Noticed the following item in the VA's news feature notes the other day and wanted to include it in the column this week:

Question — I heard that Congress passed a law authorizing special life insurance dividends for World War II veterans. I understand that veterans are entitled to this dividend even if they haven't kept their policies in force. Is this true?

Answer — No. The VA does not pay dividends on lapsed insurance policies. An insurance hoax that has plagued the VA since 1948 is refuted every year by a distribution of "applications" that claim that Congress has authorized the dividends. There has been no such action nor is there any pending. Annual dividends on current GI insurance policies are paid by the VA to veterans who continue to pay premiums. Dividend payments are made automatically, usually on the anniversary date of the policy, and no application is needed.

I thought that this might clear up some of the confusion caused by this false information.

Gorman Housing Authority To Get \$491,821 Grant

WASHINGTON — U. S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced the award of a series of Comprehensive Improvements Assistance Program contracts totalling \$48 million to 72 Texas cities.

The grants to be distributed includes a \$491,821 grant for the Housing Authority of the City of Gorman.

Other area towns receiving grants are De Leon, \$682,059; Breckenridge \$516,200; and Lometa \$65,860.

CIPA is a program of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The contract obligates the federal government, through annual contributions, to pay the principal and interest on project notes sold by the local housing authorities over a period of 20 years.

The funds will be used to modernize low-income housing units.

"I am pleased that, once again, we have been able to return some of the money Texans have paid in federal taxes to make permanent improvements that will directly benefit Texans," Gramm said in announcing the program.

The Panthers traveled to Santa Anna Friday night to take on the Mountaineers in a closely fought contest. The Mountaineers outgained and out-passed the Panthers but came up on the short end of the stick because of untimely fumbles. The Panthers came away with a 12 to 6 win.

The teams played on fairly even terms until midway through the second quarter when the Panthers took the ball on the Santa Anna 39 over the ball on the Santa Anna 49 following a fumble recovery and scored in 5 plays with Brandon Gilmore racing in for the score from 25 yards out with 7:38 left in the half. A pass try for two points failed and the score was 6-0.

The Panthers added another score with 4:22 left in the third period when Robby Hand caught a fumble in mid-air and raced 16 yards for the score. The run for two points failed and Gorman was out in front 12 to 0.

Then on their next possession the Mountaineers took the ball on their own 11 and moved the distance in 13 plays with James Hartman getting the TD on a 5 yard run with 10:36 in the game. The PAT was blocked by the Big Red defense who picked up the blocked kick and tried to return it for points, but the Gorman player could not keep his feet and got tackled.

The first Panther drive featured an 18 yard run for a first down by Gilmore.

Gilmore led the Panthers on the ground with 47 yards on 14 tries. Kevin Hirst got 32 on 18 keepers, and had several real good runs, but was held down on total yardage because of losses 4 tries. Joe Rodgers had 24 on just 5 carries.

The Panthers were lead on defense by Johnnie Osborne and Robby Hand, along with several real good defensive plays by the Panthers.

The Big Red defense will be tested again this week as they travel to Rising Star to take on the Wildcats in a district contest. This is the second year in a row that the Panthers have had to go to Rising Star. This was necessitated by changes in the district lineup. The Panthers will really have to have a great game at Rising Star because they always have tough games with the Wildcats, especially in the Wildcat Den.

