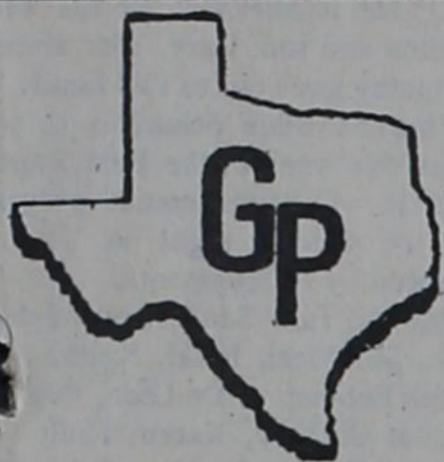

## PANTHERS ADVANCE TO STATE TOURNAMENT JUNE 12-13 IN AUSTIN

The Gorman Panthers baseball team of 1986 is alive and well after advancing to the State Class A Tournament this Thursday and Friday, June 12 and 13 in Austin. In this initial feag of saszbball a GHY the spirit of unity has really returned to the Red and Blue as they have become a close knit bunch of players who are all pulling for each other and for their school. They, and all the fans are justly proud of the players, and likewise, Coach Al Hunter, who has coached the boys this year.

The baseball fever really began last summer when some parents approached the school board about adding baseball to its athletic program. It turned out to be a great recommendation. The board went along with the idea and as a result the Panthers have shown true spirit and determination and will be playing this week in the State Tournament. This is truly a dream come true for the players, Coach Hunter, and all the fans.

The Panther record isn't too impressive at first sight, as the Red and Blue record now stands at 9-6. Two of the losses were to Lingleville, 5-2 and 3-1, and De Leon, ranked in the Class AA state polls most of the spring, posted a pair of wins. Then Gorman lost to Class AAAA Mineral Wells and Class AA Millsap in a tournament at Weatherford. The loss to Millsap was by one run.

Coach Hunter stated that De Leon had already played four games

before they played Gorman and they beat the Panthers 10-7 and 14-12. So the boys have done real great.

The Panthers knocked off Covington in bi-district, Frost in area, Sam Rayburn in regional and Savoy in the quarterfinals to earn the trip to Austin.

The starting lineup is usually catcher Randall Gibbs (.575), first baseman Ronson Childers (.325), second baseman Scott Gressett (.475), third baseman Rhett Harrison (.420), shortstop Lucio Pacheco (.580), left fielder Craig Gryder (.360), center fielder Zeno Madera (.400), right fielder Don Rodgers (.500) and pitcher Miguel Pacheco. Lucio also pitches. Al doesn't mess around with designated hitters or designated runners.

It's no wonder the parents wanted baseball started. Childers and Gryder are freshmen, while Gibbs, Gressett, Miguel Pacheco and Rodgers are sophomores. Harrison, Lucio Pacheco and Madera are seniors.

Gibbs had key hits in the playoff wins over Frost and Savoy.

All friends and relatives are invited to attend the ceremony.

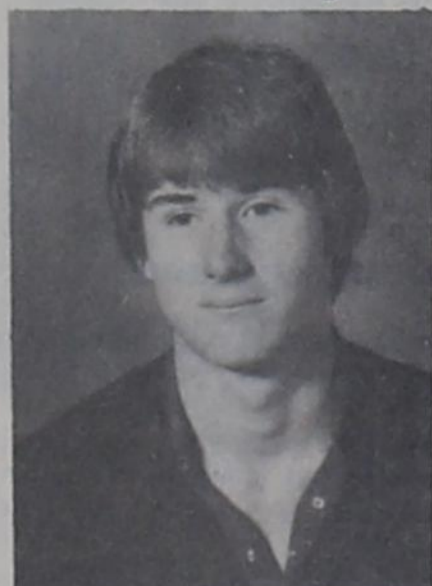

A light voter turnout was recorded in the Republican Primary Runoff held in Gorman on June 7. A total of 13 votes were cast.

