** The Criminal District Attorney's Office in Eastland has received information that there may be some citizens of Eastland County who are the victims of what appears to be an illegal "get rich scheme". Also, by participaring in such ventures, the citizen may be unknowingly committing a criminal act by participating in an "Endless Chain Scheme", most commonly called a "pyramid". Under the criminal laws of Texas it is unlawful to contrive, prepare, set up, propose, operate, promote, or even participate in an endless chain. An "endless chain" is any scheme for the distribution of money or any other property whereby a participant gives or pays money or any other valuable consideration for the chance to receive compensation for introducing additional persons and their participating in the get rich scheme.

The State law prohibiting this ac tivity has been in effect since 1974 and it was passed in order to protect the majority of participants, who by the nature of any such scheme, would never receive any financial return. Therefore, if a citizen is or has been approached to participate in any such "get rich opportunities", or has been cheated by participating, please contact your local law enforcement agency so that steps can be taken to apprehend the responsible promoter or promoters and prevent further bilking of the citizens by unscrupulous promoters and causing the citizens who participate from losing their money and unknowingly violating the law.

District Attorney Emory Walton urges that the citizens when approached to participate in any such schemes to not become involved because they most likely will lose their money to a rip-off promoter who will be long gone when the citizen finally realizes he or she has been taken. Walton warns there is no such thing as a "get rich quickly", "pie-in-the-sky", "limited or privileged opportunity", or "exclusive or confidential investment" in any of these types of schemes.