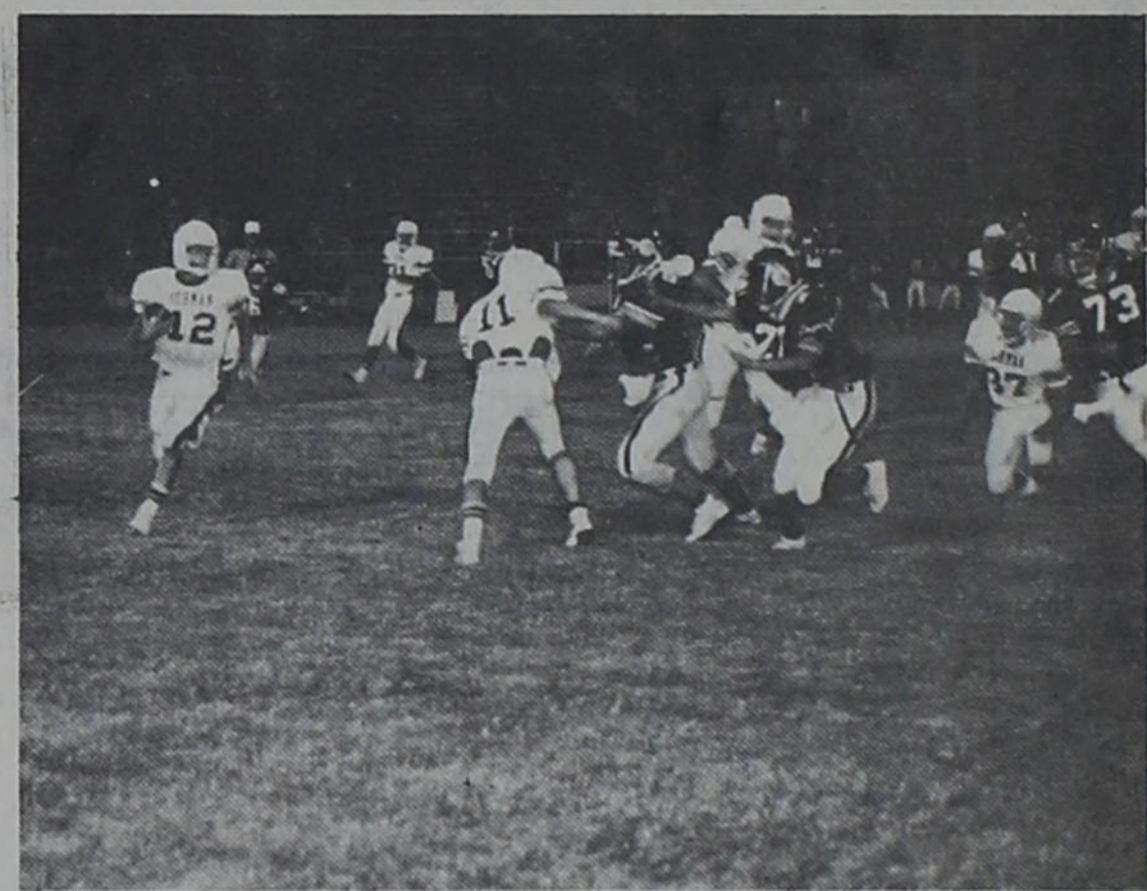
The most honored awards received at the County level are also presented at the County Awards Banquet. These are the Gold Star and Danforth Leadership Awards.

I often hear farmers and ranchers say "If I could sell the weeds I grow I could get rich". Well, here is an opportunity to sell weeds, although I probably won't make you rich. I received a letter from Schusters of Texas, Inc. this week. They are a dried flower manufacturer and use large quantities of annual broom weeds, especially the kind that tops out like umbrellas.

They asked, if we had concentrations of 10 acres or more in the county, to let them know about it. Mr. Schuster says he generally can send contract crews onto a given ranch and guarantee him \$60 per ton for the weeds and they will pick and box the product on the ranch. This is done after a frost. If you have that amount of broom weeds, you can contact Mr. Schuster at 800-592-1445.