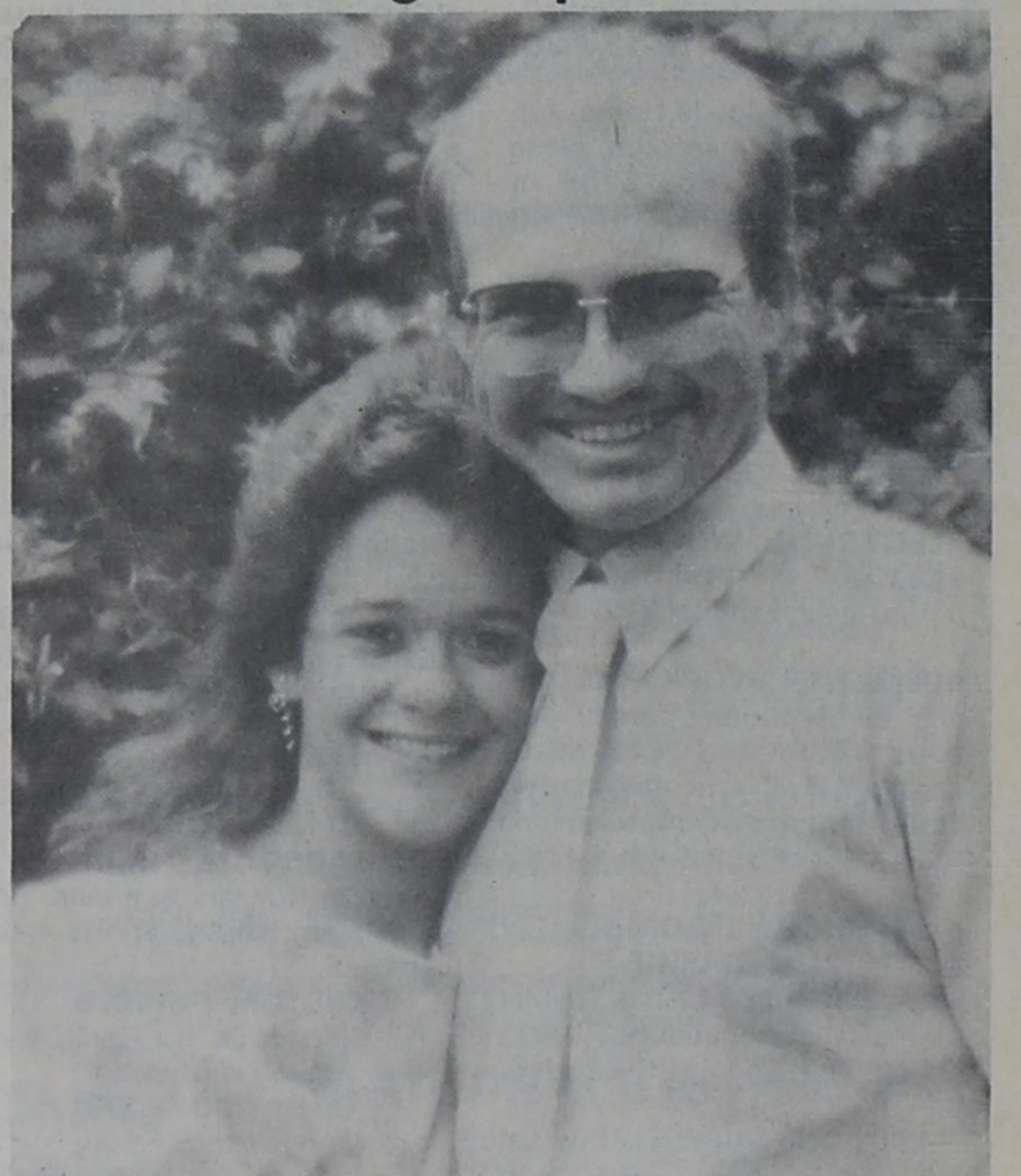
In the Lieutenant Governor's race Daved Davidson outpolled opponent Aaron Bullock 10 votes to 2.
