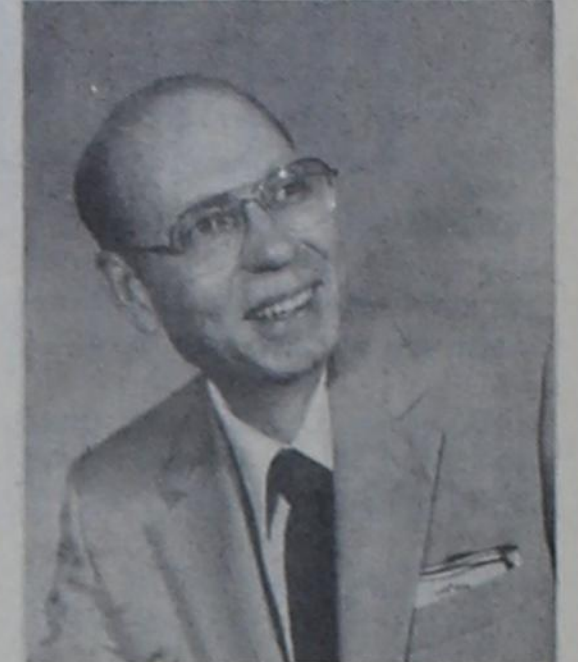


**GOOD NEWS AMERICA REVIVAL

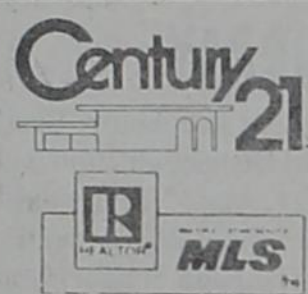

THE GORDON SPOT

With the warm spring weather the fruit is growing rapidly on our fruit trees. It's time for another application of insecticide and fungicide on the fruit. Most fruit are in the "shuck split" stage. This is when the calyx or old bloom is pushed upon the peach or plum. This spray application should be your second or third spray this year depending on whether you started at the "petal-fall" stage or the "pink-bud" stage. As in the prior spray applications use Zolone, Malathion, or Sevin. Fungicide should also be added or applied separately. Fungicides include benomyl, captan, wettable sulfur or chlorothalonil (Bravo).

The insecticide and fungicide fungicide sprays protect the fruit from worms and other insect damage and from diseases that damage fruit quality.

If weevils are a problem in your fruit trees this spray should also take care of the problem.

This time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season. There are three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start—scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer.

Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower 1/2 to 1 inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing.

April is the time for the first application of fertilizer. The recommendation is to apply 1 lb. of nitrogen form a 3-1-2 ratio fertilizer about every six weeks. If a 15-5-10 is used, then the rate per application is about 7 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. If 12-4-8 is used, then the rate of 8 lbs. per 1000 sq. ft. is needed. Some prefer to apply 13-13-13 fertilizer. It would take about 8 lbs. of this also. To some this may not seem like much fertilizer at all. Fertilizer basically does two things for a lawn. First of all, and probably more importantly, it increases the aesthetic value of the turf. In other words, we fertilize to make our lawns look good. Fertilizer also increases the rate of lawn growth. Up to a point, the more you fertilize the more it grows. There is a good reason why the rate of 1 lb. of nitrogen was chosen. The reason is that the rate of 1 lb. of nitrogen per 1000 sq. ft. will produce the greatest increase in a lawn's aesthetic value without an excessive increase in the rate of growth. Fertilizer rates higher than this will tend to increase growth rates higher and higher without a proportionally increase in aesthetic value. In other words all you tend to get for higher fertilizer rates is more mowing. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy color in St. Augustine lawns.

To keep crabgrass or other unsightly weeds from becoming a problem, apply a preemergence herbicide (weed killer) containing benefin, decathal or bensulide in early spring, after the grass has recovered from winter. Combinations of herbicides with fertilizers are available and convenient to use but, as with all herbicides, should only be used according to instructions on the

label.

Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn.

April 1 VA Education Checks Reflect Temporary Reductions

Veterans receiving monthly educational assistance or vocational rehabilitation subsistence allowance checks from the Veterans Administration are due for an abrupt introduction to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (Gramm-Rudman-Hollings) on April 1, and nobody is fooling.

Benefit payments for veterans and eligible dependants and survivors enrolled in VA education and training programs have been reduced 8.7 percent to meet requirements of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act. For a single veteran attending school full time under VA educational assistance programs, this means a decrease of \$33 per month, from \$376 to \$343.

The payment adjustments, effective March 1, will show up in checks received April 1 and are scheduled to run through the balance of the current fiscal year, ending Sept. 30.

Subsistence allowances for vocational rehabilitation trainees have been reduced 13.1 percent, a monthly reduction of \$41 for a single disabled veteran training full time.

Compensation checks received by veterans for service-connected injury or disability are not affected.