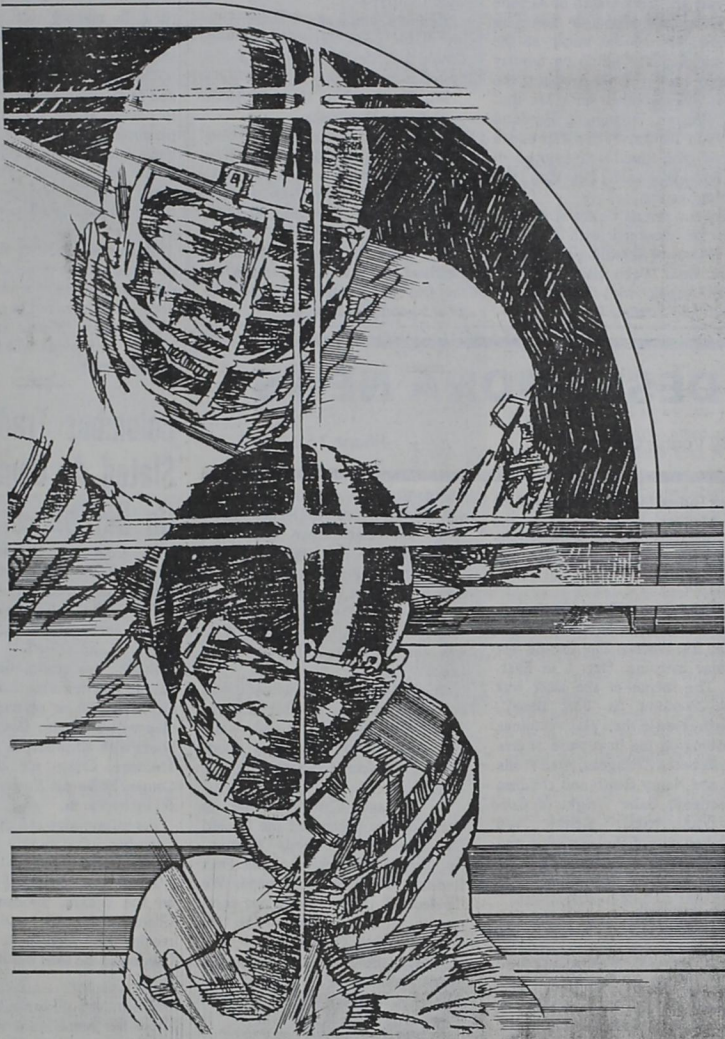

"0/92" Provisions Available For 1989 Wheat and Grain

The "0/92" provisions are available for the 1989 wheat and feed grain programs. Some producers are debating whether or not to plant winter wheat because of the dry soil conditions. This reminder may assist them in making this management decision ASCS official David Martin said.

The "0/92" provision gives wheat and feed grain producers the option to devote all or a portion of their permitted acreage to conserving uses and receive deficiency payments on the acreage. The maximum acres for deficiency payments under this provision is 92 percent of the permitted acreage.

Martin pointed out that the sign-up dates and the projected deficiency rates for the 1989 wheat and feed-grain crops have not been announced. However, Martin said that the "0/92" provisions will be available for these crops.

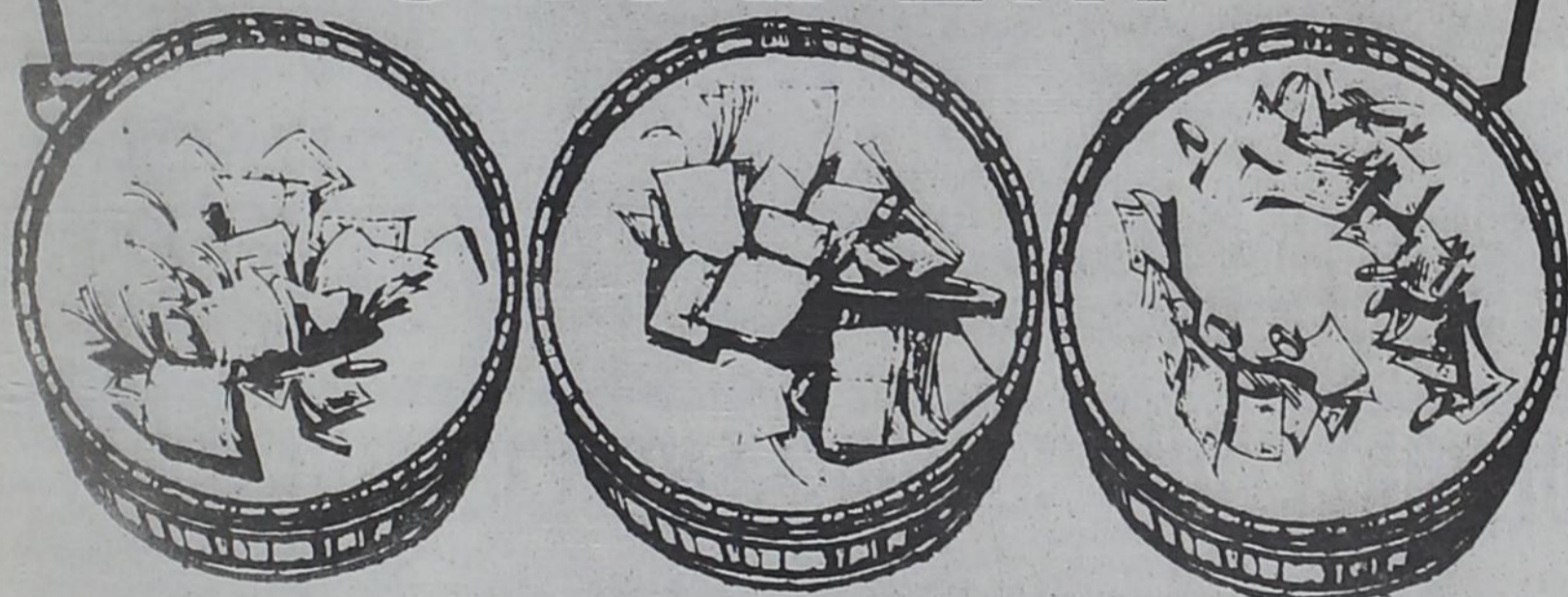
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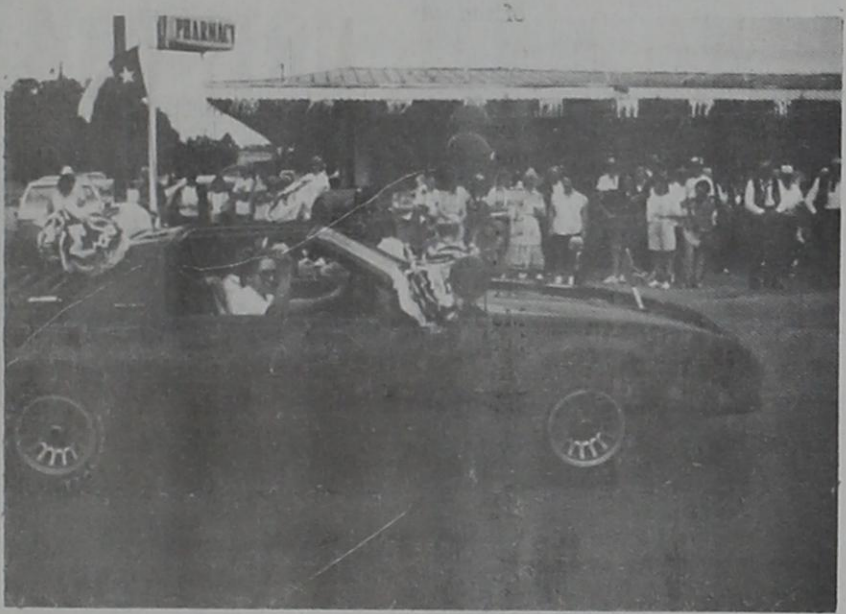
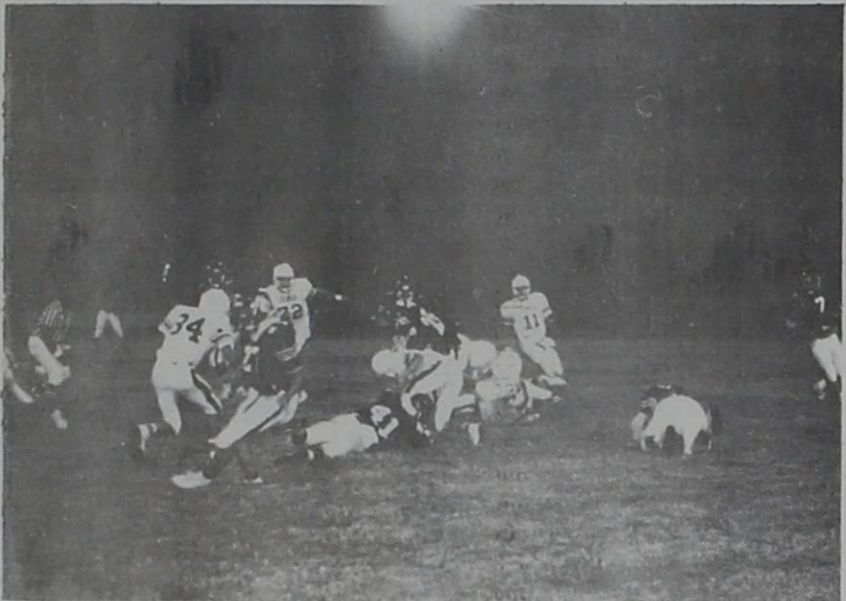
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TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

Proposed Constitutional Admendment No. 1

Three proposed constitutional amendments will be on the ballot this coming election day, November 8, 1988.

These proposals deal with a variety of issues. The first proposed amendment addresses whether money received from the Federal government as reimbursement for State money spent for highway construction, maintenance and policing of public roadways should be dedicated solely for these purposes. The second proposal relates to the establishment in the Texas State Treasury of an economic stabilization fund to be used to prevent or eliminate temporary cash deficiencies in the State's general revenues. The third amendment would create the Texas growth fund as a source of investments for businesses in Texas, and would authorize money in the permanent university fund, as well as the public school fund, to be invested in any prudent investment.

I would like to offer some background information which I hope will assist you in your decisions, and I will be discussing one of these proposed amendments each week during the next three weeks.

The Texas Constitution, adopted in 1876, has been amended 304 times, from a total of 462 amendments which have been submitted to the voters for approval. Our Constitution provides that the Texas Legislature, by a two-thirds vote of all members of each house, may propose amendments revising the Constitution, and those proposed amendments must then be submitted for approval to the qualified voters of the State. An amendment may only become a part of the Constitution if a majority of the votes cast for it in an election are cast in its favor. If approved, the amendment is effective on the date of the official canvass of returns showing adoption. The date of canvass, by law, is not earlier than the 15th or later than the 30th day after election day. However, an amendment may provide for a later effective date.

Amendment No. 1 is worded as follows: "The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

This proposal, enacted by the 70th Texas Legislature, 2nd Called Session, would amend Article VIII of the Texas Constitution to add Section 7-b. Texas voters adopted Section 7-a of Article VIII in 1946, which dedicates proceeds from motor vehicle registration fees and taxes on motor fuels and lubricants for the purposes of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways. This dedication, however, does not apply to taxes on the production of motor fuels or lubricants, nor to property taxes on real estate used for the production. Additionally, one-fourth of the proceeds from motor fuel taxes are alternatively dedicated to the support of public schools.

The result of the vehicle registration and motor fuel tax dedication has been the consistent availability of State money to finance the construction, maintenance and improvement of the State highway system. Under the Federal program of aid for public highways, states are required to pay almost all costs of planning, land acquisition, and construction on a highway project. If a project meets Federal aid specifications, the state is then reimbursed from Federal money for a major portion of its expenses (usually 90 percent of all costs of an interstate highway). The reimbursements have traditionally been used in Texas to replenish the dedicated pool of State money.

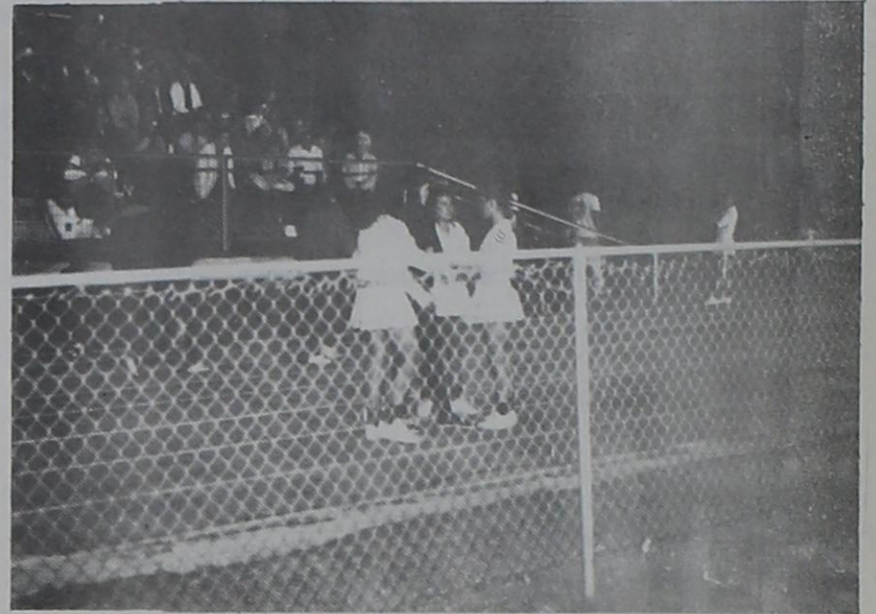
The fiscal crisis in Texas of 1986 and 1987 resulted in inquiries as to whether the Federal reimbursements could be used for purposes other than highways and policing of highways. Sources in the Federal government were divided in their opinion of permissible uses under the Federal law. Also, it is not certain whether the dedication of Article VIII, Section 7-a, of the Texas Constitution would be interpreted to incorporate Federal expense reimbursements.

The Texas General Appropriations Act estimates the amounts of Federal highway aid, most of which is Federal reimbursements, to be received in the most recent and current fiscal years to exceed \$900 million in each of those years.

Supporters of this proposal feel the Texas highway system is one of which we may be proud, and should continue to be financed as it is currently. It is suggested that population growth may result in a greater demand for new transportation facilities and require additional maintenance and improvements on existing ones. Those favoring adoption of this proposed amendment state that if Federal reimbursements of State highway expenditures are not required to be dedicated to highways, the dedicated State money could be spent each year, and the availability of unrestricted money would not be known from one fiscal biennium to another, affecting the process of planning transportation projects which require long-range budgeting.

Arguments opposing adoption of this proposal include concern that the Legislature would be restricted in its ability to set fiscal priorities based on the needs of the State for each biennium. It should be understood that constitutional dedications of money do not guarantee that the money will be appropriated for the designated purpose; rather they only prevent it from being used for any other purposes. Further, it is argued that the Federal government typically restricts the use of money it grants or rebates to the states; and, if the Federal government does not restrict a state's use of Federal highway money, that state should have the authority to leave it unrestricted.

I urge you to carefully consider the Constitutional Amendments on the November 8, 1988 ballot. Texans have indicated their ability to choose those issues which they consider to be priorities. Of the 25 proposed amendments on the 1987 ballot, Texas voters ratified 17. We have the right and the obligation to decide whether or not further amendments to the Texas Constitution are enacted.

Texas Gets \$575 Million For Texas Highways

WASHINGTON — A total of \$575 million has been earmarked for highway construction and repairs across Texas in the Transportation Appropriations bill, U. S. Sen. Phil Gramm stated.

"This marks an increase of more than \$45 million for Texas alone," Gramm said.

The senator said the bill, which is expected to be approved shortly by both the House and Senate, also contains funding for special Doppler radar systems at the Love Field in Dallas and at Hobby Airport in Houston.

Other Texas projects contained in the Transportation Appropriations legislation include:

— \$50 million for the light rail system at Houston.

— \$3 million for the Zaragosa International Bridge project in El Paso.
